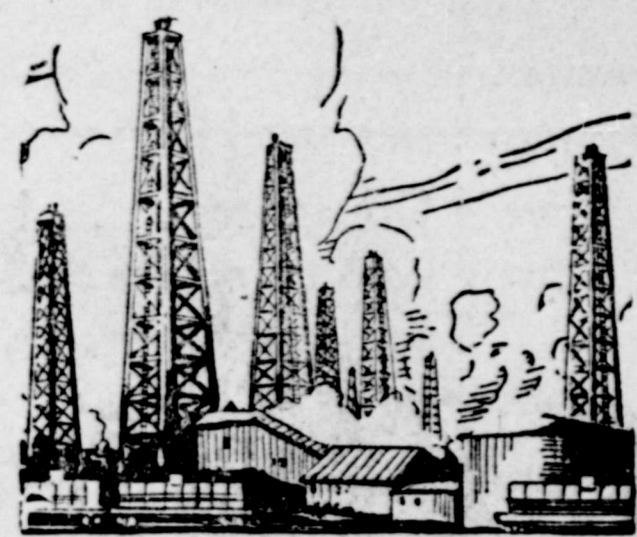

The survivors are her husband, four sons: Arthur Stearns of Meadow, Claud Stearns of Houston, Elmer and Alvin of Matador; three brothers, Edward Burrus of Olton, Charles Burrus of Abilene, and Harry Burrus of Big Spring; three sisters, Mrs. John Faulkner of Post, Mrs. Clifford Cast of Bedford, Oregon, and Mrs. Joe Kuykendall of Big Spring; three grandchildren: Frances Stearns of Matador, Stafford and Patsy Jean Stearns of Meadow.

Mrs. Stearns had been a citizen of Motley County the past forty years. She was born at Clinton, Mo., and came to Texas when two years old, the family settling in Floyd County. Mr. and Mrs. Stearns were married at Iowa Park July 26, 1891. They moved to Motley County in 1898, after residing in Floyd County three years. He became engaged in the cattle and ranch business. They own a nice ranch a few miles east of what is now Roaring Springs.

The herd of cattle were in the highway near a bridge when the truck hit two of the herd which caused the driver to lose control and headed into the bridge.

Patton Springs Community Holds Big School Rally Last Wednesday Night

The pupils, teachers, school board and a great number of patrons of the Patton Springs School District enjoyed a fine school rally in the school gymnasium Wednesday night of last week. Many people present were happily disappointed in that there was not a lot of long speeches to which no one wanted to listen. The evening was taken up with games and diversion which was enjoyed greatly.

Supt. Kelly acted as master of ceremonies at the meeting. This is Mr. Kelly's first year at Patton Springs, and he seems to be a real he-man endowed with sports and business. The first stunt was given by the pupils of the first, second and third grades. The pupils were lined up in two rows, the girls in one row and the boys in another, the two rows facing each other. Then Mr. Kelly run a trotline on which was fastened bait in the form of sticks of candy. The game consisted of the little people placing their hands behind their backs and then taking the candy off the line with their mouths. The girls won the stunt.

The second stunt was a tug of war by the fourth, fifth and sixth grade pupils, the boys giving the first contest and the girls then giving another. All of them won and received a nice big stick of candy each.

The boys of the seventh and eighth grades gave a very thrilling contest in the form of a three-leg race. It was a scream from the very first whistle. The girls in those two grades hand a candy race, each of the two divisions carrying a stick of candy on her chin to a certain point and return.

Pupils of the ninth, tenth and eleventh grades gave a contest in basket ball dribbling. They were asked to dribble to the opposite end of the gymnasium, make a goal throw and then dribble back and deliver the ball to the next one in relay form. The tenth grade won the contest.

Mr. Kelly called for the young people above school age and who are yet single. The young ladies were in one

row and the young men in another row. Mr. Kelly placed some kind of funnel on his nose and then demonstrated how it was to be placed on the nose of the next one to him and no one was to use their hands. The men had broader noses and the funnel would stick better for them and they won the contest, but the ladies received candy along with the men.

The married people who had been married less than ten years were asked to line up, the ladies in one line and the men in another line. The men were given a box containing a pair of overalls and a hat, and the ladies were given a box containing a dress and a hat. The game was that they must put on the clothes and run to the opposite end of the gymnasium, take off the clothes, place them in the box, return and give the box to the next person. Speed was emphasized more than getting dressed in many instances. The men won only by placing one leg into the overalls and making the race.

The older people of the community were in a pillow casing contest and before the game was over there were so many people crowded around and so much noise was going on that the winners could not be announced to the gallery. It was a great game because everybody wanted to win. All of them knew they would get candy, but the spirit of contest ran high.

Paul S. Rogers, Superintendent of Schools at Girard, entertained the people with a fine picture show after the contest hour. There was comedy, historical and classical pictures, but the people enjoyed the comedy and the historical pictures most. A number of people expressed their appreciation for the picture show.

Mr. Kelly stated that he hoped people would give him and the teachers their cooperation in this next term of school. He announced the beginning of school last Monday, August 29, and gave directions relative to the school buses. He asked how many people would like to have another get together night soon and it seemed to be voted unanimous.

The first bale of cotton of the 1938 production for this community was ginned at Spur last Thursday afternoon. The bale of cotton was grown by John T. Wright of Red Hill community and was brought to Swift Gin where the lint and seed were separated. The bale was a good one, weighing 442 pounds and was the first bale in Dickens County this year. The bale did not sell and the classification has not been made at this time.

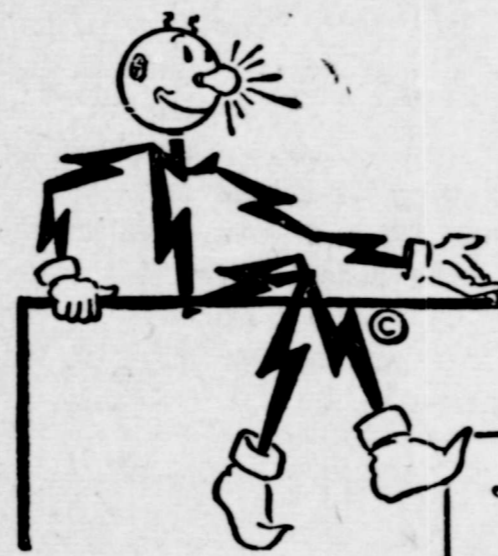

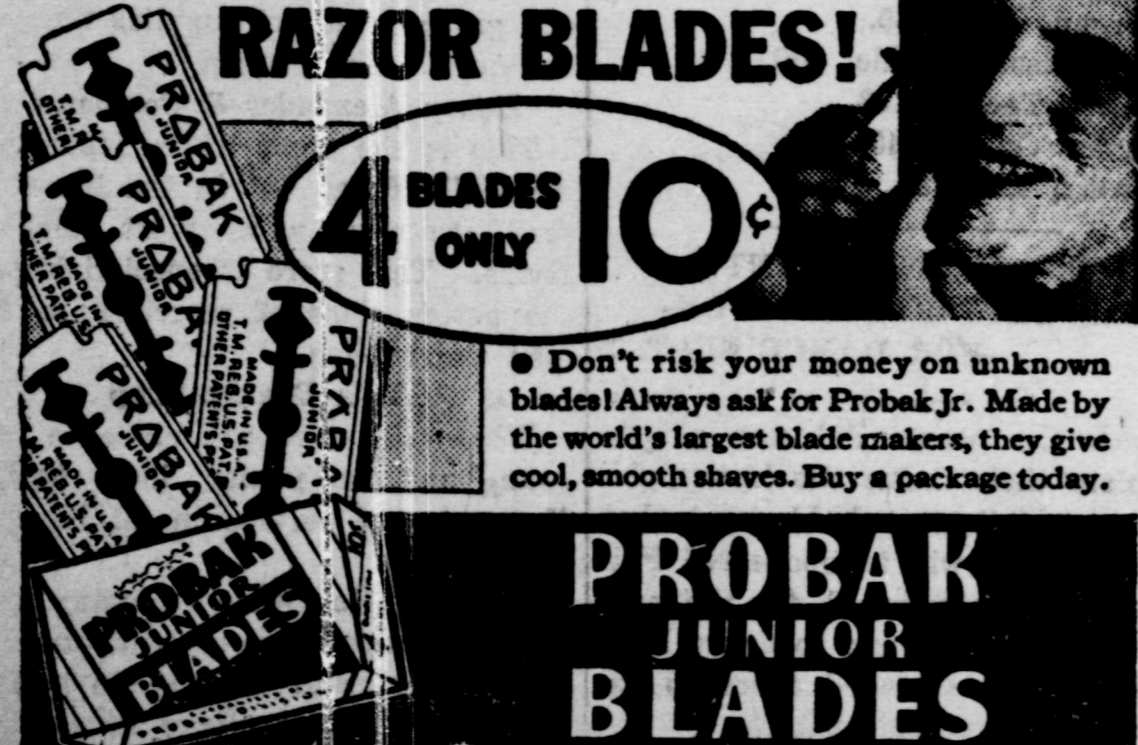

AN ORDINANCE FOR THE PURPOSE OF FIRE PREVENTION IN THE CITY OF SPUR

Be it ordained by the Board of Commissioners of the City of Spur, Texas:

Section 1. Section 2. Any person violating any provisions of the foregoing Section shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor and upon conviction shall be fined in any sum not exceeding One Hundred (\$100.00) Dollars.

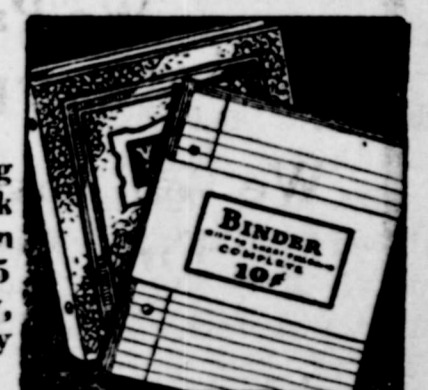

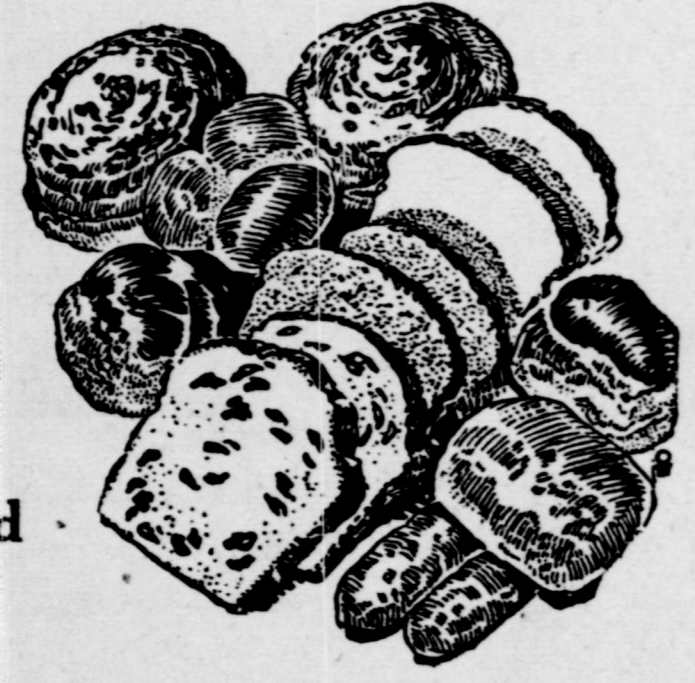
