**Three Dramatic Stars Combine Talents For Realism In 'The Tarnished Angels'**

The American story classic on Hollywood's "too-hot-to-handle" list for the past three decades has finally reached the screen and with only minor deletions of its basic realism which, in times past, precluded movie reproduction.

William Faulkner's novel, "Pylon," candidly outspoken beyond its first publication ear, seems even more forthright as a motion picture, "The Tarnished Angels," presented at the Palace Theatre, starting Sunday. Rock Hudson, Robert Stack, and Dorothy Malone, the brilliant three of "Written on the Wind," are starred with Jack Carson.

Hearty audience response to this earthly entertainment not only indicates public awareness of Faulkner's towering literary importance but gives evidence of growing moviegoer demand for adult honesty in the films.

To say "The Tarnished Angels" is unique would not be doing it justice. First off, it brings a new Rock Hudson. The actor, selected by the Theatre Owners of America as "Star of the Year" appears as the threasure, fumbling reporter covering a New Orleans air circus during the early thirties.

Hudson adds a new dimension to his already giant stature as a dramatic performer.



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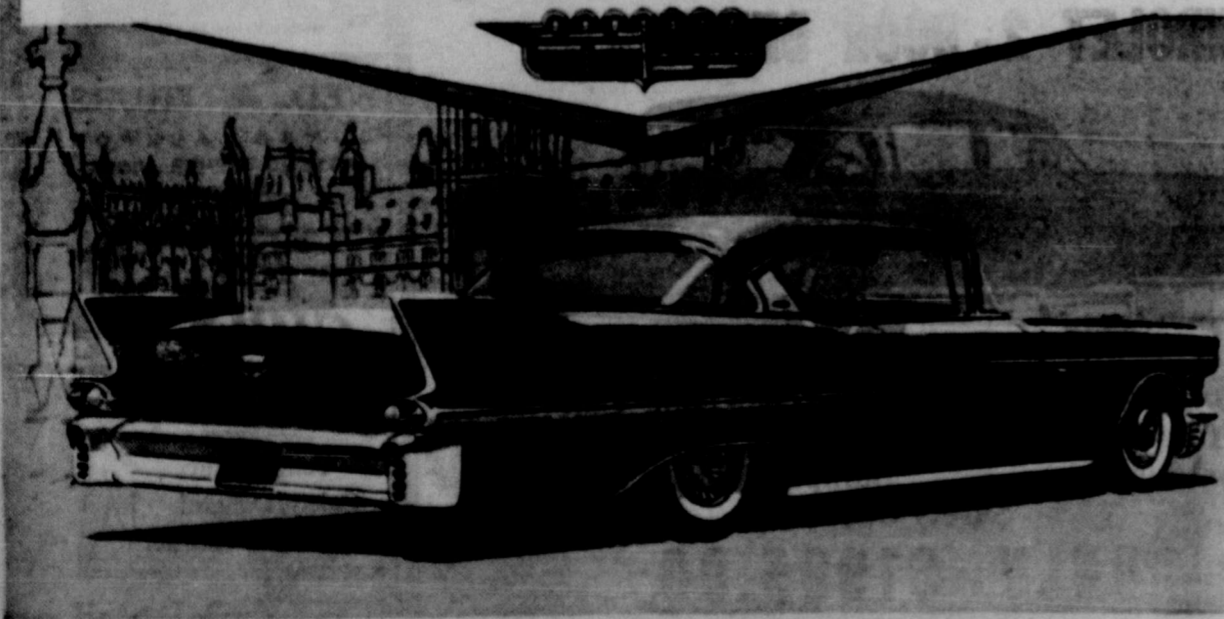
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## Society Needs to Answer Three Questions Regarding Delinquency

(Concluding a Series of Three Articles.)

Society still needs to answer completely as possible three questions about Juvenile Delinquency:

1. What do we know about Juvenile Delinquency?
2. What is it we don't know about Juvenile Delinquency?
3. With the knowledge we have, what is the best way to cope with Juvenile Delinquency?

We do have some information like statistics, descriptive material, case histories and programs of treatment which have had various degrees of success. The knowledge we do have and the scattered programs currently underway are gratifying. But what we do have is far from enough. Our national attention has been focused upon the problem, but more attention is not enough. We are scarcely keeping pace with the problem.

In addition, the trend in delinquency in the high school age groups. Today much attention is directed toward the junior high school age group. Young people today develop more rapidly and come of age sooner than did their parents.

Today's children are taller than their predecessors—even their feet are two sizes larger than those of the same sex. What does this mean in terms of Juvenile Delinquency? When a child is delinquent at a pre-teen age, we are not too concerned, because he is small, much smaller than adults. But when he becomes as big or bigger than ourselves and can carry knives, clubs, guns and fights with them, we are suddenly surprised and concerned.

Becoming concerned too late may be our undoing. The time to really become concerned is when we detect the slightest trends toward delinquency and this may be early in the elementary years or even before school age. One fact is certain. No one is born a delinquent. Delinquency must be learned. Man lives on this earth approximately 25,000 days and nights. One-third of this time is spent in childhood with the remainder in adulthood. The average married couple lives 13,000 to 15,000 days and nights together. And of that time—assuming they have one child—they have roughly 6,500 days and nights to rear him. Of these days and nights, it may take around 2,000 days and nights or five to six years to help a child become delinquent. These days and nights are not only sufficient time to make lots of mistakes, but also lots of corrections. It is true that shocking experiences can go a long way toward handicapping a child. But it isn't so much what happens to a child as it is how he feels about what happens to him.

Some of the major tragedies of life are family-centered—such as divorce, disease, dependency and delinquency. Yet, we do little to overcome this influence. The family is often given the least attention of the basic institutions in society. It receives most of the blame for Juvenile Delinquency but the least help in correcting and preventing this social evil. If this growing problem of Juvenile Delinquency is to be curbed and eventually reduced, it

most likely will be done by families with adequate knowledge about how each individual child should be reared through his or her formative years. The work of supporting agencies should be concentrated in help for the family. Bad driving conditions prevailed in less than 15 percent of the fatal highway accidents in the U. S. in 1957.

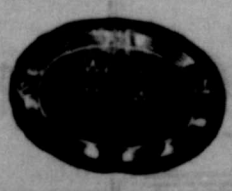
