Overseas Mail Is Congested

Air mail restrictions on foreign coints became effective September 4. The Postal Department this week gave out the following statement relative to Air Mail to foreign points.

"The War and Navy Departments exercise control over the transportation of Air Mail to overseas destinlations. Reports received during the past few weeks show that the volume of Air Mail now being received greatly exceeds the facilities that can be made available for transportation. Therefore, it is necessary to reduce the weight of each piece so that greater number of letters may be carried.

"The following order of loading will be necessary:

"First all official mail.

"Second, V-Mail (Which goes to Soldiers and Sailors in service) "Third, to the extent space is

available, other letter mail weighing not in excess of two ounces per



Cotton ginners in six Southwestern States must file detailed price reports with the Dallas headquarters of the Office of Price Administrator on or before September 19, OPA officials announced Wednesday.

The former federal judge served in the Navy in World War 1 and was a lieutenant commander in the naval reserve when he became Governor of Texas in 1934. His inaugeration as Governor compelled him to resign his commission in the Navy.

In the event his plans for returning to services do not materialize, Allred said, he probably will practice law in Houston. He was in Austin last week for the Democratic state convention.
