Your Spanish Lesson

Lesson 7—Three Conjugations in Spanish

In the last lesson we learned about words of action or verbs like "hablar," to speak, "comprar," to buy, "andar," to walk, and "cantar," to sing. We learned how to use the words with "yo" meaning "I" and "usted," meaning "you," this form being the same for "él" meaning "he". We saw how we change "cantar" into "Yo canto", I sing or "Usted canta", you sing. We can also reverse this last phrase and ask a question, vis., ¿Canta Usted? Do you sing? We learned also the words "si" and "no", to answer questions with yes or no.

If you will notice all these action words like "hablar", "andar", and "cantar", all have the ending "ar". In Spanish we group these words according to their ending. All of these words like "hablar" that end in "ar" belong to one group. Those that end in "er", like "comer", belong to a second group, and the ones that end in "ir", like "vivir", to live, are placed in a third class. So we must learn that there are three kinds of action words or verbs ending in "ar", "er", and "ir", respectively.

It is important that you learn to know these groups because when you know to which group a word belongs, then you know how to change the word when you want to say "yo" or when you want to use "usted". Naturally, when we change from one person to another, we have to change the action word also. We say for "hablar" "yo hablo", but if we use the word "usted"; then we change "hablo" to "habla" and we say "Usted habla". For "comer", to eat, we have "Yo como", I eat; when we change to "usted" we have "Usted come". With words of the third group like "vivir", to live, or "subir", to climb or go up, we make the same changes that we do for "comer" with "usted". We say "Yo vivo", I live; "Usted vive", you live or "Vive usted en la ciudad de Corpus Christi?"

As you may observe, we make changes in these words just like we do in English. For example, let us take the word "to speak". We say "to speak", "I speak", or "he speaks". You see how when we say "I", we leave out the word "to", and when we say "he", we put in an "s". In English we have many changes. We change from "go" to "goes", from "like" to "likes" and many others. In Spanish we have many changes, too, but an advantage that we have is that all words are grouped into classes or conjugations. When we learn one word from a group, we have also learned all the words belonging to that particular group. So we must make it a point to learn the three words "hablar", "comer", and "vivir", and learn to change them at will when we say "yo" or "usted" or "nosotros" meaning "we".

I am going to give them to you in their order:
Hablár—Comer—Vivir.
Yo Hablo—Yo Como — Yo Vivo.
Usted Habla — Usted Come
Usted Vive.

Try to make some questions in Spanish and then answer them, easy, simple questions that will give you practice in using the correct forms; so that you will become used to the changes. For example, with "hablar", we can say: "¿Habla usted español?" "Yo hablo español, pero no muy bien". "Me gusta hablar español", and others that you might be able to think of.

ATTENTION FARMERS

In some sections of the county there seems to be quite a bit of misunderstanding as to the Loan which we are handling here at Spur. For that reason the following statements are made.

1. The Texas Cotton Growers Cooperative Association of Dallas, Texas is operating legally under both State and Federal Laws as a farmers cooperative marketing association.
2. The money with which these loans are made is borrowed direct from the Farm Credit Administration in Washington. We are under the supervision of the Administration this season and were last year when we loaned on more than 100,000 bales. The charges we make for handling the loan is known to the FCA and the same loan values are used on our Form G paper as are used on Form A paper used by AAA office.
3. Any privileges of selling equities that might accrue as a result of an advancing market on the Form A paper is also the right of those who place their cotton in the loan on our Form G paper. Equities on cotton in the loan on our paper DO NOT HAVE TO BE SOLD TO THE ASSOCIATION. IT IS THE PRODUCERS COTTON TO BE SOLD AT HIS OWN DISCRETION AND TO WHOM HE WISHES.

If you have heard rumors anywhere that might cause you to doubt any of the above statements, it will be a pleasure for me to discuss the whole matter with you at our office which is located between the Citizens Gin and the Compress here in Spur.

If your cotton has been classed on the Green Card at Lubbock, bring the class card and your warehouse ticket with you and we can complete your loan in a few minutes. If your cotton has not been classed, put the bales in the nearest warehouse and bring your warehouse tickets and samples to this office and we can complete the loan without any running around or delay.

Whether you handle cotton with us or not you will be treated courteously and every service we have will be extended you.

Food For Defense

Hon. Claude R. Wickard Secretary of Agriculture Washington, D. C.

Dear Sir:

We are greatly concerned in Texas about the "Food for Defense" program. All agencies of the United States Department of Agriculture have put forth every effort to enlist our farmers in this great and necessary campaign. Mr. R. M. Evans made an eloquent address at Waco on November 4, in its behalf.

Since the beginning of this campaign I have traveled in more than half this state talking to farmer groups. Without exception the farmer's attitude is that we must defeat Hitler but at the same time he is asking why builders of warships and warplanes, makers of munitions of war, and members of the unions should be allowed to make large profits, and high wages, while the farmer is asked to increase the production of food for defense with no assurance that he will receive a living wage for his work.

Mr. Wickard, too many Texas farmers are losing confidence in our government and its promises to protect their right to make a fair living. Our farmers are patriotic. They are not on strike. They will not strike but they want proof that our government will see that they get the same sort of treatment that other groups are receiving in this great struggle.

Our farmers cannot understand why certain cabinet officials are so much concerned about non-defense spending but never seem to object to the unfair profits that are being made on many government defense contracts.

Texas farmers are willing to produce their share of food needed for defense but they are not going to be satisfied to do so and take all the risk themselves. As a farmer, you know that farmers generally are opposed to inflation but they do insist on fair price for their efforts.
