## Editor's Corner

At a meeting last Thursday night in Spur High School, Superintendent of Schools B. G. Nunley announced the local schools are facing a crisis concerning classroom space for next year.

Nunley told a committee of businessmen, headed by Fike Godfrey, that Spur High School will have to have at least four more classrooms in order to offer courses needed by high school students to gain entry to an accredited college.

Nunley also pointed out the need for physical shop space in the school's vocational agriculture program and a suitable homemaking department.

In the not too distant past, the people of the Spur Independent School District rejected a school bond issue of about \$500,000. Yet, the local school district spends only about \$290 per scholastic, which is far below the state average of \$364.48.

At present, the school district is in debt, \$225,000 and finance authorities say the district probably could not stand a bond of more than \$325,000.

In the face of these facts, Nunley has recommended a long range building program for the local system.

One look at the Junior High building, which has been recommended to be condemned as a fire hazard by ex-Fire Marshal R. E. Powers, will tell the layman that the people of Spur have been grossly neglecting their schools, and consequently their children.

In our opinion, the people of Spur owe it to their children to provide them with an adequate education . . . and the problem begins with an adequate school plant . . . one that will attract teachers.

It is a shame, in this modern age, that there are people who think so little of their children and their future that they will sacrifice them to a dollar sign.

We do not advocate going dangerously in debt, but advocate action, in some form of building program, that will put the Spur school system out of its present doldrums.

The "Gripe Column" we installed recently has been sputtering on the verge of death. However, after this week's column and the following "gripe", we think business should pick up.

## Third Producer Recorded In Dickens Field

The Duck Creek-Tannehill field of southern Dickens County has gained its third producing oilwell.

Fletcher Oil and Gas Drilling Corp. completed its No. 2 Mary Copeland as a northeast offset to the discovery well in the two-well Dickens County pool. Project potential on pump for 135 barrels oil daily without water. Oil gravity tested 35 degrees and gas-oil ration figured 321-1.

Hole was made to total depth of 4,583 feet, and cased with five and one-half inch to 4,579 feet for open hole completion. Top of the pay was called at 4,579 feet on kelly busing elevation of 2,240. Location is four miles southeast of Spur, being 1,519 feet from south and 1,024 feet from west lines of Section 203, Block 1, H&GN survey.

## Insects Strike Cotton

The first outbreak of cotton insects has appeared in the Spur area this week according to Bob Berry, Dickens County Agent. "Thrips are very plentiful in most fields," Berry says, "and it is easy to observe their damage to cotton. The tiny thrips are more difficult to see with the naked eye but they may be seen in good light."

"Typical damage from thrips is curling of the leaves of young cotton and severe stunting of growth. If allowed to continue," reports Berry, "it is possible that thrips will kill much of our very young cotton." Thrips are found in large numbers in older stands of cotton as well as in some fields which are just emerging.

"Control measures are easy and not expensive," states Berry, "and money invested in insect control now should pay very large dividends."

Many insecticides will give good control on thrips with very small applications. Aldrin, Dieldrin, and Heptachlor at one-half pint per acre; Toxaphene at one pint per acre; and DDT at one quart per acre will control thrips as well as other insects which are apt to attack cotton at this time.

Repeated applications of insecticides at weekly intervals will insure protection from insect attack for the growing plants and will cause the cotton to set and mature earlier. Earlier cotton usually has higher quality and consequently sells for a higher price.

"Insecticides should be applied weekly for three to four applications," advises Berry, "but in every case control measures should be discontinued by July 1 in order to allow beneficial insects to multiply." This is in brief the Extension Service Early Season Cotton Insect Control Program," concludes the County Agent. For further information farmers are urged to call upon the County Agent or to consult the leaflet L-218, "Texas Guide for Controlling Cotton Insects" which is available in the County Agent's office in Dickens and on the bulletin rack in the Farm Bureau Office in Spur.

Admission will be the same as last year according to Gregory—50 cents for adults and 25 cents for children.

Gregory will serve as pool manager while Junior high Coach Douglas McArthur will be pool director. McArthur will be assisted by Jimmy Holder. Cookie Gregory will serve as pool secretary.

The pool will be open from 2 to 7 p. m. on Monday, Tuesday, Thursday, Friday and Saturday. Wednesday hours will be 9-11 a. m. to 2-5 p. m. Sunday the pool hours will be 2 to 5 p. m.

The pool will be available for parties from 8-10 p. m. by appointment only. Gregory states. Price will be \$10, or \$5 per hour.

Registration for swimming classes will begin on June 9th. Coach McArthur will have charge of this program.

Swim tickets, good for 25 swims, will be on sale at the pool for \$10 for adults and \$5 for children.
