Lunch Room Proving Asset To Community

The Spur School Lunch Room is a big asset to this community in many ways. At present there is employed eleven people counting the three maids who work in girls' rest rooms, and there is released in Spur something like \$471.00 per month or for six months' period \$2,726.00. With all of the food commodities WPA is furnishing many people are finding this to be one of the most profitable projects in the community. The sponsor's share of expense is less than \$100.00 per month.

Tickets sell for \$2.00 per month or \$50c per week. It is hoped that parents will pay for a monthly instead of weekly ticket; however those who intend for their children to eat at the lunch room only occasionally will find that the weekly ticket can be used to good advantage.

All parents who are financially able are required to make some contribution to the lunch room. Even though the amount may be small a small monthly contribution will help much in keeping the lunch room self-sustaining. Every parent whose child eats at lunch room is urged to make some weekly or monthly payment.

The biggest problem at present is to find some way to feed the colored school children. It would require something like a \$15.00 per month contribution to see that these children are fed. Any one who wishes to help in financing this lunch room will contact any teacher in the Spur Schools and information can be had.

Menus will be followed as near as possible in this order next week: Monday — Scalloped potatoes, broiled bacon, green beans, carrot strips, W. W. muffins, apple, and cocoa.

Tuesday — Smothered liver and onions, potato salad, plain muffins, and peach pies.

Wednesday — Boston baked beans, scalloped tomatoes, cabbage salad, corn muffins, oatmeal cookies, and cocoa.

Thursday — Corn pudding, broiled bacon, creamed English peas, stewed prunes, W. W. muffins, apple, and cocoa.

Friday — Salmon loaf, egg sauce, mashed potatoes, vegetable salad, raisin bread, and chocolate cake.

Home Guard Asked To Meet Tuesday

A general meeting of everybody interested in the organization of a home Texas National Guard are asked to meet in the American Hall in the second floor of the Wendell Building Tuesday night to start basic drill.

There will be two nights each week at the same place and officers of the First or Second Company will be there to conduct drill work. The two nights will be in order that everybody may have an opportunity to drill at least one night.

It is necessary to have enough men for company organization and to have enough drill practice for the Company to bear inspection by the State Officers in order to get final proof of the Company and get it maintained. State inspection will come within about five or six weeks.

What The CCC Has To Offer

Camp Commanders and members of their staffs are being called into service, as are men in private life. Numbers of the enrollees are being given the opportunity to qualify for positions of great responsibility with increases in pay several times that they are now receiving. Enrollees who have applied themselves and taken advantage of the opportunities available in each camp are reaping a rich reward for their efforts. The CCC offers a boy who is ambitious and with more opportunities for advancement than he can find in private employment. Boys who are of good character, unempolyed and needing work, 17 to 23 1-2 years old, will find the CCC an ideal place to become skilled in many types of work and trades. With each boy now receiving \$15 of his \$30 pay (\$8 in cash and \$7 put aside for his, when he has dependents; or with \$22 saved if he has none) an opportunity is presented to become independent upon his leaving the Corps.

Over 500 boys will be needed in January and every boy wishing to join the CCC should make application at the County Welfare Office as soon as possible.

Another Call For Volunteers Soon

Mrs. R. C. Brown, secretary to the County Draft Board, stated this week that word had been received that a second call for army training will be made January 13. It is estimated that the call will require about four times the number of the first call, which will mean that eight or possibly ten men will be required for Dickens County's quota. There are more than enough volunteers signed up waiting to fill the next quota.

It is thought the third call and possibly the fourth call will come sometime during January.

FARM PROGRAM CARRIES IN DICKENS COUNTY

The vote last Saturday on the farm program for 1941 indicated a lack of interest on the part of the farmers in Dickens County. However, the vote was comparatively small, yet the program received a big per cent majority. The vote for the program was 420 to 61 against it. This was a majority of 87 per cent. However, over the cotton producing section of the South the majority per cent was 92.

Mr. and Mrs. Curry will not move here at this time. Mrs. Curry is teaching in the Crosbyton City school, and Mr. Curry has his business there to look after. They own their home there and are not in a position to move to Spur at this time. Mr. Curry will spend half of his time in Spur with the business here.

They have three children, Patricia, Nina Marie and Leon all of whom are in school at Crosbyton.

More Checks Go To Farmers

The Agricultural Department reported that more soil conservation checks had been received. There were 129 checks amounting to \$13,456.82. This makes a total of \$160,046.26 received in conservation checks so far.

Also, the department reports five range checks received amounting to \$1,083.39. The checks on this program have just begun coming in. The wheat parity paid to Dickens County farmers this year amounted to \$14,652.45. The cotton parity paid amount to \$145,544.63. Adding all these farm aids makes an amount of \$321,326.73 that the farmers and stockmen of Dickens County have received from the agricultural program this year.

83 TREES OUT OF 100 STILL ALIVE AND GROWING ON SHELTERBELTS

83 trees out of every 100 planted are still alive and growing on the shelterbelt planted in Dickens County this last Spring.

These figures were made available by the Forest Service after making their Fall survival counts. Considering the dry summer, it is believed that this is a pretty good average on the 12 miles of shelterbelt planted on 17 farms in the Northern half of the county around Glenn and Afton.

Farmers taking good care of their trees are well pleased with their growth.

Anyone interested in having trees planted on their farms should leave their application with the County Agent.

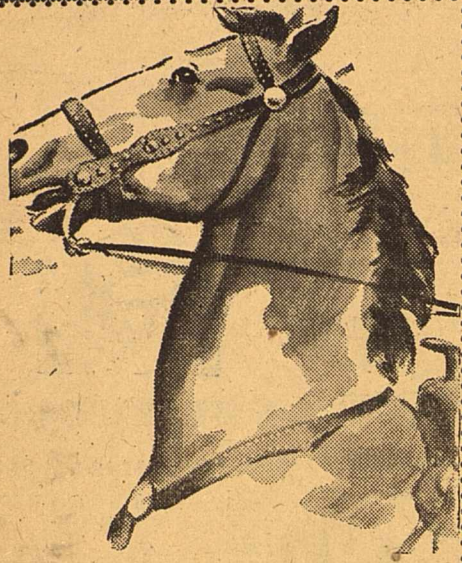
The report from the membership chairman, C. R. Walthall, showed that 434 persons had signed up for membership for this year. The membership quota was exceeded by a small number.

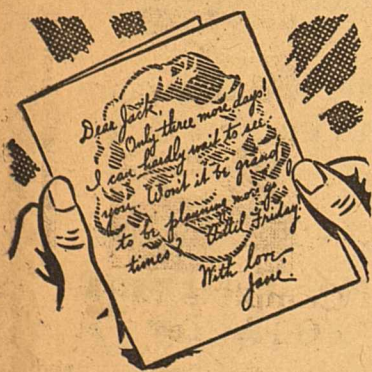

What Cold Storage Locker Means

When the cold storage locker system was installed at the Leon Ice Company in Spur, a number of people rented a locker. Their experience is that they can keep their meats in these lockers for an indefinite period of time and the meats remain fresh and sweet like fresh dressed meats. These meats are kept in perfect condition without the aid of curing salts or curing processes.

Any farmer or stockman can secure one of these lockers, kill a hog or beef, place it in his locker and have fresh meats of any type he desires for weeks without having to take any chances in regard to curing the time it is in there. Bacteria, which causes meats to spoil do not work in a freezing temperature. Besides, all meats are better after having been frozen. The sureness of meats keeping perfectly and at the same time remain fresh is a great convenience. Again, being able to keep your meats without the process of curing and taking chances on it being spoiled is another great economic convenience. It cost money to buy curing salts and spices, and it requires lots of time to treat meats with these salts and spices. But, such things are not needed when you keep your meats in a locker at 15 to 18 degrees below zero.

The service of a locker is not confined to meats only. Many people have kept vegetables fresh in lockers for several weeks. This is another great convenience. You can pick English peas from a fall garden and keep them fresh until Christmas in your locker. That is another great feature about cold storage.

Again, it matters not what time in the year you kill your meats, you can put them in your locker and keep them nice. Kill your hog or beef in July and hurry it to your locker, and if you get it there before it spoils, you may rest assured it will not spoil after it gets into the locker. Again, you have people of experience in handling meats to take care of your meats when you get such meats to the cold storage. This means a lot to you. Those of us who have been using

Questions About Defense Guard Answered

Questions frequently asked as to whether the Texas Defense Guard may expect to receive arms and equipment cannot be specifically answered. The Adjutant General was advised in conference with officers of the Department General Staff that we would be equipped with Enfield rifles, bayonets, sartridge belts, canteens and covers, haversacks and mess equipment. A requisition for these items has been submitted by the State, but it has not been indicated when shipment would be effected. All organizations will be supplied without action on their part when such equipment is available.

Organizations desiring to equip themselves with uniforms may do so. A memorandum covering permissible types of uniforms will be forwarded you at an early date.

State regulations governing the Texas Defense Guard together with enlistment contracts and other necessary forms are in process of preparation by this department. When completed and approved, you will be furnished a supply of enlistment contracts, and your enlisted men will be requested to execute this new form.

After the completion of enlistment contracts by all members of the organization, the unit will be inspected by an officer designated by the Adjutant General, and if the report of the Inspecting Officer is satisfactory, State acceptance of the unit will be issued.

Every effort is being made in drawing up the TDG regulations and in preparing the enlistment contracts to avoid the inclusion of any objectionable matter or any procedure which will cause membership in the TDG to interfere with the commercial affairs of the community or with the occupation of the members. Honorable discharges will be authorized by the Adjutant General upon the request of Organization Commanders for members who may move away from the station or whose business affairs interfere with the performance of their military duties. Transfers to other organizations will be authorized for like reasons.

Boys Who Have Volunteered For Army Service

It might be of interest to our readers to know what men from Dickens County have volunteered into the U. S. Army. So far the young men of our county have held up a fine record in volunteers for service of our country.

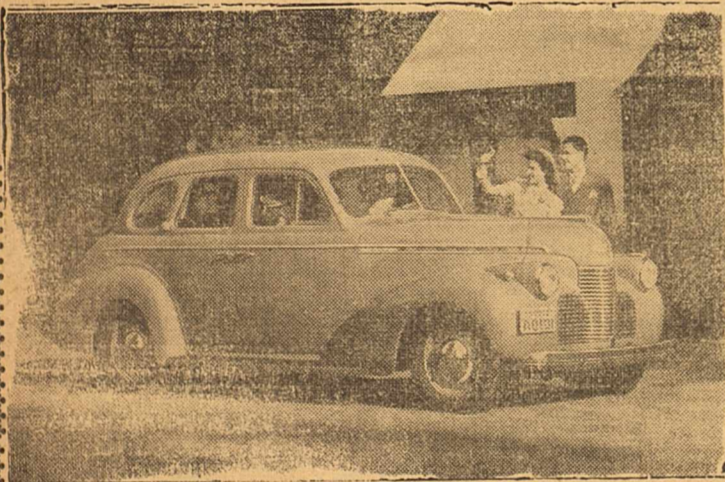
