## Glickman extends sign-up period

Glenn R. Brzozowski, CED of the Haskell County FSA Office was notified that Secretary of Agriculture Dan Glickman announced the extension of the sign-up deadline for assistance provided by the 1999 Budget Bill under the new Crop Loss Disaster Assistance Program. The new deadline is April 9, 1999. The sign-up was originally scheduled to end March 12.

"This money is badly needed by farmers who suffered losses due to natural disaster, the effects of which are made worse by the current slump in farm prices," said Glickman. "We want to make sure that everyone who's eligible has a chance to participate."

Farmers are eligible for compensation either for qualifying losses on 1998 crops, or losses in any three or more crop years

between 1994 and 1998 where a crop insurance indemnity or assistance under the non-insured crop disaster assistance program was received. Farmers can receive payments under either single-year or multi-year provisions, but not both. The U. S. Department of Agriculture will make payments to each eligible applicant at the higher of the two levels.

Payments to farmers will be prorated after all applications are reviewed in order to stay within the program's budget requirements. Crop loss payments will be made after all applications have been processed.

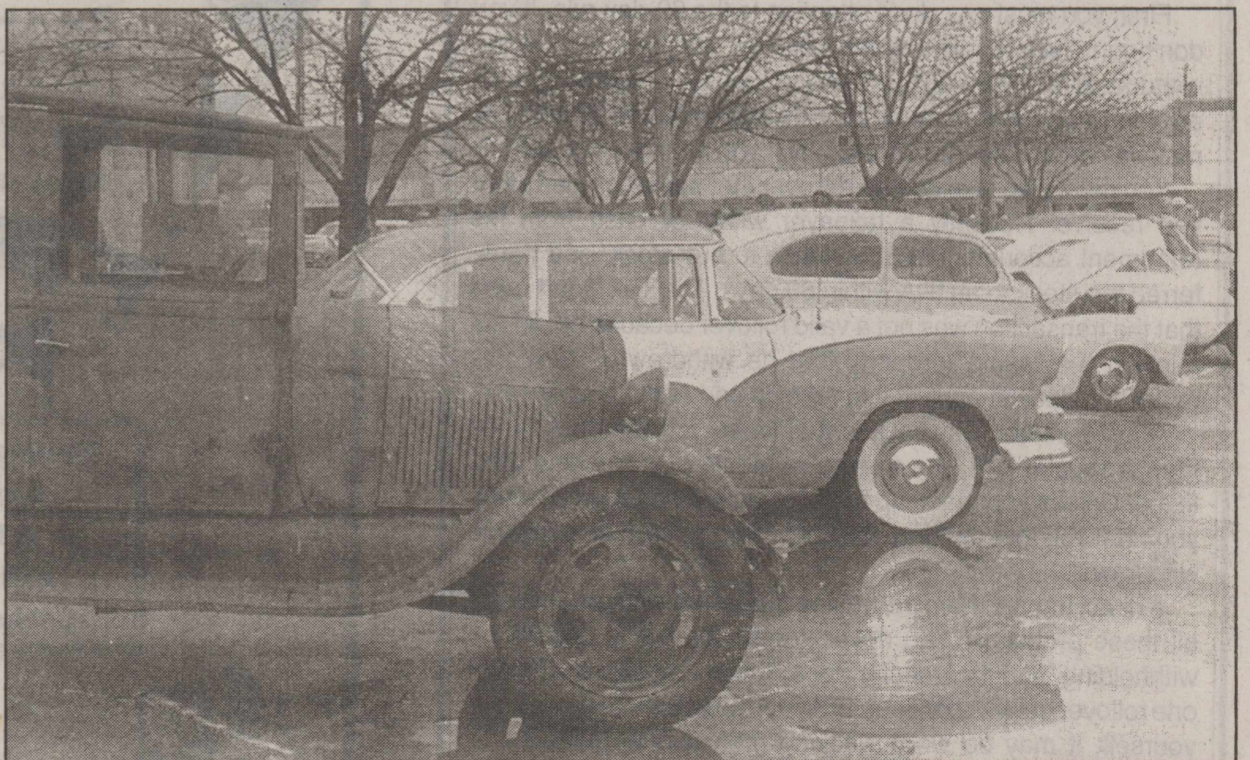

**AVOID IRA ROLLOVER PROBLEMS**

There are two ways to transfer funds between IRAs. You can request a direct trustee-to-trustee transfer, or you can withdraw funds yourself from the first IRA and redeposit them in a second IRA within 60 days. The second method, known as an IRA rollover, is not without its risks, however.

First, you must pay close attention to the 60-day rule. If you don't reinvest in an IRA by the 60th day after you receive the withdrawal, the IRS won't accept any excuses. You'll be considered to have made a potentially taxable withdrawal, and you may pay an additional 10% penalty if you're under age 59 1/2.

You must also take care to roll over the "same" property that you receive. Recently a taxpayer withdrew cash from his retirement accounts, used the funds to buy stock, and transferred the stock to an IRA within 60 days. The Tax Court ruled that the transaction was not a valid rollover because he did not reinvest the "same" property that he withdrew. Clearly this restriction doesn't apply if you receive and reinvest only cash.

Another major drawback is that when you withdraw funds from a regular IRA, the trustee is required to withhold 20% taxes. Unless you make up the 20% from other sources when you reinvest, that missing amount will be treated as a taxable withdrawal.

A direct transfer from the trustee of one IRA to another avoids all these problems. You never handle the funds, there's no withholding, and the transfer doesn't count against the limit of one rollover per IRA per year. But if you must handle the rollover yourself, it may be worth seeking professional guidance to avoid a misstep.

## A teacher's teacher



IMA DELL FITZGERALD in 1958

Ima Dell Fitzgerald, a 49-year veteran first-grade teacher for whom Fitzgerald Elementary School in Arlington was named and dedicated in 1985, died in Arlington Mar. 1, at age 89.

In a classroom for over half a century, she taught 22 years in Haskell, and 27 years in Arlington before her retirement in 1977. After retirement, she continued to teach as a substitute for nine years, and was so esteemed as a teacher, she was booked up for months in advance.

Born in 1910 on a farm outside Eastland, Ima Dell Woods was one of the original teachers employed by Paint Creek Rural School District, moving there from Rose School. At Paint Creek the young 18 year-old who began teaching with only a high school diploma married Robert Fitzgerald, only son of early day Haskell County settlers Walter and Kate Fitzgerald.

By attending what is now Hardin-Simmons University in Abilene during the summers, she eventually earned bachelor's and master's degrees.

After 22 years of teaching in Haskell, she moved to Arlington.

At the 1985 dedication of the Ima Dell Fitzgerald Elementary

School in Arlington, she was called "a teacher's teacher" by former colleagues and longtime admirers who gathered to pay her tribute.

In the book *Putting Paint Creek on the Map*, a history compiled by Monique Morgan, John Sam Rike, III, of Haskell, whose grandmother was Ada Fitzgerald Rike, sister-in-law of Ima Dell Fitzgerald, writes about attending the dedication of the Ima Dell Fitzgerald Elementary School. "What a tremendous occasion that day in the early spring of 1985 was when we were able to attend the ceremony and see this fine lady stand before some 700 people and tell of her various teaching experiences at Cobb School, Rose School, Paint Creek Rural School and Haskell."

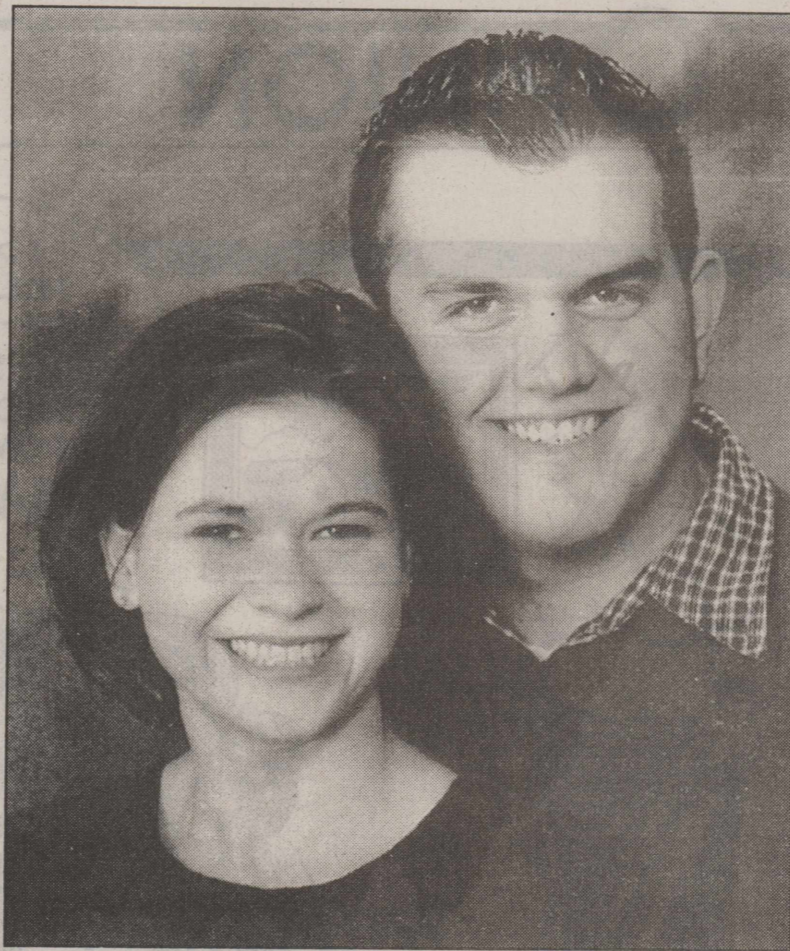
Mrs. Fitzgerald, who said she had always wanted to teach ever since she had idolized her own first-grade teacher, taught first grade for 22 years in the same Arlington classroom.

In trying to answer the question of why she remained a first grade teacher for so long, rather than teach more mature students, Mrs. Fitzgerald said, "First grade is the most pivotal grade. It is their (the children's) foundation. If they don't do well in first grade, chances are they are going to have problems throughout school."

In a 1985 interview with the *Star Telegram*, the woman who had been in the classroom for more than half a century said she was glad the school had her name.

"My deceased husband was the only son in his family and we didn't have any children," she said. "This way, with the school named Fitzgerald, I feel that his name can live on."

In the hearts and memories of the students of this former Haskell teacher for whom an Arlington school was named, and who was said by a former principal to be "a great lady, who was all business in the classroom", the name of Ima Dell Fitzgerald will also live on.

## HIGHLIGHTS

**AUSTIN** — A champion of open government and the public's right to know has emerged from the ranks of the Texas Senate.

State Sen. Jeff Wentworth, R-San Antonio, has filed a dozen bills this session requiring state, county and local governments to shape up or risk civil fines of up to \$1,000 a day, the *San Antonio Express-News* reported last week.

Proposals by Wentworth would require meetings of state agencies to be advertised online and would instruct state agencies to post a sign detailing citizens' rights to inspect and copy government records and state employees' responsibilities to provide easy access.

Brought after 18 months of testimony from more than 400 people in eight Texas cities, Wentworth's proposals would:

1. Limit the fees agencies could charge for compiling and copying documents; and
2. Allow citizens to file civil lawsuits in their county courts compelling government agencies to comply with open records requests.

"It is absolutely fundamental to our whole system of government that citizens have access to meetings where decisions are made and to memorandums and records of those decisions," said Wentworth, who chaired the Senate Interim Committee on Public Information.

"We want to make citizens aware of their rights to these records," he told the *Express-News*. "It's their money that paid for the creation of these records. They belong to them and should be available to them as needed and at minimal expense."

Calling the Internet "the wave of the future that the state must prepare for," Wentworth has proposed a committee of state and local officials charged with finding the most "useful and cost-effective" way to provide government information online.

His proposals also would:

- Make arrest warrants and search warrants public information as soon as they are executed;
- Prohibit all agencies from asking for an attorney general's opinion on whether they have to comply with an open records request, if a similar decision already has been reached;
- Allow these agencies to require requesters to pay a deposit if the records are more than five years old, fill more than 10 archive

boxes or will take more than five hours to compile; and

- Exempt alternative dispute resolution agreements and economic development negotiations that include trade secrets or commercially sensitive information from the open records rules.

**Jobless Rate Lowest in Years**  
January unemployment, at 4.7 percent statewide, was the lowest in 19 years, the Texas Workforce Commission reported earlier this month.

"The Texas economy remains strong, providing many employment opportunities to jobseekers across the state," said Diane Rath, chair of the TWC.

In January, the Metropolitan Statistical Area with the lowest unemployment rate was Bryan-College Station with a rate of 1.8 percent.

Austin-San Marcos was next with 2.7 percent, followed by Lubbock at 2.9 percent and Dallas at 3.2 percent.

The highest unemployment rate was in McAllen-Edinburg-Mission at 19.6 percent, followed by Brownsville-Harlingen-San Benito at 13.8, El Paso at 10.7 percent and Laredo at 10.1 percent.

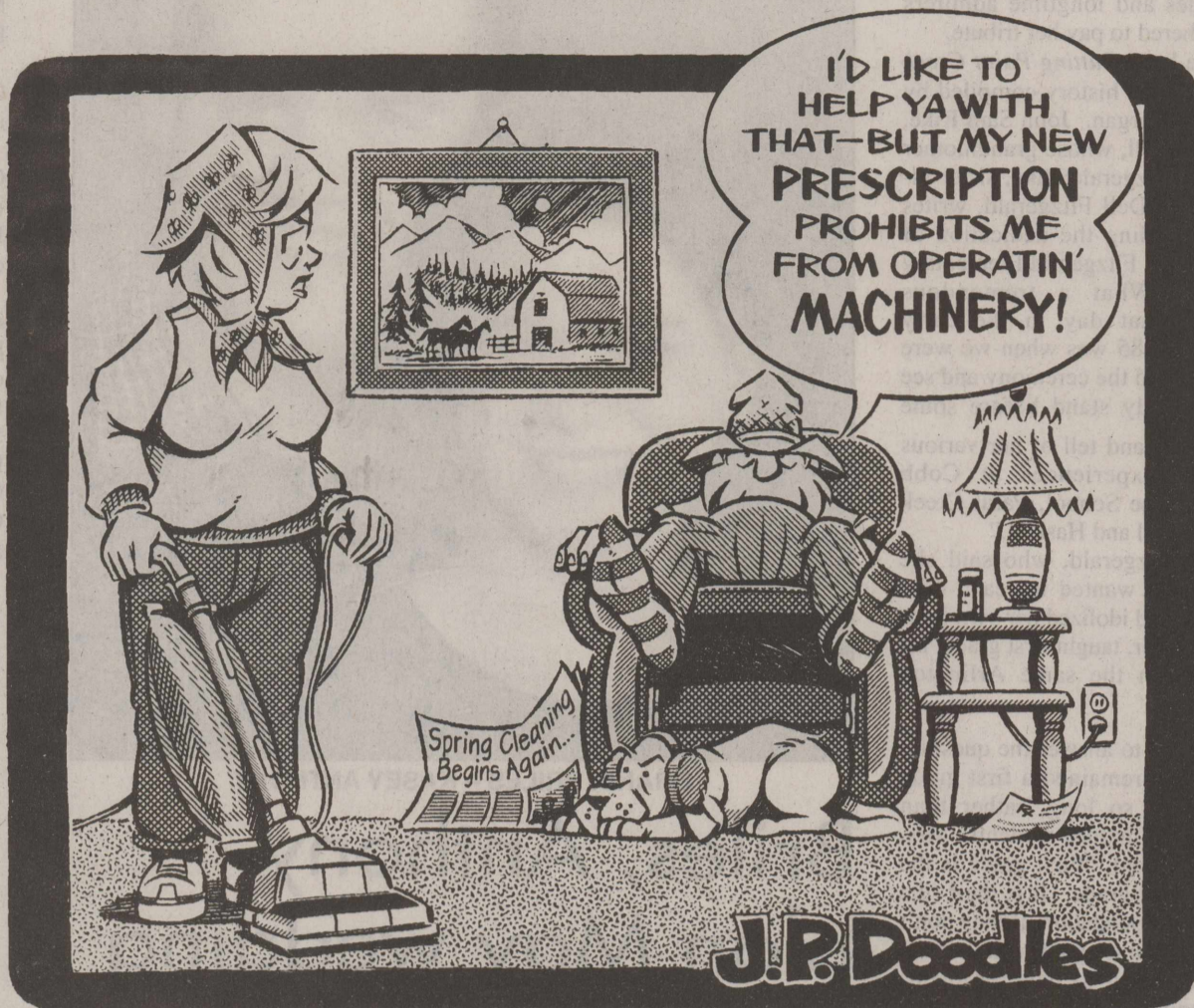
**NAFTA Exports Remain High**  
Texas exports increased by 3 percent in 1998 to almost \$87 billion, the Texas Department of Economic Development reported last week.

Exports to Mexico last year totaled \$36.33 billion, making that nation Texas' biggest trade partner. Next highest was NAFTA partner Canada at \$10.33 billion.

Electronic equipment and components trade slowed due to declines in East Asian economies but continued to be Texas' largest export industry.

**Other Capital Highlights**  
■ Gov. George W. Bush has enlisted the help of Austin political strategist Karl Rove, who will work with the "exploratory committee" investigating the possibility of a Bush presidential race.

- The 2,424 foreign corporations now operating in Texas are employing about 317,000 people statewide. That amounts to about 3.4 percent of the Texas workforce, according to the Texas Comptroller of Public Accounts.
- State Rep. Ron Wilson, D-Houston, has filed a bill that would transform Austin into the "District of Travis" to be overseen by the state.



## From The Inside Out

After reading and hearing about the lady since her death early this month, I have come to admire her greatly.

I wish I could have known Ima Dell Fitzgerald, a teacher so esteemed by her community they named an elementary school for her.

She seems to have been one of those individuals who know themselves and are "at home" with their contribution to the world.

Allie Belle Smith brought me the notice of the former Haskell teacher's death from the *Star Telegram Arlington Metro*, which her son and daughter-in-law, Bob and Darlene, had brought her.

After Mrs. Fitzgerald's husband Robert died, she moved into an apartment complex across from Aldersgate Methodist Church in Arlington and Bob and Darlene became special friends with her. They are greatly appreciative of her influence on their son.

Darlene attended the funeral, and was especially touched by a reading of something found among the teacher's papers. She told the story of its background.

When Robert Fitzgerald died, Ima Dell became very despondent, feeling that she couldn't go back to work at the school. Her principal, who eventually knew the real spirit of this woman, told her to sit down and write out her philosophy of life, and to read it over several times, before she made up her mind to quit teaching.

After honestly spelling it out for

herself, Mrs. Fitzgerald returned to the work she loved.

Darlene Smith obtained a copy of the teacher's philosophy from the minister and I share it here.

**My Philosophy**  
by Ima Dell Fitzgerald

I have many loves but the three greatest are: my Church, my country, and my profession. I believe that through my work in the school room, I have the opportunity of making a significant contribution to the purpose of my time. I chose working with little children because early training is most effective and the children are so responsive.

My aim is to love each child and make each feel he is wanted, needed, appreciated and loved. Every child, if we really study him, has the potential to feel success in some areas; and it is my duty to make that discovery, thus a happy child. Every child has a reason for doing everything he does—good or bad; and I am to observe the child until I understand his problem, then to work with him to correct the bad without punishment.

I believe each child in my classroom should be exposed through experience and observation to the meaning of work, love, play, hope, pride, faith, happiness, respect, and honor. These traits are essential for a happy successful life. I like quiet times for thought. What I do speaks so loudly that children cannot hear what I say. A

teacher is like a book, to be read by all who pass, his appearance being the preface; his actions, the index; his habits, the title; but the climax depends upon his helpfulness to his fellowman. To give a child a feeling of security by touching him on the shoulder or clasping a little hand, regardless of color or appearance, is more effective than hundreds of words.

I must be active in my community and know its adults to work effectively with children. I believe a teacher works not only for her pupils, but for the best interests of the school and community. The unimportant places in the world are filled with people who are paid only for what they do; the important places are filled by people who do more than they are paid for because they love their work. I strive for that place and believe true happiness is found only in productive lives which are accomplished through work and study.

Marion B. Craig has expressed my goal in life:

The only crown I ask, dear Lord, to wear is this—that I may help a little child. I do not ask that I should ever stand among the wise, the worthy, or the great; I only ask that softly, hand in hand, a child and I may enter at Thy gate.

## Sales tax receipts show gain

State Comptroller Carole Keeton Rylander delivered \$318.2 million in monthly sales tax payments to 1,097 Texas cities and 118 counties, a 9.5 percent increase over the \$290.5 million allocated to cities and counties in February 1998.

"February sales tax rebates reflect holiday season sales by Texas retailers. It appears that retailers had a very good Christmas, an indication of Texas' strong economy and high consumer confidence," Rylander said.

This month's payments to cities and counties include sales taxes collected by monthly filers in December and reported to the Comptroller in January, plus quarterly returns for sales in October, November and December and returns from annual filers for the entire year of 1998.

Rylander delivered monthly sales tax rebates totaling \$293.6 million to Texas cities, 9.9 percent higher than last February's payments of \$267.1 million. Rebates of \$24.5 million to Texas counties were up 9.5 percent compared to those paid in February 1998. Another \$9.7 million went to 37 special purpose districts around the state.

Haskell County had a 13.79 percent increase for February, 1999 of \$53,099.60 in comparison to \$46,661.32 for February, 1998. 1999 payments to date of \$68,258.53 reflect a 1.64 percent decrease over 1998 payments to date of \$69,398.37.

The City of Haskell had a 16.20 percent increase for February, 1999 of \$48,904.80 in comparison to \$42,084.46 for February, 1998. 1999 payments to date of \$63,847.74.

O'Brien had a 52.22 percent decrease for February, 1999 of \$205.64 in comparison to \$430.44 for February, 1998. 1999 payments to date of \$228.33 reflect a 50.81 percent decrease over 1998 payments to date of \$464.22.

Rochester had a 8.66 percent decrease for February, 1999 of \$1,038.07 in comparison to \$1,136.60 for February, 1998. 1999 payments to date of \$1,286.44 reflect a 10.44 percent decrease over 1998 payments to date of \$1,436.53.

Rule had a 8.43 percent decrease for February, 1999 of \$2,439.06 in comparison to \$2,663.73 for February, 1998. 1999 payments to date of \$2,911.64 reflect a 11.42 percent decrease over 1998 payments to date of \$3,287.17.

Weinert had a 47.94 percent increase for February, 1999 of \$512.03 in comparison to \$346.09 for February, 1998. 1999 payments to date of \$580.06 reflect a 59.92 percent increase over 1998 payments to date of \$362.71.

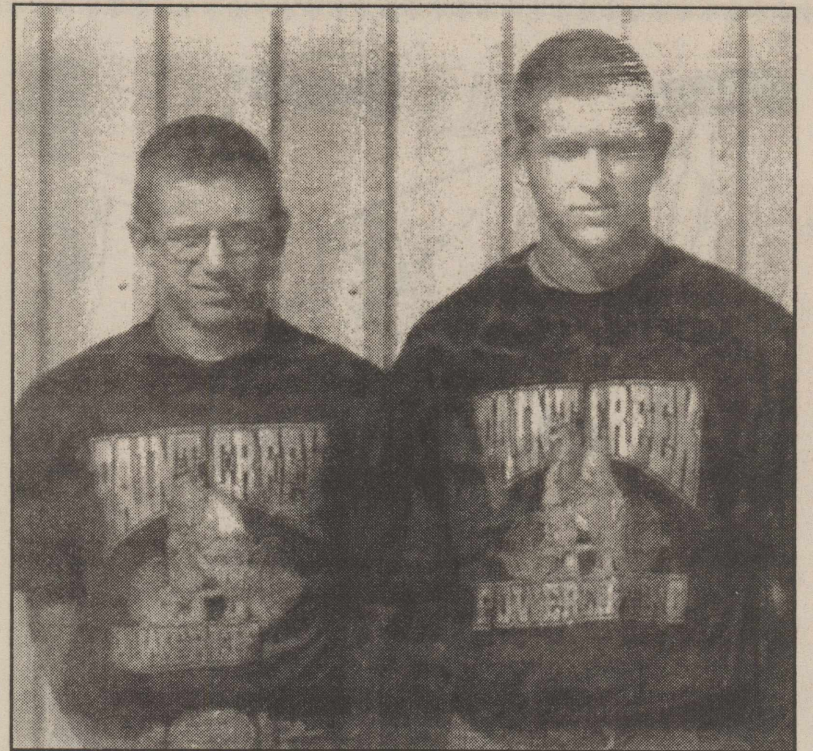

Local ATPE members' children are eligible for the new scholarship.

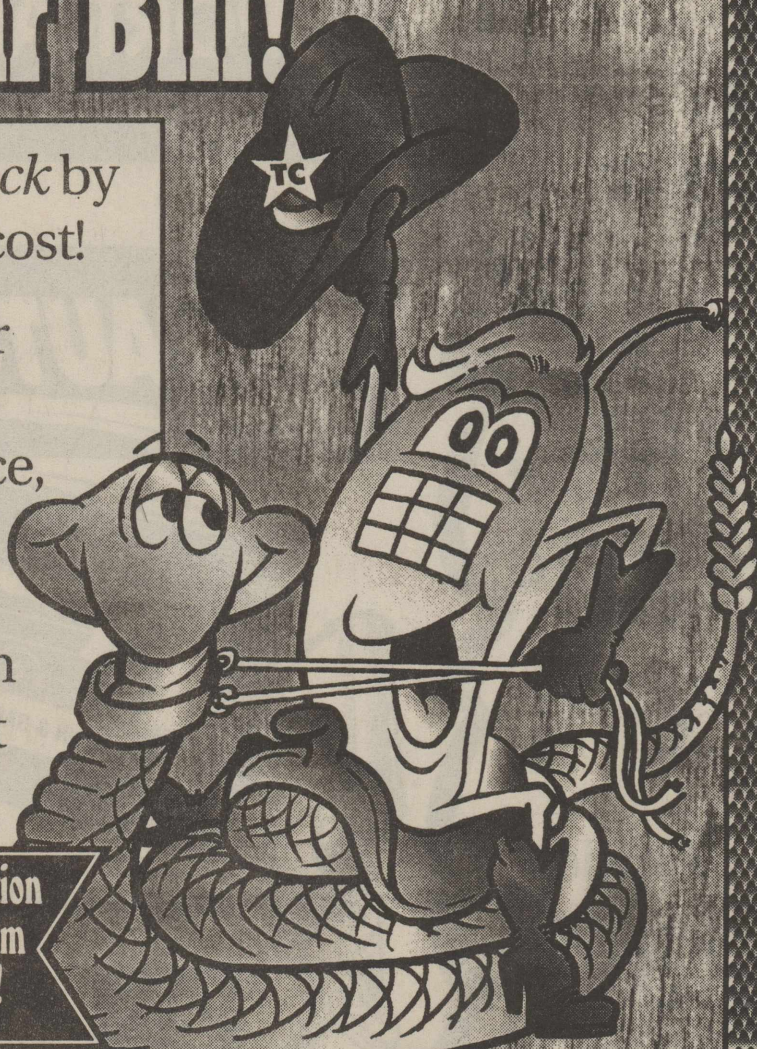

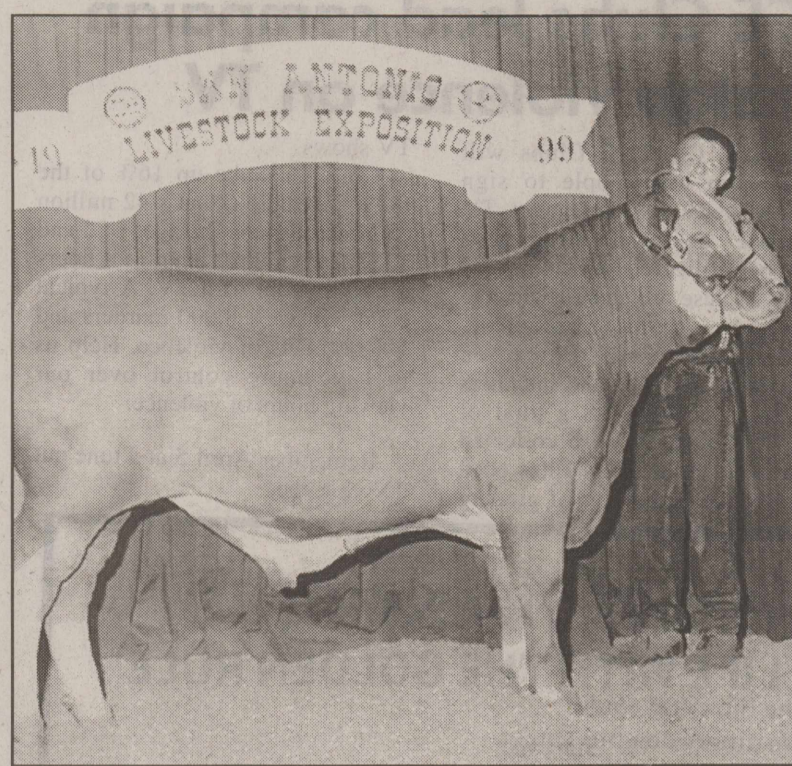

In accordance with the Workforce Investment Act, the following services will be provided sequentially to adults and youth who are 18 years of age or older: basic core, assisted core, intensive and training services. Basic core services shall be the initial service for all individuals, followed by assisted core, intensive and training services for those individuals meeting WIA requirements for that level of service. 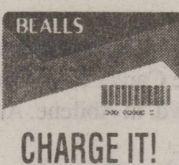
