Spur To Challenge Post

The Spur Bulldogs will travel to Post tomorrow night to play their third conference game of the year against the Post Antelopes.

Post lost to a strong Floydada team last week, 52-34.

Spur Fullback Joe Copeland scored 22 points in the Slaton-Spur game last week to hold onto his AA area scoring lead. Copeland has scored 94 points. Halfback Kenneth Suitt has moved up to eighth position in scoring with 55 points.

Coach Bill Henry reports that according to scouting reports,

SPUR 42, SLATON 12

The Spur Bulldogs, winners Friday night before a Homecoming crowd of approximately 2,000 people, to cop the District 3-AA conference game.

The Spur win over Slaton virtually eliminated the Tigers from the District race. The win was the second for the Bulldogs in two conference tries.

The Bulldogs were led by Fullback Joe Copeland who rolled up 205 yards rushing and scored 22 points on three touchdowns and two conversions.

The first quarter of the contest was a duplicate of the first quarter of the Tahoka game. It found the two teams swapping out fumbles, neither one being able to muster a scoring punch, although Slaton halfback Pat Adamek got off a 43-yard scamper late in the first period.

Midway of the second quarter the Bulldogs broke the ice. Halfback Kent Morgan, who was in the hospital Wednesday, intercepted a Slaton pass, and gave Spur possession on their own 30 yard line. A fifteen yard penalty against Slaton moved the ball to the Tiger 49, and Spur drove to pay dirt from there in 12 plays.

Halfbacks Kenneth Suitt and Jimmy Paronto alternated with Copeland in covering the distance. Suitt chipped in with 11 yards; Paronto 16, and Copeland 23. Copeland got the TD on a plunge from the one. Try for point failed.

Spur scored its second touchdown three minutes later when a Slaton fourth down try failed to clear for a first and the Bulldogs took over on the Slaton 37. Walker fouled Suitt with a 17-yard pass to set up Copeland's ten yard burst good for the score. Try for point again failed.

With only 40 seconds remaining in the half, the Bulldogs struck again when defensive end Marshal Murray recovered a Slaton fumble on the Tiger 35.

Walker went to the air, with time running out, to hit Paronto with a 19-yard pass to the Tiger 15. Walker threw again, and this time Suitt made the catch to score. Copeland ran the conversion over, and Spur led 20-0 at the half.

The Bulldogs scored again early in the third period. Slaton was forced to punt to the

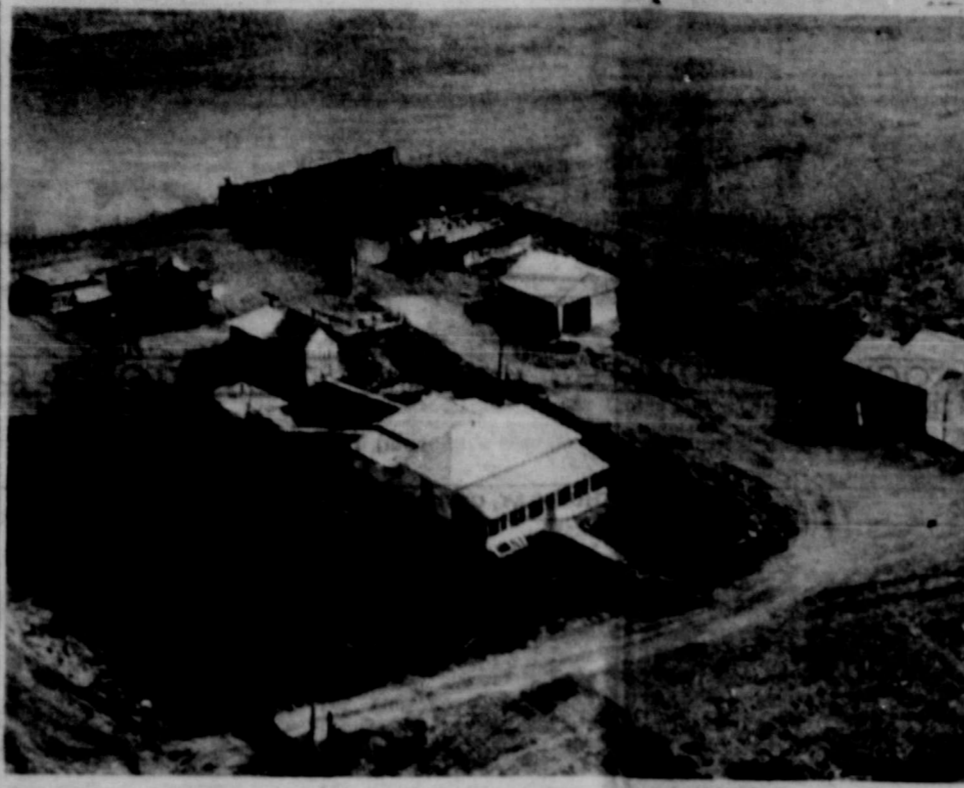

Congress Makes Change In Social Security Law

Congress has removed the requirements that a severely disabled wage earner has to have some recent work prior to becoming disabled in order to be eligible for disability insurance benefits or the freezing of his social security wage record. The new amendments to the social security law will enable many more disabled wage earners to qualify than was previously possible.

The law as stated before provides that a severely disabled person must have worked in employment covered by social security at least 5 years out of the 10 years prior to becoming disabled, and at least one and one-half years of this time must have been in the 3-year period before becoming disabled. The new law has dropped the latter requirement of one and one-half years work within the last 3 years.

Now a wage earner who otherwise meets the disability requirements under the law may have his social security record frozen, or if he is age 50 or over may receive monthly disability benefits as long as he is fully insured and has worked 5 years out of the 10 before becoming disabled.

Some persons who will be affected by this change had previously filed claims under the old provision of the law and were denied because they didn't have the recent work required. These individuals should again file a claim at this time according to John G. Hutton, manager of the Lubbock social security office. Hutton states, however, that only those persons whose claims was denied because they did not work one and one-half years out of the last 3 should refile their claim. A previous denial for any other reason would not be altered by the recent change in the law.

A representative of the Lubbock Social Security Office will be in Dickens on November 5, 1958 at 9:30 a. m. at the Courthouse and will be glad to assist in all matters pertaining to Social Security.

FALL DEFERMENT

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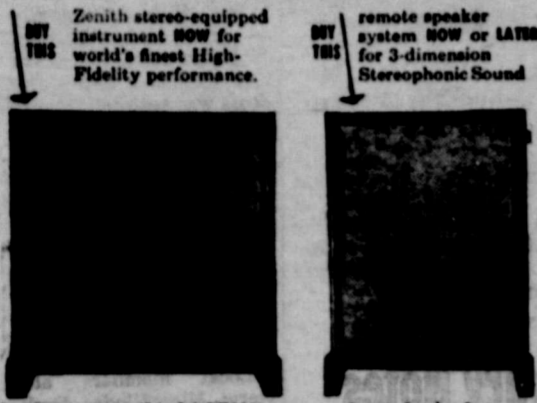

I greeted Ehrler at the gate of the football field, and we chatted as he looked over the Spur team. Guard Jim Gabriel happened to run by, an Ehrler remarked - "That's a Gabriel, I can tell by his legs and the way he runs." He spotted Jim before he had any way of knowing who he was.

Ehrler also had some remarks about the size of the Spur team. "That No. 73 is a monster!" "Look at that No. 52, can he move?" He was referring to tackle Kenneth Gilcrease and center Don Kidd, 175 and 205 respectively. He was even more impressed after the ball game, needless to say.

If the Bulldogs can get by Post this week, all the eggs will be in the basket when they meet Floydada here Nov. 7. Both are presently undefeated in district play.

Let's hope the Bulldogs don't get surprised at Post like Abernathy did against Lockney last week. Abernathy appeared to be a shu-in for the District 2-AA conference title until the Longhorns upset the apparent.

Post will run the T and Spread formations against Spur, and no doubt will pass a lot. The spread is dangerous, and so is Post. They led Floydada 8-6 in their game for a short time Friday night. without the blocking and defense. However, we realize that offensive play of the linemen, the backs would not be able to make those long runs. So here's a bouquet to the Spur Bulldog linemen:

Ends Woody McArthur and Ernest Wilson - Woody and Ernest always give a good steady performance, both on offense and defense. Woody plays defensive tackle and does a good job, Ernest got some good tackles in the Slaton game.

Guards Jim Gabriel and Marshall Murray - in Murray and Gabriel the Bulldogs have one of the best sets of guards in the district. Gabriel is steady on defense and sometimes outstanding; Murray plays offensive end and since the first of the season has come along fine.

Center Don Kidd - moves to tackle on defense and plays a good, steady brand of ball, recovering his share of fumbles - he almost got loose with a fumble in the Slaton game, but for a shoe string would have scored a TD.

Gary Scott comes in to play middle guard on defense and Gary has shown great improvement, helping to block a kick that set up a Spur touchdown in the tightly played Anson

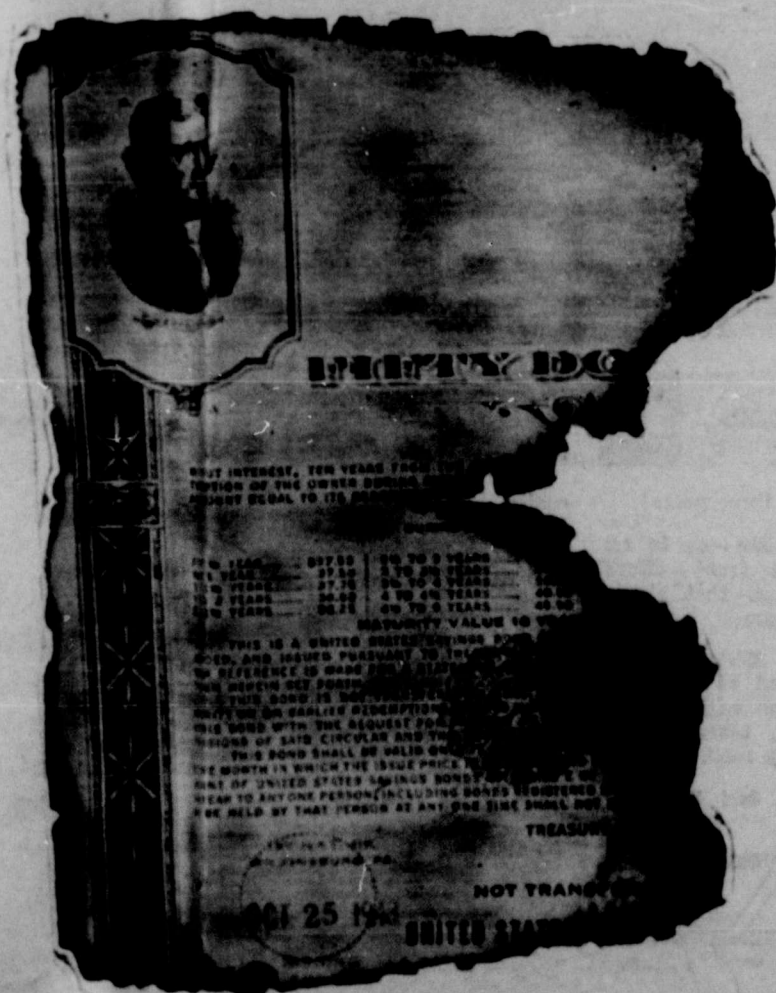

God Ranges, High Prices Delay Beef

God ranges and plentiful grass plus a hesitancy on the part of many feeders to pay the asking price for feeder calves, for the second year in a row, delayed the movement of beef cattle into feedlots reports A. B. Wooten, economist for the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

The latest pig crop report indicates that the number of sows farrowing this fall will be 17 per cent higher than for a year ago. When this "hog parade" starts to market next year, Wooten says a sharp price decline is almost a certainty.

The economist believes the continued high demand for beef will hold through 1959 since business activity has increased. Per capita supplies, however, may drop below those for 1958. Beef, he adds, will be competing against larger supplies of pork and poultry, and the general level of cattle price in 1959 is likely to remain near the 1958 level.

Wooten says swine producers have been stepping up their marketing in order to beat an expected fall price drop and that earlier movements had somewhat cushioned the price decline. Prices, however, have dropped more than \$4 per hundred from the mid-summer high.
