## Local Scout Council Outlines Scout Week Program

The two committees of Scouting in Spur held a meeting the last of the week and outlined a program for the National Boy Scout Week which is February 7-13 inclusive. The committee discussed a number of fine things the Scouts might include in their program for the week. After all they settled on the following outline:

Friday, February 7, the Scouts are to conduct programs at the schools in Spur. The committee did not make any definite designations, but thought possibly the Scouts M a s t e r s and the school authorities might work out this program. There are three Scout Troops and a Cub Pack in Spur and there are four schools.

Saturday, February 8 the Scouts are to assemble at the American Legion Hall and hear the program sent out from National Headquarters by radio. This program will begin at 6:30 o'clock, p. m. Saturday afternoon at which time Dr. James E. West, Chief Scout; Walter W. Head, president of B o y Scouts of America; and President Roosevelt, Honorary President of Boy Scouts of America, will speak on Scouting. Arrangements f o r radio reception will be made and the Boy Scouts are to be present in uniforms, if possible. February 8 is the birthday of Boy Scout Work.

Sunday, February 9, is to be Church Day and Boy Scouts, dressed in uniforms, are to attend Sunday School and preaching services at their respective churches during the day. Possibly the churches may ask the Boy Scouts to act as ushers during the morning services. The various churches in the City will have at least one service for the benefit of the Boy Scouts, outlining how Boy Scout work is helpful to the church work and how it ties in with church programs.

Monday, February 10, will be Quarterly Review. Scouts are expected to be ready to stand inspection that day.

Tuesday, February 11, is to be newspaper day for the Boy Scouts. During that day they are to turn in newspaper articles to the press and get some practice in writing. Articles should be typed for the press. The newspapers are to assist the Scouts and make that edition as near a Boy Scout edition as possible.

Wednesday, February 12, is to be Citizenship Day for the Scouts. It is hoped they will arrange to cooperate with the City Officials in assisting to direct the affairs of the City that day. It is not expected the Scouts will center on taking people before their courts, but will in some manner, render a real assistance to the City and thereby learn something about civic duties and City management, as well as the machinery of City government.

Thursday night, February 13, is to be Father and Son Banquet. This banquet will be served by the ladies of the Methodist Church and will be fifty cents per plate. All fathers should begin now to arrange to take their son as a guest to that banquet. Ladies must know by Tuesday night, February 11, about the number of plates they are to serve. A good speaker will be there.

## Prospects For NYA Training School Favorable

A number of citizens of Dickens County held a meeting in Spur Thursday afternoon to discuss the idea of securing a youths training school here under the auspices of the National Youth Administration. R. C. Brown, who has always shown great interest in the young people, acted as temporary chairman of the meeting which was held in the American Legion hall.

Wilmer L. Mauldin, NYA Counselor of Paducah, was present and was introduced by Chairman Brown. Mr. Mauldin stated there are a great many places where this work is proving a great success both to the young people and to the communities as a whole. He introduced B. L. Cogdill, Area Works Supervisor at Lubbock, who addressed the meeting. Mr. Cogdill is an experienced mechanic and knows the value of training to young people. He stated that the federal government is waking up to the fact that we are from eight to ten years behind in practical training of our people.

He stated that the object of this work is to teach boys some very vital things. Boys are allowed 80 hours per month and draw 20 cents an hour while they are taking the training. He said it keeps the boys at home and tries to make practical, useful citizens of them. In that way he said it is better than a CCC camp because in that work boys have to leave home. He related how the boys at Lubbock had erected a nice cement block building at the Texas Technological College at a very low cost to college.

Mr. Cogdill then stated he was ready to answer questions, and a number of questions were asked, and all were answered in very satisfactory manner. Mr. Cogdill stated that boys who signed up for this training would have to work. He said it is no sitting down proposition. Any boy who did not do his duty could be fired off the job and another boy put in his place.

Judge Boedeker was elected permanent chairman and was accorded authority to select a committee to take a survey in regard to the work. The other members of the committee are: Atstin C. Rose of McAdoo, V. S. Ford of Afton, Cecil Meador of Dickens, O. L. Kelley for rural schools, O. C. Thomas for Spur schools, O. C. Arthur for Spur Civic Club, Mayor F. W. Jennings for the City of Spur, Mrs. M. H. Brannen for the County Library, R. C. Brown for the American Legion, Mrs. Elton Cook for the City Federation of Women's Clubs.

The duties of this committee are to look around and try to learn how many prospects can be secured in the county. Mr. Cogdill stated that any kind of work can be done for any tax paying corporation, such as city, schools or county government.

Everybody present were inclined to think it would be a good investment in the community. The government body having the work done would have to pay for the material. All the work would be free.

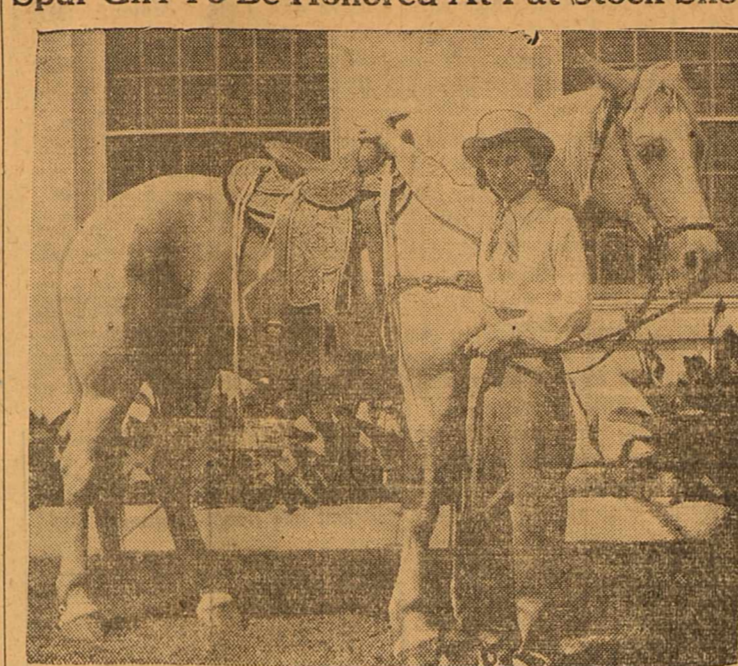
## Farmers Receive Additional Checks

## Feed and Seed Loans Available

Emergency crop and feed loans for 1941 are now available to farmers in Dickens County, and applications for these loans are now being received at Spur by D. H. Sandidge, Field Supervisor of the Emergency Crop and Feed Loan Section of the Farm Credit Administration.

These loans will be made, as in the past, only to farmers whose cash requirements are small and who cannot obtain a loan from any other source, including production credit associations, banks, or other private concerns or individuals.

As in former years, the money loaned will be limited to the applicant's necessary cash needs in preparing and cultivating his 1941 crops or in purchasing or producing feed for his livestock.

Borrowers who obtain loans for the production of cash crops are required to give as security a first lien on the crop financed or, in the case of loans for the purchase or production of feed for livestock, a first lien on the livestock to be fed.

## Eastern District Scout Executives Met Here

The Executive Committee for the Eastern District of Scouting held a meeting in Spur Thursday night and outlined the work for the year. Towns represented at the meeting were Roaring Springs, Dickens and Spur. Representatives present were: C. W. Giesecke of Roaring Springs, Charles Taylor, Cecil Meador, Eric Ousley and Wade Banwsky of Dickens; George S. Link, Jerry Bell, O. C. Thomas, W. N. McCombs, O. C. Arthur, Cecil Fox, R. C. Brown, W. F. Godfrey, O. L. Kelley, and others of Spur.

J. C. Grimes, Scout Executive for the northern section of the South Plains Council Area, was present and presented the District Committee a plan of scouting for 1941. George S. Link, District Chairman, presided at the meeting and asked the committee if they desired to adopt the program. It was voted unanimously to carry out the program for the year. The program will include a training course for Scouters, a Boy Scout Week program, local competitive meetings for the Scouts, District competitive contests for the Scouts and Area contests, one week at Camp Post in June which will be the first week in June for the Eastern District, and a district Scouters meeting.

Mr. Grimes reported that we have 134 registered Scouts in the District now and it is the hope to raise that number to 199 during the year. He advocated the organization of a new troop in Spur, a Negro troop in Matador, a Cub Pack for Matador and another Cub Pack in Spur soon.

The District First Aid test will be held in March which will be the first of a series of competitive tests in the district for 1941 program. There are seven troops of Scouts in the Eastern District, and it is hoped that all of them will be in on this contest. First Aid is one of the most important features of Scouting.

Mr. Grimes recommended more camping activities for the Scouts during the year. He stated that boys must have out-door activities if we expect to keep them interested Scout work.

The Scout leaders felt that there is a great program for 1941, and they feel if they follow through that it will be a great improvement in Scout work in the Eastern District.

The first Court of Honor has been called at Spur for Friday night, February 14. A number of Scouts have completed certain work which entitles them to advancement.

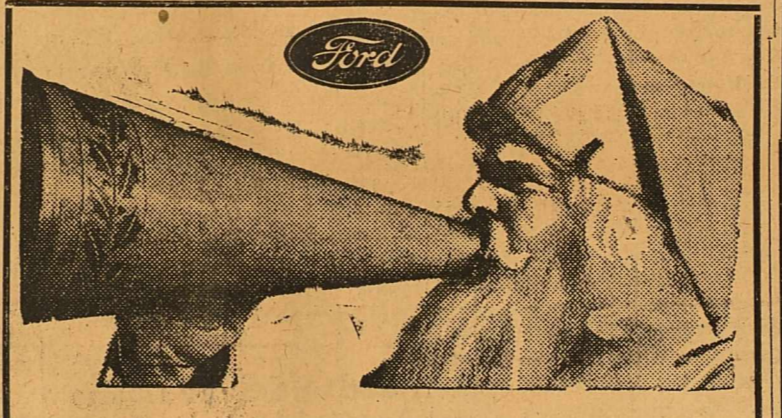

In this manner every county in the district would have access to a good library. It is hoped people will attend the meeting February 6.


