FACE THE GORY FACTS

Few journalistic achievements of recent years have caused such a furor as the publication, by Readers' Digest, of J. C. Furnas' article, "—And Sudden Death."

Some Pointers On Economic Highlights

No depression year has seen such sustained improvement in business as 1935. In other years since 1929, there were substantial advances, but these were followed by recessions that took use back to extreme lows.

Here is a digest of business changes taken from a Business Week chart. Comparisons are for the first nine months of 1935 with the first nine months of 1934.

- Steel production, 17 up. Automobile production, 23 up. Construction (Residential construction showed a gain of 80 per cent, but this was slightly more than offset by declines in non-residential, public works and utilities construction.) 1 down.

Railroads Announce Holiday Excursion

In preparing to handle the largest volume of Christmas-New Year holiday excursion traffic that has moved for several years the Fort Worth and Denver City Railway Company and The Wichita Valley Railway comprising the Burlington Lines in Texas have announced the authorization of attractive excursion fares and arrangements to apply between all points served by railroads in Texas, Colorado, Louisiana (west of Mississippi River), Arkansas, Oklahoma, Illinois, Iowa, Kansas, Missouri, Minnesota, Nebraska, North Dakota, South Dakota, Wisconsin, Montana, Wyoming, certain points in Michigan, Memphis, Tennessee and Natchez, Mississippi.

One and one-third of the current one-way first class fare plus Pullman Company charges will apply for accommodations in sleeping cars. For coach service one and one-half of the current one-way coach fare will apply.

The coach fares are very low compared to the usual cost of highway travel, especially so when the risk of the latter is considered.

Tickets will be on sale December 12th to January 1st, inclusive, and will be good for return until midnight of January 31, 1936. Stop-overs may be made at any point enroute within limit of ticket, and usual baggage checking privileges will be allowed.

It is expected that excursion rates will also be authorized to Eastern and Southeastern States and possibly to the Pacific Coast but definite announcement has not been made.
