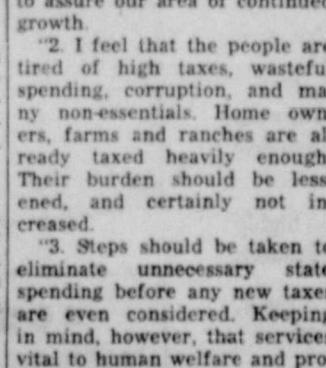

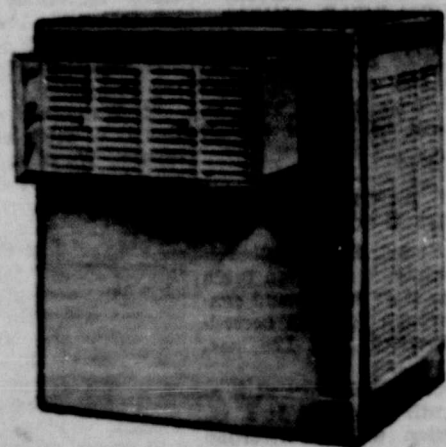

A weekly public service feature from the Texas State Department of Health.

The advent of penicillin and other so-called "wonder drugs" has revolutionized modern medical practices. These new drugs—called "antibiotics"—have caught the public's fancy, and have given physicians powerful weapons in their conquest against disease.

But into this symphony of praise has crept a sour note. Cases of incorrect dosage and self-prescription are becoming common, raising the danger of serious reactions.

It is a waste of time to run for a shot of penicillin for an oncoming cold. The drug is ineffective against the viral diseases, including common colds, flu, measles, and mumps. Taking penicillin in lozenges or other forms for scratchy throats and for upset stomachs or a variety of mild illnesses which would quickly run their course anyway, is unwise unless prescribed by a physician.

A common pattern of self-prescription goes like this: The doctor prescribes an antibiotic for a sick patient. Some of the pills are left over after the patient gets well. Several weeks later, the patient again feels had and—on his own initiative—takes the left-over pills. There are at least five good reasons why drugs should not be taken without prescription.

1. When improperly used, they may prevent or retard action of the body's natural immunity. This sometimes happens because drugs work on germs while the natural defense mechanism remains inactive.

2. Germs vary in strength and

ability to cause disease. Stronger ones may become resistant to drugs, just as some insects have become resistant to DDT. They multiply and produce new generations also capable of resisting antibodies. Recent outbreaks of infection in hospitals are proof of this.

3. Some diseases call for massive doses of drugs for prolonged periods. Taking small quantities on your own initiative might mean germs you are trying to kill may actually flourish.

4. Some people are allergic to drugs. One person in 25 is allergic to penicillin, and one in ten may develop allergic reactions after repeated doses.

5. Self-administration of antibiotics can often mask a really serious illness by obscuring symptoms, thus making an accurate diagnosis difficult or impossible.

Increasing use of wonder drugs have shown up their limitations. A most appropriate rule of thumb to follow in the use of any drug is never to take them without a physician's recommendation.



### IT'S THE LAW in Texas

Automobile Accident Rules Should Be Memorized. Vacation time is near. Soon millions of people will be driving about the country, and automobile accidents will occur with increasing frequency. What should a person do when involved in an accident?

At such times it is hard to keep your wits about you and know just what to do. It is therefore a good idea to plan in advance just what you would do in event of a smash-up. Here are a few simple rules that every driver should commit to memory:

1. Stop! Failure to stop can result in serious criminal consequences.

2. RENDER AID. If anyone is injured: (1) Render first aid. (2) Stop bleeding. (3) Call a doctor or an ambulance or both. (4) Do not move an injured person in any way that could possibly add to his injury.

3. Protect the Scene from Further Damage. You may be liable for damages to approaching drivers, unless they are properly warned. If the highway is obstructed at night, have someone turn his headlights beams on the wrecked vehicles.

4. Call an Officer. Policemen, Highway Patrolmen, Sheriff's and their deputies are trained accident investigators whose testimony may be invaluable in establishing your civil claim for damages.

5. Gather Information, write it down. Don't trust your memory. Don't guess—be specific. Measure skid marks. Step off distances. Be sure to obtain names and address of witnesses. You are required by law to exhibit your driver's license to the other driver—and he must do the same.

6. Be Careful What You Say. Even if you feel you probably are to blame, it is best to make no admission. You may learn later that the other driver was equally at fault, or more so. Emotional comments can be misconstrued by others, or may be misquoted. Whatever you say, make it factual.

7. See Your Doctor if there is the slightest chance you may be injured. Serious injuries do not always result in immediate pain or bloodshed.

8. Consult Your Lawyer Immediately. The sooner your lawyer is brought into the matter, the better he can advise you and protect your rights. He can obtain statements from the witnesses while their memories are fresh, and do many other things to insure that the true facts are preserved. Get your lawyer's advice before giving any interviews or statements to investigators or adjustors for the other side.

9. Inform your Insurance Co. Promptly. Failure to do so may void your policy.

10. Report the Accident to the Department of Public Safety. This is required by law if there is any injury, death, or total damages exceed \$25.00. An official accident report form may be procured from the Police, Sheriff's Dept.

# Dickens County Places 20,694 Cotton Acres In Soil Bank

The 23-member counties of the Plains Cotton Growers, Inc. in West Texas put only 6.4 percent of the 1958 cotton allotments in the Soil Bank. From a total allotment of 2,279,536 acres, farmers in the 23 counties put only 145,778 acres in the Soil Bank.

Acres by county ranged from a low of 742 acres put in by Yoakum County farmers to a high of 20,694 acres put in by farmers in Dickens County. It might be noted that the majority of land in both these counties is dry land acreage.

In the irrigated belt Lamb County farmers put in 17,933 and Hale County farmers put in 12,746 acres. Lubbock County, which has the largest county allotment, 229,654 acres, saw farmers put in only 9,502 acres in the Soil Bank.

Farmers received slightly more than five million dollars

compensation for this acreage being put in the 1958 Soil Bank.

## Sharp Rise Is Recorded In Farm Income

The annual rate of farm operators' realized net income rose sharply to about 13 billion dollars in the first quarter of 1958, compared with a rate of 11.7 billion in the same quarter of 1957.

This reflected substantially higher prices received by farmers for beef cattle, hogs, eggs, potatoes and other vegetables, for which supplies were reduced from a year ago, points out A. B. Wooten, extension economist.

Prices of farm products are running well above last year and are expected to average higher for the year than in 1957, says Wooten. Prospects indicate that supplies of some products will increase, notably vegetables, hogs, fed cattle, and eggs, so, current levels of prices and incomes may move toward the levels of 1957. But even so, farm operators' realized net income in 1958 is expected to be from 5 to 10 percent above the 11 1/2 billion dollars in 1957.

This increase is the opposite of last year's situation, he says. Realized net income to all farm operators was lower last year than the year before, though income per person on farm was about \$90 higher last year than in 1956.

The increase in income per person last year was due to the fact that there were about 8 percent fewer people on farms, leaving fewer persons among whom the agricultural income was divided, he adds.

More and more farm people are supplementing their incomes with off-farm employment, notes Wooten. In recent years the ratio of income from non-farm sources, compared to farm sources, has been about one to two. This means that farm people are making \$1 in non-farm jobs for each \$2 they make on the farm. The future level of income per person on farms may depend a great deal more on income from these non-farm sources.

**FARM TOPICS**

Early season cotton insect control time is here again and there is a very definite need for beginning the program at once. In many fields, trips, aphids, and grasshoppers are injuring cotton and fleahopper infestations are expected to appear at any time. Good stands, deep moisture supply, early planted cotton and good growing weather all make prospects for a bumper cotton crop look very bright but failure to control insects could bring about a complete waste of the opportunity for a successful season.

Control measures are easy and inexpensive at this stage of growth and, in my opinion, farmers cannot afford to neglect this most important phase of cotton production.

Control measures should be started at either the four leaf stage or whenever insects appear, whichever is earlier, and then repeated weekly for two to four applications, but in no case should early season applications be repeated after July 1. This will allow approximately thirty days for beneficial insects to build up and aid in bollworm control. This is known as the Extension Service Early Season Insect Control Program and growers who have had experience with it report earlier harvest, higher yields, better quality, and more economical insect control than when waiting until a later date to control bugs.

national shortage of storage. Grain which is stored during the harvest season always sells at a higher price in a short time and is always good for animal feeding if the farmer will hold it until the demand is greater.

I have available to farmers a number of blueprints for graineries and other sources to furnish farm storage building plans. It seems that now is a good time to consider building or otherwise acquiring additional storage space for the small grain.

For those storing grain, do not neglect to clean all old grain and debris from the bin before adding new grain. The bin should be sprayed to kill all insects which may damage the grain while in storage. A new bulletin, B-227, Grain Storage, gives many helpful hints on maintaining quality of stored grain. They are available at the County Agent's office in Dickens or at the Farm Bureau Office in Spur. Please call for them.

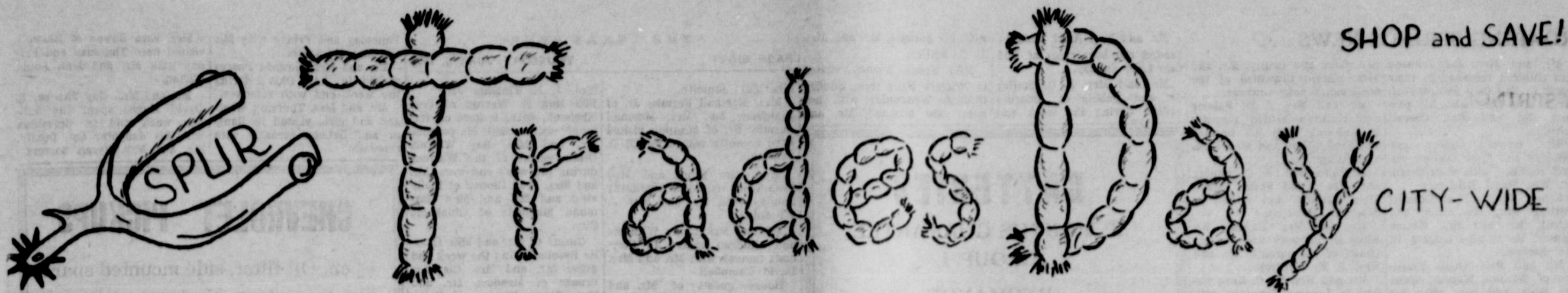
