## Dickens Enrolls 60 As School Opens

The Dickens School opened Monday following registration of about 60 students Friday, according to school principal, W. L. Gilbert.

The school was opened following an appeal to District Court and posting of a supercedence bond. The school case is pending action by the Texas Court of Civil Appeals.

Recently District Judge Victor H. Lindsey had upheld action of the Dickens County School board in annexing the Dickens Independent School District to the Spur Independent School District. The decision, handed down in 72nd District Court, rejected an application by the Dickens Independent School District for a court order enjoining the county board from completing the annexation.

However, last week, the Court granted the Dickens School District an appeal and a school was reopened.

A permit has been issued, according to Principal Gilbert, to allow Spur Independent School District to run a bus into Dickens to pick up High

School students. Several elementary children have been enrolled in the Spur Schools by transfer. Elementary school children may not ride a Spur bus inside the Dickens School District, however, an elementary child may ride on the bus outside of the Dickens School District.

A pounding was held for the Dickens School lunch room Tuesday night, and food and money totaled approximately \$136, donated by people of the community. Some 50 persons were present.

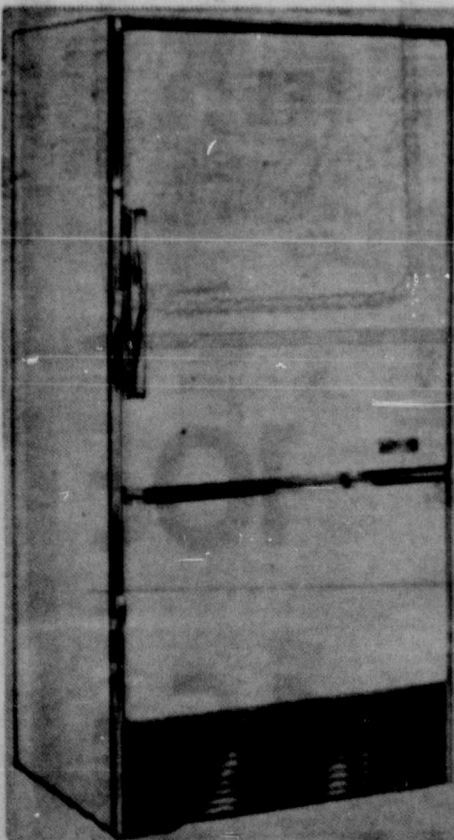

# About Your HEALTH



Is your child starting to school this year for the first time. If so, is he ready for it? There is still some time left before school begins, and now is the time to prepare him for his exciting adventure.

He needs to start his school life in good physical health. Have your family physician give him a complete physical examination even though he has periodically examined your child in the last few years. An eye test is very important, and teeth should be checked by the family dentist. Now is the time to recheck and correct any defects not found in the past before school begins.

Most likely your child has already been immunized against polio, diphtheria, tetanus, whooping cough (pertussis) and small pox but if he hasn't had these immunizations started immediately for his own protection and that of his classmates. And by all means don't wait until school starts for those polio shots. Even if all immunizations have been done, be sure to check with your doctor about necessary booster shots.

Your child should have escaped these "childhood" diseases by early and correct immunization while he was still in the protective atmosphere of his home, but once he starts school, he will be exposed to conditions that he is unfamiliar with and may not be able to cope

with if he is not protected. Be sure and learn how his school handles sudden illness or accidents and your role in avoiding them.

He should know how to wash his face and hands, how to comb his hair, and how to use a handkerchief or tissue, not only for blowing his nose, but for covering a cough or sneeze.

Perhaps the most important part of your child's preparation for school is his mental and emotional outlook. Learning to give and take, to get along with others, will be necessary at school—and throughout life. If he has felt secure in your affection, has learned to take his place in the family group, shared in small responsibilities and learned to do some things on his own—if he has played with children his own age, the chances are that he will get along well at school.

But there are other factors too. Not enough sleep can make him tired and edgy. He may need from ten to twelve hours a night to build up his energy. If you haven't already begun, now is the time to see that your child has plenty of sleep regularly.

As parents, you will play the leading role in the development of your child's character and personality. His future depends more than anything else on your support and encouragement in his outside activities.

## Crime In Texas Shows Slight Increase Over First Of 1958

Increasing crime in Texas showed some signs of improvement in a report released today by the Texas Department of Public Safety.

Crime statistics released by Joel Tisdale, chief of Identification and Criminal Records, showed that crime in all categories during the first six months of 1958 increased 7.2 per cent. This figure, however, was not as great as the 9.5 per cent increase reported for the similar period last year.

Noticeable decreases in this year's report were shown in the categories of auto theft, rape, murder and homicide. Auto theft was down 5.1 per cent, while last year it showed a 26.8 per cent increase. Murder and homicide decreased 12.7 per cent during the first six months of 1958; in the same period in 1957 that classification of crime was up 22.7 per cent. And the 1958 report on rape was a decrease of 24.6 per cent in comparison with a 2 per cent increase in 1957.

Tisdale said both the urban and rural figures show increases this year, but that crimes in urban areas were not increasing as rapidly as previously experienced. Urban major crimes were up 8.4 per cent; rural crimes increased only 1 per cent.

Most classifications of crimes against property in the new report showed increases. The rise in burglary was 14.1 per cent; robbery 14 per cent, and theft 7.3 per cent. Aggravated assault, classified as crime against the person, increased 1.1 per cent.

Juvenile crime during January through June continued its strong upward climb with 52,871 total arrests of persons 20 years or younger who were charged with a major crime. Chief Tisdale explained that this figure was not all-inclusive in that many juveniles were not fingerprinted, especially those arrested for misdemeanor offenses. His report on juvenile crime was based on fingerprint cards received by the department.

In the first six months of last year 49,849 persons 20 years old or younger were arrested on felony charges. The ages of 17 through 20 received the most arrests.

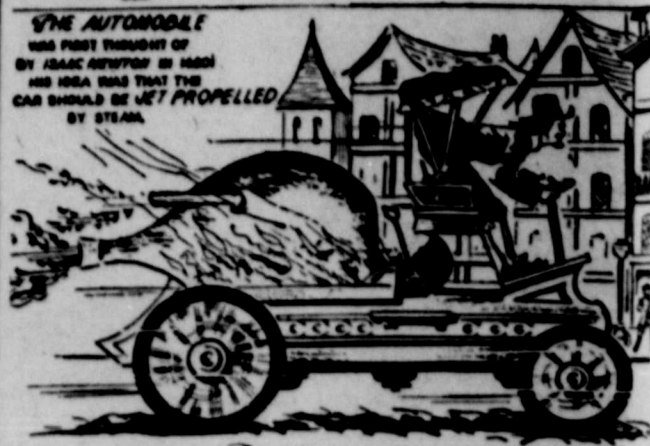

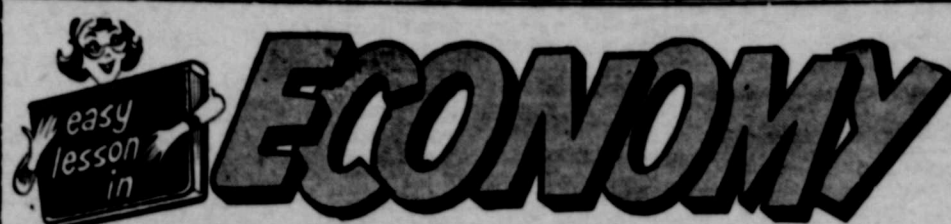
