891 Reported In Area Churches Last Sunday

Tornado Signal Adopted

Plans for construction of a 55-foot tower to house an air-operated whistle to be used as a tornado alert are now complete according to City Officials. The tower will be built near the fire station and will also be used in connection with fire drills and rescue work. The tornado signal is expected to be a series of short blasts on the whistle. The all clear signal will be one continuous whistle.

A Civil Defense movie about disasters will be shown next Monday night in East Ward Auditorium at 8 p. m. Admission is free. A weather man from Lubbock will also be here to answer any questions that might arise.

Bill R. Barrett and Russell E. Powers have been appointed to serve as co-ordinators of a Civil Defense Disaster and Rescue Unit. Purpose of the units are to function in any type of disaster, including tornados, floods, explosions, etc.

These units will include trained tornado spotter groups, rescue units, trained first aid units and trained police units. The coordinators will undertake an education program aimed at schools, hospitals and convalescent homes, theatres, or any public place. Personnel of these places will be informed on proper procedure during an alert.

Other units being set up include fire equipment; first aid and rescue; police; communication; information center; transportation; hospital; and food committee. Heads of these units and committees are now being appointed and will be announced in next week's paper.

Already organized is the Caprock Civil Defense and Rescue Units, made up of Spur, Dickens, Crosbyton, Ralls, Lorenzo and Floydada. These units will combine to help each other in case of emergency. Norton Barrett, Crosbyton, has been named coordinator and Bill Bell, Crosbyton, assistant. Mr. Purdy of Ralls will serve as secretary-treasurer.

In order that maximum efficiency might be carried out in this disaster program, officials have asked that all persons with storm cellars please fill out the clipping printed below and mail it to the Civil Defense Coordinator, Spur. With this information on file, disaster officials will be able to assign cellars to school children, or check cellars following a storm to see that they are clear of debris and no one has been injured.

Pan American Pet. Corp., operating from Lubbock, has announced the confirmation and southeast extension of the recently opened Croton on Creek-Tannehill field of south-central Dickens County.

Confirmation well, the No. 1-J S. W. Swenson, potential on pump for 113 barrels oil and no water per day from casing perforations at 4,635-50 feet. Completion was natural.

Oil gravity tested 37 degrees and gas-oil ratio was 350-1. Hole was made to a total depth of 4,900 feet and plugged back to 4,850 feet for completion. Five and one-half inch pipe was run to total depth.

Well site is located 1,960 ft. from south and 680 ft. from east lines of the west half of the east half of Section 275, Block 1, H&GN survey; eight miles east-northeast of Spur townsite.

STATE REPRESENTATIVE

Robert R. Patterson Announces Candidacy For State Senator

Robert R. Patterson, State representative from Snyder, announced Thursday, April 24, 1958, he is a candidate for nomination for State Senator of the 24th Senatorial District.

Patterson, 46, a lawyer, has served two terms in the House of Representatives from the 90th Legislative District, composed of Scurry, Garza, Kent, Pearson, and Crosby Counties. He was chairman of the delegation to the 24th Senatorial District at the Democratic Convention in Fort Worth in 1956.

The incumbent State Senator is David Ratliff of Stamford who was elected in a special election following the death of Harley Sadler.

In making his announcement for the upper house of the State Legislature, he said he would make an on-the-ground, person-to-person campaign from now until election day.

"Based on my experience in the Capital during the two regular sessions and two special sessions of the Legislature, I am convinced that the best interest of the people of West Texas will be served by a change in this office. During the course of this campaign I will submit the record to substantiate my opinion," the candidate said.

Patterson was born at Rotan, August 18, 1911, the son of Mrs. R. R. Patterson and the late R. R. Patterson, a pioneer family which settled in Fisher County in 1907. He attended the public schools in Rotan, Texas Tech, The University of Texas and graduated with the LL.B. Degree from Cumberland University. Licensed to practice law in 1939, Patterson opened a law office in Snyder. During World War II Patterson was in the Navy aboard a destroyer operating in the Atlantic and Pacific.

Prior to his first term in the House of Representatives in 1955, Patterson had served as Special County Judge of Scurry County during the height of the oil boom there and as City Judge of Snyder.

The 24th Senatorial District of the State Legislature is composed of Dickens, Garza, Kent, Stonewall, Borden, Scurry, Fisher, Jones, Shackelford, Howard, Mitchell, Nolan and Taylor Counties.

ON ACREAGE RESERVE LAND

ASC Receives Approval To Help Farmers Put Down Cover Crops

The Dickens County ASC has received approval for an ACP practice to assist farmers in putting a cover crop on Acreage Reserve Land (cotton or wheat) or any other idle cropland that the farmers may have, according to W. W. Gunn, ASC office manager.

Be sure to read the specifications on this practice before applying for payment.

Specifications are as follows:

1. A cover sufficient to offer a good wind erosion protection must be attained before payment is made.
2. The cover must be left on the land until January 1, 1959.
3. The crop must NOT be harvested or grazed.
4. The cover crop must be gone over with a stalk cutter or some like means whereby it cannot be harvested at any time.
5. The following crops will apply:

Sweet sorghum, sudan, sorghum alum, perennial sudan.

6. (a). Planted in 16 inch to 42 inch rows—\$1.30 per acre.
- (b). Drilled or broadcast—\$1.80 per acre.

May 10, 1958 — Final date to dispose of excess wheat.

Points of interest to farmers who have land in soil bank-acreage reserve:

Cotton or Wheat

1. Do NOT graze or harvest anything from these acres.
2. This is the one year agreement.
3. We will help you (from ACP funds) put a cover on these acres.
4. Control noxious weeds — cockle bur, sunflower and tumble weeds.

Funeral services for Mrs. Ruth Ann Mosley, 17, Dallas, who was accidentally shot to death late Monday afternoon, were held in the Four Square Church Wednesday afternoon, Rev. J. E. Lee officiating. He was assisted by Rev. Pete Adcock, Amarillo.

Mrs. Mosley was shot in the heart during a playful scuffle with a teen age friend, Robert Grant. Grant said he did not know the gun was loaded.

Justice of the Peace J. E. Berry rendered a verdict of accidental death by accidental shooting, and County Attorney Alfred Walker and District Attorney John B. Stapleton said they had concluded the death was accidental and Walker said no charges have been filed and none are contemplated.

At the time of her death Mrs. Mosley was visiting with her parents, Mr. and Mrs. Clyde Morrow, Spur. Since her marriage on March 29, to Don Lee Mosley, she had made her home with him in Dallas. She had been scheduled to return to Dallas Wednesday.

Survivors include her husband, Don Lee Mosley; her parents, Mr. and Mrs. Clyde Morrow, and one sister, Mrs. Frances Blackburn, Alameda, Calif.

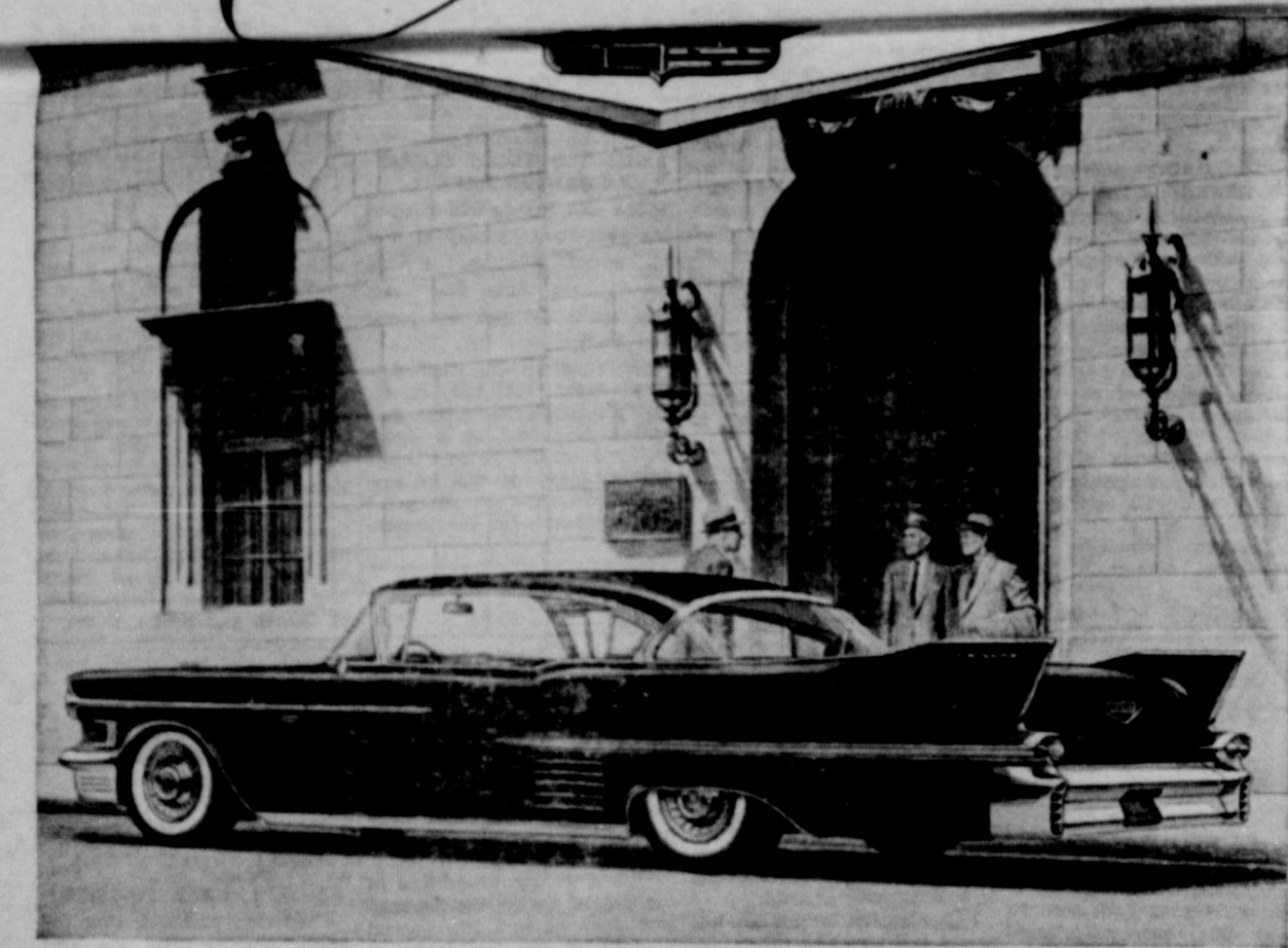

McAdoo Girl Wins First In District P-TA Safety Contest

Can we afford not to teach driver education? This question should be one of vital concern to our schools today.

The number of highway casualties in recent years has been shocking. Between 25 and 40 thousand persons are killed annually in traffic accidents, and over 100 thousand persons are permanently disabled. Of the drivers involved in fatal accidents in 1952, more than one-fourth were 24 years of age or younger. Seventy-one out of every one hundred drivers during that year were guilty of at least one violation. When we look at facts such as these we realize that something should be done to improve these conditions.

I think that every driver should be given proper training before he is granted a driver's license. We, as young citizens, need to learn all we can about automobiles and modern traffic safety. A course in driver education will not only give us these facts, but it will do much toward developing right attitudes toward traffic responsibilities. Police officers tell us that no city could hire enough officers to enforce the traffic laws if the people are not willing to obey the law of their own free will. It is much better to help prevent an accident than to punish the offender after an accident has taken place.

"Showing off" in a car is one of the major causes of accidents. Some people think they are smart when they speed and show off on highways. Some drivers have the attitude that "It's all right if you don't get caught." Obeying the laws is the responsibility of each of us. Laws are made for the good of everyone, and when a law is broken the person who breaks it should be punished. Not all violations result in accidents, but continued violations nearly always result in accidents.

High school driver education courses produce good results. Studies made in Pennsylvania compare the driving records of high school students who had received driver training and those who had not. The trained students had fewer accidents than the untrained ones.

I think that pupils in the seventh and eighth grades should be able to take classroom courses, and that high school students should be able to take classroom and under-the-wheel courses, because this is the age group that is learning to drive.

There may be those who feel that offering driver education courses in high school is too expensive, but if it can help to save lives then it is worth much more than it costs in dollars and cents. No amount of money can measure the value of a human life.

1. This is the (5) five or more year contract.
 2. Do NOT harvest or graze anything from these acres.
 3. Establish a cover crop on these acres.
 4. Control noxious weeds - cockle burrs and sunflowers.
 5. If you have already established a cover, then don't plow up what you have until it has been inspected by our County Performance Supervisor.
- If you wish to seed a native grass cover such as: side oats gramma, blue gramma, buffalo, ect., then you must establish a litter crop the first year. This can be done by seeding forage sorghum (not grain sorghum) - sweet sorghum, sudan grass. If you seed sorghum alum, switch grass, perennial sudan

blue panic, johnson grass, grass you do not need a litter cover established in advance. These are considered a permanent cover.

The Soil Bank Program will help you establish either the Litter Cover or Permanent Cover.

SOME CAN ADJUST Delinquents Should Receive Varied Treatment - Knowles

Not all delinquents should be considered the same way any more than we think of various illnesses—physical or mental—in the same way. There are many kinds and degrees of delinquency and the treatment of each case may vary somewhat.

I'm thinking of a boy about 14-years of age who made one major mistake. He stole a college student's car (the keys were left in the car) one day after school, picked up a friend and drove around town for an hour or so. When he returned the car to the place from which he took it, police officers apprehended him.

Questioning revealed that the boy was healthy, intelligent, curious and extremely bored. He was an Eagle scout, an "A" student with too much time on his hands with "nothing" to do, so he said, "to do". He tried out for the football team but had failed to qualify because he started late. Both his mother and father were working so the boy shifted for himself after school looking for... he wasn't sure, just looking mostly. That's when he saw a car with the keys inside.

The boy's mother was an insecure person. Most of the time she was just plain tired. His father was termed by the boy to be very strict, uninterested and uninteresting.

Counseling was provided by a group of concerned persons from various agencies. A job was found for the boy after school as well as a full-time summer job. The next fall the boy made the football team and became interested in acquiring some new friends. His home

conditions became more livable. To this date the boy is making a good adjustment.

"Right" and "wrong" are important concepts to learn. Children should have learned the difference between right and wrong by the time they are eight-years of age, according to Dr. Gesell who is famous for his research on thousands of children of all ages.

The refinement of these concepts may go on throughout one's lifetime. Honesty is honesty regardless of age, color, class or creed—whether we are at home at school, at church or just around the community.

Every person in the community is responsible to teach honesty as well as to learn and practice its virtues. Juvenile delinquency and honesty can scarcely stand each other's company. (To Be Continued)
