# Earthquake claims at least 235

BELGRADE. Yugoslavia (AP) — Tens of thousands of Yugoslavs spent the night in the open after an earthquake Easter morning devastated more than 60 miles of Adriatic coastline in southern Yugoslavia and Albania and killed at least 235

Aftershocks continued through the night.

Belgrade Radio said there were more than 200 known dead in Yugoslavia. It said the Albanian news agency reported at least 35 persons killed and 350 injured in Albania, Yugoslavia's southern neighbor.

Doctors flown in from across Yugoslavia treated hundreds of injured in makeshift relief centers. Rescue workers, using specially trained dogs, searched more than a dozen coastal towns and villages for survivors or bodies buried in the rubble. Frogmen probed the coastal waters for persons whose homes slid into the sea.

The Seismological Institute in Belgrade said today that the original quake registered 6.5 on previous reports that gauged the quake at 7.2 on the ground motion scale. It was the strongest quake ever recorded in Yugoslavia, although the toll was far less than that of the 1963 quake in Skopje, 100 miles to the east. in which more than 1.100 were killed. Officials at the institute said the quake, which occured at 7:20 a.m. Sunday. had the power of 10 million tons of explosive. Hardest hit was a

> The initial 50-second shock tore open hotels, hospitals. factories and homes along the coast. Buildings and roads slid into the sea. There were waves of violent aftershocks, and by evening more than 80 tremors had been reported.

There is not a single house that has not been damaged in one way or another in Herceg-Novi." said Dusko Seferovic, mayor of the resort town on Kotor Bay.

All roads and most rail lines in the area were damaged and telephone, water and power lines were broken.

# Workers fighting floods

JACKSON. Miss. (AP) — Workers frantically piled sandbags along muddy levees today to try to contain record flooding of the Pearl River which has forced thousands from their homes and inundated the city's new. \$48 million sewage treatment plant.

"We're sandbagging and praying," said Steve Spotts, administrative assistant to Mayor Dale Danks. as the Pearl's worst flooding in history surged rooftop-high in some places and sent five feet of water into parts of the downtown area.

The mayor's office estimated that 17.200 persons have fled their homes in Jackson, a city of 250,000, but state civil defense officials said only about 8,000 were homeless across the state. The river was at 42.6 feet at Jackson today, up only

two tenths in the last 12 hours, and officials said the levee system, keeping even more water out of the city. was holding. The National Weather Service said the river was

expected to crest between 42.6 feet and 42.8 feet, about

record at Jackson was 37.5 feet in 1902. President Carter declared the region a disaster area

City officials said the state's new \$48 million sewage treatment plant was flooded early today despite almost constant sandbagging operations since the flood waters began last week.

'This is a major loss." said city spokesman Carroll Fulgham. "The plant is lost to the city for operational purposes until the waters go down. We don't know what's salvagable right now.

Fulgham said the city was converting to a sewage lagoon system and service would be continued.

Among those forced to flee as the river went on its. rampage over the weekend was Jerry Blunt. an attorney, who said he had no flood insurance on his \$85,000 home. He complained that he got no warning that the water was rising

We heard somebody say. We're going to sue somebody.' But who are you going to sue, the Lord?'

Mildred Sullivan, 67, whose husband died in a fire eight years ago, returned to her recently-redecorate \$135,000 tri-level home in a rowboat Sunday to find "everything ruined, absolutely gone.

"I'm dying inside," she said

The water covered hundreds of homes and businesses in Jackson and major city streets were flooded in several sections. Interstate 20, a major east-west route through Jackson, remained open but traffic was slowed as dirt-laden dump trucks and emergency vehicles and sightseers searched for routes into flooded sections.

The National Weather Service said it expected the river to stabilize today after more than two days of relief from heavy rainfall that saturated most of Mississippi. Georgia and Alabama last week.

The U.S. Army Corps of Engineers appealed for volunteers to bring dump trucks and clay earth to bolster levees along the Pearl. About 200 state prisoners helped under guard to reinforce a downtown levee. Floodwaters rose to within a block of the governor's mansion downtown.

Danks also asked downtown businesses to use only essential employees beginning today. The Pearl flooding combined with the overflowing Town Creek which runs underground beneath the city's center. made downtown a peninsula.

## Record 10 percent increase expected

WASHINGTON (AP) — The cost-of-living increase Social Security beneficiaries will automatically begin receiving in July will likely be a record of about 10 percent, government sources predict

The exact increase will not be known until April 26, when the Labor Department reveals the Consumer Price Index for March Social Security benefits climb automatically each July if the index for the first three months of the year is 3 percent or more above the figure for the same period of the previous year

Double-digit inflation in January and February already has helped boost the index to 9.3 percent above its level in the first quarter of 1978. The index's March jump, which is inevitable, will push it close to 10 percent, said the sources, who asked not to be identified

Last July the nation's 34 million Social Security beneficiaries got a 6.5 percent increase. The highest previous automatic hike was 8 percent in 1975, following a year in which inflation hit a postwar high

meanwhile, were releasing their annual report to Congress today

Last year the trustees. Health, Education and Welfare Secretary Joseph A. Califano Jr. Treasury Secretary W. Michael Blumenthal and Labor Secretary Ray Marshall, reported higher taxes had put the system's retirement and disability trust funds on a sound footing until the early 21st Century

However, they said the Medicare hospital insurance trust fund will go broke by 1990 unless it receives additional revenues.

The cost-of-living increases, which have been automatic since 1975, are one reason the system has been thrown into the fiscal crisis that led

Congress to pass higher taxes in 1977 The maximum Social Security benefit for a worker retiring at age 65 in 1978 was \$489 a month, so a 10 percent increase would boost his benefit to \$538 a month, or \$6.456 for 12 months. A spouse of retirement age is entitled to an extra 50 percent for a total benefit for the couple of \$9.684.

# Christians pray for peace and freedom

Christians around the world celebrated Easter Sunday with appeals and prayers for peace, freedom and human rights.

Cheered by 350.000 pilgrims and tourists jamming St. Peter's Square. Pope John Paul II voiced his hope for peace where it "is particularly relevant and particularly awaited"- in the Middle East, Africa, Asia, Latin America and among "the peoples who live in the various social, economic and political systems.

The Roman Catholic pontiff took note of the designation of 1979 as the International Year of the Child, making a special plea for "those who suffer hunger, and above all for the little children." And he wished for peac for all those who suffer, are humiliated. disappointed, oppressed, repressed and whose human dignity is violated.

Jerusalem was a babel of bells and foreign tongues as Roman Catholics, Protestants and Coptic Christians celebrated Easter, the Eastern Orthodox. churches observed Palm Sunday and the Jews celebrated Passover.

Roman Catholic and Eastern Orthodox Masses were celebrated in the 12th century Church of the Holy Sepulcher, which they believe was built on the site of Christ's tomb. The Copts worshipped at a tiny chapel built into the back of the church. Protestant services began at sunrise and continued through the day at the Garden Tomb. the cave outside the city walls which the Protestants believe to be the site of the

There were no terrorist attacks in the holy city, but the Israeli military command said that early Sunday, 50 miles to the north, its troops killed four Arab guerrillas

who slipped across the Jordanian border. "It appears the guerrilla squad intended to perpetrate an attack on civilians," an Israeli army spokesman said.

Easter was a day of special rejoicing for African Christians in Kampala, the capital of Uganda. The city's churches were filled with with people giving thanks for their liberation from Idi Amin.

"I stopped going to church because I thought God had forgotten us." said a worshiper at the Anglican cathedral.

In England, the leader of the world's Anglicans, the Archbishop of Canterbury, called for freedom in the Soviet Union and other Communist countries

Noting that "a bear, smiling and benevolent," has been chosen for the mascot of the 1980 Olympics in Moscow, Archbishop Donald Coggan said, "Let the bear unlock its prison camps and release the dissidents. Churches across the United States were

filled with worshipers, and 50,000 persons braved sporadic showers to stroll in the annual Easter Parade along New York's President and Mrs. Carter and their

daughter Amy attended the Easter service at the First African Baptist Church on Sapelo, the Georgia island where they are vacationing. The congregation was made up of the descendants of slaves.

## A better world

There is one sure way that you can help make the world a better place in 1979. This is to concentrate on improving yourself.

Obviously a lot of people think they could improve the world by forcing their ideas on others. Austin and Washington are full of such people - people who want to compel others to do things their

Every time you hear somebody say, "There ought to be a law," they are actually saying, "People ought to be compelled to do things my way.

In the final analysis, that is what politics is all about. It is a way of deciding who is going to exercise power over others - of deciding whose ideas shall prevail.

It is undoubtedly true that some people have better ideas than others - at times. But at different times, those "others" may have

One problem with trying to force our ideas on others is that they have ideas of their own as to what they want to do and how they

want to do it. This is one way conflicts arise. When you concentrate on self-improvement, there is little risk of conflict. And you may even achieve the position where others will imitate your example voluntarily.

How do you go about self-improvement? Well, that is for you to decide. One person might sign up for a class in some challenging subject. Others could begin an exercise program or start reading some mind-expanding material. Many could probably find guidance at a church or temple.

Concentration on self-improvement could both decrease the causes of conflict and produce better individuals. Then the world would be a better place, by that much, and 1979 a better year.

## Incident at Three Mile Island

The postmortems on the incident at Three Mile Island began before it ended. and will no doubt continue for years. The events of the first weekend of April 1979 at the 900 megawatt nuclear power plant near Harrisburg. Penn. have branded the name of that anonymous sand bar on the Susquehanna River in the minds of the American people

When it became evident of Friday, March 30, that the incident was more serious than first reported, newspaper and television news types rushed to the scene. which is easily reached from both Washington and New York. What had happened at the plant was certainly newsworthy: the worst accident in the 22 year history of nuclear power plant operation in the United States

Two serious malfunctions had occurred in the plant's cooling sytem, abetted by three inexcusable human errors. When the primary and secondary cooling mechanisms failed to quickly lower the temperature of the reactor, the emergency core cooling system (ECCS) was triggered. It worked flawlessly

Then someone shut it off, and the drama began

Radioactive steam was released outside the containment building to ease pressure in the reactor. The radioactivity was never of sufficient intensity to harm a Harrisburg fly; this was obvious, since the network reporters who expounded gravely and sometimes frantically of the dangers of radioactivity posed casually enough for the cameras within shouting distance of the

Engineers in the plant's control room. working with colleagues at the National Engineering Laboratory at Mud Lake Idaho, monitored conditions inside the reactor vessel by computer calculations. The hydrogen bubble was detected and analyzed, and corrective action taken on recommendations by the scientists in non-nuclear scale model. Their recommendations worked exactly as

When the curtain rang down on Three Mile Island, the citizens of Middletown and Goldsboro returned and the reporters drifted away. They left behind a miasma of confusion and innuendo about the safety of nuclear power. NBC and ABC commentators ended every sentence over the weekend with "Officials say the reactor

is stable, but--." Carole Simpson of NBC and ABC's Geraldo Rivera smirked on the air about nuclear safety measures. The New York Times reported that John H. MacMillian of Babcock and Wilcox, which built the reactor, "appeared weary and

The Three Mile Island incident was an anti-nuclear field day. But what has been almost 'otally absent is a balancedperspective on risk-taking, by which we all measure our daily lives.

The reporters who trekked in battalions to Middletown seemed to have forgotten why Three Mile Island was a big story - it was a big story because it had never happened before.

But there was no mention of the fact that the radioactive iodine that escaped from the plant emitted only one twentieth of the radioactivity of the fallout in the same area from the last Red Chinese nuclear bomb test in the atmosphere. Missing from the frantic calls for evacuation of a million people was an understanding that with a coal-fired plant accident or a liquified natural gas explosion, or a hydroelectric dam break, there would be no time for evacuations - only funerals.

The proper perspective on Three Mile Island, and on nuclear power requires a coldly rational effort to weigh risks against risks. The fact is that not a single human life has ever been lost in a reactor-related accident at a nuclear power plant. That is still true today

## Farewell to the AAU

The obituary of a venerable institution appeared in the papers the other day. The Amateur Athletic Union, the most powerful force in American amateur sports for ninety years, died of federal legislation: the Amateur Sports Act of 1978. The law takes an anti-monopoly approach, allowing the 32 sports now under the AAU umbrella

to form their own corporations and regulate their own registrants. Most important, it strips the AAU of its franchises to certify athletes for Olympic competition, thus guaranteeing its demise.

Few people will shed tears for the AAU. It has tended to be imperious, and sometimes downright old fogevish. Once it

It is true that sports are important to our culture. President Hoover once noted that "Next to religion, baseball has furnished a greater impact on American life than any other institution." Today the U.S. is a sports culture. Last year 255 million customers paid to see major sporting events. Twenty million people jog regularly, twenty-nine million play tennis. The "athleisure" industry has become an imortant sector of our economy: athletic

government regulation because sports are big business", which is the theme we most often hear. Sports-related industries are big business, but the sports themselves are not. The annual gross of the average NFL football team, for example, is \$8.9 million, about equal to a small supermarket. Baseball's bonanza last year produced \$230 million, less than the snuff and chewing tobacco industry -- rather small potatoes.

Yet something in our present national spirit seems to demand central authority. "The Final Report of the President's Commission on Olympic Sports," a 600-page document issued in 1977, makes instructive reading in this regard. It calls for Congress to create a Central Sports Organization, to achieve a "vertically integrated American sports system." The CSO would be "voluntary" but publically financed, and it would have broad regulatory powers over individual athletes and the structure of amateur sports. Even before the AAU was killed, planners were at work to fill the void.

Ironically, the Commission argued that American sports are in such bad shape that the CSO is necessary to head off "inevitable" government regulation! The scenario goes like this: Too much fragmentation in sports ( i.e. local and private control) makes for "chaos;" private means of controlling "abuses" have "failed;" thus a semipublic body is needed to head off a crisis that would bring complete nationalization of sports. The CSO, it is argued, would not CONTROL sports, it would generously solve problems and provide efficiency. The Commission even calls forth the spirit of 1787: "The state of amateur sports in the United States today is comparable to the condition of the nation itself in the years following the Revolutionary War." Conclusion? We today need a federal constitution for sports just as the nation needed a strong national constitution then.

But I must provide a caution. Liberty is possible only when our lives are largely exempt from the public power. Social institutions must be autonomous. Politics, intruding into areas such as recreation, can cause only a strangling of the very spirit that makes sports fun. And wholesale substitution of public for private controls may well make the AAU's obituary a little more of the obituary of human freedom.

# The \$1 trillion issue

There is considerably more drama in the Mideast maneuverings, and a strategic arms limitation agreement with the Soviets has higher political visibility.

But muted though advance notice has been, the upcoming congressional debate on MTN is as important a test as the

administration is likely to face this year. MTN is the Multilateral Trade Negotiation ageement, a comprehensive rewriting of world trade rules worked out in five years of sharp horsetrading in Geneva among 98 nations, including all of the world's major industrial economies and

raw-material producers. The agreement calls for a broad range of tariff reductions. But even more significant, it pledges the signatories to ease up on a multitude of import controls. product standards, licensing requirements, export subsidies and the like. The trade-restrictive measures, in fact, have

been the major concern of the negotiations. The major industrial countries are also agreeing to open up bidding for government contracts to foreign firms.

The administration is mounting a major lobbying campaign in favor of MTN, and every bit of the effort is going to be needed. Congress, acutely aware of the nation's chronic trade deficit and under pressure from industries threatened by foreign competition and from organized labor, which translates more imports into fewer American jobs, is highly susceptible to protectionist pressures. If most congressmen had their political druthers, they would make the American market more difficult rather than easier for foreign goods to enter

Acknowledging the problem, the administration is agreeing in advance to restrict imports on a number of products, from clothespins to television sets and steel. And it has written into the current budget some \$200 million for the retraining and relocation of workers adversely affected by an influx of foreign goods into

But its major argument is that the United States has much more to gain than to lose by freer and therefore, it is assumed, a higher volume of trade. MTN by itself will not reduce the U.S. trade deficit. It will not, for example, curb the immense American appetite for foreign oil. But it should make possible expanded exports to make paying for that oil easier.

And exports ultimately, it is argued, create many more jobs for American workers than are likely to be lost to foreign imports. According to the chief trade negotiator, Robert Strauss, access to government procurement contracts in other major countries alone opens up a \$25 billion annual market to U.S. business.

But that is only a minute share of total world trade, which Strauss puts at more than \$1 trillion annually. The American share of this is not only substantial in itself. it accounts for a substantial share of the U.S. economy. One out of every three acres of cultivated farm land in the United States, Strauss notes, is producing for export. And one of about every seven manufacturing jobs is dependent upon overseas markets. Putting this in very round figures, a State Department study estimates that exports account for some 16 percent of everything Americans grow, manufacture or mine and some 4.3 million American jobs.

The present timetable calls for submission of the trade agreement to Congress in April, with final action possibly not coming until fall. It is an all or nothing proposition. Under the terms of the Trade Act of 1974 that authorized U.S. participation in the Geneva negotiations, Congress cannot amend the agreement; it must be accepted or rejected in toto.

The odds may be slightly on the side of the administration, if only because of necessity - this is one issue observers are generally agreed it cannot afford to lose. But it is still too close to call for certain.

Whatever the outcome of the debate and vote, however, one thing can be said with certainty at this early date. We will be living with the consequences for a long time to come.

# nages 'almost incredible'

WICHITA FALLS, Texas (AP) - National Red Cross officials toured this tornado-stricken North Texas city Easter Sunday and termed the damage "almost incredible.

"I'm terribly sorry I had to visit Wichita Falls under these circumstances," said Red Cross national Chairman Jerome P. Holland, who flew over the devastated eight-square-mile

"From the helicopter, the extent of the damage is almost incredible. It's going to be hard to give a real accurate picture to other board members of the damage," Holland said.

The massive twister killed at

least 44 persons and injured 600 Tuesday. It was the worst of a series of tornadoes that chewed across both sides of the Red River, killing a total of 54 persons in Texas and another three in Oklahoma

Property damage was set at \$204 million in Wichita Falls

Disaster relief centers were opened during the weekend here and in Vernon, and officials began bringing in house trailers for the homeless.

Wichita Falls, a city of 94,000, remains under a curfew: officials estimate the restricted hours will remain in effect 10 more days. So far, 25 persons

have been arrested for looting, and 32 others have been jailed for violating the curfew.

The casualties of the storm included 10 churches, but their congregations were absorbed by other churches in the city as residents sought comfort and strength in Easter Sunday

More than 2,400 persons attended a city-wide service titled "The Dawn of a New Day" at the municipal auditorium while another 500 sat through services in their cars at a wrecked drive-in theater.

"I don't believe the storm was the Lord's work, but I think the Lord's work will come from the

storm," the Rev. Ted Savage told his Faith Baptist Church congregaion of about 500. Many

"I think that we are going to be closer and stronger because of this," said minister Jack Dial of the Evangel Temple Assembly of God. "Our building is gone, but our

Dial said the tornado was "God testing our faith." Dressed in everything from Easter Sunday best to ragged blue jeans, the congregation sang hymns and clapped hands.

Nearby, members of the Southwest Baptist Church pulled into the Seymour Drive-In Theater where the Rev. Larry D. Lilly preached to them from a flat-bed truck

Red Cross officials released revised figures Sunday showing the twister damaged or destroyed at least 6.711 structures in Wichita County.

The report said 2,566 homes were destroyed, another 879 had major damage, and minor damage hit 1,659 homes. In addition, 84 mobile homes were destroyed, 1,274 apartment units were destroyed, 170 apartment units were damaged, and 79 businesses were destroyed

WICHITA, Kan. (AP) - A three-hour riot at an outdoor rock concert in which 28 policemen and 37 concert-goers were injured was the worst such incident in the city's history. authorities say.

Four remained in the hospital overnight, including one officer. as a result of the rioting that occurred Sunday night in a four-block area on the city's south side, officials said.

About 500 law enforcement officers used tear gas to quell the riot at the Herman Hill Park concert. One hundred of the estimated 3.500 persons gathered for the concert were arrested.

Police Chief Richard LaMunyon said the incident began around 5:30 p.m. when officers asked from the bandstand for vehicles parked illegally to be moved.

However, a dense lawyer of mid and high level cloudiness was beginning to move into Southwest Texas as an upper level disturbance moveds toward the state from the southwest.


Temperatures across almost all of texas were mild during the predawn hours with readings mostly in the 60s except in the panhandle and mountains where temperatures were in the 50s.

# Congress celebrates Easter abroad

**Associated Press Writer** WASHINGTON (AP) - At least 115 members of Congress are journeying overseas this Easter recess in tax-paid quests for knowledge of world affairs.

Air fares alone, assuming all 106 representatives and nine senators are traveling tourist class on commercial airliners, would top \$180,000, just for some of the most popular one-destination trips. And that doesn't count air fares for the staff aides. Defense Department guides and others considered essential on such fact-finding

Congressmen get up to \$75 a day in living expenses plus taxi fares and other incidentals on such foreign trips. Most trips this 11-day recess last from seven to 10 days, so the living expenses coul total anywhere from \$60,000 to \$86,000



DEAR DR. LAMB - A year ago I had a stroke. My neurologist believes the stroke was caused by a thrombus. My cardiologist believes it could have been an embolus from the heart due to an irregular heart beat. My family doctor tells me the neurologist is right. He says my stroke occurred in my right middle artery in the brain and it is impossible for an embolus to reach this artery from the heart. Who is right? Is it impossible for an embolism to reach the right middle artery coming up from the heart?

DEAR READER - You can develop an obstruction of an artery in the brain either way. A thrombus means a simple clot. In the artery it's usually a complication of fatty-cholesterol deposits. The fatty material is somewhat like a pimple and may rupture and a little hemorrhage starts within the artery and the clot forms. That is the most common cause of strokes.

The clot that forms in the arteries in the brain to cause a stroke is exactly the same as a clot formation that can occur in the artery to the heart and cause a heart attack. In both instances the underlying problem is usu-ally fatty-cholesterol depo-

Now the arteries that go to most of your body, including the brain, come from the left side of the heart. If you have a significant irregularity of the heart — and I mean something besides an occasional skipped beat — you can develop clots in the left side of the heart. A good example here is atrial fibrillation. The left atrium may be fibrillating or just twitching, so to speak, at rates as fast as 500 beats per minute. Under these circum-

stances, it never really contracts in a rhythmic manner. A clot can form in the left atrium, pass into the left ventricle, which is the lower heavy pumping chamber of the heart, and then flow out with the blood through the arteries. The clot may lodge in the brain and cause a

A clot that develops in the

veins in most locations cannot go to the brain. If you have a clot in the leg, for example, associated with thrombophlebitis, it will follow the veins as they get larger and move upward toward the right side of the heart. It will enter the right atrium. It can pass down into the right ventricle which is the lower pumping chamber for the right side of the heart. It can flow out of the right chambers of the heart through the pulmonary artery to the lungs There it will lodge in the lungs and cause a pulmonary embolism. So it makes a difference whether the clot is coming from the right side of the heart or the left side of the heart as far as the complications it can cause.

New York, NY 10019. In most instances the best means of preventing a stroke are the same means we recommend for preventing heart attacks. Specifically, avoiding obesity, eating a diet that's low in fat and low in cholesterol, not smoking cigarettes and maintaining a normal blood pressure. If need be, medicines to lower blood cholesterol and decrease high blood pressure can be used. (NEWSPAPER ENTERPRISE ASSN.)

At the rate he writes, science fiction author Issac Asimov could put out his own book of the month club. Asimov just completed his 200th book, making him one of literature's most prolific authors.

But a friend, Ben Bova. says in Omni Magazine that literaty critics who sniff haughtily at the idea of producing books in such quantity should cast their thoughts in the direction of a playwright named Shakepeare. At his peak, the Bard of Avon was knocking out masterpieces at a rate of at least two a year.

"Asimov has many talents as a writer," says Bova, "but his special genius when it comes to nonfiction is his ability to approach the most complex of subjects, disect them neatly, and present them to his readers in terms of such precise clarity that anyone can understand them."







# Accident forcing second look

in Pennsylvania has forced Western European governments to re-examine their nuclear development plans amid growing criticism that the same thing, or worse, could happen here.

Most European officials who have spoken out on the Harrisburg affair have insisted that despite the risk, resource-poor Europe has no alternative but to develop nuclear energy.

But planners at the European Commission in Brussels fear that Harrisburg's legacy to Europe will be a delay of at least one year in the pace of nuclear development as governments tighten safety standards and calm public fears.

Nuclear plants generate only 10.3 percent of the electricity consumed within the nine European Economic Community nations, although plans call for boosting that to 30 percent by 1985.

Non-communist Europe operates some 85 plants. compared with 70 licensed plants in the United States, the world's leading nuclear consumer. Britain leads Western Europe with 33 plants, followed by West Germany with 15. The Soviet Union has 26 nuclear

Robert Elphick of the EEC's energy commission, says the Harrisburg accident - widely reported in Europe - "has not helped the cause of convincing people we can control this technique safely. After the accident at Harrisburg, local governments

in Belgium and Italy called for a halt in plant construction in their areas until they receive assurances of safety.

Voters in the north German state of Schleswig-Holstein may provide a clue to the depth of anti-nuclear sentiment when they cast ballots April 29 in a legislative election that the Social Democrats want to turn into a referendum on a local power plant.

Danish Prime Minister Anker Joergensen said recently that his country had not abandoned plans to build reactors but added, "on the other hand, we are taking a pause, offering ourselves a respite to examine the information we will get on the U.S. accident.'

One European country pressing ahead with nuclear development is France, which has the continent's most ambitious nuclear plans. And the Soviet Union and other-Soviet bloc nations have tended to downgrade the Harrisburg incident and press ahead with plans for nuclear power.

But elsewhere, nuclear energy is under attack by environmentalists and lawmakers skeptical of industry assertions that European safety standards are too strict to allow another Harrisburg-type

In Sweden, where the nuclear power issue helped topple the Socialist government in 1976, the present government shelved plans to open two new reactors pending a referendum next year on the future use of nuclear power. "The Harrisburg accident has raised new and

serious questions." Prime Minister Ola Ullsten said when he appointed a commission to study the U.S. accident and evaluate Swedish standards.

Two weekends ago, nearly 10,000 people marched through Stockholm demanding an end to Sweden's

Anti-nuclear groups planning a protest against a government plan to bury nuclear wastes near the town of Gorleben quickly added "We all live in Pennsylvania" to their chants.

Interior Minister Gerhard Baum sent technicians to Harrisburg to study the situation and ordered an investigation of West Germany's 15 plants, despite assurances by the country's leading builder that its plants were superior in design to the Americans'.

Here is a rundown of the nuclear debate in other European nations:

Britain: British officials say the Harrisburg incident is evidence of the superior safety standards of their gas-cooled reactors, which have been in service since the late 1940s with only two minor accidents. But anti-nuclear groups have put forward 50 candidates for the May 3 general election, and 19 of these are expected to make trouble for liberal candidates in marginal

Finland: The Finnish government announced that it saw no need for special safety measures because the possibility of such an accident at one of its two nuclear plants was non-existent

Italy: Controversy over nuclear safety has held up government plans for an additional 12 plants. Massimo Moretti, director general of the nation's electricity monopoly, warns of drastic power shortages in the 1980s if the plants are not built. "The Harrisburg facts change absolutely nothing because electric energy means economic development." he said. "And nuclear energy is indispensable

## Feeders enjoying best profits in years

WASHINGTON (AP) — Cattle feeders recently have enjoyed some of the best profits in years. Despite steadily rising market prices, however, they are facing a growing crunch in net returns, according to the latest Agriculture Department studies

The main cost increase has been for lightweight feeder cattle bought by feeders, fed for up to six months and then sold as U.S. Choice-grade beef to

A new "livestock and meat situation" report, which examines the expenses and profits of Corn Belt cattle feeding operations, takes a look at what has

Suppose, it said, a farmer or feedlot operator bought a 600-pound steer last September, fed it for six months and sold it in March at a market weight of 1,050

The animal last September would have cost \$386.76 at average prices of feeder steers then. Counting feed and all other costs, the total investment in the steer by the time it was ready for market last month was \$611.72.

That means the seller would have had to get at least \$58.26 per 100 pounds to recover all costs.

The actual average price last month was \$71.04 per 100 pounds on the Omaha. Neb., market, meaning the producer theoretically had a "net margin" of profit of \$12.78 per 100 pounds. In other words, using the USDA figures, a profit of \$134.19 was made on the finished steer

But the report also examined how cattle prices have moved up since last September.

For example, in March the same 600-pound feeder steer cost \$523.50 when it was put in a feedlot. Assuming the same type of costs, the producer would have a total of \$783.75 invested in the animal by the time it is ready for market this September

That means the producer would have to get at least \$74.64 per 100 pounds for the improved financial situation.

GOOD; YEAR

steer in September to break even. Just to recover costs of the original purchase price and the feed it consumes, the steer would have to sell for \$66.14 per 100 pounds.

Department livestock economists have projected that prices of Choice-grade steers may bring a range of \$70 to \$72 per 100 pounds in the July-September quarter of this year, just a bit short of the break-even price a producer would have to get to recover all his production costs.

Thus, while cattle producers particularly the cow-calf operators who hung on during the previous years of depressed prices - are in a greatly

BOSTON (AP) - Men and women in China may begin swapping responsibilities for taking birth control pills once a contraceptive tablet is approved for men. possibly later this year. a Chinese professor says.

DENVER (AP) - The Colorado Division of Wildlife says a combination of emergency feeding programs and milder weather has averted the threat of widespread death among the state's deer and elk.

Severe winter conditions, called the worst in decades, had prompted wildlife experts to predict that up to 60 percent of the state's deer and 20 percent of the elk would die for lack of food. But Division of Wildlife spokesman Pete Hansson said those early estimates have been sharply reduced.

ATLANTA (AP) - Based on what is known about exposure to high radiation doses, the Three Mile Island nuclear accident should cause no noticeable increase in cancer deaths, a Center for Disease Control researcher says.

Dr. Clark Heath said this weekend that experts predict



In 490 B.C., the army of Athens defeated the invading army of King Darius of Persia at a place called the plain of Marathon. According to legend, the Athenian general Miltiades sent his fastest runner, Pheidippides, to take news of the victory to Athens, about 25 miles away. 


