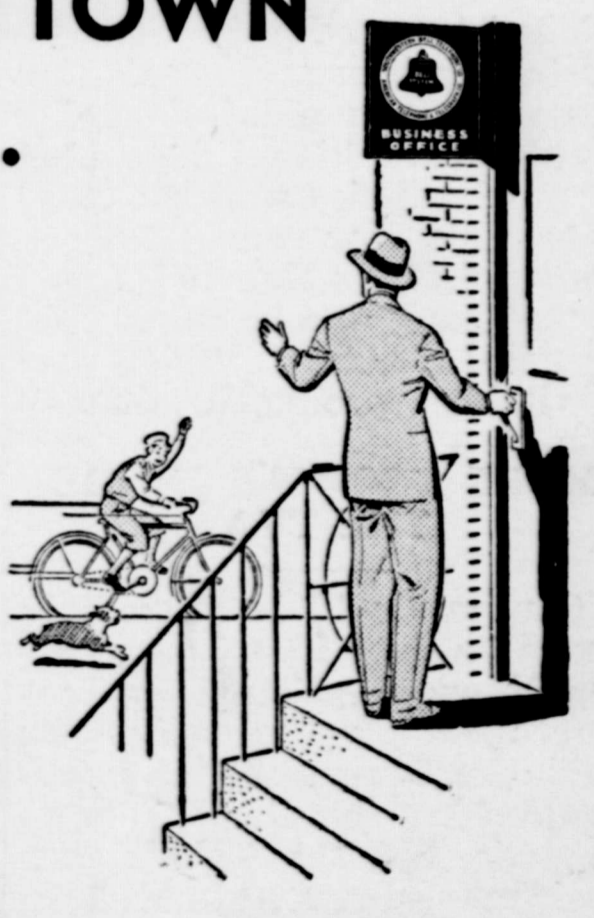

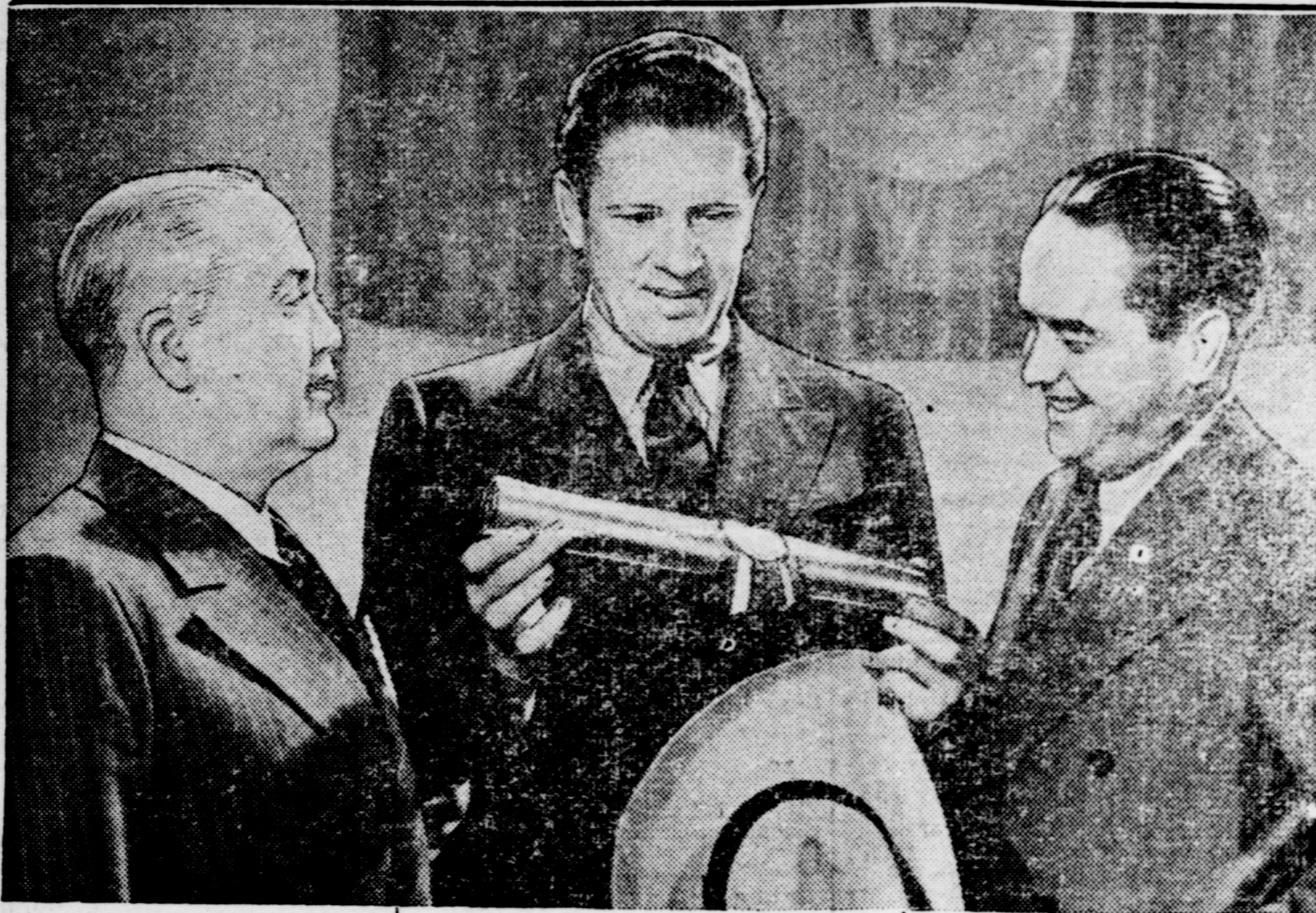

Dispelling The Fog By Charles Michelson

Some of my colleague columnists have been in a serious state of mind concerning the sale to newspapers and magazines of President Roosevelt's notes in connection with the books that are to be issued containing his messages to Congress, announcements of policies, and the speeches he has made.

Obviously, the administration critics must find it difficult to criticize that disposition of the proceeds of these syndicated articles, according to their sacred tenet that whatever the President does must be wicked. So they questioned the veracity of the statement, quoting that in response to a previous inquiry the White House secretariat had stated that the President's share in the proceeds would go to him directly.

Now it runs in my mind that President Harding was the owner of the Marion Star, which earned him \$42,000 the year before he came to the White House. This big profit was largely because of his candidacy and the general belief that he would be elected.

Among the terms of that sale was a provision that President Harding would receive \$10,000 a year for fifteen years for a column—a weekly column, if I recall correctly—which would naturally be syndicated. So that the \$10,000 fee could not be considered in any way exorbitant.

I do not recall that any of the columnists, now so caustic in their comments, found the slightest fault with President Harding for contracting to write a current column while he was in the White House. In fact, it was apparent to all newspaper men that the \$535,000 purchase price paid for the Marion Star was due to the well-founded belief that the publication of such a column by the President would give vast prestige to the paper and perhaps result in such syndicate profits from the distribution of that column as to justify the big price.

Whether Woodrow Wilson agreed to do some magazine stuff before or after he ceased to be President appears to be in doubt. Mr. Jay Franklin says that he postponed a message to Congress in order not to detract from the interest in an article on the Mexican situation, which Mr. Franklin says was from the President's "professional portable typewriter."

However, David Lawrence, who very much less frequently finds anything to approve in the Roosevelt policies, says that President Wilson wrote only one magazine article after he left the White House. Mr. Franklin, a little bit mysteriously, states that President Coolidge "nicked Ray Long of the Cosmopolitan magazine for articles from his dour Presidential pen," and added "it is a fact that President Coolidge wrote magazine pieces for money while in the White House."

No Live Issue. It would not seem to be a very live issue, as long as the proceeds of the newspaper and magazine publications are to be donated to some public purpose. Nevertheless, some of these columnists gravely announce that no other explanation is possible than that there was so much criticism aroused (by themselves and by some hostile newspapers) that the President changed his mind in deference to public opinion.

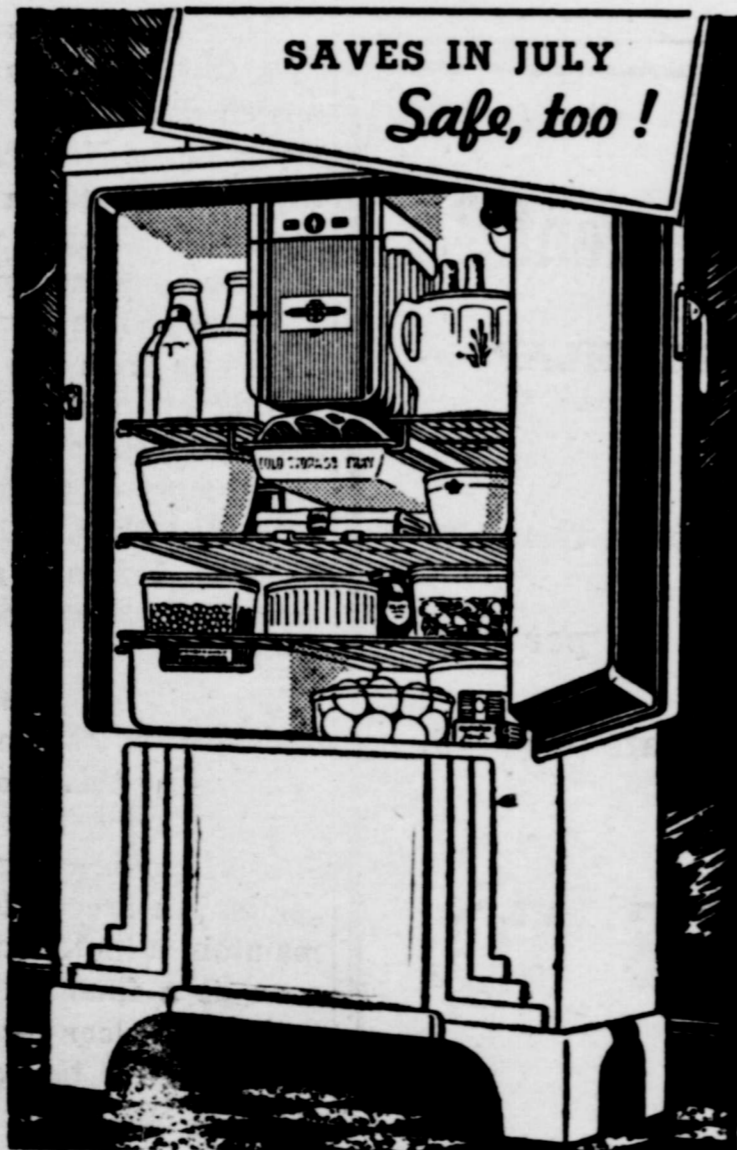

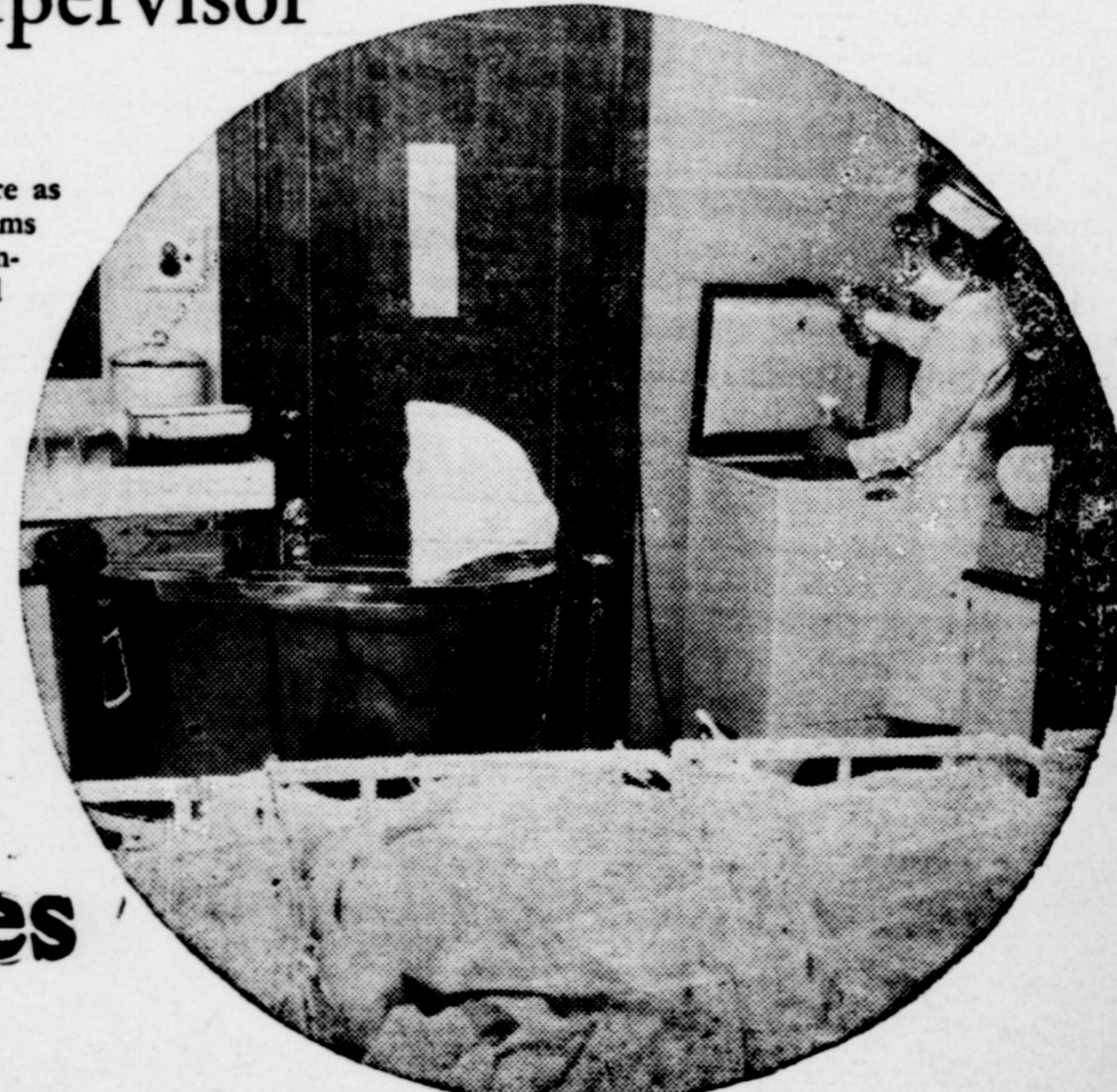

Farm Foreclosures Are Averted

Many farmers are losing their property or undergoing heavy expense to save it, because they fail to take advantage of debt adjustment services offered by the Farm Security Administration, it is reported by Allen A. McKimney, FSA's county supervisor.

Mr. M. B. Oates was in conference recently with Mr. McKimney, FSA's supervisor for this district, to develop plans for spreading information on debt adjustment.

"The county advisory committee for debt adjustment meets every month, and sometimes oftener, but it is not necessary for a farmer to take his case directly to them," Mr. McKimney said. "If he will come to the FSA office, I will go over his situation and advise him what the next step should be."

One case, recently foreclosed, could have been adjusted if application to the Farm Security Administration had been made a few weeks earlier, he said. The farm involved in this case will be saved for its present owner by taking advantage of the moratorium provided under the Frazer-Lenke Amendment to the Bankruptcy Act, but the owner will have to pay \$192.00 in attorney's fees, which would have been saved to him by earlier action.
