

# Spur Clips Crane 30-8 For First Bi-District Win In History

The Spur Bulldogs wrote another chapter in their Cinderella Story last Friday night as they clipped the Crane Golden Cranes, 30-8 in a Bi-District football game played in Crane.

Although the game was a close contest, the Bulldog victory was decisive, allowing the highly regarded Crane ground game only 50 yards rushing in the second half of play.

Offensively, the Bulldogs were led by fullback Joe Copeland and halfback Kenneth Suitt.

After kicking off to Crane, and allowing one first down, the Bulldogs held and Crane kicked, Spur taking over on

their own 49-yard line. On the first play from scrimmage Suitt scooted around the Crane left side for 21 yards. Then, with the fans still buzzing about Suitt's run, Copeland brought them to their feet as he jarred the middle, broke into the clear, and rambled 30 yards for the touchdown.

It was only one of three touchdowns the big Spur fullback recorded as he rampaged for 177 yards on 19 carries, to average 9.3 yards per carry and grab both scoring and rushing honors.

Suitt followed his teammate closely as he recorded a scintillating 95 yard kickoff return to open the second half and also scored on a five yard punt for two touchdowns. Suitt averaged 5 yards per carry.

Early in the second quarter quarterback Freddy Walker intercepted a Crane pass on the Bulldog 10 and returned it to the 44 yard line. Walker almost got loose; the last defender making the tackle.

After a 5 yard penalty against Crane, Spur faced fourth down and one. Walker called Copeland's number and he responded with a 49-yard scoring gallop that was partially nullified by a clipping penalty. After the penalty was stepped off, the gain was reduced to only 11 yards and a first down.

One pass fell incomplete; Suitt made one and then Suitt found Halfback Jimmy Paronto

in the clear with a 28-yard pass.

Two five yard penalties moved the Bulldogs back, but fiery halfback Kent Morgan regained the distance with an 11-yard burst at the left side. Suitt added four, a pass fell incomplete, then Walker hit Copeland for 7 yards and a first down on the four. From there Copeland needed but one play to score. Try for point failed as did all the others. With 6:50 of the second period remaining, Spur led, 12-0.

Crane came to life just before the half ended to tack its

8 points on the scoreboard.

The Cranes drove 80 yards in 15 plays, mostly on short yardage. Quarterback Scott Coffield scored on a keeper at right guard. The try for extra points was fumbled and End Allen Jourdan recovered in end zone.

The Bulldogs had the option and chose to receive the second half kick-off. The kick came long and high, spinning down to Suitt who was standing near the five. The fleet halfback hesitated only momentarily allowing his protection to form, then set sail for the goal.

About the Spur 40 yard line he ran into trouble, but managed to wriggle free. At mid-field he was challenged again but literally ran out of the arms of a Crane defender and scooted home for the score.

Suitt's run virtually "broke the back" of the Cranes. However, they never stopped fighting and played a whale of a ball game.

The Bulldogs racked up their fourth touchdown after they forced Crane to punt. Spur took over on their own 7 and proceeded to drive 93 yards to score.

The drive was made all on the ground and featured the blocking of the Bulldog's tackle to tackle spread: Melton Webb, Marshal Murray, Don Kidd, Jim Gabriel and Kenneth Gilcrease.

Copeland scored from the 11

with a burst up the middle.

The final Spur touchdown came with about 41 seconds remaining and was set up when the Cranes gambled and failed to make a first down on their own 32. This time Suitt got the score as he ran the ball

over from the 5. Spur 30, Crane 8.

The entire Spur forward wall played a bang up game both defensively and offensively. The defense was led by linebackers Jim Gabriel and Kenneth Gilcrease, tackle Don

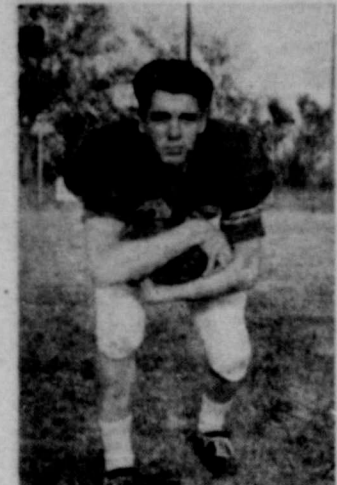
Kidd and End Marshal Murray.

The offense featured the blocking of Gabriel, Kidd, Gilcrease, Murray, Webb and ends Ernest Wilson and Woodie McArthur.

Widening, reconditioning and resurfacing F.M. 261 from Spur to the Crosby County line.

Seal coat on 8.1 miles of F.M. 1441 from 2.6 miles northwest of McAdoo to 5.5 miles northeast of McAdoo.

Seal coat on 16.8 miles of F.M. 265 from S.H. 70, east and south to U.S. 82.

Seal coat on 6.7 miles of F.M. 193 from F.M. 265 at East Afton, east.

Seal coat on 9.1 miles of F.M. 836 from Spur, northwest.

The Highway Commission has authorized the development of this program for the purpose of protecting the investment of the public in the Farm-to-Market Road System. The work will be done during the Summer of 1959.

of the school formed in 1934. Coach Ralph Marshall has served as head coach for the past 12 years at Patton Springs, and on six occasions has brought a team through to Bi-District.

**About Your HEALTH**

If you're looking for something to be thankful for these ominous times, consider this.

More than one-half million Texas babies were born hale and alert during the two-year period between September 1956 and 1958. That adds up to an average of some 685 babies per day.

For the same time period 147,000 Texans died—representing a ratio of more than three births for every death, a fact clearly worth being thankful for.

The figures are revealed in an advanced look at the State Health Department's biennial soon to be published.

The excess of births over deaths during the two years added some 360,000 people to Texas population. That increase together with the influx of newcomers now making their homes in Texas, swelled the population past the 9.2 million mark.

Since 1936, infant deaths during the first year of life have dropped from 71 per one thousand, to less than 30 per thousand today. And during that same period, maternal deaths have been cut from 6.9 per thousand to less than 15 so far this year.

The past biennial also produced these developments: Some 115,000 Texans, whose births were not registered at the time, found it necessary to file delayed certificates of birth through probate courts to prove age, parentage, and citizenship. Most of these births occurred prior to 1903, the year the Texas vital statistics law was passed to require birth and death registration.

Nine hundred persons changed their names during the two-year period, and court-ordered amendments to birth certificates were duly attached.

Almost a quarter of a million people asked for certified copies of their birth records. Just to process these requests more than 550,000 trips to the files which now contains more than 11,370,000 records of births and deaths.

And finally, since marriage of the parents of an illegitimate child subsequent to its birth legitimates the child, 1,750 new birth certificates based on legitimations and paternity determinations were prepared and filed.

If being able to prove age, parentage and citizenship isn't worth being thankful for, nothing is.

## TECH PROF SAYS . . . More Research To Increase Range Productivity Urged

More research to develop better ways and means to increase range land productivity is called for by Dr. Gerald W. Thomas of Texas Tech in the November issue of Soil and Water magazine.

The Tech Dean of Agriculture says Texas now has over 100 million acres of land where domestic and game animals graze on native vegetation.

While ranchers should be vitally interested in the decline of range productivity, the general public is also concerned because management of this land plays a major role in watershed protection, water yield and flood prevention, he

said. Thomas cited the need for "more basic information on the complicated interrelationships of climate, soils, plants and grazing animals," and reviewed research currently underway in Texas that relates to range conservation.

"A very interesting study of deferred-rotation grazing using a combination of sheep, goats and cattle yields some good results," he said of grazing management studies of Sonora.

At the Texas Range Station near Barnhart, special attention is being given to the influence of grazing management

## U.S. May Face Tree Shortage

Even if all forest land in the United States capable of growing commercial crops of trees is put fully to work, this country may have difficulty meeting its future timber needs.

Increases in population point to further urbanization of land, further development of our national highway system, more needs for reservoir sites, and additional use of forest land for recreational and water yield purposes.

The answer to the question of whether such land pressures might prevent us from meeting our future timber needs lies largely in the hands of farmers and other small forest tract owners. Three-fourths of our commercial land—land cap-

able of growing trees as a crop—is privately owned. This land is distributed among 4.5 million owners, of which 3.4 million are farmers. Virtually all farm tracts are less than 500 acres, with a large percentage consisting of less than 100 acres.

Commercial forest area in Texas is 11.6 million acres. Of this, 93 per cent, or 10.8 million acres, is privately owned. The current productivity of much forest land in the U.S. is low in relation to physical capacity of the soil and climate. For one thing, production depends upon keeping the land growing as many trees as it can. An extensive survey by the U.S. Department of Agriculture's Forest Service in 1952 indicated that one-fourth of our commercial forest area is poorly stocked. Over 40 million acres have less than 10 per cent of the trees they are capable of maintaining.

On the brighter side, trends in tree planting have improved and the Forest Service reports that over a billion trees were planted on about a million acres of forest land in 1957. This is a record never exceeded in U.S. history. Even more are expected to be planted this year under the Conservation Reserve of the Soil Bank and other programs.

Thomas said grazing experiments that include the effects of deer are being conducted at the Kerr Wildlife Management area while grazing research with yearling cattle has been conducted since 1942 at the Spur Range Station. At the Southwestern Great Plains Field Station at Bushland, major emphasis in future experiments will be concerned with fitting livestock into High Plains conditions including use of both uncultivated native grass stand and cultivated crops.

### SOVERIGNTY UP THERE

Down through the ages man has dreamed of traveling through space, but for once we now seem to have the machinery to do it, perhaps to the moon or to Mars soon.

Space flight creates new relations and conflicts, surely among earth people and maybe between us and denizens of other worlds. The satellites, for example rises problems, though right now fortunately sovereignty is not one of them.

But suppose some country claimed that our satellite held a T.V. camera which threatened its security. Can that nation claim violation of its sovereignty up there? Such questions of sovereignty might involve communications, flight control, traffic regulations, ownership, moon mineral rights and what have you.

How much is one nation entitled to high-altitude unimpeded flight over another? Or how much may one nation restrict the overhead passage of satellites, missiles, etc.?

New international agreements might set out low-altitude zones of national control, with unrestricted freedom beyond that zone.

But, first just where does "space" (outside the earth's gravitation) begin? Nobody knows just where sovereignty over lower space should stop and unrestricted use begin.

Do we need a space navigation code? space rescue code? rules of governing transport of passengers and goods?

We'll have brand new problems of neutrality, nationality, domicile, statelessness, internment, asylum, embargo, piracy, smuggling, customs, colonies, legal jurisdiction—all coming with the space age.

Physical science certainly does not represent all the problems. Many people in fact claim we do not know enough about the nature of outer space to write laws defining the rights of nations to explore it.

## Proper Papers Can Speed Up SS Payments

Would you like to help your local social security office reduce the length of time necessary to process applications for retirement benefits?

According to John G. Hutton, manager of the social security district office in Lubbock, people making application for their retirement benefits can speed up the handling of their applications if they bring along the papers necessary to establish their right to benefits.

These papers should include their social security card, proof of their age and proof of recent earnings. Hutton explained that your most recent W-2 form furnished by your employer, or your last income tax return along with your Schedule C or Schedule F and the cancelled check showing payment of the self-employment social security tax, if you are self-employed, will suffice for proof of recent earnings.

Hutton added that a birth certificate is not necessary for proof of age but that any old document giving your date of birth, an old family Bible, or an old insurance policy might possibly be all that is needed for proof of age.

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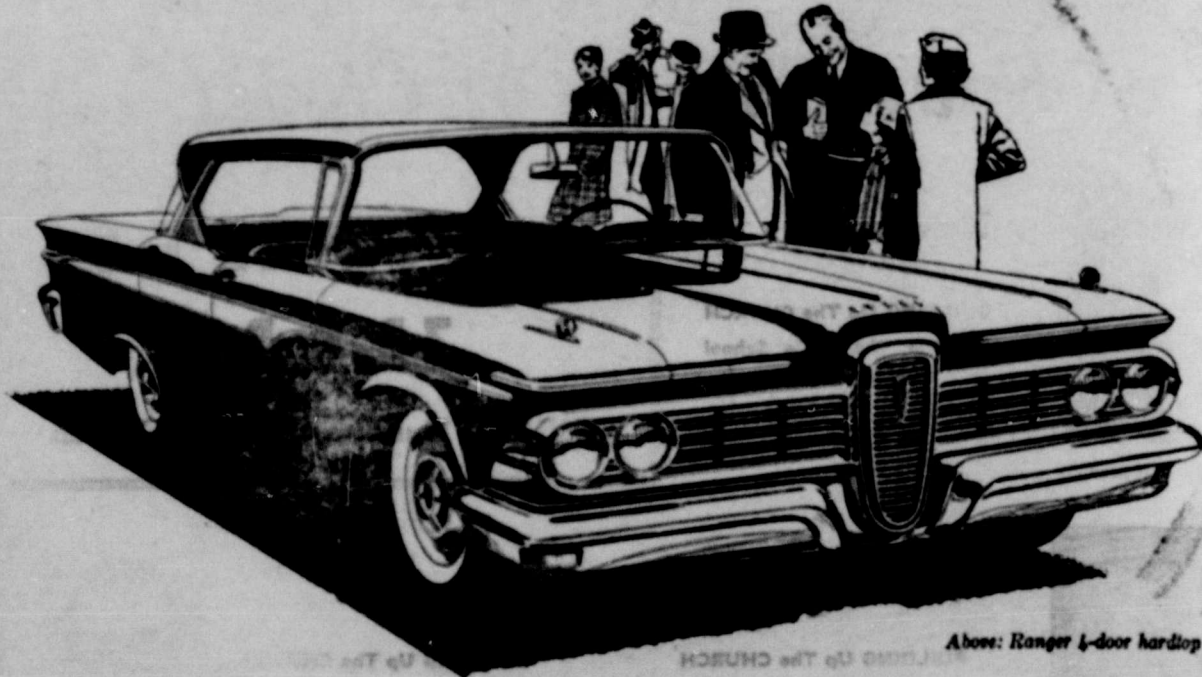

## Highway Patrol Exams To Be Given Jan. 20

Future patrolmen of the Texas Department of Public Safety will be selected Jan. 20 throughout Texas in examinations to be given young men between 21 and 35 years of age.

In announcing the date for the selecting exams, Col. Homer Garrison Jr., director, said approximately 170 vacancies now exist in the ranks of the Texas Highway Patrol. He said applications will be accepted until Jan. 12.

Young men interested in these important positions may obtain detailed information from DPS offices located in Austin, Waco, Dallas, Houston, Corpus Christi, Midland and Lubbock. Any officer of the Department of Public Safety and the Texas Employment Commission will talk to you at length concerning the interesting jobs.

New patrolmen will draw \$300 per month while training and will live in the modern Law Enforcement Academy in Austin throughout the training period. At the completion of the formal schooling, new patrolmen will work with experienced officers during their first assignment.

Employee benefits for patrolmen include annual vacations, sick leaves, a modern retirement program, low cost insurance, new uniforms, travel expenses, holidays, longevity pay and promotion opportunities.

Persons applying must have a high school education, be between 21 and 35 years of age, weigh not less than two or more than three pounds per inch of height, between 68 and 76 inches tall, physically sound and of good moral character.

## Cheerful Place To Read Is Asset To Home

Every home needs well lighted, cheerful places to study and read. A good desk lamp properly placed goes far in preventing eye strain and reducing fatigue, according to extension home furnishings specialists.

A table lamp, wall model, or even a pair of wall lamps can do the job. The important thing is to be sure the lamp is equipped with a glass or plastic reflector bowl under the shade, or with a wide harp to accommodate an indirect type bulb. Both these types of under-shade construction give a combination of upward and downward light that reduces the eye-irritating difference in

brightness between the desk top and the rest of the room. Height of the lamp from the desk is very important, too. A lamp that is too short gives such a small spread of light that part of the desk is virtually dark. A lamp that is too tall places the bottom of the shade above eye level with a resulting brightness that is uncomfortable. Most people find that a height of 15 inches between desk top and bottom of the lamp shade is most satisfactory.

Third important factor is placement of the lamp on the desk. It should be placed on the side of the desk opposite the writing hand. If twin lamps are used, such as two wall lamps, mount them with the center of the shades about 30 inches apart.

As for the amount of light—150 watts is the minimum recommended for a wall or table lamp while a pair of wall lamps should have a minimum of 100

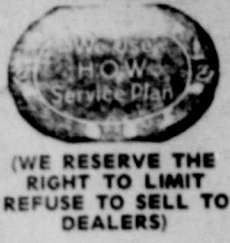
