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

Dr. Kemp receives prestigious

by Mary Kaigler "It's been fantastic," Dr. William J. Kemp of Haskell enthusiastically said recently of his more than fifty years of practice, achievements and recognitions. "I've had everything that anyone

could have had in the dental

profession." Last week in Kansas City, Missouri, when he received the prestigious Rinehart Medallion from the University of Missouri-Kansas City School of Dentistry as one of fifty persons named Alumni of the Year for each of the last fifty years, it was yet another of the many recognitions of service and appreciation given him from the profession to which he dedicated himself in the early 1940s. Dr. Kemp had been chose as the school's Man of the Year in 1980, an honor for which he is very

Saying that he was the "first Kemp kid to get a college education," Dr. Kemp tells of running off from home after graduating from Haskell High School in 1941, to attend Pre-Dental school at the University of Texas. (For a year his family thought he had found a job and was working in Austin.) Proud of his own children, he says they have been a joy to him. He and his wife, Billie Jean Kemp, have one son, Dr. William J. Kemp, Jr., who is in Pedodontic Dentistry in Amarillo and one daughter, Kemberly Kay Brossman, a 7th grade English teacher in Houston, who received her Master's Degree from Oxford University last

After finishing pre-dental school at U. T. in 1943, Bill Kemp served in the Army Air Corps in Bombardier Training until 1945. Entering the University of Missouri at Kansas City in 1946, he received a DDS degree in 1949.

Coming back to Haskell to practice, he set up his clinic across from the Haskell Hospital. He worked out of seven area hospitals, doing surgery five or six times a week and saw forty to sixty patients a day until he retired eight years ago. Now with Dr. Cliff Ray, he works all day Monday and

morning. Aside from his involvement in his profession over the last fifty years, Dr. Kemp has also taken an active part in local organizations and civic affairs. He is past Commander of Rogers Cox Post 221, past president and 30-year member of the Lions Club, past president of Band Boosters and Quarterback Clubs, past vicepresident of Haskell Chamber of Commerce and past president of Haskell Homecoming Association. He is a past member and secretary of Haskell School Board, member of Board of Stewards and Trustee of First United Methodist Church, and the Board of Directors of Chisholm Trail Council of Boy Scouts.

Speaking of his many years in the key leadership positions he has held with the dental profession, Dr. Kemp attributes Gov. John Connally with getting him started. In 1964, when Dr. Blackwell, an older dentist from Stamford, who thought of the younger Dr. Kemp as "his little protege," said he wanted him to be on the Texas State Board of Dental Examiners, Dr. Kemp told him, "You'd better get yourself a city guy, there is no way I'd make it." However, Dr. Blackwell went on and nominated him from this district. At the time there were two seats open on the six-man State Board.

That fall, Charles "Tex" Thornton, founder of Litton Industries, came to Haskell Homecoming and was a guest along with several others at the Kemp's home for steaks one night. When Bob Herren said, "Well, we're proud of Doc, he's been put up for the State Board of Examiners," Thornton asked Kemp if he'd like to be on that board. "I'd give my eye teeth to be on it," Dr. Kemp replied, "but there's no way, there's guys from Houston and Dallas running for it."

"Well, the position is yours," Thornton told him and Dr. Kemp said, "Look, Tex, I know you're a great person, but John Connally is the governor." Thoraton replied that he and Governor Connally had served together in the Navy. That seemed to settle it.

Hearing nothing more about it

for several months, Kemp decided the positions were already filled. One day in September 1965, when Dr. Kemp's office office nurse asked him if he could take a call from Governor Connally, he offhandedly said, "Yeah, sure, I'll talk to the man," thinking it was a joke. Without hesitation, when the governor asked him if he would serve on the board, he said, "Governor, I sure would!" After that, through their associations together, he became friends with Governor Connally. "I thought he was a great guy," he said.

Serving on the Texas State Board of Dental Examiners longer than anyone else (26 years), Dr. Kemp is proud to have helped over twenty young people from the area get into dental schools and hygiene schools.

When he was named President of the American Association of Dental Examiners, in 1977, they held his party on the Queen Mary in Los Angeles. His niece Rawlna (English) and her husband, Guy, from Hollywood, along with 265 other guests, came to the cocktail party. Staying in the King George and Queen Mary suites, the Kemps and their children kept thinking, "If only these walls could speak, what a story we'd have to tell."

Haskell's Dr. William J. Kemp has indeed had a full, interesting and rewarding career in the practice of dentistry. "If anyone ever enjoyed a job, it is me," he said. "Of course, if everyone had this much fun, no one would be going to the dentist."

He isn't entertaining the idea of stopping the whole thing either, just because of some number or date on the calendar. Of course, if he should decide to quit, he can always continue to pursue and enjoy his other interests of golfing, flying and fishing; this is, if he isn't too busy attending award luncheons and breakfasts in his honor, given by a profession that still values dedicated men like him.

On May 8, following a special luncheon during the Texas Dental Association's Annual Session in the San Antonio Convention Center, Dr. Kemp will be recognized again and honored for his contributions to organized Dentistry by being presented the prestigious 50-year and Life Membership Awards.

AUSTIN — Gov. George W. Bush last week made public his preference for traditional families when it comes to raising children.

"I'm against gay adoptions," Bush said, regarding legislation that would bar the state from designating gays and lesbians as foster parents or permitting them to adopt children.

State Rep. Warren Chisum, R-Pampa, has filed legislation to prevent homosexuals from adopting children in the custody of Child Protective Services, the agency that takes custody of abused or neglected children.

"I believe children ought to be adopted in families with a woman and a man who are married," Bush

On a similar theme, the governor also said he opposes including sexual orientation in a bill to clarify the state's hate-crimes law that increases penalties in cases in which a victim is targeted for a specific reason such as race or gen-

"I've always said all crime is hate crime," Bush was quoted by The Dallas Morning News.

"People, when they commit a crime, have hate in their heart. And it's hard to distinguish between one degree of hate and another," Bush said.

Handgun Licensee Arrests Tallied

Texas concealed-handgun license holders have been arrested 2,080 times since the law authorizing the permits took effect in 1996, according to a study by the Washington, D.C.-based Violence Policy Center.

The Violence Policy Center's statistics included 103 charges of aggravated assault, 442 cases involving drunken driving and 15 charges of murder or attempted murder.

However, December 1998 statistics from the Department of Public Safety show only 515 of the charges cited in the center's report resulted in convictions, though some were still pending, DPS spokeswoman Tela Mange said.

DPS statistics showed that the bulk of the convictions against licensed concealed-handgun holders were misdemeanors, including 185 for drunken driving and 21 for prostitution.

Felonies included 31 convictions of aggravated assault, six of assault causing bodily injury and five of aggravated sexual assault.

Out of the 192,160 licenses issued in Texas from January 1996 to December 1998, 614 were revoked. A total of 2,341 license applications were denied, Mange

Economy May Slow Down

State Comptroller Carole Keeton Rylander on March 22 predicted slower growth in the Texas economy during the next four to six months, basing her forecast on the Index of Leading Texas Economic Indicators.

Showing gains were the Texas 100 Stock Index, new home construction, retail sales and new jobs. Texas gained 278,000 new jobs during the last 12 months, with 269,000 in the service sector.

Slowing down were new business incorporations and the number of jobs in want ads. Unemployment claims have increased. **Workers' Comp Rates Drop**

Texas workers' compensation carriers have responded to lower base rates set by the Texas Department of Insurance by cutting their rates by an average of 10.5 per-

"Given the wide range of rate changes filed by the companies and the intense competition we see in the marketplace, this is a good time for employers to shop around for the best deal," said Insurance Commissioner Jose Montemayor.

It is only fair to give employers a break on their workers' compensation costs when claims drop, Montemayor added.

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
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From The Inside Out

Recently, while in New York City, we saw people from every country and every culture every day, but during the Saint Patrick's Day parade up 5th Avenue, it seemed that everyone had become

I was there with our daughter, Dr. Karen Kaigler-Walker, professor and chair of the Department of Marketing at Woodbury University in Burbank, California, who was accompanying a group of fifteen fashion marketing, fashion design and graphic arts students and their teacher on an academic field trip.

Wednesday morning, after breakfast at Lindy's, which was near our mid-Manhattan high-rise hotel between Broadway and "The Avenue," Karen and I walked the three blocks to Saint Thomas Church Fifth Avenue to stand on the stone steps of the historic old church for viewing the parade. We had attended the eleven o'clock Sunday morning Festal Eucharist service there, and decided then that it would be a good vantage point for seeing the parade.

Getting there about 30 minutes before the parade started at eleven, we did find a spot on the steps along with dozens of others who had already discovered it. Across the wide sidewalk at the street, people were lined up five and six deep, straining at the barricades to catch an early glimpse down 5th Ave. There was a happy mood among the multitude of people who continued to gather in the cool, clear sunshine, many of them bedecked in something green; carnations, hats, wigs, and even a few young celebrants sported green sprayed hair. Walking among the crowd, street vendors sold shamrocks and green balloons, and strangers happily exchanged information about their Irish ancestry with one another. It seemed that everyone was suddenly proud to claim some tie to the Auld Sod. Even Karen and I remembered and reminisced about the stories my mother told us of

our Irish grandmother who came to this country during the infamous Potato Famine in Ireland.

By the time the first group of New York's "finest" appeared, riding on their beautiful police horses, there was a contagious festive spirit in the air that didn't let up. One solemn soul, walking up and down the sidewalk carrying a Bible and a sign announcing "The end is near," was woefully outnumbered by happy celebrants in his quest to send his message. Somehow, in that atmosphere, he seemed lonely and sad. Ignoring him, the festive ambiance of the crowd seemed to say, "Well, what a way to go!"

Marching bands and military music always choke me up, but the beautiful haunting, soulful sound of bagpipes absolutely tears me up. There were dozen of excellent bands that day; police academy and police precinct's bands, military bands, high schools and private schools from all around the country, and Irish bagpipe bands and delegations from every county in Ireland. Many Irish fraternities and organizations, each carrying their banner, marched with their bands, and dozens of Irish school girls, dressed in their uniforms of green skirts and white blouses proudly marched and played whatever instruments they had. We saw one large band of young girls from Ireland playing small concertinas and triangles.

The most amazing, incongruous sight, for me at least, was the large Chinese bagpipe marching band wearing kilts and carrying their national Chinese flag. That seemed to put some credence to the old saying that everyone is a little bit Irish on St. Pat's Day. With the bagpipes wailing out the old Irish songs my mother taught me when I was a little child, I just about came unglued. Caught up in the feeling, I cheered and clapped like I'd just come over on the boat, while wiping the tears welling up from some remote place of ancient past within me and running down

We continued to watch the fastpaced parade for an hour and a half, and even though it hadn't shown signs of being about over, we assumed that it probably was, and left to have some lunch before meeting the rest of our group at The Metropolitan Museum of Art for a presentation by the director of the historic Costume Institute.

When we emerged from the Museum, which was way up 5th Avenue from where we had stood to view the parade, it was five p.m., and the parade was still going by, six hours after it had

Although any traffic across 5th Avenue had been stopped by police barricades, my intrepid daughter decided we were going to get across somehow to be able to catch a bus back down to our hotel. Finding a brief lull between marching bands, she said "Come on, we're going," and stepped out ahead. Having walked a lot all week with no trouble, always being able to keep up with that fast-moving group of young students, I was really surprised about half way across 5th Avenue, when my left leg muscles locked down. When Karen reached the curb and looked back and saw me still in the street her face was pure panic. After what seemed like hours of wading through thick molasses I finally forced the leg to take me across to the other curb about five or six feet ahead of one of those girls' bands from Ireland, which was not missing a beat marching up the upper end of 5th Avenue just like there wasn't some old lady from West Texas stranded in front of them.

After a few minutes rest, the illtimed muscle cramp left and I wasn't troubled with it again. But, for just a few agonizing moments, there in the middle of 5th Avenue in the middle of the Saint Patrick's Day parade in New York City, I decided the sad-faced sign-bearer we'd seen earlier that morning just might be right, and that for me, indeed, "The end is near."





IRS TAX UPDATE - APRIL 1999

Here's a quick rundown of some of the recent IRS rulings and announcements that may affect you.

•On March 22, 1999, the IRS released proposed regulations that would change the electronic tax deposit requirements once again. Beginning January 1, 2000, businesses with federal tax deposits exceeding \$200,000 in calendar year 1998 will be required to use electronic depositing. The old dollar limit was \$50,000. In the meantime, the IRS will waive penalties for those businesses whose deposits are under the \$200,000 limit.

•You can pay taxes you owe this year with a credit card, but since the IRS cannot absorb credit card fees as merchants do, you will be charged the fee. Consider that extra cost before using a charge card to pay any balance due.

•Annual depreciation and expensing deduction limits for 1999 have been announced. For business cars first placed in service in 1999, the deduction limit for this year is \$3,060, a \$100 decrease from the 1998 limit. Deductions for later years are unchanged from the 1998 limits. They are \$5,000 for the second tax year, \$2,950 for the third tax year, and \$1,775 for each succeeding

•Employers can provide employees up to \$50,000 of life insurance coverage as a tax-free fringe benefit. The cost of coverage beyond that amount is considered taxable income to the employee. The IRS has just revised the tables showing how much income must be reported for excess coverage. The new rates reflect the decrease in insurance costs resulting from longer life spans. Employers should make any necessary payroll adjustments before the proposed July 1, 1999, effective date for the new rates.

•Social security recipients who have been paying their income tax via quarterly estimated payments can now have taxes withheld from their monthly benefits payments. IRS Form W-4B (Voluntary Withholding Request) is required; the form can be obtained from the IRS by calling 1-800-






