One In Thirteen Finds Fault With New Dial Phone System

Only one out of every 13 Spur telephone customers had anything unfavorable to say about the telephone company or its service in the post card survey just completed here, according to Jim Garrett, manager for Southwestern Bell Telephone Company.

"Naturally we're quite pleased with the response we got from our customers here," Garrett said. "We mailed 675 cards and 115 were returned with comments. It was gratifying that only 51 replies—about 8 per cent of the total mailing—were criticisms, even though we pointed out that we weren't looking for compliments."

The company started the canvass about six weeks ago, mailing double post cards to all customers here. The purpose of the project was to find out what customers had complaints so the company could try to remove the causes of the complaints. Each customer was asked to fill out the return half of the card, listing their comments or criticisms of tele-

Wrecks Spur Traffic Crackdown

Two car wrecks, involving four cars and a school bus, have spurred Police Chief Wayne Beadle to issue a warning that he will crack down on all traffic violations.

The wrecks occurred Sunday night and Monday at noon.

In the Sunday wreck, a 1954 Ford, driven by Mrs. Virginia Ford, crashed into a 1955 Chevrolet driven by Jett Conner.

Investigating officers related the following incident:

The Conner car was moving

west down West Harris when it was struck in the side by the car driven by Mrs. Lindsey, which emerged from Miller St. Conner's car careened between trees, after scraping a parked car owned by Preston McClanahan. The car came to rest near the McClanahan house after it had crashed through a porch column.

Mary Ann Gregory, Gale Buzbee and David Albin were riding with Conner. Miss Gregory was hospitalized and later released.

Tanya Lindsey, two year old daughter of Mrs. Lindsey, received a broken arm. The other occupants of the car, Yvonne Nichols and Donnelle Young were both hospitalized, but have since been released. The infant has also been released.

Mrs. Lindsey was issued a ticket by investigating officers for running a stop sign. Investigation of the wreck is still in progress.

Damage to the McClanahan car has been estimated at about \$150. Both Conner's car and

the one Mrs. Lindsey was driving were termed a total loss.

Monday about 12:25, a 1955 Oldsmobile, driven by Donald Estep, hit a school bus and glanced into a lamp pole at Willard and 3rd St.

W. S. Alredege, driver of an empty school bus, said he had stopped at a stop sign, then thinking he was clear, pulled out into the intersection. He immediately saw the Estep car approaching and stopped. The car hit the bus bumper and then the lamp pole. Damage

was estimated at about \$800 to the car. The bus was undamaged.

Officers issued Estep a ticket for speeding. No injuries were reported.

Peace Officers Schedule Annual Meeting Today

The Caprock Peace Officers Association will hold their annual meeting today at the Ranch of Horace Wood, in Kent County.

Approximately 400-500 area peace officers are expected to attend. The Caprock Peace Officers Association has consistently recorded the best attendance record of any organization of its kind in the state.

Formed in 1949, with six peace officers in attendance, the association's annual meeting has grown steadily through the years. In 1957, despite inclement weather, 376 officers and guests were registered.

Cecil Fox, State Game Warden for Dickens, Crosby and King counties, has served as president of the organization since its beginning.

In 1951, the meeting was expanded to include a shooting contest with live rattlesnakes as targets. This event has come to be known as the Rattlesnake Rodeo. Rattlesnakes for this year's shoot were trapped, for the most part, on the SMS and Matador Ranches. Helping catch snakes were: Cecil Fox, Gene Roberts, Spur; Mr. Cowan, Sweetwater; Mr. Osborne, Snyder; and W. G. McMillan and party, Lubbock.

The officers and guests are divided into groups for shooting. The two highest shooters in each group enter the final shoot. Each shooter gets three shots at a rattler.

Scoring will be by hits: In the head or within 2 inches of nose, 10 points. Hit anywhere else in the body, 5 points.

Contestants are required to fire center fire pistols. Winner of each group will receive an award.

This year's program will feature a magician, Tom Tilson. Alfred Walker will make the welcome address.

The association has just completed publication of its official magazine, "The Caprock

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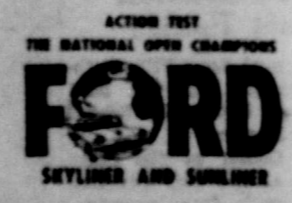

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CROWN GALL KILLS PLANTS

When plants die or fail to make satisfactory growth, Harlan Smith, extension plant pathologist, says that crown gall may be the trouble maker. This bacterial disease attacks many plants and can be recognized by the large, roundish, rough, woody swellings or galls it produces. The galls are found on the stem or trunk of the affected plant just below or at the soil surface or on the roots. Removal and burning of infected small plants is advised. Local county agents can supply control recommendations.

MILDEW HITS GARDENS
Flower and vegetable gardeners are advised to watch their plantings for signs of powdery mildew by Harlan Smith, extension plant pathologist. The fungus appears as a white to grayish growth covering the surface of the plant parts but chiefly the leaf surface. Dusting with 325-mesh sulfur or spraying with wettable sulfur (2 ozs. per gallon) will usually give good control.

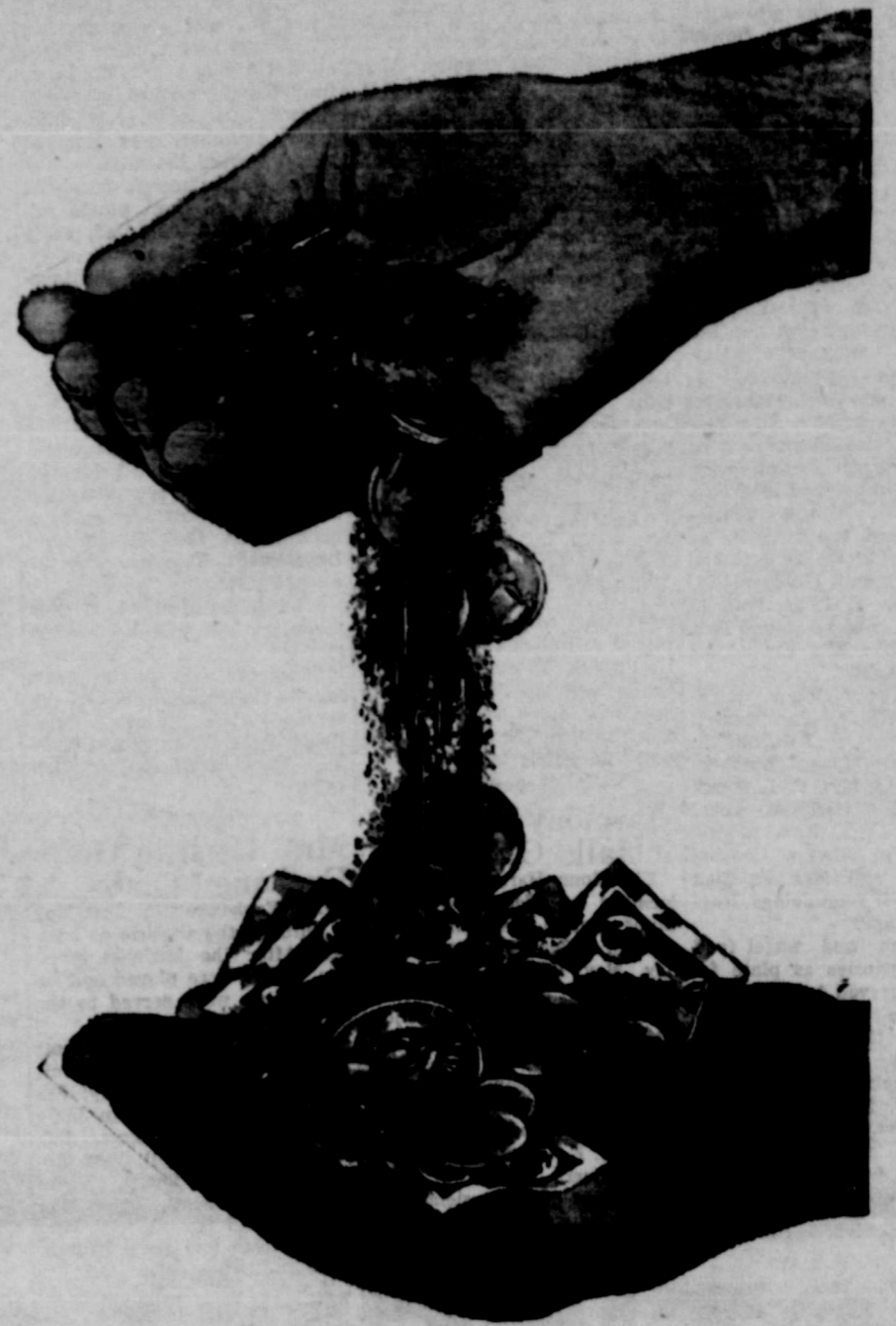

Right now reports are coming in about persons capturing young deer, coyotes, and other "babies" of the wild, hoping to make pets of them.

It's against the law, the Director warns. Wardens have been asked to keep a close watch out for persons who go into the woods and come out with the young pets.

In addition to being against the law, it also is dangerous, the Director says. For instance, a coyote pup is a cute little thing. While still very young, it is playful and full of fun. As it grows older, however, the animal instinct develops.

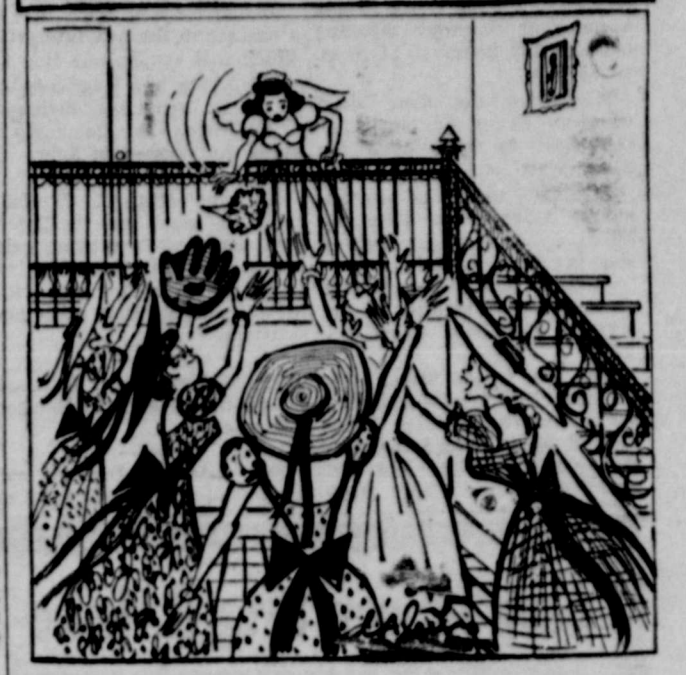
We have many cases on record where these young coyote pups have bitten the hand that feeds them, the Director warned.

"Every year we have a number of calls from persons who have found a deer they thought to be lost in the woods," the Director said. "It might be lost, but the chances are it has a much better chance of survival in the wild than when you take it away from its mother."

He advised persons finding distressed wildlife to contact the Game Warden. He'll know what to do about it.
