CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT THE GENERAL ELECTION ON NOVEMBER 4, 1958.

HJR #17—Number Six on the Ballot.

If IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS!

Section 1. Article XVI of the Contitution of the State of Texas, shall be amended by adding thereto a new section 66, to read as follows:

"Section 66.
