## Bulldogs To Play Quannah

The Spur Bulldogs will launch their longest road trip of the season tomorrow when they journey approximately 123 miles to challenge the once-defeated Quannah Chiefs.

After losing their opening game to Stamford, Quannah has bounced back to defeat Crowell, Hollis, Okla., Vernon and Memphis.

Quannah will field a well balanced squad that is a master in running the dive and option series.

Coach Bill Henry's Bulldogs are expected to be in good physical shape, with Halfback Jimmy Paronto expected to see action. Paronto was held out of the Matador game with a bruised hip.

**SPUR 43, MATADOR 21**

The Spur Bulldogs put on their greatest show of the season last Friday as they downed the Class B Matador Matadors, 43-21.

Spur scored in a variety of ways; rushing, passing and on a blocked kick. The Bulldog offense ground out a total of 361 yards. Matador had 267 total offense.

Spur opened the scoring with seven minutes remaining in the first period when quarterback Freddy Walker passed to Fullback Joe Copeland for 20 yards and a touchdown. Try for point was no good.

The Matador offense sputtered and Spur recovered a fumble on the Matador 43 and scored in three plays. Walker passing to Copeland for 20 yards and the touchdown. Copeland virtually ran out of the arms of two defenders as he galloped into pay dirt. Halfback Kent Morgan ran the conversion over and Spur led 14-0.

The Bulldogs scored again before the first period ended when the Matadors fumbled on their own 15 yard line and Spur again recovered. Halfback Kenneth Suitt scored in one try and Morgan converted. Spur 22, Matador 0.

Spur ran the score to 28-0 midway of the second quarter when they drove 70 yards in 11 plays. The drive was spearheaded by three complete passes good for 65 yards. The drive also was marred by three penalties good for 35 yards. Walker scored from the 7. Suitt kicked the point and the scoreboard read Spur 28, Matador 0.

Suitt didn't waste any time scoring in the third period as he galloped 66 yards on the second play in the second half. Copeland converted and Spur led 37-0. Suitt's run was around right end; he turned the corner, saw daylight, and burst into the clear, scoring untouched.

In the fourth quarter, the Matadors tried to punt from their own 32. Tackle Barney Mack Benson came barging through to block the kick, and freshman end Sam Parsons picked up the pig hide and paced the 30 yards to the end zone and cashed it in for six points. Conversion attempt was no good and Spur led 43-0.

With Spur Coach Henry playing his bench, the Matadors finally broke into the scoring column in the fourth quarter in earnest.

Early in the period Quarterback Gerald Pipkin scored from the 10 and kicked the point. Score, 43-7.

Then Halfback Sherill Rigby intercepted a pass and returned it 75 yards for a touchdown. Don Kidd, playing tackle on defense, chased Rigby all the way. Try for point was no good. Spur 43, Matador 13.

Rigby again got the Matadors on the scoreboard with a fine 53 yard run around left end on the last play of the ball game; the gun sounding while Rigby's run was in progress. He also ran the points over to make the final score read Spur 43, Matador 21.

Rigby was the leading ground gainer for the game, with 147 yards in 24 carries. Spur's Suitt was second with 119 yards in 8 carries for a 14 yard per carry avg.

**Farm Bureau To Start Drive For Members**

Kimmel pointed out that farm population of this county has dropped to less than 13 per cent.

The Dickens County Farm Bureau drive, will continue through October 22, will be aimed at reaching the organization's quota of 290. Last year it had a membership of 265.

The farm leader said the organization is expecting a tough fight in its efforts to keep the rural road program intact.

The program has already come under fire of certain non-farm groups he said.

The objectives of the farm organization, Kimmel added include a high farm income, securing funds for the eradication of plant and animal disease and for promoting agricultural research and education, improvement in our rural school system, and preservation of rural government.

**2,079 Bales Ginned**

A telephone survey of a representative number of Dickens County gins reveals that the cotton harvest is far ahead of the pace set last year.

The survey showed that the County gins contacted had ginned 1,680 bales, compared to 1,475 ginned on Oct. 24 last year.

Although production estimates continue to be somewhat lower, quality and grade of cotton raised in Dickens County continues to be high; steadily drawing top price of 34-35 cents.

Last year's production estimate was for 25,000 bales. This year a more conservative 18,000 bales are predicted.

One gin that rests just outside Dickens County, West Texas Gin at Kalgary was also polled and is included in the survey report.

The Kalgary gin was included because some bordering Dickens County farmers gin there.

**Bank Deposits Show Increase**

Bank deposits at the Spur Security Bank for the quarter ending September 24 show an increase in deposits over the preceding quarter by some \$297,693.53.

The official statement, published elsewhere in The Texas Spur, also shows a slight increase in deposits over this same period last year. Deposits are listed this year at \$4,137,559.34; compared to \$3,950,444.43 at this same time last year.

The June 23 statement showed deposits at \$3,839,885.81.

On the resource side of the Spur bank's latest statement are loans of \$1,285,896.55 compared with \$1,778,562.62 listed on the June 23 statement. Building and furniture, \$36,965.00; real estate owned other than bank premises, \$5,451.00; federal reserve bank stock, \$6,000; U.S. government bonds, \$1,657,059.00 and cash on hand and due from other banks, \$1,086,875.81.

Liabilities listed include: Capital stock, \$100,000; undivided profits, \$207,186.42; and deposits, \$4,137,559.34.

Bank deposits are due to show a healthy increase as harvest of the area cotton crop gets into full swing.

A new oil well location has been spotted in Dickens County and drilling is now under way.

Located in the west-central part of the county, drilling is by County Oil Corp., Wichita Falls. The well is listed as the No. 1 J. P. Goen and is a 5,800 foot rotary test.

Drill site is located 1,963 feet from north and 467 feet from west line of Section 407, Block 1, H&GN survey, A-210. It is one and one-quarter miles west-northwest of an 8,388-foot dry hole, but there is no nearby production.
