Spur, Matador Play Here Friday Night

The Spur Bulldogs will play their second home game of the current football campaign Friday night when they meet the Matador Matadors at Jones Stadium at 8 p.m.

The Matadors are led by quarterback Gerald Pipkin and Tackle Lewis Fair. Spur fans will remember Pipkin for his play in the Spur-Matador tilt last year. Fair is a 221 pound returning letterman.

Although Matador does not sport an outstanding record this year, they always manage to play Spur a good ball game.

Coach Bill Henry said early this week that he thought all members of the team, with the exception of Don Morrison and possibly Melton Webb would be ready for action Friday. He said Webb might be ready, but he was not sure. The big tackle was working out in pads Monday, although he was held out of heavy contact work. He received a wrenched knee in the Crosbyton game.

Spur 22, Crosbyton 14. In a sometimes hectic, sometimes sluggish ball game at Crosbyton last week, the Spur Bulldogs downed the Chiefs, 22-14.

Spur scored early in the first quarter in two plays after defensive halfback Kent Morgan recovered a Chief fumble on the Crosbyton 27 yard line.

Kenneth Sutt gained one yard; one play was nullified by a penalty, and on the next play, quarterback Freddie Walker hit fullback Joe Copeland with a pass good for 32 yards and a touchdown. Sutt ran the conversion over and Spur led 8-0 with 9 minutes and 15 seconds still remaining in the first period.

Following the kickoff, Crosbyton failed to make a first down and punted to their own 42 yard line. From there the Bulldogs started a scoring drive; it was slowed by two 5 yard penalties, however.

Copeland had 25 yards on 3 carries in the drive; Sutt contributed 6 on two carries and Paronto had 5 in one try. Facing second down on the Chief 13, Walker hit end Ernest Wilson with a scoring pass, but the play was erased by a 5 yard backfield in motion penalty and the Bulldogs had to try again.

This time, Sutt found end Woodie McArthur in the clear and hit him with an 18 yard jump pass good for 6 points. Pronto ran for the conversion and Spur led 16-0.

For the first time this year the Bulldogs gave an appearance that they might muster a pass attack to balance their ground game. They completed 3 of 3 passes in the first quarter for 56 yards. One completion being erased on the penalty.

However, in the second period, Crosbyton managed to intercept three passes and fire up an aerial attack of their own.

Late in the second period the Chiefs marched 70 yards to score from the Spur 35 on a pass. Edwards to Forgas. Conversion try was no good and the score was 16-6. Spur.

Crosbyton completed four passes in a row in their scoring drive.

The third period was scoreless, but early in the fourth, Spur upped their lead to 22-6. Taking the ball on their own 42 yard line, following a Crosbyton kick, Spur drove 58 yards in 15 plays. The scoring drive was aided by pass interference against the Chiefs, giving Spur the ball on the five.

Morgan lost three; Copeland gained two; Sutt got four, and facing fourth down and three Walker sprinted into the end zone to score. Copeland scored the points after touchdown.

Chamber Directors Hear Plans For 50th Anniversary Outlined

W. R. Cole, Ft. Worth, met with the directors of the Spur Chamber of Commerce Tuesday morning at 7 a.m. and outlined a program for Spur regarding its 50th anniversary that is approaching in 1959.

Cole said in order to put on a pageant, Spur would first have to form a corporation and adopt a name. The directors voted to form this corporation and use the name, Spur Jubilee, Inc. Cole is a representative of the same company that staged Crosbyton's celebration.

He will be back in a few weeks to make a survey of the town and community to determine if there is enough interest to stage the event. He will then start to work planning the celebration if enough interest is shown. Cole must have a contract with the corporation approximately five months before the celebration.

It has been suggested that the 50th anniversary celebration be staged in conjunction with Ex-Student homecoming next year. Any ideas or suggestions should be turned in to Betty Kearney at the Chamber office.

The Spur High School Ex-Students Association announced at a meeting last Tuesday night that it proposes to build a building to house Ex-Student offices at an estimated cost of \$25,000, providing financial plans materialize favorably.

The proposed building would be used during the year as a youth center for the young people of the community. The size of the structure would be 120 feet X 60 feet wide. It would include a lounge, kitchen facilities, Ex-Student office space along with complete recreational facilities.

This added loan value is important to persons buying land and to those who use long term credit on their farms and ranches.

The National Farm Loan Association of Spur now has 679 loans outstanding for \$2,690,082.21 in the Dickens, Kent, Stonewall and a portion of King counties, Storey said.

On the George Delisle farm a cover crop established on Soil Bank land was observed. The improvement of crops by the use of a rotation of feed and cotton was observed on the farm of E. F. Shugart. Irrigated land being put to good use as pasture was seen on the Victor Arrington farm. Representatives from the Spur Experiment Farm discussed the feasibility of rootplowing with the group at plots on the Jim Barron ranch. The group then moved on to Rex Robinson's ranch where a working Great Plains Plan was observed and discussed. At this time the tour moved on to the Patton Springs School cafeteria where they were served a delicious meal.

Following lunch, native grass seeding on Conservation Reserve Soil Bank land was observed on farms of G. B. Morris and Ralph Bennett. The tour ended around 3:00 PM after seeing another Great Plains Plan on Paul D. Hagins Farm. Attending the tour were District Supervisors, C. P. Witt, Clark Forbis and Victor Arrington; District Cooperators, Robert Reynolds, Paul D. Hagins, G. B. Morris and Roy Arrington.
