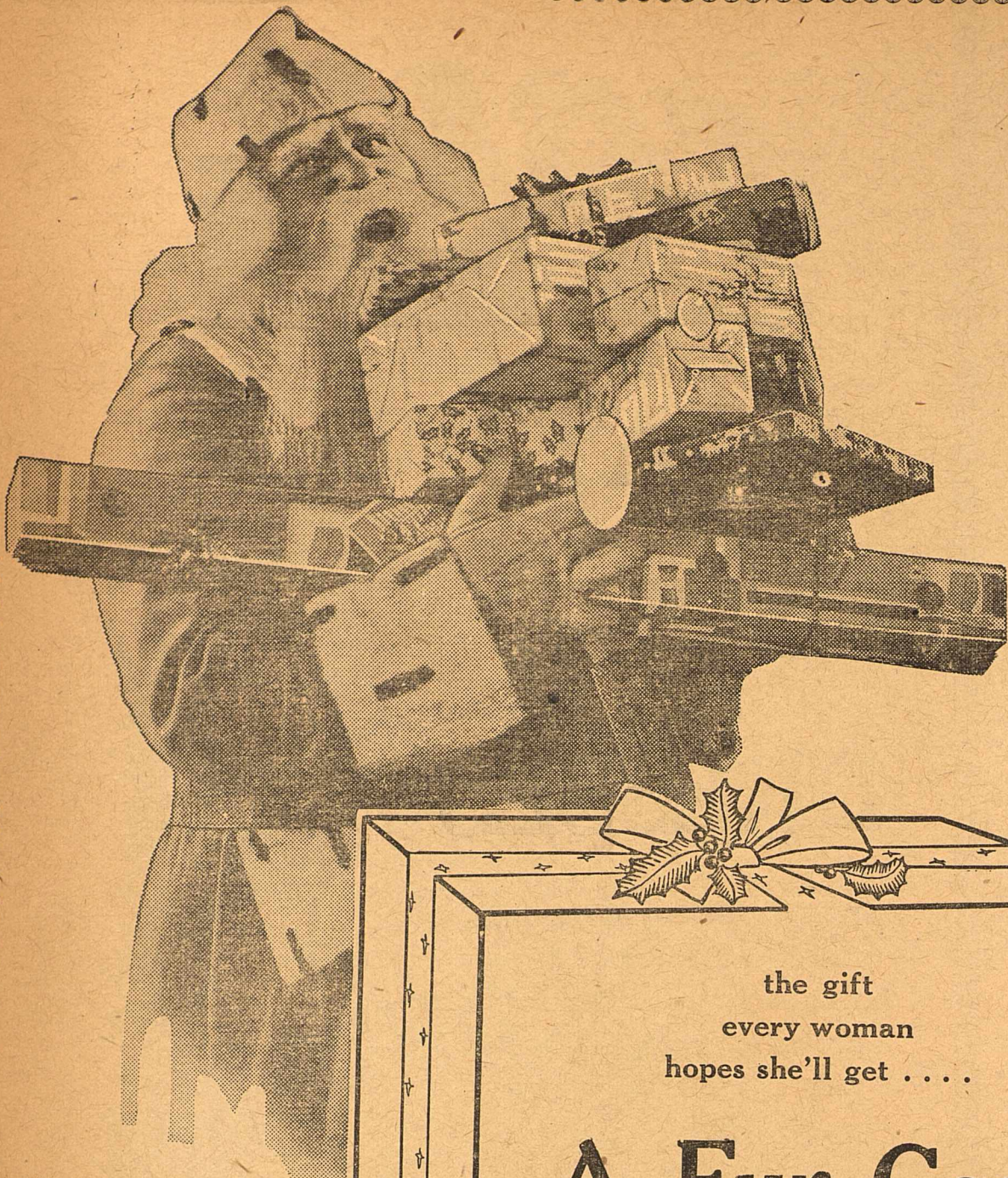

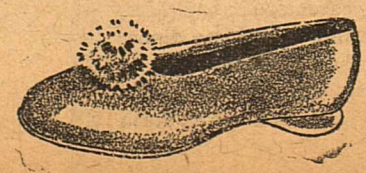

AN ORDINANCE requiring any person before constructing or making any alteration in or repairing any sidewalk, curb and/or gutter to obtain a permit therefor, and to construct, alter or repair any such sidewalk, curb and/or gutter according to the grade and specifications of the city engineer; prescribing the materials out of which the same may be constructed; prescribing a penalty for the violation hereof, and repealing all ordinances in conflict herewith.

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE BOARD OF COMMISSIONERS OF THE CITY OF SPUR:

Sec. 1. That it shall be and is hereby made the duty of the owner, lessee, contractor or person in charge, possession or control of any lot, block or real estate abutting upon any public

street, square or alley within the corporate limits of the City of Spur, before constructing or laying of any sidewalk, curb and/or gutter, or altering, changing or repairing any sidewalk, curb and/or gutter on such property on or along that portion of said property which may be now or hereafter designated for sidewalk purposes, to apply to the Board of Commissioners of the City of Spur for a permit therefor, describing in such application the property and street, square or alley on or along which it is desired to construct, alter, change or repair any sidewalk, curb and/or gutter, the sidewalk to be constructed, or the change, alteration or repairs to be made in such sidewalk, curb and/or gutter, the materials out of which same is to be constructed, altered or

repaired, and the name and address of the owner of such property, and of the lessee, contractor or person in possession or control of said property; said application to be filed with the City Secretary of the City of Spur.

Sec. 2. That upon the filing of the application provided for in Section 1 hereof, the same shall be referred to the City Engineer who shall examine said application, inspect the premises where it is desired to construct or to change, alter or repair any sidewalk, curb and/or gutter, establish and fix the grade or grades for the construction thereof, and plans and specifications therefor (if such plans and specifications have not already been prepared and presented to him by the applicant) and shall report thereon to the Board of Commissioners at their first meeting after the filing of such application, provided such application has been filed and referred to the City Engineer a sufficient time prior to such meeting for such report to be made.

Sec. 3. At the first meeting of the Board of Commissioners after the filing of such report, they shall examine such application and report, and if in their discretion such construction, alteration or repair would not adversely affect the public safety, a permit therefor shall be granted without charge; but if in their opinion the public safety required, the refusal of such permit, they shall fix a

time and place for a hearing on such application, cause the applicant to be notified thereof, at which hearing the applicant may appear and show cause, if any he has, why such permit should be granted, and the Board of Commissioners after such hearing may in their discretion grant or refuse such permit or grant same with such modifications and conditions as they may deem the public safety requires.

Sec. 4. It shall hereafter be unlawful to construct or repair any curb or gutter within the corporate limits of the City of Spur, of any material other than cement or concrete, or to construct or repair any sidewalk with any material other than cement or concrete, brick, flag stones, or other similar materials.

Sec. 5. It shall hereafter be unlawful for any person to construct, alter, change or repair, or permit to be constructed, altered, changed or repaired, within the corporate limits of the City of Spur, any sidewalk, curb and/or gutter on property of which he is the owner, lessee, contractor, or of which he has charge, possession or control, without first applying for and obtaining a permit therefor from the Board of Commissioners of the City of Spur, or to construct, alter, change or repair any such sidewalk, curb and/or gutter of any other or different materials than that herein provided, or in any manner other than in conformity with the grades and specifications of the City Engineer.

Sec. 6. Any person violating any of the provisions hereof shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor, and upon conviction thereof, shall be fined in any sum not less than Ten Dollars nor more than One Hundred Dollars; and each day any such construction, alteration or repairs shall be made, or shall be allowed to remain on any ground designated for sidewalk purposes, or for curb or gutter purposes, shall constitute a separate offense and punishable as such under this Ordinance.

Sec. 7. All ordinances and parts of ordinances in conflict herewith be and they are hereby repealed, and this ordinance shall take effect and be in force from and after its passage and publication as provided by law.
