The Spur High School FFA chapter has qualified two judging teams to participate in the State contests to be held Saturday at Texas A&M College.

Last Saturday at Texas Tech, the livestock judging team, composed of Freddie Scott, Kenneth Suit and Marshal McCalliard placed 10th. The dairy products team placed 9th among 50 teams. It is made up of Bennie Loe, Calvin Dozier and Donnie Arnold.

Although ten teams from the local chapter participated in the contests, only five were eligible for state competition. The other five were held on the Area I level. State competition will be run off in meat judging, poultry judging and dairy cattle judging.

## Disaster Unit Heads Named

Construction is now underway on a 50 foot tower to house a tornado warning whistle according to Civil Defense officials. The tower is located adjacent to the Fire Station.

The whistle will be utilized only when a tornado has been sighted. Plans are underway for the Lubbock Weather station to contact Civil Defense headquarters in Spur in case there is an alert out for the area. A test of the warning system is planned in the near future.

Efforts are also being made to obtain 40x40 metal shelters for the schools. These metal houses would be sunk underground and would serve as a shelter for school children during an alert.

In conjunction with the disaster program being set up for Spur, classes in first aid and rescue work are being planned. The courses are open to both men and women. Interested persons leave their name and address at the City Office, tentative Civil Defense headquarters.

J. Dyess; Fire department—Buddy Hoover; school—M. C. Hurst and search parties—Dickens County Sheriff's posse.

Anyone interested in serving on one of these committees should contact the committee chairman.

Information about local storm cellars is still vitally needed. Especially those who are in the vicinity of a school. Location, capacity, construction of the cellar should be sent to Civil Defense Coordinator, Spur, Texas.

## Negro Gets Life; Two Soldiers Receive Three Years Probation

A sentence of life imprisonment was assessed Eddie Fletcher, a Monahan Negro, in 110th District Court in Dickens Tuesday after a jury found him guilty of murder without malice as a result of a fatal automobile crash near Spur and also of being an habitual criminal.

Fletcher, formerly of Lubbock, was charged with murder without malice while driving an automobile while intoxicated. Dist. Atty. John Stapleton of Floydada had enhanced the charge with two prior felony convictions of the defendant.

Judge L. D. Ratliff of Spur levied the life sentence, which is automatic upon conviction of a defendant for a felony and upholding of the enhancement.

In other court action, two Ft. Hood soldiers entered a plea of guilty in District Court to the burglary of Merchant's Motor Freight in February.

They were placed on probation for a three year period.

## Disorder Ranks High In Farm Accidents

"Swing out with spring and clean up things," is the advice to farm families from the Texas Farm and Ranch Safety Council. Disorder ranks second only to poor judgment as a cause of farm and home accidents, according to records supplied the group by the National Safety Council.

The records show that one out of every five people contacted in a survey of hospitalized home accident cases to be the victim of an accident caused by disorder. Cluttered, untidy surroundings are breeding places for accidents, points out the Council and are also responsible for other hazards which are a threat to the health and well-being of the family.

Fire finds a breeding place in papers, rags and rubbish tucked into closets, attics or corners. Volatile fuels, paints, cleaners, insecticides are other fire hazards if not properly stored. Check the farm and home for overloaded electrical circuits; lubricate all electric motors in accordance with the manufacturer's recommendations and take a good look at the home ventilating system.

Eliminate fall hazards by keeping stairs, halls and alleyways clear of obstructions. Check light bulbs and clean lamp shades for better lighting in hall and on stairways. Remove from the premises, advises the Council, broken glass,

nails protruding from boards, scrap metal and loose wire. Too, they point out that rodents don't like a clean farmstead.

The Councilmen suggest a spring paint-up as part of the spring cleaning job. Hazards which often go unnoticed may be found during the cleaning and painting operations. The Council members believe that a clean and orderly farm will produce more at lower cost for there will be a place for everything and everything will be

in place on the well-kept farm.

## Fire Ant Invasion Provokes Quarantine In Six Counties

The vicious little imported Fire Ant, infamous for its painful bite and destructive habits, is the target of a new federal quarantine imposed in eight states, including Texas.

Six Texas counties will be "blocked off" due to the federal order, in an effort to prevent the further spread of the pest into farm and ranch country. Beginning May 6th, movement of plants, soil and other carrying agents of the ant will be closely supervised in the infested areas.

Many East Texas farmers already are acquainted with the fire ant, a native of South America who has also recently become an "unwanted alien" in parts of Alabama, Arkansas, Florida, Georgia, Louisiana, Mississippi, and South Carolina. Texas counties under quarantine include Hardin, Jasper, Jefferson, Newton, Orange and Tyler.

In these counties, the fire ant has made a name for itself as a pest harmful to crops, livestock and humans. It often attacks small animals, ground-nesting birds, poultry and new-

born calves and pigs. Its fiery sting can bring death to these young farm animals and make the farmer's field work painful, and often impossible. The hard mounds of dirt, sometimes as high as 18 inches and two feet cross, cause damage to machinery.

The quarantine order will cause some unavoidable difficulty, especially to nurserymen whose property is infested. Any business whose main activity involves transportation of growing plants, is affected by the order.

Nurserymen are urged to inspect their property carefully before the quarantine becomes effective. Texas Department of Agriculture inspectors are available to help eradicate the pest. If a nursery is found to be free of the insect before the federal quarantine is imposed, then some of the regulatory problems will be simplified. An infested property will have to treat its plants to kill the ant before shipment is permitted.

I think it is a great privilege to have my mother and dad teach me to drive and help to correct my mistakes. I am going to take Driver Education so that it will help me learn more about the car and the principals of driving. I think the young driver should realize his mistakes and try to improve them.

The teenage driver must take the responsibility of driving seriously. He should learn he is not only responsible for himself, but also for the others using the highway. "If you drive, don't drink. If you drink, don't drive." This is a good slogan and if more people followed it, there would be fewer ac-

cidental. "Slow down and live," is another slogan to which the young driver should pay attention. Speed is one of the most common causes of accidents. The young driver's attitudes are very important. The teenage driver must not get the idea that "he comes first" on the highway. Small courtesies such as dimming your lights when approaching another car, slowing down to let others pass you, and yielding the right-of-way to pedestrians and the other driver will always pay off.

Alertness while driving is very important. If you become sleepy while driving, either change drivers or pull off the roadway and take a nap. While you sleep always leave a window open just a little. Carbon monoxide is deadly.

No matter how well the teenager drives, one is not a safe motorist unless his car is in good condition. The Department of Public Safety will inspect every automobile annually. Your car must have the following required equipment:

Headlights (with high and low beam); safety glass; windshield wipers; horn (but not bell, whistle, or siren); hand brake; foot brake; front and rear registration plates with light on rear; muffler; red tail light; red reflector and stop light. A rearview mirror may be used to help you see vehicles that are about to pass. Turn indicators may also be used.

Laws are for your safety in driving. Some of the main rules are: When driving do not go over the speed limit; never drive through a red light; yield the right of way to vehicles and pedestrians; see if there are cars approaching from back or front before you pass another car; keep on the right side of the road except when passing; do not pass on a hill or curve; and drivers of any age must obey a traffic officer at all times.

Driver education not only helps young drivers of today to learn the principals of driving, but it teaches the teenage driver how dangerous and destructive a car can be unless used properly. I believe Driver Education will help us to be safety conscious, which will make our highways safer for all.

I think driver education should be taught in every school in the state because people should be taught to drive.

In 1952 there were 1,350,000 injured, and 38,000 killed. Many of these accidents were caused by teenagers who did not know how to drive correctly. Most teenagers think that the automobile is just a toy, a thing in which to play or act smart, while driving.

A great number of young people are not taught properly how to drive; therefore they do not know the rules of automobile driving. But now driver education is here to teach us how to drive safely and correctly. It also teaches us how to develop good driving attitudes.

Developing the proper attitudes has been a difficult problem for teachers and parents. The authorities know that good driving is a large part of intelligent living.

I believe the answer to the traffic problem lies in education. Even experts believe that there is not any suggestion to support the belief that conditions will improve in the near future, unless people are taught properly to drive.

If one wants to enjoy the privileges of driving, then one should want to learn how to drive safely. We should be a leader in the interest of safety for others and make every effort to encourage the young

## Public Safety Department To Conduct License Check Soon

An effort to rid Texas highways of unlicensed and unsafe drivers was revealed recently by Major R. A. Crowder, Region 5 Commander of the Texas Department of Public Safety.

At the same time, Crowder pointed out that sixteen percent of all rural fatal accidents in Texas during 1956 involved an unlicensed driver.

Officers of the Department will begin conducting driver's license checks in the immediate future on all traveled thoroughfares in Region 5 and throughout the State. All motorists that are stopped will be required to exhibit their licenses to the officers.

"It is not our desire to surprise motorists without a forewarning," Crowder said. "So we would like to take this opportunity to advise them that they may expect these checks

at any time in the future," Crowder stated.

The Commander stated that the driver's license law in Texas is nearing 22 years on our statutes and we feel that no driver has a legitimate excuse for not having a valid driver's license. This law requires any operator of a motor vehicle who resides in Texas or has gainful employment in the State to be licensed as an operator, commercial operator or chauffeur.

The driver's license checks will be made on a full enforcement basis and vehicle safety inspection stickers will also be checked and motorists not having a valid driver's license or current inspection sticker as required by law will be cited into the proper court.

Major Crowder is requesting all City Police Departments and County Sheriff Departments to assist in this effort.

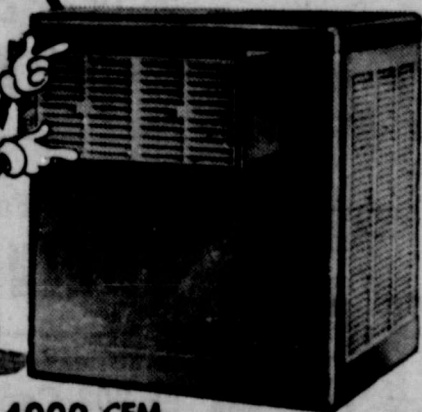

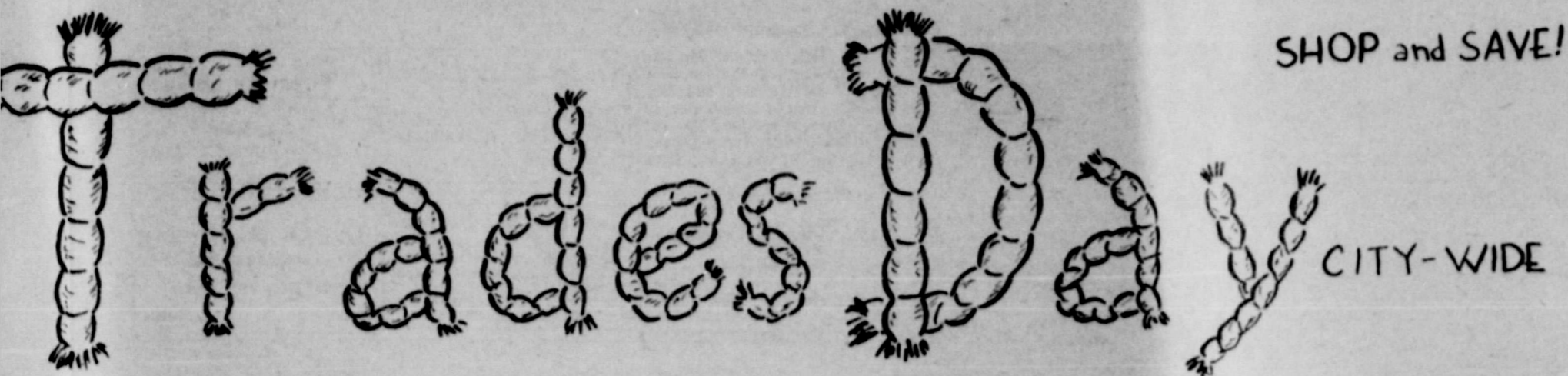

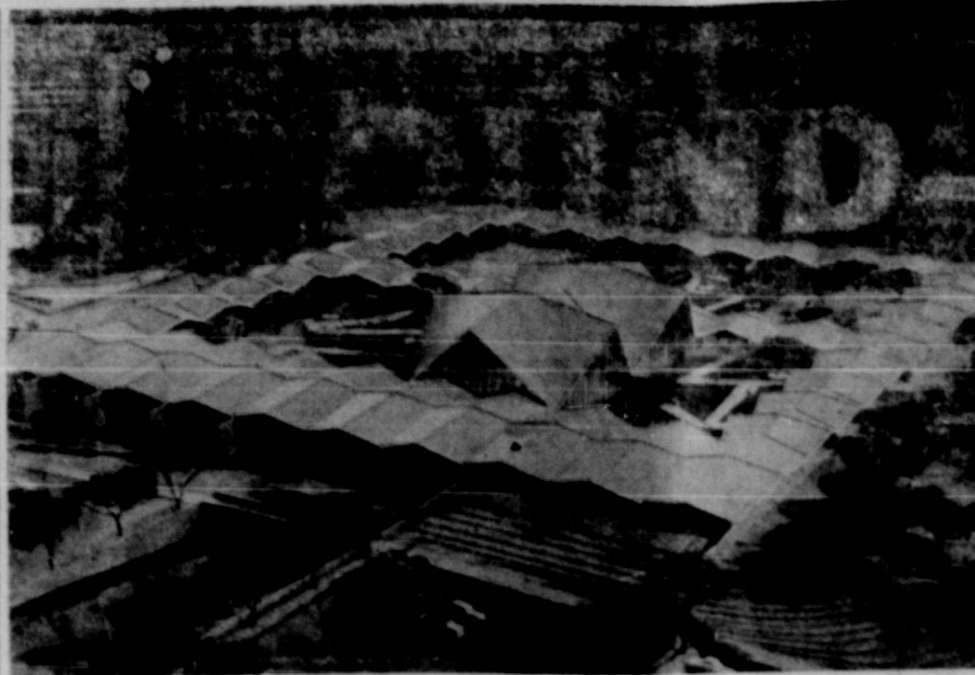

**Disabled Must File By June 30 For Benefits**

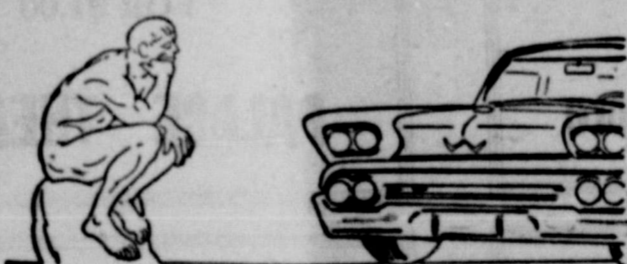
June 30, 1958 is a very important date for many disabled people, John G. Hutton, district manager of the Lubbock social security office said today.

Many people who are disabled have neglected to apply under the social security disability provisions Hutton said. Workers, both men and women, who have been disabled for over a year have until June 30, 1958 to file application for the disability freeze or for disability benefits if they are 50 or older. Those who have been disabled for a prolonged period and wait until June 30th may forfeit their rights to disability benefits at age 50, to maximum old-age benefits, and to benefits for their survivors.

Hutton pointed out that there is no deadline for those who file within a year from the time they become disabled. The June 30, 1958 deadline applied only to those who have been disabled for a prolonged period.
