ALVIN ALLISON ANNOUNCES FOR SENATOR'S POST

LEVELLAND SOLON IS FORMER JUDGE; MAKE STATEMENT IN TIMES

Alvin R. Allison of Levelland, Texas, has authorized the Dickens County Times to announce his candidacy for State Senator from the 30th Senatorial District of Texas.

Judge Allison was formerly county judge of Hockley County, Texas, holding such office for two terms, during which time he was president of the West Texas County Judge's and Commissioners' Association.

He was elected representative of the 119th District in 1938 which is composed of nine counties of the South Plains. During the 46th Legislature Allison sponsored House Bill No. 190 popularly known as the "Hot Check Law", and other legislation of interest to the average citizen.

The 30th Senatorial District contains 24 counties consisting of Bailey, Lamb, Hale, Floyd, Motley, Cottle, Cochran, Hockley, Lubbock, Crosby, King, Dickens, Yoakum, Terry, Lynn, Garza, Kent, Stonewall, Gaines, Dawson, Borden, Andrews, Martin, and Howard Counties.

A detailed statement of his platform will appear in this paper at a later date.

District 4-A Schedule Announced For 1940

J. D. Wilson of Paducah was chosen District 4-A chairman at a meeting held in Matador Monday at which 1940 schedules were made and other business of the conference discussed.

District moguls agreed that tie games in 1940 would count one-half win, one-half loss, with no preference given downs, yardage, and penetrations.

It was further agreed that in case of tied clubs in the district standing a playoff would be held between November 21 and No. 28.

In case of a three-way tie for the league title, a coin would be flipped to decide the playoff teams, but all three schools athletic funds would share in playoff money.

Perusal of the Bulldogs '40 card shows three home tilts in conference play: Matador Oct. 11; Ralls Oct. 18; and Paducah Nov. 8 or 11.

Supt. Thomas explained that clubs playing on Nov. 8 as scheduled could change dates to the Armistice holiday, with district sanction.

Only pre-conference game so far scheduled by the locals is the Haskel setto here on Sept. 20. This is return for Spur's invasion there last fall.

November 1—Spur at Crosbyton; Lockney at Floydada; Matador open; Paducah at Ralls.

November 8—Paducah at Spur; Floydada at Matador; Crosbyton at Ralls; Lockney open.

November 15—Spur open; Floydada at Crosbyton; Matador at Lockney; Ralls open; Paducah open.

November 21—Spur at Floydada; Matador at Paducah; Crosbyton open; Lockney at Ralls.

Funds Now Available To Landowners For Water Facilities At New Office Here; FSA And SCS Aid

NEW OFFICE HERE MAKES WF GRANTS

MONEY TO BE USED IN MANY TYPES OF WATER FACILITIES PROGRAM

FARM SECURITY AD. AND SOIL CONSERVATION SER. TO COOPERATE PROJECT

Funds are available to Dickens County landowners for water facilities loan grants through two government agencies it was learned this week.

Newly established Water Facilities Office, under direction of Paul E. Propst, Superintendent, in cooperation with Farm Security Administration and Soil Conservation Offices here, was taking loan applications as early as Friday of last week.

Cook Reports Money Available

Returning from a water facilities conference in Dallas last week, E. D. Cook, conservationist, said money was available and would be loaned as rapidly as borrowers applied and qualified.

Cook told of report of the Washington Board of Water Facilities at the Dallas parley that these loans would be rushed before July 1, at which time curtailment may come from government. Approximately three billions of dollars are available to landowners in 17 Western States, Cook stated.

Where To Apply

Application for loans should be directed to county agents office, FSA office, SWC office, or to the new Water Facilities office in Spur Security Bank Building, Propst pointed out.

A news release to all three Spur offices stated: "Congress has appropriated funds for carrying out the provisions of the Water Facilities program. In addition a part of the Farm Security Administration has been made available to give assistance to landowners and farmers.

Loans To Be Used

Loans are to be used in developing small water systems, such as stock ponds, wells, springs, water spreading dikes and construction and in-

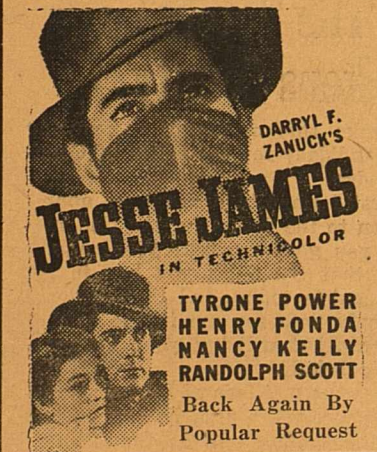

With nary a workout in days, the game Spurs made creditable showing against the Cardinals but could not clamp hot-shot Johnson, fine forward, who alone, scored 20 points, 16 in the first half.

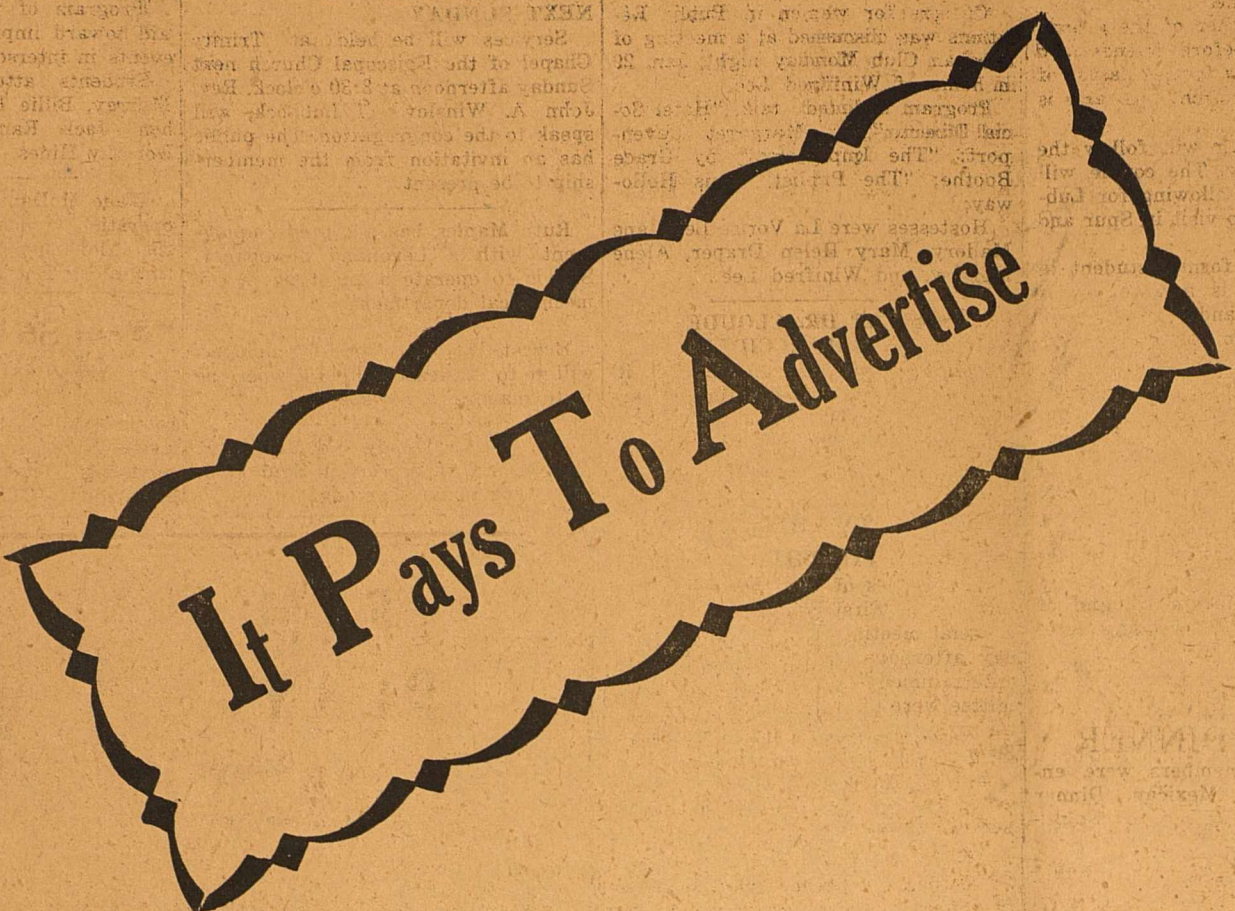

1940 Farm Program 'Explained Regarding Wheat - Cotton Payments

VIOLATION OF ALLOTMENT IS PAY STOPPER

COTTON AND WHEAT CROP PAYMENTS, PENALTIES, ARE EXPLAINED BY AAA

Details of the 1940 farm program concerning allotments and payments are issued:

1. Program is effective for the period beginning January 1, 1940, and ending November 30, 1940.

2. The payment is 1.6 cents for each pound of the normal yield for each acre in the cotton allotment. If the acreage planted to cotton is in excess of the allotment, there will be a deduction at the rate of 4 cents for each pound of the normal yield of the excess acres. Any person who knowingly plants, or causes or permits the planting of cotton on his farm in 1940 on acreage in excess of the cotton allotment for the farm for 1940 shall not be eligible for any payment on that farm or any other farm under the 1940 program.

3. For wheat allotments farms, the payment is 9 cents for each bushel of the normal yield for each acre in the wheat allotment. There shall be a deduction at the rate of 50 cents for each bushel of the normal yield of the acreage planted to wheat in excess of the allotment.

4. The average rate of payment per acre for general crops in the United States is \$1.10 per acre and the average rate of deduction is \$8 per acre. The secretary will establish for each county a rate of payment and deduction per acre which will vary among the counties as the productivity of the cropland in the county devoted to the production of general crops varies, as compared with the productivity of cropland in the United States devoted to the production of such crops.

The soil building goal for any farm shall be one unit of soil-building practices for each \$1.50 computed for the farm. The maximum payment which is available as assistance for carrying out soil-building practices is 55 cents for each acre of cropland in excess of the total soil-depleting allotment for the farm.

The payment is 10 cents per acre of non-crop open pasture land in the farm, where the total pasture does not exceed 640 acres. On larger ranges the maximum payment which is available is \$1 per animal unit plus two cents an acre.

New Cotton Marketing Plan Proposed By Secretary Wallace; Would Blue Tag Estimated Crop; Will Introduce Bill

FULL PLAN SHOWS WAY TO CURB IMPORTS VIA UNIQUE MILLING USE

Secretary of Agriculture, Henry A. Wallace, has prepared a bill designed to improve marketing of American cotton by means of a certificate plan which he will ask the present Congress to enact.

In substance, it proposes for cotton that the Secretary of Agriculture determine on Jan. 1 of each year, or some fixed date, the number of bales of cotton that he believes will be consumed in the United States during the coming year.

Will Stop Cotton Imports

In a recent statement to the press, Texas Congressman, Wright Patman, explained the proposed legislation with the following example: If the Secretary should decide that six million bales will be consumed, he will be authorized to issue six million blue tags and distribute them to farmers who may grow what will be known as 'blue tag' cotton. This blue tag cotton would be the only kind offered to knitters and weavers in the United States during that year, and none could be imported. Representatives of the cotton mills would be compelled to pay a fixed price for this blue tag cotton, which is expected to be the parity price.

Congressman Patman's explanation pointed out that, if the mills did not purchase all of this blue tag cotton, the Commodity Credit Corporation would then make a loan on it to the farmer for parity price. Thereafter, mills would have to pay the Commodity Credit Corporation 1 cent a pound extra, if purchased from the Corporation. This is to induce the mills to buy direct from the farmer, and in that way it not cost the Government anything to pay parity prices for cotton that is domestically consumed.

Conservation Continued

In addition to this proposal to pay farmers parity prices for cotton that is domestically consumed, the farmers must be encouraged to conserve their soil and diversify their crops. Therefore appropriations will be asked to continue to pay the farmers for soil conservation. In order for the farm program to become self-sustaining, a processing tax will likely be asked.

Supreme Court Objections Met

The Supreme Court of the United States, which held such a law unconstitutional on Jan. 8, 1936, will, as now constituted, declare such a law constitutional, it is thought.

In addition to a big change in the personnel of the Court, the objection which was given by the Supreme Court in 1936 opinion can be met by having the processing taxes paid into the United States Treasury and then reappropriated to the farmers in the same way and manner that Social Security taxes now go into the United States Treasury and are then reappropriated for Social Security purposes. In this way, it is believed, the Supreme Court's objections on the ground that it is not constitutional to tax one class or group for the direct and immediate benefit of another class or group will be overcome.

Returned From East; Says Mahon Working Hard For W. Texas

Virgil V. Parr returned from an extended trip in the East last week and was buoyant relative to conditions of the country. He was in New York, Philadelphia and other eastern commercial centers and feels that the country is in fine condition, the best possibly since the close of the World War.

Mr. Parr spent several days in Washington, and during the time was in conference with Congressman George Mahon. He stated that Congressman Mahon is really on the job and is working for the interests of people of West Texas. He stated that it is largely through the efforts of Congressman Mahon that Rural Electrification is being furnished the people in this country. Mahon has worked day and night in behalf of that project and has really helped to put it over. Many other projects such as the farm program, soil conservation service, farm security work, and many other projects to benefit the farmers and stockmen of this country has been in Congressman Mahon's program according to Mr. Parr.

Mr. Parr is one of the best informed men relative to agriculture and livestock business in this country. He is very much in accord with the farm and ranch programs of the government and says that Mr. Mahon is largely responsible for that work in this section. He stated, in fact, we would not have had this service had it not been for such men as Congressman Mahon.

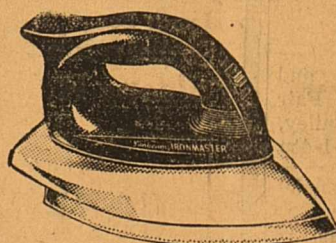

The local setup would see Soil Conservation experts estimate costs, draw plans, and draft other facilities in planning the projects.

New Office Hurdles
Then prospective borrowers would be granted money loans through the new Water Facilities Office of FSA, it was announced.

In charge of the new office, located in former quarters of the FSA, is Paul E. Propst. He comes to Spur from the Alpine district. He is Water Facilities Superintendent of this district of FSA, comprising King, Dickens, and Kent Counties.

Propst is former Rural Supervisor for FSA at Brewster, Terrell, and Jeff Davis Counties. He was transferred here Jan. 8.

Questions Answered
Follows, questions and answers, which may clarify the water facilities program to readers and prospective

borrowers:

(Q) Who is eligible for water facilities program?

(A) Owners who occupy and operate their farms.

(b) Owners who not occupy the land but whose land is occupied and operated or worked by farm laborer, share cropper or tenant.

(c) Tenants who hold the lease or contracts on land the tenure of which can reasonably be expected to hold for the term of the loan.

(d) Tenants who hold a lease or contract, for a term less than the term of the loan, on land from an owner, whose tenure status is satisfactory, and the lease insures to the tenant or his successor benefits that will offset his contributions to the best of the installation, and in which the owner has agreed to assume full responsibility for the repayment of any unpaid balance of the loan at the expiration or termination of the lease, and compliance with the Farm Plan.

(Q) How do I secure financial assistance through this program?

(A) The Farm Security Administration (new Water Facilities Office) handles all loans.

(Q) What is the rate of interest and length of loan?

(A) Three per cent for a period of one to 20 years, depending on the size of the loan and the farmer's ability to pay.

(Q) What are the security requirements?

(A) Each loan must be secured by a first mortgage on the removable parts of the facility. In cases where the value of the available security, in its excess of the amount of the loan, the maximum security required will be twice the amount of the note, including the recoverable value of the facility. Crops, livestock, benefit payments, etc., may be used as security, as determined by the Farm Security Administration.

(Q) How much can I borrow for developing an adequate water facility?

(A) Any amount necessary to develop an adequate water supply.

(Q) How long will I be obligated to carry on a complete program of soil and water conservation?

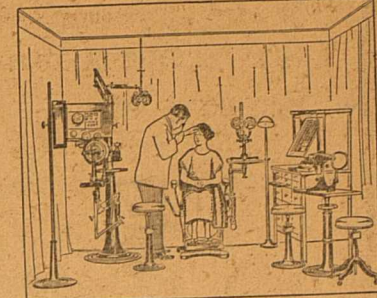
(A) Five years or, if loan is for longer period, to the extent of the loan.

(Q) Will the trained personnel of the Soil Conservation Service and Farm Security Administration cost me in carrying on this program?

(A) No charge is made for technical assistance of either service.

(Q) Where can I make application for the water facilities program?

(A) At local offices of Soil Conservation Service, Farm Security Administration Office, or your County Agent.
