# Band off to bowl

When the Pride of Pampa Band marches through Pasadena Monday in the 90th Tournament of Roses Parade, it will be following a long tradition of musical pageantry opening the New

Ever since the Monravia, Calif. Town Band appeared in the second Rose Parade in 1891, nearly a quarter-million musicians have added sound and color to the festivities.

Pampa band members departed by bus for California at 11:30 this morning. They will be followed Thursday by band boosters and parents, who will fly out of Amarillo at noon.

The Pride of Pampa is

among 22 bands from throughout the world invited to participate in the parade. Bands are selected by the Tournament's Music Committee, which judges from more than 150 applicants based on performance, appearance and ability to march for two hours down a five and one-half mile parade route.

Generally, there are over a dozen high school bands in each year's parade, including four selected from within California and eight or more from out-of-state. All geographical sectors of the U.S. are represented in the musical groups invited to participate in the parade; the Pride is the official Texas band. In recent years,

bands have come from as far away as Canada, Japan, the Virgin Islands and Hawaii.

More than 4.000 musicians are scheduled to march in this year's parade. Most, including the Pride of Pampa, will be appearing in the Tournament of Roses for the first time. They will join 61 floats and 250 equestrian riders in the parade.

"Our Wonderful World of Sports" is the theme for this year's parade. More than 1.5 million curbside spectators are expected to view it in person, with 125 million others in the worldwide television audience.

Following the parade, the Big Ten and Pacific-10 champs - the University of Michigan Wolverines and the University of Southern California Trojans - will battle it out in the 65th Rose Bowl football game.

The Michigan and USC bands will also be marching before the game. Other musical groups appearing in the parade are The Salvation Army Tournament of Roses Band; the U.S. Marine Corps Band: the U.S. Air Force Academy Drum & Bugle Corps from Colorado Springs; the Tournament of Roses Official Band from Pasadena City College; and the McDonald's All-American High School Band, composed of two all-star musicians from each state and the District of

# Mourners shot on Iran's roads

TEHRAN, Iran (AP) - Elite Ranger troops opened fire on a funeral procession for an antishah professor today, and hospital officials said at least four of the thousands of marching mourners were killed. The government, meanwhile, imposed fuel rationing on this oil-rich nation because of a crippling petroleum workers' strike.

Officials at Pahlavi Hospital said it received four dead and 22 wounded from the procession attack. A spokesman for the National Front, the chief opposition group, said at least six had been killed, and a government spokesman denied there were any deaths, though he said several persons had been

Without hospital reports, casualty figures issued by the two

sides have been difficult to verify independently.

The Front spokesman said several persons were shot dead in other clashes today between security forces and demonstrators in Tehran.

At one point, mobs of antishah demonstrators streamed toward the U.S. Embassy, but Iranian troops fired automatic weapons in the air to chase them. The protesters scattered but then regrouped and moved of to other areas.

Soldiers had allowed the funeral procession to take place on condition there be no antishah violence. Reporters who witnessed it said the march began peacefully from Pahlavi Hospital but when it reached the 24th of Esfand Square, about a quarter-mile away, the Ranger troops opened fire.

The university professor, who had been taking part in an antishah sit-in, was shot and killed Tuesday, reportedly as he leaned from a window to shout support to protesters during a demonstration.

A Front spokesman said he did not know why the soldiers fired on the funeral procession, but he believed soldiers along the square may have mistakenly thought troopers accompanying the marchers had deserted to the opposition. Reporters said some soldiers had escorted the marchers to en-

> sure that the procession was peaceful. Squads of the elite troopers were marching through Tehran's streets today, shoulder to shoulder, their faces covered by gas masks. Armored cars with 50-caliber machine guns

vered in the area of the square.

Heavy bursts of gunfire shook the downtown area, and pedestrians fled for shelter in office buildings. On one street, some 500 protesters set fire to heaps of tires, blocking traffic and enveloping a yellow Fiat in flames.

Demonstrators said the car had been full of agents of SAV-AK. Shah Mohammad Reza Pahlavi's dreaded secret police, who began shooting at the crowd. But the demonstrators said the agents escaped before the car was set ablaze.

The protesters first gathered at the headquarters of the National Iranian Oil Co., then moved toward the nearby American Embassy. Witnesses said the mob dispersed when the soldiers fired into the air.

# Home 'like battle scene'

DES PLAINES, Ill. (AP) -A muddy, foul-smelling crawl space beneath the home of a man suspected of killing 32 youths is "like a battle scene in there with all the trenches dug. You're working right in the graves.

Dr. Robert Stein, Cook County medical examiner, said Tuesday night that in his 20 years as a forensic pathologist he has never come upon a more horrifying case.

"Before this is all over with. this could be one of the most heinous crimes of the century," said Stein, who has been crawling on his stomach underneath

The skeletal remains of four full bodies and parts of a fifth

Tuesday, bringing to eight the total found there since the search began Friday: A ninth body was found under a concrete garage floor last week. The search was to continue to-

John Wayne Gacy Jr., 36, a construction contractor who once served a prison term in Iowa for sodomy, reportedly told investigators he had sex with and then killed 32 boys and young men, burying 26 at his home and throwing six in the Des Plaines River.

He is being held without bond on a murder charge and is scheduled to appear in court Friday.

Gacy, who was twice divorced, had lived in the house

Stein said he is not close to identifying any of the victims and some may never be identified. "The teeth are excellent but we still have to have the dental reports to match them," he said.

Edmund Dobbs, chief of Cook County Sheriff's Police, said that "based on my information they're all young boys.' Lt. Joseph Kozenczak, who is

heading the investigation for Des Plaines police, said Frank Landingin, 19, of Chicago, whose body was found Nov. 12 in the Des Plaines River southwest of Joliet, may have been one of Gacy's victims.

Kozenczak said Landingin's naked body was found with bikini underwear stuffed in his

found at Gacy's home also had underwear or cloth in their mouth when found

'Here's a straightforward case, isn't it, for capital punishment, the electric chair," said Stein. "I'm a physician, hence I'm against the taking of any life, but here is a classic example for the electric chair.

"He claims, what, 32 bodies? I bet you money you're going to find that many.

Dobbs said about 20 men worked inside Gacy's home Tuesday.

Stein said the excavation

would proceed slowly because workers risk becoming sick from breathing methane, hydrogen sulfide and other gases released during the decomposition of human flesh.

# Davis testifies

HOUSTON (AP) - Millionaire Cullen Davis took the stand today to tell about his relationship with FBI informant David McCrory and denied

Davis said he avoided McCrory at almost every turn and that his girlfriend twice changed the telephone number at her residence to head off calls from McCrory.

that he met him frequently, as his chief accuser

His initial testimony was a prelude to his denial of involvement in an alleged scheme to have his divorce judge killed.

The 45-year-old industrial czar said McCrory first approached him in January, but that he ducked further contact.

Davis and McCrory knew each other. One of McCrory's ex-wives was and still is a close friend of Davis' estranged wife, Priscilla. Davis told of a day in May when McCrory

came to see him: 'He said he was broke and didn't have a job. and he discussed the fact that he had been pimping for his wife. His wife was a prostitute. He started crying...he said he wanted to be

Davis said he sent McCrory on a business trip to Atlanta with Art Smith, who was the president of a newly acquired Davis company called Jet Air Corp.

"I thought it would be an excellent

opportunity...I told Art to take him with him and show him the ropes," Davis said.

Davis said he later told McCrory he would give him a job because he was "going to help me on my divorce, particularly matters pertaining to Priscilla.

Davis, charged with solicitation of murder, was the first witness called this morning after a five-day holiday recess. He never testified in his capital murder trial

in the shooting death of his 12-year-old stepdaughter. Lead defense attorney Richard "Racehorse" Haynes had indicated earlier he would call at

last year in Amarillo, in which he was acquitted

client to the stand. Davis' testimony was expected to be dramatic. He was expected to deny involvement in an alleged scheme to kill his divorce judge and to say he was framed by his estranged wife and

Haynes and the million-dollar defense team wanted the judge to put certain restraints on what looms as a long, searching cross-examination of Davis.

## Phenomenal growth

An interesting item came to the desk the other day about the growth of the Texas population. We are growing, the item pointed out, and it gave some of the reasons.

"People are pouring into the Lone Star State in ever-increasing number," the news feature read, continuing, "Texas is like a giant magnet drawing people from other states and regions at an accelerating rate. Dr R.L. Skradbanek of the Texas Real Estate Research Center at Texas A&M University was credited with that statement.

His statement went on: "Migration to Texas is part of a national pattern where more people are leaving the Frost Belt states of the industrialized Northeast and Midwest for the Sun Belt states.'

Then Dr. Skrabanek told why they are coming to Texas: "Texas is getting more than its share of people following better jobs as industries relocate in areas where energy is available, wages are lower, unions are less organized and the general cost of living is lower."

Energy is available not because the fuel for it just happened to be in the ground but because industrious, free - enterprising Texans found it there and made all that energy "happen." Wages are lower because the general cost of living is lower. The general cost of living is lower because, for one major reason, unions are less organized and the steep cost of labor-unionism is not passed on to the consumer. The worker has a freedom of choice in his pursuit of employment because of the state's right-to-work laws, and he is not forced to pay union dues to hold a job.

These things are keys to the population-industrial growth in Texas, and Texans should strive to keep them alive and healthy. If they do, then the future of Texas comes out as a rosy picture.

Dr Skrabanek pointed out that between 1950 and 1960, people moving to Texas exceeded the number leaving by an average of 11,400 a year. The average jumped to 112,000 a year between 1973 and 1976 and to 228,000 between 1976 and 1977. While migration accounted for only 13 percent of Texas' total population growth in the 1960s, it made up twothirds of the population growth between 1976 and 1977, he said.

Dr Skrabanek said Texas, in total population, now ranks thrid behind California and New York, and its growth rate of 124.6 percent between 1970 and 1977 was more than twice the national average. He said that with the exception of California, Texas increased its population more than any other state between 1976 and 1977.

He added, "If Texas continues to add population at the same pace in the remaining years of the 1970s as it did between April 1, 1970, and July 1, 1977, it will have a larger population increase between 1970 and 1980 than in any census decade in state history. Until Now, the largest increases in number of people for any census decade took place between 1950 and 1960, when Texas added more than 1.86 million. It now appears almost certain a population increase of more than 2.2 million can be expected between 1970 and 1980. Furthermore, there are no indications of a slowdown in population growth - at least through the next 10 years."

But there is one thing that can slow down the population growth and all state growth, and that is the capitulation of Texas to big labor unionism. That would eliminate the things most attractive to those who make a state's industry, population and economy grow.

# Costly navy junk

Steve Seidenglanz and the U.S. Government are at a standoff. Seidenglanz is a Sun Valley, Cal., surplus equipment dealer and the government, in this instance, is the U.S. Navy.

The standoff exists because Seidenglanz has something the navy very much wants. won't sell to anyone else and won't cut his price. The navy, for its part, most assuredly wants what Seidenglanz has, but

won't pay his asking price. It all come about like this.

Last year, the navy sold three torpedo shaped hunks of metal as surplus "junk" to the highest bidder the price paid, by another surplus dealer, was \$36.60. In the meantime. Seidenglanz acquired the three pieces of so - called junk from the original buyer for \$200.

So far, so good. Transactions like that take place all the time-in the surplus

Trouble is, the three objects aren't "junk" after all. Turns out, they contain classified electronic circuitry. And the navy wants them back in the worst sort of way; though quietly, if possible. Understandably, a bit embarrassed at letting classified material get out of its control, and for a mere pittance, at that, the navy naturally, isn't looking for undue

publicity. At which point, more trouble, for the navy, rears its head. Seidenglanz is quite willing to co - operate: providing the navy is willing to pay his price. Insisting that he acquired the property legally and above board, Steve Seidenglanz is asking \$150.000 plus \$10,000 in accumulated storage fees.

To which, the navy replies, "out rageous!" Interviewed, the surplus dealer explained his position:

"As much as I would like to make a profit, I'm still a pretty gung - ho American and there is no way in hell I would sell the devices to a foreign country." But, the stocky, junk dealer went on to add, the government's treatment of him in the past justifies his attitude toward the government now. It's like this, he says:

"In 16 years in the surplus business, the government has trained me to react this way. If I make a mistake, I have to pay for it. If I don't pick up the goods on time, I have to pay a storage charge. If I don't pay my income taxes on time, I have to pay a

"So, when the government comes to me and say. Hey, we made a mistake - now give me back the merchandise' - my reaction is, 'Go to hell!'

Suffice it to say, we understand how Steve Seidenglanz feels. Nevertheless, we think he is wrong.

Like so many others, the surplus dealer apparently thinks that the government has some huge fund into which it can dip at will; consequently, in view of the govenrment's treatment of him in the past, demanding \$160,000 for something that cost him \$200, when he hasthe government over

a barrel, is sweet "poetic justice." But, actually, it isn't like that at all. Before the government can pay Seidenglanz the \$160,000 he is demanding, it must first take \$160,000 from the taxpayers. So, instead of "poetic justice" for past

wrongs as he no doubt imagines, what Steve Seidenglanz is demanding is that the taxpayers, who had no part in the transaction, be punished to the tune of some \$160,000 for a bureaucratic mistake.

Sorry Steve! But that's the way we see it.

# The short view

Modern corporate chief executives sometimes are criticized for their short view, which, so it is said, extends little beyond the time they will reach retirement age and pass the baton to another professional manager in the line of succession. This, so it is claimed, generates decisions of public positions that may damage the corporation's best interests over the long term. We're not inclined to accept such a sweeping generality uncritically. There are all kinds of executives, all kinds of corporations and all kinds of decisions to be made. In many instances, the short view is the only view possible, given the uncertainties that cloud the long view.

Nonetheless, we ourselves are at times frustrated by what seems to us to be a short view, or excessive pragmatism, in the positions some corporations take with regard to the public policy. Nowhere is our frustration better focused than on the

country's major companies in support of the President's "voluntary," wage and

For example, General Motors Chairman Thomas A. Murphy offered his opinion that the voluntary program is viable, adding "I have no sympathy for those in the press, in business, in labor and in government who assert that a voluntary program cannot work before it is given a chance to work." Manufacturers Hanover Bank President JohnF. McGillicuddy told the New York Economic Club recently that "any efforts such as voluntary wage and price controls that might even marginally influence the outcome (of the inflation fight) should be applauded, not condemned.

We assume that businessmen who take such a view sincerely believe that price and wage restrint have something to do with fighting inflation, but it would be more tempting to suspect that they merely see unions. George Meany not only suspects that, but shouts it to the world, saying, if we're going to have controls, why not make them mandatory

And indeed, why not? If you believe there is some inflation - fighting magic in wage and price restraint, why not make them mandatory, so that everyone can live by the same rules? This would have the additional merit of giving any sanctions imposed against the violators legality, which is doubtfully present under the ad hoc arm - twisting now being done under the "voluntary" rubric

We find few businessmen willing to declare in favor of mandatory controls. Apparently the lessons of President Nixon's mandatory controls of 1971, which did get wide support from business, have lingered long enough to prevent that.

The answer many businessmen would give to the question above would be tactical: We support voluntary guidelines because if we don't the government will impose mandatory controls.

We don't pretend to know much about political tactics, but it has seemed to us that a stand on principle is always good politics. And any businessman who thinks that mandatory wage and price restraints are bad must surely think that ad hoc wage and price retraints are bad. So why say they are good?

Wage and price retraints, whether mandated by law or enforced through ad hoc illegalities, are damaging to the interests of business and the public in both the short and long term. They historically have been a sideshow governments staged to mask mismanagement, which characteristically takes the form of overspending covered by currency devaluation. Worse, they are an attempt by government to shift the blame for inflation to business and labor.

Thus, those businessmen who applaud "voluntary" wage and price guidelines are, in effect, applauding a government political attack on the private sector. If they think this will appease. Washington, they are badly mistaken. They encourage such attacks by lending them credibility.

Business is indeed under pressure from government. Hardly a day goes by without some new assault from the FTC, Antitrust, and Department of Labor or some other agency. It would distrub us to believe that professional managers have no other response than dissemblance. If so, the critics who complain about a short view may be correct.

## **Voting** records

**Congressional Quarterly** WASHINGTON - Absenteeism was up in Congress during 1978, as it usually is when members have to campaign for re -

The average member participated in 87 percent of the votes taken during the year, four points below the 91 percent record level of 1975, according to Congressional Quarterly's annual survey of voting participation.

The 1978 figure compares with 90 percent for 1977 and 86 percent for 1976, another election year

The Senate and House combined took 1,350 votes during 1978, one more than the previous record high set in 1976.

Because Congress doesn't keep attendance records, voting participation scores provide the closest thing to a tally of how often members participate in activities on the Senate and House floors. But the figures are only af approximation because a member may be present and choose not to vote.

In general, House and Senate members voted about the same percentage of the time. House Republicans took part in voting slightly more often than House

Only one senator - Democrat William Proxmire of Wisconsin — answered every one of the 516 Senate votes taken during the year. Proxmire extended a string of consecutive votes that began in 1966, when he last missed one, and reached a Senate total of 5,997 votes by the end of 1978.

Democratic Sens. Edward Zorinsky of Nebraska, Robert C. Byrd of W. Va., and Henry M. Jackson of Washington scored 99 percent, as did Republican Richard G. Lugar of Indiana and independent Harry F. Byrd Jr. of Virginia.

Fifteen other senators scored 95 to 98

There were three perfect scores in the House in 1978, recorded by Democrats Adam Benjamin Jr. of Indiana and William H. Natcher of Kentucky and Republican Robert J. Lagomarsino of California.

Kentucky's Natcher has not missed a vote since coming to Congress in 1954. He has voted a record 6.925 consecutive times.

Twelve House members and two senators voted less than 50 percent of the time in 1978, compared to only three House members and no senators in 1977 Seventeen members were in this category

Illness and election campaigns contributed to the absences of most of the members with the lowest attendance

Scoring lowest were Democratic Reps. Olin E. Teague of Texas, 9 percent; Yvonne Brathwaite Burke of Califorfia, 34 percent; and Peter W. Rodino Jr. of New Jersey, 36 percent.

Teague and Rodino had difficult health problems during the year and Burke was busy in her unsuccessful campaign for election as California attorney general.

The lowest Republican score in the House was 40 percent, recorded by Louis Frey Jr. of Florida, an unsuccessful candidate for the gubernatorial nomination. Democrat James Abourezk of South Dakota, who is retiring after one term in the Senate, had the lowest voting score in that chamber, 44

Another Democrat, Wendell R. Anderson of Minnesota, had the next lowest score, 49 percent. Anderson was defeated for election to the seat to which he was appointed in 1976.

The lowest voting percentage for Republican senators was 69 percent, scored by John G. Tower of Texas who was engaged in a tight race for re - election. He won that contest.

The average representative voted 87 percent of the time in 1978, as did the average senator.

House Republicans voted 88 percent of the time, Democrats 87. In the Senate, each party scored 87 percent.

In the House, eastern Republicans led members from all regions, with a 91 percent participation score. In-the Senate, eastern Democrats and eastern Republicans had the highest scores - 91 percent each.

#### Ethical debt retirement donors: Richard O'Neill, a Mission Veio.

and ROBERT WALTERS WASHINGTON (NEA) - President Carter's strict moral code and an unfavorable image of "fat cat" campaign contributors in an era of political reform have complicated the Democratic Party's efforts to wipe out its massive 10 - year - old

Determined to eliminate the debt, even at the cost of generating unfavorable publicity, the Democratic National Committee (DNC) late last year sought a special exemption from the federal law governing campaign financing.

That statute limits individuals to yearly contributions of \$1,000 to each candidate, \$5,000 to each multi - candidate political action committee and \$20,000 to the national committees of political parties.

In addition, individual donors may give no more than \$25,000 annually to all candidates and committees involved in contests for federal offices - seats in Congress, the presidency and the vice

presidency. But because most of the DNC debt was incurred in connection with the 1968 presidential campaign, before the current law was passed, the Federal Election Commission early this year waived the contribution limitations for the Democrats.

With authority to solicit unlimited amounts throughout most of 1978, the Democrats have collected only slightly more than \$250,000, leaving a deficit of approximately \$1.4 million to be paid before fund - raising begins in earnest for the 1980 presidential and congressional campaigns.

That's a marked improvement over the autumn of 1969, when the decade - old debt reached its peak of \$8.3 million. But Democratic fund - raisers have a long way to go if they are to attain their goal of balancing the party's books by mid - 1979

The names of the major donors to the special debt - retirement fund have not been previously published, but here's a list of the last of the "fat cats" in American

# AAA wants truck litter stopped

HOUSTON (AP) - The American Automobile Association wants liability insurance to be mandatory for all Texas motorists and a mandatory 90day driver's license suspension for drunken drivers.

But the No. 1 item among 1979 legislative objectives adopted by the state's three AAA motor clubs in Houston, Dallas and Amarillo, is a tougher state law requiring a tarpaulin or similar cover on the backs of trucks to prevent accidental littering.

The AAA says highway litter

caused by uncovered trucks is costing Texas taxpayers millions of dollars a year. The organization also called for reenactment of a law requiring motorcycle operators and passengers to wear helments.

The legislative program was developed after a survey of AAA members indicated the following results: -96 percent favor tarpaulin

covers on truck loads, -89 percent favor the 90-day driver's license suspensions. -94 percent favor mandatory

liability insurance, and -71 percent favor re-enact-

ment of the motorcycle helmet

At present, the AAA said, uncovered trucks with loads piled high operate routinely all over the state, "littering the highways and causing damage to other vehicles and occasional injuries to their occupants.'

'Aside from the enormous highway safety problems caused by uncovered trucks, the cost of cleaning up litter which they spill is a real and growing problem," the AAA

## Radar poses threat

WASHINGTON (AP) - Russia has successfully tested a new radar and missile system that could pose a serious threat to low-flying American bombers and fighters invading Soviet air space, Pentagon officials

The Pentagon's research chief said Tuesday a Soviet MiG-25-type fighter has made at least one successful "look down-shoot down" attack, destroying a target drone the size of a small fighter plane. The system could be operational in

the early 1980s, he said. The official, Dr. William Perry. told a briefing that when the new system is in use, it will have "significant implications" for the ability of U.S. fighters and bombers to survive. These planes are believed capable of eluding the radar systems Russia currently uses by flying close to the ground.

Perry said the significance of the look down-shoot down radar is its ability to distinguish targets such as low-flying aircraft from "ground clutter," which confuses existing radar sys-

DEAR DR. LAMB - I am a 29-year-old female and for over a year I've been having pain in my right side where my gallbladder is located. I went to my doctor and he sent me to have my gallbladder and colon X-rayed, but nothing showed up. Then, he gave me some tablets for what he thought was a spastic colon. I still have the pain from time to time despite

the tablets. give me some information on gallbladder colic. I had never heard anything on this before I read one of your columns and you mentioned. briefly, that a low-fat diet was helpful for gallbladder colic. Could this possibly be my problem? If so, what other information could you give me about treatment of

DEAR READER - It is unlikely that your pain is caused by gallbladder colic. Why? Because you don't have any gallstones. Most attacks of gallbladder colic are caused by sudden obstruction of the bile duct usually from a stone lodged

The pain is quite severe and may be in the pit of the stomach or under the margin of the right ribs. Sometimes it radiates to underneath the right scapula (shoulder blade) or even into the side of the neck. It is often associated with vomiting. The pain is intense and persistent. It may last for several hours. After the pain goes away there may be. residual soreness along the rib margin.

Now, I'm not sure what kind of X ray you had for your gallbladder, but some stones show up on an X ray and other don't, depending upon their chemical compo-

The ones that don't have to be visualized by X ray after taking a gallbladder dye. This is usually done by giving the patient tablets. The dye is absorbed through the digestive system and con-

centrated in the gallbladder. If you haven't had that kind of an examination, one can't be certain that you don't have stones. On the other hand, if your examination included this procedure and you don't have any stones, I think you can practically forget about gallbladder colic.

Patients rent attacks of gallbladder colic sometimes benefit from a low-fat diet. Fat stimulates the gallbladder to contract, resulting in colic. This is not true of either pure protein or carbohydrates.

Mild indigestive complaints, gaseousness and nausea are often not related to gallbladder disease at all. Many of these patients have a spastic colon. The pain caused by the spastic colon where it bends under the rib cage near the gallbladder region may be confused with discomfort from gallbladder disease.

When such patients have their gallbladder removed, often they don't get relief from their symptoms because the pain wasn't caused by the gallbladder to begin with.

Of course, the doctor is sometimes in a difficult situation because the patient may have silent gallstones along with a spastic colon. At least 30 to 40 per cent of the patients who have gallstones don't have any symptoms from them.

#### Polly's Pointers By Polly Cramer

DEAR POLLY - I have a fabric lamp shade with water stains on it from when our roof leaked. I have no luck trying to clean this shade and cannot find a

new one that matches the lamp. I do hope you or one of the readers can help me. — MARIE

DEAR MARIE — The color and fabric used for your shade will have much to do with the success of removing the water stains. It is most likely the shade is made of a rayon or acetate of some sort and they don't take kindly to all cleaning methods. After first testing for the effect apply a solution of hydrogen peroxide and water to the stains with an old toothbrush. Gently rub in with the brush. If this removes the circles then rinse by using the toothbrush and clear water and dry as quickly as possible. With such sparse information this is all I can suggest and certainly with no guarantee.

DEAR POLLY - Before going to the beauty shop to have my hair cut I always stick some masking tape in my purse After my hair is cut I use the sticky side of the tape to pick up every loose hair that has fallen on my neck or clothing.


The type of beard or mustache you choose should relate to both your hairstyle and your life-style. If you



# Marriage as consent to sex being challenged

SALEM, Ore. (AP) - A notion as old as the Bible is being challenged in an Oregon courtroom where a husband is on trial charged with raping his

For generations marriage has been viewed as consent to sex between the spouses and marital privilege was a defense against rape

In 1977 Oregon legislators passed a law removing marriage or voluntary cohabitation as a defense against rape. Supporters of the bill called it simple justice.

We were saying the marriage contract does not demand you to submit just because you are married," says state Sen. Edward Fadeley of Eugene. The guarantee of sexual access in both directions - to men and women - is written in the Old Testament. And this law does indeed change that."

It is unlikely that when Oregon lawmakers deleted the phrase "not married to" from ticipated the national attention generated by the trial of John Rideout.

Rideout, 21, went on trial in Marion County Circuit Court last Tuesday on a felony charge of raping his wife, Greta, 23. She claims he beat her and forced her to have sex last Oct. 10 while they were fiving together in a Salem apartment.

The trial, which resumes today, is believed to be the first criminal prosecution of a husband charged with raping his wife while they lived together.

Delaware and Iowa allow prosecution of husband-wife rape cases and a spousal rape law takes effect Jan. 1 in New Jersey, but it is not believed any cases have been tried under those laws.

Rideout's attorneys have maintained that marital privilege is a defense against rape under common law despite the 1977 legislation and they have challenged the constitutionality

They filed a pretrial objection, overruled by the judge, claiming that Oregon's rape law is unconstitutional because it violates a married couple's right to privacy. In addition, the defense says the law violates equal protection because it applies only to one sex.

Before the Oregon law took effect on Oct. 4, 1977, a man couldn't be prosecuted in the state for raping a woman to whom he was married unless they were legally separated. A man also couldn't be prosecuted for rape if the couple was unmarried and living together.

"It's almost just a simple justice type thing," says state Rep. Gretchen Kafoury of Portland, co-sponsor of the law. "I think the bill passed as easily with," knew a married woman lidn't have as much recourse to physical assault by her husband as a woman assaulted on the

the law on marital rape changed fizzled before the bill even got to the floor. She said women's rights groups decided to approach the 1977 Legislature more cautiously by introducing a bill to allow rape prosecutions when married couples were living apart or unmarried couples were living to-

However, the Senate Judiciary Committee decided to go a step further by amending the bill to allow rape prosecutions regardless of marital

"It seems to me that if it is

wrong to rape your spouse, a spouse you are living separate from, it is equally wrong to rape a spouse you are living state Sen. Stephen as it did because legislators Kafoury - ex-husband of Rep. Kafoury - said during hear-

ings on the bill.

Several of the bill's original sponsors voted against it because of the change.

years, says, "I believe there is a U.S. Supreme Court case, involving sodomy, where what one does in one's bedroom is privileged.

Fadeley says, "Marriage is something the government has always been involved in. My concern is that it will be used as a blackmail tool in a situation where a husband and wife

were fighting with each other. Testimony presented during the Legislature's consideration of the rape bill claimed that battered women rarely file or pursue criminal charges against their husbands. The Women's Rights Coalition argued that the same would probably be true in rape cases.

# Hill says he made life better for Texans

General John Hill expected to be elected governor on Nov. 7. Instead, he was upset by Dallas businessman Bill Clements, who will be inaugurated Jan. 9 as Texas' first Republican governor in a century. In a recent interview. Hill summarized his six years as attorney general and talked of why he lost the governor's race and about his future plans.

Associated Press Writer AUSTIN, Texas (AP) - John Hill says he honestly feels he made life better for Texans as attorney general.

Yet Hill, 55, wanted more than anything else to be the next Democratic governor of Texas.

Through six months of virtually non-stop campaigning against Republican Bill Clements, Hill was the odds-on favorite to achieve his life's dream on Nov. 7. He lost, however, by some 17,000 votes out of nearly 2.4 million.

Hill insists that polls showing him 6 to 11 percentage points ahead of Clements right up to

election day were correct. What the polls cannot do is reflect who is going to vote," Hill said. "Our turnout was a little lower than we had anticipated and the turnout of the opposition was remarkably higher

than had been anticipated. In a recent interview, Hill discussed his six years as attorney general. He also spoke with apparent bitterness about the Clements campaign and gave a glimpse of his plans for the fu-

"I believe we made the attorney general's office a breath of fresh air in state government," said Hill. "We made it a force for protecting the public interest instead of a force just to represent the status quo of the state agencies or to protect vested interests.'

An aide supplied a three-page summary of Hill's record by categories, and here is a sampling:

Consumer — Handled 71,850 complaints under the Consumer Protection Act, which he proposed. Of 363 cases brought by Hill, he lost only three. A total of \$385,000 in civil penalties was assessed and \$3 million in restitution was ordered. Another \$5.3 million was obtained through mediation.

Environmental - Obtained 440 injunctions and \$5 million in civil penalties against polluters.



# Man's 'mom' not related

SAN JUAN, Puerto Rico (AP) - When Charles Kane's mother died, he discovered she was not his mother at all-that the sister he had grown up with was not his sister - that 30 years after World War II he had become another victim of the Holocaust

Kane's real parents were executed in the ovens that exterminated six million Jews during World War II.

'It was such a big surprise I felt disjointed," he said. I think that the modern trend is to tell children the truth. I think they should be told regardless of the circumstances."

Kane said he had never suspected he was adopted. The death of his adoptive mother led him to unravel the mystery of his early childhood. A month after she died he found a dusty. sealed envelope containing his adoption papers. Henry and Jacqueline Kane, both Jews, had adopted him when he was 5 years old.

Then, at age 35. Kane set out to find his real identity through letters and telephone calls to Jewish relief agencies around

the world. One of these inquiries produced a short typewritten letter that told him he had two older sisters in Belgium: Astrid and Madeline.

Astrid wrote: "Now, after 35 years - such a long time - we have found one another.

The discovery of a new family put a strain on Kane's relationship with his adoptive sister in San Juan. "I act the same toward her, but she doesn't want to talk about it. I guess she feels that I'm gaining two sisters and she's losing a brother " he said

Kane feels he has satisfied himself about his past, saying, "The obsession is over now. Yet he devotes much of his salary as a high school teacher to trips that will reveal secrets about his family.

He flew to Brussels to meet his sisters last December, plans a trip to Israel next summer and talks of going to Germany for information on his family. He also said he wants to write a book about his experiences.

Kane recalls with tenderness his first meeting with his sisters at the Brussels airport. He

said they kissed and hugged each other as if they had known each other all their

The three Eckhaus children's parents, Benjamin and Celli, were living in Belgium at the time of their deaths. A Romanian, Eckhaus was arrested in 1943 in front of a crowded marketplace while trying to escape Hitler's SS troops. Sworn statements made by concentration camp survivors said that he

When his mother learned that she also would be taken prisoner. Kane said, she put her daughters in a Catholic orphanage near her home.

# Temple reopens Official: Time running out for current auto engine

WASHINGTON (AP) — Time is running out on the internal combustion engine and a joint government-industry effort like that which sent men to the moon may be necessary to develop the automobile of the future, says Transportation

Secretary Brock Adams. And because of the deteriorating world petroleum situation, a replacement for conventional auto engines must be found within the next decade. Adams said in an interview.

The motor vehicle is the prime mover of our society, and our mobility and much of our economy depend on a fragile alliance with the Organization of Petroleum Exporting Countries," he said. "The recent OPEC price rise and events in Iran reinforce my belief that we must have a new type of propulsion unit.

"The government is going to have to be involved very heavily in the basic and advanced research because the automotive companies say they just do not have the resources or the inclination to get into it," he said.

It ought to be a cooperative effort, the secretary said, noting the automakers have 30,000 engineers and the Departments of Transportation and Energy together have invested \$100 million in research on

experimental vehicles. "I don't want to get into a situation where we have a set of government engineers

independently developing some great newthing,

and then having the auto makers who have to commercialize it calling it the dumbest thing they ever heard of," Adams said.

'It's the same kind of thing we did when we said, 'okay, we'll put a man on the moon," he said. "We used a lot of different resources in the government and industry.

In a speech earlier this month in Detroit, Adams challenged the industry to "re-invent the car" in the next few years and invited auto company officials and engineers to a "summit" in Washington to hasten development of an energy-stretching, safe and people-pleasing autos.

Subsequently, Henry Ford, chairman of the Ford Motor Company, invited Adams to Detroit to inspect Ford's research labs and to discuss the technology involved, along with such things as "the reaction of consumers to smaller, lighter cars, the capital requirements of the technical task ahead and the over-all effects of what we do on employment levels and the general well-being of the economy.

Adams scolded U.S. automakers for being "imitators" instead of "innovators" and noted that the Transportation Department had to go abroad to buy the technology of a gasoline-efficient auto. "It's a Volkswagen Rabbit with a super-charged diesel. It gets 50 miles to the gallon and has full crash protection," he said. "It's a good automobile.



# Cost of statistics book rises with market prices

WASHINGTON (AP) - The Agriculture Department put its annual book of statistics on sale today for \$6, a price well within President Carters wage and price formula.

Last year's version of "Agrjcultural Statistics cost \$5.75 for the paperback volume. The about 85 percent in the last six price for the 1978 edition is up about 4.3 percent.

But over the longer haul, the price of the 605-page volume has risen almost as dramatically as many other items on the market. The 1972 edition, for example, cost \$3.25, meaning that the book's price has risen

The new champion trees include: Black oak (Quercus velutina), located in Red River County, owned by Selby Pace; Blackjack oak (Quercus marilandica), located in Smith County, owned by Bell Meadows Ranch; Parsley haw (Crataegus marshallii), located in Angelina County in Angelina National Forest; White ash (Fraxinus americana), located in Tyler County, owned by the Southern Timbergrowers Association, Houston; Devil's walkingstick (Aralia spinosa), located in Sabine County in the Sabine National Forest; Texas

Texas Department of Highways and Public Transportation.

the Texas madrone has been submitted to the American Forestry Association in Washington, D.C. for certification as a national champion.


