EXCITING WESTERN FILM STARS JOEL McCREA, VIRGINIA MAYO

Splendid acting, a hard-hitting story loaded with suspense and action and masterful direction, all combine to make Allied Artists' "The Tall Stranger", which opens Sunday at the Palace Theatre, one of the year's top entertainment values.

Joel McCrea and Virginia Mayo are starred in the action drama that was filmed in CinemaScope and DeLuxe color, and they register with superb performances. Their portrayals contribute greatly to a fast moving action drama that can be classed as first-rate entertainment for the entire family.

"The Tall Stranger" relates the adventures of a wagon party of early day settlers that is heading toward the West Coast. The party is misled by a smooth-talking outlaw, played by George N. Neise, who convinces the leaders that they should settle in a lush valley. This turns into a valley of

death for the wagon party as it finds itself trapped in a deadly war between Neise's outlaws and the gunfighters working for Hardy Bishop, played by Barry Kelley, who owns the land.

There are some tremendous action scenes as McCrea rides into the middle of the shooting war and tries to help the settlers. One particularly effective sequence shows the outlaws in a pre-dawn raid on the Bishop ranch and there is another fight scene with McCrea and Michael Ansara as they battle in the middle of a raging stream.

"The Tall Stranger" is head and shoulders above the usual

Davis point out that a ton of silage costing from \$4 to \$5 is equal in feeding value to about 500 pounds of 16 percent grain mix costing \$15 to \$18.
