

Last week Fae Bass, Dickens County Home Demonstration Agent, was one of the 572 County Extension Service Agents attending a state conference at A. & M. College. These agents received not only information as to ways and means of carrying a great deal of inspiration from the numerous outstanding speakers there for the occasion. 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


