Spur High Has Hog Breeding Program

The Spur F. F. A. is carrying on a large hog breeding program with 50 sows and gilts and four boars, all of these are started now or selected and ready to start as soon as they are weaned.

Most of the boys with breeding hogs are feeding milo grain and a mineral mixture of equal parts salt, limestone, and bonemeal, supplemented with a mixture of equal parts cotton seed meal, alfalfa meal, and tankage, unless they have milk at home to feed them.

Defense Coordinator Appointed

Will Contact Farmers November

A meeting of government farm agencies will be held in Lubbock Friday, October 31, for the purpose of discussing plans and to secure information relative to the need of extra production of eggs, poultry and milk on the various farms in Texas to assist in relieving any food shortage that might be.

A meeting will be held in Dickens Saturday, November 1, to further explain matters relative to the extra foods that may be needed. Farmers are invited to the meeting in Dickens.

Then the various committeemen will start contacting farmers Monday, November 3, and get them to sign up compliance sheets to cooperate with the plan. These compliance sheets will be a volunteer matter with the farmers, but it is thought that all will want to cooperate with the program.

The committee on this work are: Joe M. Rose, chairman of the County Committee; J. O. Winslar of the Farm Security; Clark Forbis of the Commercial Credit Corporation; J. M. Reed, of the Soil Conservation Service at Snyder; Mack Woodrum, County Agent; and Marvin Angle, of the Forest Reserve Service at Paducah.

Jackrabbits Left Bulldogs Behind

The Spur Bulldogs lost their second conference game Friday night by letting the Ralls Jackrabbits run off and leave them with a jump of 13 to 0. At the first of the game the Bulldogs went after things and it seemed they would go over the goal line with their first opportunity with the ball. They worked from their 37 yard line down to Ralls 14 yard line, and there bogged down with a series of attempted passes after making six yadds on a first down.

Ralls had the ball at their 14-yard line after Spur had failed on downs. They made eight yards and six yards for a first down. Gained two yards and then lost two. Gained six and four for a first down. Ralls made one yard and three yards, then five yards but were called back and given five yards penalty. Ralls completed a pass for ten yards, and then made one yard to complete a first down. Then too slow on next play and took five yards penalty. They made five yards and then given five yards penalty. Ralls completed a pass from the 49-yard line and went over for a goal. Failed to convert and the score was 6 to 0 for Ralls.

Spur received at their 35-yard line. Lost six yards, then made seven yards. Failed on pass and punted to Ralls 42 yard line.

Ralls gained five, lost one and gained three. (quarter) Ralls gained two yards but were offside and had to punt to Spur's 20-yard line.

Spur made five yards, three yards and three yards for a first down. Failed on pass, gained two yards, failed on pass and punted to Ralls 22.

Ralls gained 17 yards for a first down. Gained three, lost two, then gained three. Punted to Spur's 33 yard line.

Spur lost two yards and gained eight. Completed a pass for nine and a first down. Spur lost the ball on a fumble at Ralls 33 yard line.

Ralls made 12 yards for a first down. Ralls made three, then five, but called back for a five yard penalty. Gained two yards and failed on a pass. Punted to Spur's 33 yard line.

Spur gained one yard, then made no gain. Called back and Ralls gets five yards. Completed a pass for two yards and punted to Ralls 35 yard line. Half was up. Score 6 to 0.

Ralls received at their 35 yard line. Ralls gained two and ten, took 10 yard penalty. Punted to Spur's 43 yard line.

Spur gained one yard, and then had a pass intercepted at Ralls 44 yard line. Ralls made a fumble which cost them the ball at their 48.

Spur gained one yard and two yards, then failed on a pass. Punted to Ralls 25. Ralls gained one yard and then 14 yards for a first down. Gained three yards, no gain, gained two and then punted to Spur's 36.

Spur made 14 yards for a first down. Spur failed on pass and Ralls gets 10 yards penalty. Spur made 14 yards for another first down. Spur made five yards for a penetration, failed on pass and then made four yards. Spur gets five yard penalty, then lost five yards and lost the ball on downs.

Ralls made five yards, but called back and given five yards penalty. Made five yards and six yards for a first down. Ralls failed on a pass, then made seven yards (quarter). Failed on pass and then gained five yards to complete a first down. Made 15 yards for a first down. Ralls gets penalty. Failed on pass. Gained three yards and three yards, then over 14 yards for a goal. Converted and the

Club Members To Study Spanish

By Mrs. Cliff Bird

In order to co-operate with President Roosevelt's Good Neighbor policy all the federated clubs of the United States have been asked to study the language of our Latin American neighbors.

1917 and 20th Century Clubs of Spur have begun the study of Spanish. Finding it very difficult to get suitable texts for a short but adequate course in conversational Spanish we are indeed grateful that The Dickens County Times is going to publish a series of twenty brief lessons in the language, prepared by E. E. Mireles, head of the Spanish department of Corpus Christi schools. These lessons, if really learned, give sufficient information in Spanish to enable any student, with the help of a good Spanish dictionary to learn to speak the language well.

The study clubs hope that many outside their membership will avail themselves of this splendid opportunity to learn conversational Spanish, so generously made possible by The Dickens County Times.

To make the most of the course, get note book in which you can paste each week's lesson. In this note book do all suggested written work. Get a good Spanish dictionary if possible, to further your study.

Let's all learn the language of our Latin American neighbors. Let's learn to speak Spanish.

Lesson 1—PRONUNCIATION

"Buenos Dias"
"Buenos Dias is "Good morning."

Before we start with our first lesson in Spanish, I am going to say a few words as introduction so that you may have a basis for the lessons which are to follow. It is advisable that you make notes as we go along and that you make an effort to learn each sound and each word as we mention them.

Spanish is a phonetic language. By that we mean that each letter has only one sound. There are two exceptions, the letters "c" and "g" which have two sounds. As soon as a person learns the sounds of the letters, he can read any word in Spanish. The ability to understand the word, however, is another thing; it is a question of memory, that is remembering the meaning of the word once it is learned either in actual use or from the dictionary.

The Spanish alphabet is the same as the English with the only addition of four letters, "ch", the double "l" (ll), the "ñ" which is an "n" with a little line or tilde over it, and the double "r" (rr).

All the consonants are the same as in English for our practical purpose with the exception of the letter, "h" which is not pronounced, and the letter "j" which has a similar sound to the English aspirated "h" in the word "horn." When you have learned the pronunciation of these few exceptions with the sounds of the five vowels, "a", "e", "i", "o", "u", then you have learned to read Spanish because the rest of the letters are the same as the English.

Although English is not a phonetic language, it has much in common with Spanish for 60 per cent of English comes from the Latin and Spanish is mostly Latin in origin; hence we have words that appear in both English and Spanish as "doctor", "conductor", "factor", "oriental", and some that are slightly changed from the English by the addition of a letter like the word "correct" which in Spanish is "correcto", "consonant" is "consonante", the English word "firm" is "firma", "organ" is "organó", "conduct" is "conducta", and so there are thousands of words that are either the same in English and Spanish or very similar. These words sound very different to you when we say them in Spanish, but that is because of the pronunciation; so now we shall pass on to the subject of the vowels which represent the main part of Spanish pronunciation as being different from English.

The vowels are the same as in English, only they are pronounced very differently from the English. The five vowels are "a", "e", "i", "o", "u" and they are pronounced "a" (ah), "e" (eh), "i" (ee), "o" (the same as short "o" in English), and "u" (like the double "o" in the English word boot).

The vowels are the very structure of the language; hence it is very important that you learn them well to start with. Let us say them slowly and repeat them many times aloud until you are sure you can pronounce them distinctly "e", "i", "o", "u".

Let us now combine them with a consonant, for in Spanish every vowel must have its consonant. Let us use the letter "b". We have "ba", "be", "bi", "bo", "bu". Using the letter "l", we get "la", "le", "li", "lo", "lu"; if we use the "p", we form "pa", "pe", "pi", "po", "pu"; and with "m", the combinations "ma", "me", "mi", "mo", "mu". If we repeat the combination of "pa", we have the Spanish word "papá" which means "father" and repeat "ma", we have the word "mamá" which means "mother". So we have "el papá", the father and "la mamá", the mother. Then we may say "el papá y la mamá", the father and the mother; the letter "y" (ee) meaning "and".

away some years ago. Also, three brothers survive: Wall Edwards, Kidd Edwards and Grover Edwards.

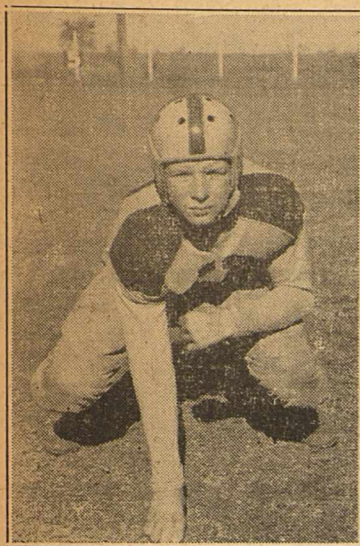

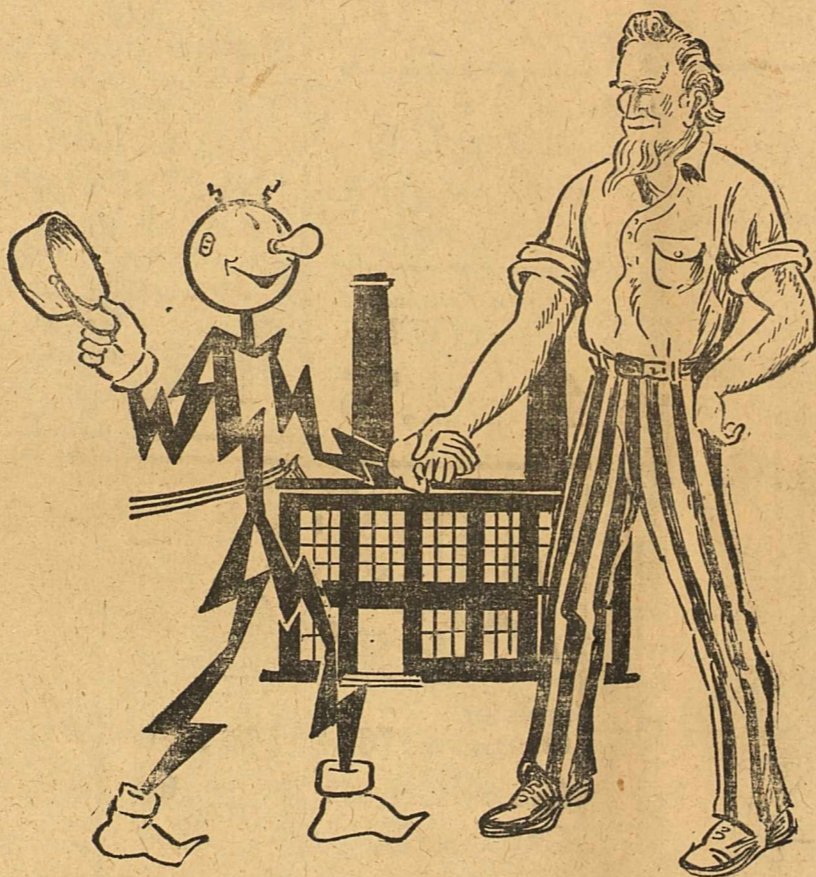

Is Classified as a "National Defense Utility"

This Company is serving Camp Barkeley, Abilene; Goodfellow Field, San Angelo; Bruce Field, Ballinger; Arledge Field, Stamford; Victory Field, Vernon; and other associated and cooperative projects, all of which are defined as National Defense Premises.

The Company, therefore, is classified as a National Defense Utility, and its property is protected by an Act of the Congress of the United States (Chapter 926-3D, Session 76 Congress) approved April 20, 1918; and Texas Labor-Violence Law (H. B. 800) passed by the Legislature on April 4, 1941.

Section 5 of the Federal Law reads as follows:

"That whoever, with intent to injure, interfere with, or obstruct the national defense of the United States, shall wilfully injure or destroy, or shall attempt to so injure or destroy, any national-defense material, national-defense premises, or national-defense utilities, as herein defined, shall, upon conviction thereof, be fined not more than \$10,000 or imprisonment not more than ten years, or both."

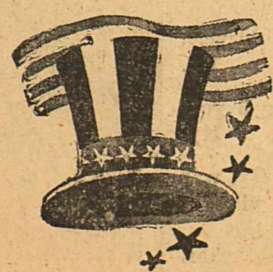
Section 1 of Texas H. B. No. 800 reads as follows:

"It shall be unlawful for any person by the use of force or violence, or threat of the use of force or violence, to prevent or to attempt to prevent any person from engaging in any lawful vocation within this state. Any person guilty of violating this Section shall be deemed guilty of a felony and upon conviction thereof, shall be pun-

ished by confinement in the State Penitentiary for not less than one (1) year nor more than two (2) years."

Section 2 of Texas H. B. No. 800 reads as follows:

"It shall be unlawful for any person acting in concert with one or more other persons to assemble at or near any place where a 'labor dispute' exists and by force or violence prevent or attempt to prevent any person from engaging in any lawful vocation, or for any person, acting either by himself or as a member of any group or organization, or acting in concert with one or more other persons, to promote, encourage, or aid any such unlawful assemblage. Any person guilty of violating this Section shall be deemed guilty of a felony, and upon conviction thereof shall be punished by confinement in the State Penitentiary for not less than one (1) year, nor more than (2) years."

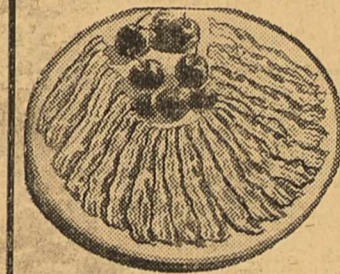

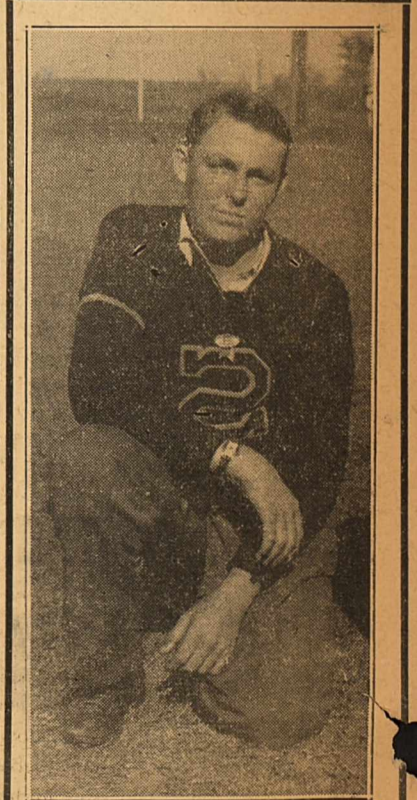
