T. L. Kennedy, of Floydad, was in our city Tuesday looking after business matters and greeting some old friends.

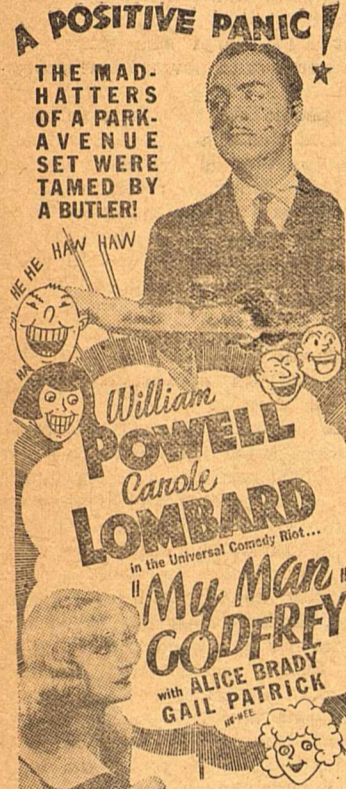

In turn this information and data could be transferred to the Department of Agriculture at College Station and Washington in a very concise and definite form from the representative communities in the county, thereby giving the Department of Agriculture a picture of the goal in which our local farmers are driving after.

A county tabulation committee was selected to study individual farm plans and later submit to the state organization their findings in the form of a county farm program. The persons selected for this committee are as follows: Joe M. Rose, W. F. Foreman, George Pierce, L. A. Grant-ham, R. R. Wooten, O. E. Minix and Mrs. John Bachman.

Several persons were selected for the Master Farmer contest. These farmers are to be judged at a later date on their farming activities in 1937. Out of this group there will be one farmer selected to compete in the state contest representing Dickens County. Those farmer selected were W. A. Harris, George Pierce, Will Watson, W. S. Smiley, Joe Tannisch, G. E. Kissinger, W. F. Pierce, Harvey S. Holley, Paul G. Braddock, E. C. Robertson and C. C. Haile.

Two all demonstration farms were selected for the purpose of carrying out demonstration work in all phases of farming operations and farm home activities. The two farms selected at present are R. R. Wooten's and Watt Holly's.

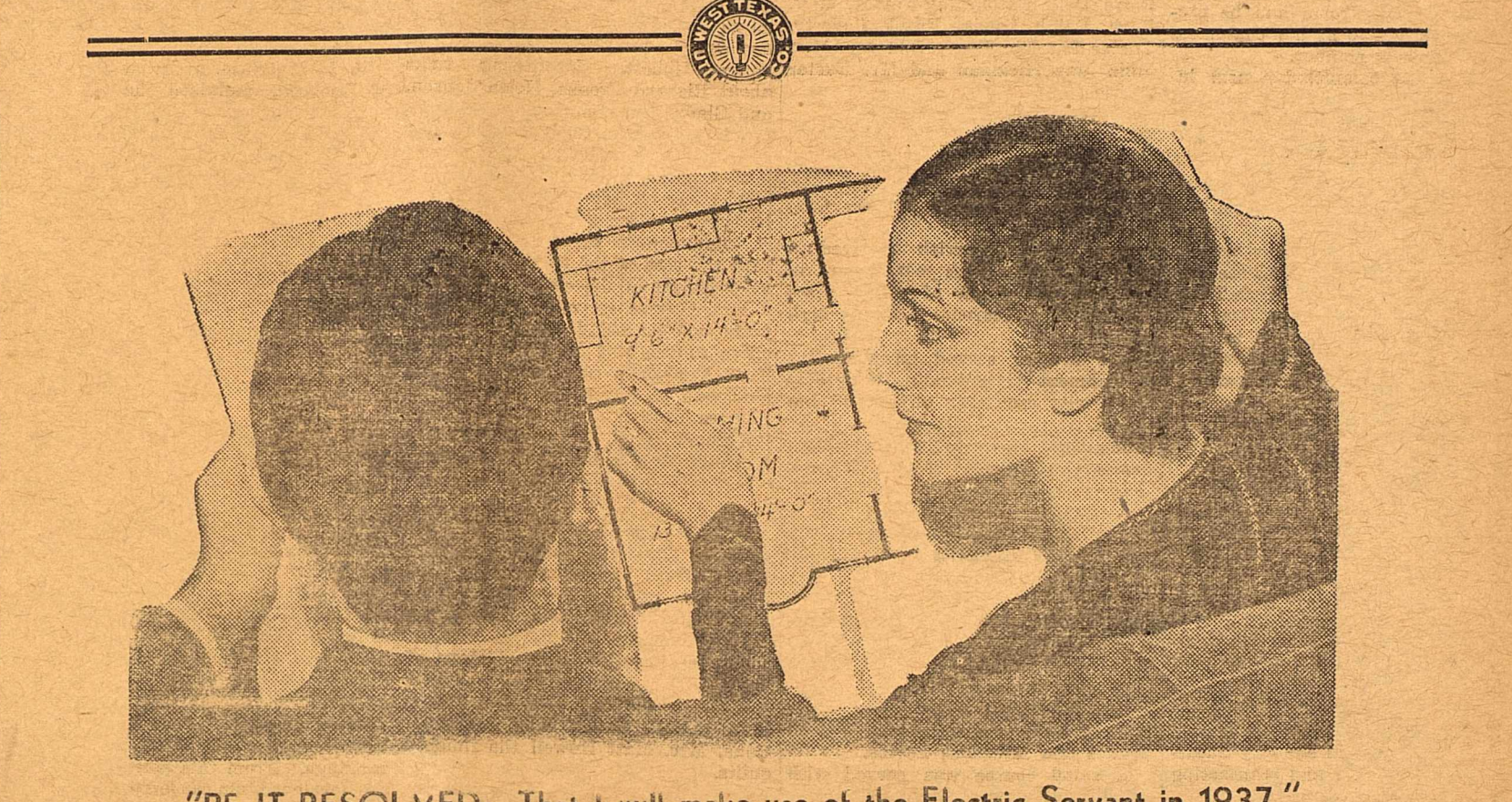

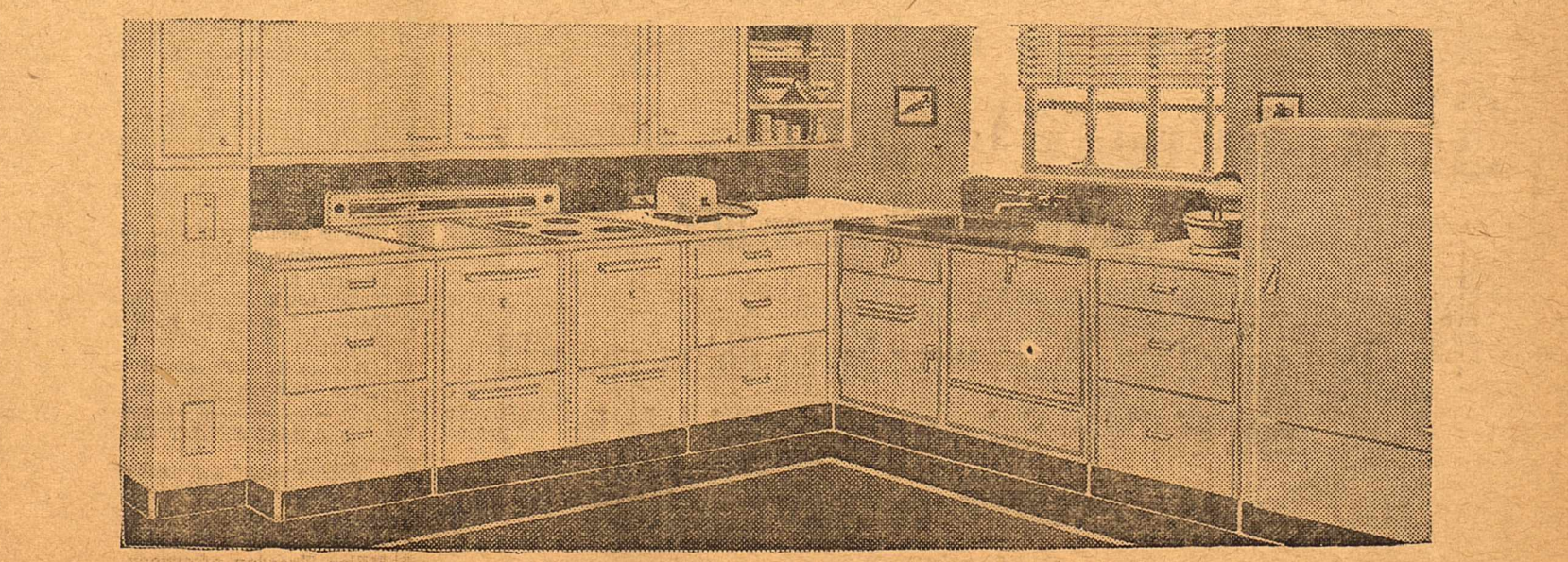
