Farm Truck

Spur Bulldogs Meet

County agricultural agents in Texas are helping acquaint owners of farm trucks with the new government orders which vielly affect them, says George E. Adams, vicedirector and state agent of the A. and M. College Extension Service. A new regulation of the Office of

Defense Transportation requires a certificate of War Necessity for the operation of farm trucks as well as other trucks, busses and taxis. The regulation becomes effective Nov. 15 "The Extension Service is inter-

ested in helping farmers and ranchers conserve their equipment for war purposes," Mr. Adams explains. Certificates of War Necessity will govern a truck's maximum mileage or minimum loads, or both, and no

With the exception of one farm for oil to some Agency designated by the Commodity Credit Corporation to purchase oil peanuts. The Guaranteed price is \$86.00 per ton for No. 1 oil peanuts


Producers are permitted to keep seed peanuts for their own use with out penalty. Peanuts sold other than for oil from farms that do not have a peanut allotment are subject to a penalty of 3c per pound.

Producers are not permitted to pay a portion of their peanuts for threshing as this is considered a sale and would be subject to the above mentioned penalty.

Producers will be furnished a marketing card to be used when peanuts are sold. Each sale must be recorded on the card by the buyer at the time of the sale.






