Red Cross Memberhip Seven schools compose the basket all district in Class B schools for Campaign Still On

The drive for Red Cross membership was started in Spur last Wed. opportunity to serve the country since the Red Cross organization is recognized by the government as the best method of handling problems of hospitalization, nursing, relief in floods and other calamities.

The National Red Cross office has called for about two and one-half times as much aid as was given last year. This means that Dickens County which has steadily increased its gifts will have to give about double what it gave in 1940. In 1939 Dickens County numbered 97th in the 239 counties in Texas taking part. In 1940 Dickens County was 58th, or 5.53 per cent of chapter population enrolled. At 3:30 Wednesday of last week, Mr. Walthall reported that out of the 1,00 membership goal that 350 had been enrolled from Spur and that around \$405.00 had actually been paid in cash, which include donations. Fully two thirds of the population had not been seen at this time.

People should be interested in this work since a portion of the funds are kept in Dikens County to take care of emergency needs at home. It is the hope of all workers that people will continue to sign up as members and continue contributions until the goal has been reached.

Your Spanish Lesson Lesson 5-Four Extra Letters In Spanish

"Buenos Días, Señoras y Señores". (Ladies and Gentlemen).

In our last lesson we learned how to speak of one person or object and change to many obpects or persons. We say "la casa" and "las casas", "la mesa" and "las mesas", "el libro" and "los libros", "el sombrero" and "los sombreros" We learned also some words that end in "es" in the plural instead of "s"; for example, "conductor", "conductores" and "doctor", and doctores".

In the first lesson we made mention of the fact that in the Spanish alphabet we had four letters extra that we did not have in the English.

In this short course I am merely trying to present a concise view of the Spanish language. Our ultimate goal is to speak the language relatively well. It is imperative that you learn, first of all, how to read to speak perfectly with the only aid of a simple dictionary or in the actual practice of the language.

The only thing that we lack in our basis for this course is learning these four extra let-

ters that we mentioned. The four letters are the "ch" which is a single letter in Spanish, and is pronounced like the 'in our word "church"; the "l" (ll) which has the sound of the English y in the word 'yam" proximately like "ni" this letter being the only one that does not have an English equivalent; and the double "r in our English word "run" making it stronger and producing a rolling sound.

We see the "ch" in the Spanish word "ucha", a quarrel or fight, the double"!" in the word "gallo", a rooster, the "ñ" in the word "nino", a child and the double "r" in the word perro", a dog.

These words must be learned as key words for the pronunciation of these four extra letters of the Spanish alphabet: Lucha — gallo — niño -

We will now go over our vocabulary which is not very extensive, but very important since each word is a key word in pronunciation. Mamá, papá, esposo, esposa, mesa, casa, cosa, cubo, cena, cinco, gato, gota, gusto, gente, gitano, lucha, gallo, niño and perro.

To conclude our fifth lesson we will use some of these words in the plural form. As you may remember, we add an . We must also use the plural form of the words "el" and "la", that is, "los" and

Las mesas de la casa son muy bonitas.

La gente de la ciudad de Corpus Christil es muy buena. El goto de los niños de la casa es blanco.

Los niños de la casa son muy buenos. Los gallos y los perros son

de mi papá.

Mis amios son muy buenos. Las casas grandes y blancas son muy bonitas en (in) la ciudad de Corpus Christi.

You may now try to form sentences by yourself with these words we have used in our lessons. Try to use both singular and plural forms and vary the sentences as much as possible, being sure that you say each word correctly.

In some sections of the county there seems to be quite a bit of misunderstanding as to the Loan which we are handling here at Spur. For that reason the following statements are made.

The Texas Cotton Growers Cooperative Association of Dallas, Texas is operating legally under both State and Federal Laws as a farmers cooperative marketing association.

2. The money with which these loans are made is borrowed direct from the Farm Credit Administration in Washington. We are under the supervision of the Administration this season and were last year when we loaned on more than 100,000 bales. The charges we make for handling the loan is known to the FCA and the same loan values are used on our Form G paper as are used on Form A paper used by AAA office.

3. Any privileges of selling equities that might accrue as a result of an advancing market on the Form A paper is also the right of those who place their cotton in the loan on our Form G paper. Equities on cotton in the loan on our paper DO NOT HAVE TO BE SOLD TO THE ASSOCIATION. IT IS THE PRODUCERS COTTON TO BE SOLD AT HIS OWN DISCRETION AND TO WHOM HE WISHES.

If you have heard rumors anywhere that might cause you to doubt any of the above statements, it will be a pleasure for me to discuss the whole matter with you at our office which is located between the Citizens Gin and the Compress here in Spur.

If your cotton has been classed on the Green Card at Lubbock, bring the class card and your warehouse ticket with you and we can complete your loan in a few minutes. If your cotton has not been classed, put the bales in the nearest warehouse and bring yuor warehouse tickets and samples to this office and we can complete the loan without any running around or delay. loan without any running around or delay.


