

U. S. Wheat Bins Are Full



World War II finds the United States well supplied with wheat, says the U. S. Department of Agriculture. As the chart indicates, the supply is double that of 1917 when America entered the first World War. It is estimated that on July 1, the Nation's supply will be nearly 11/2 billion bushels, enough for two years of domestic use. Instead of plowing up new land and expanding wheat acreage, farmers are able to use land, labor, and equipment in turning out other war commodities more vitally needed—such as dairy, poultry, and meat products, vegetables, and oil crops.

Natural Foods For Health and Victory

Dickens county people need more natural food in their diet. Most of our diets are too low in some of the essential vitamins and minerals. What's the remedy?—One big item is to use at least one servin of whole grain products daily; according to the Texas Food Standard.

Miss Hazel Phipps, Extension Specialist in Food Preparation, says that that "it's a fact that whole wheat flour contains: 6 times as much B-1 (thiamin)—5 times as much iron—4 times as much phosphorus 2 times as much calcium—and several times as much riboflavin and vitamin 1as ordinary white flour that has not been enriched. Enriched flour has B1. nicotinic acid and iron added and is to be preferred as other white flour."

Use whole wheat flour in your favorite recipes, substituting it measure for measure for white flour, or using it half and half. Rolled oats and whole grain corn meal are also good grain to use. Try them and you'll like them says Fae Bass, County Home Demonstartion Agent.

Yellow Corn Meal Mush Made With Milk

(Serves 6, usually) 2 c yellow whole grain cornmeal 1-2 cold water 1 t salt

4 c skim milk Stir water and meal together. Heat milk to boiling. Add salt and moisten meal and stir until well mixed. Let cook slowly 2 to 3 hours with frequent stirring to prevent sticking. Serve hot with sugar (or other sweets) and hot milk. Or pour into pan to cool, and when cold and firm slice and fry in hot fat.

_ Whole Wheat Yeast Bread __ (6 loaves)

1 cake compressed yeast 6 t salt 8 c white flour (enriched) 3 c skim milk, heated to steaming 8 c whole wheat flour (or enough to make dough of proper consistency) 3 c water heated to simmering (or 6 c skim milk) As much as 3-4 of flour may be whole wheat






