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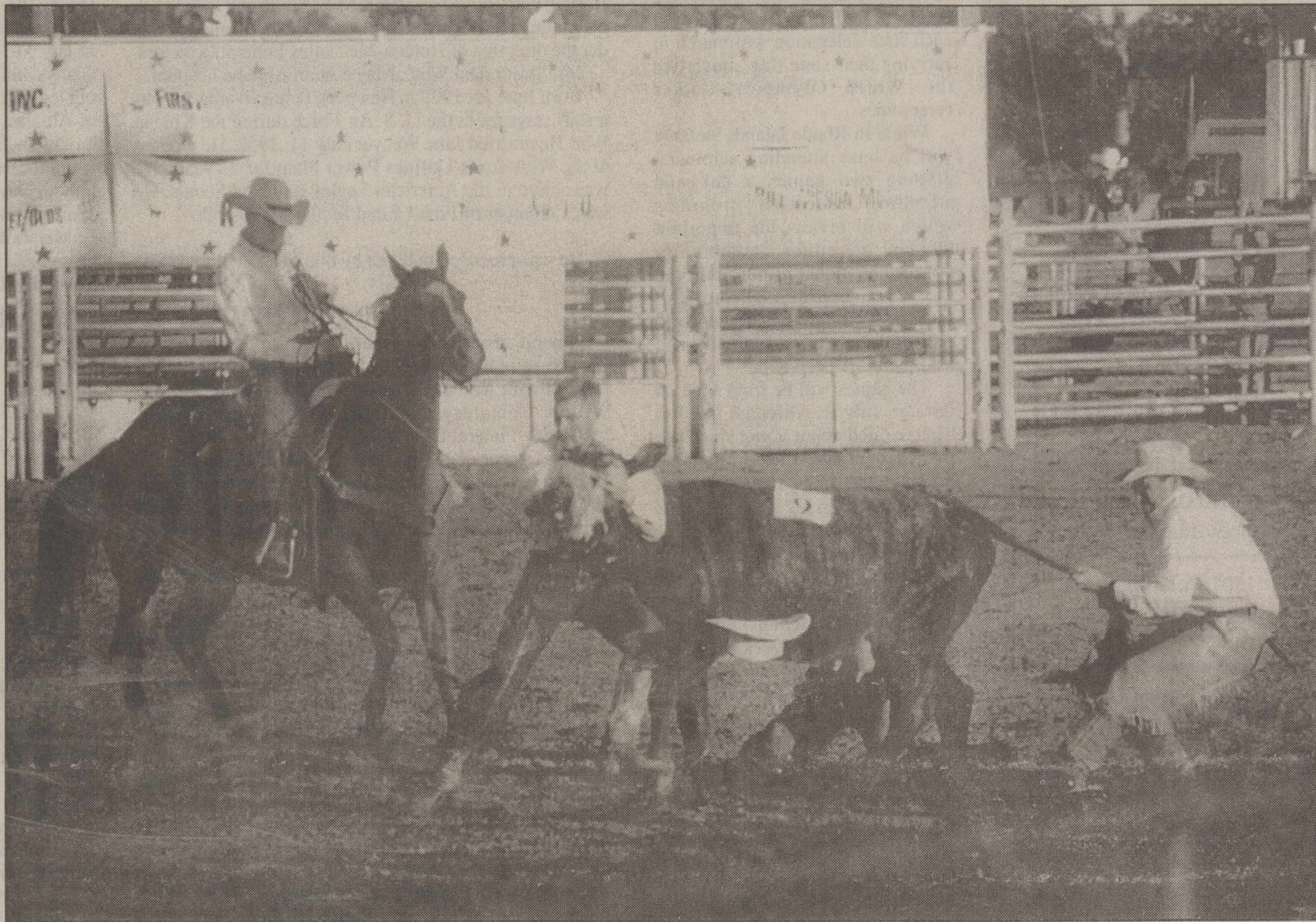

Chief Bassett says 'It can happen here'

If anyone living in Haskell thinks all the lawlessness is happening in Abilene or other larger places remote to our area, they need only to look at Haskell Police Chief Tom Bassett's police docket for the last several months, to realize that, as Chief Bassett says, "it can happen here."

While we have escaped the greater trauma of crime we read of in other places, we do have it here, and Chief Bassett advises all citizens to be aware of what is

going on around them and in their families.

In an interview with *The Free Press* he stated that his philosophy with dealing with lawlessness is one of no tolerance.

"When thieves learn you mean it they soon move off to other places," he said.

Activities that his department has dealt with during the last few months include:

Feb. 1, Burkett's Restaurant, Double A Drive Inn, and Lela's

were burglarized. Four adults were taken into custody.

Feb. 6, additional burglaries occurred in the county. All were cleared by arrests. Several agencies including the Texas Rangers and Haskell Sheriff's Office worked together to help clear these and other offenses.

Mar. 26, two adult suspects passed five checks without permission at local grocery stores. They were arrested for forgery.

In April two cases of assault, one involving family violence, and one simple assault were both cleared with arrests.

Apr. 15, one vehicle was stolen from Larned Sales Center. Recovery was made the same day with 14 Abilene juveniles taken into custody.

Apr. 17, local juveniles were taken into custody following threats to the Haskell Civic Center.

Apr. 21, two Haskell juveniles were taken into custody after

making terrorist threats at Haskell High School.

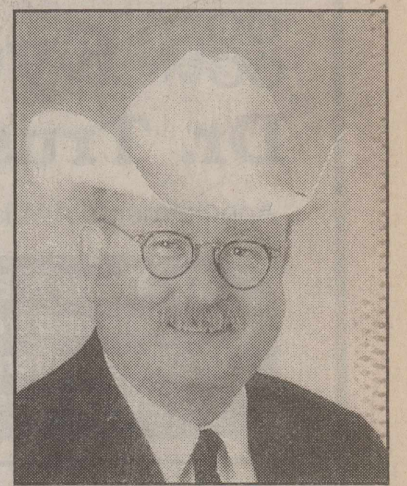
Apr. 27, another incident of intentional indecent exposure by a Haskell juvenile who was taken into custody.

May 2, two assaults occurred. Two adult suspects were taken into custody.

May 6, an assault occurred and arrests were made.

With a large percent of local cases being cleared by arrests, the Haskell Police Department is above the national average in clearing cases. Bassett expressed thanks to many Haskell citizens for their cooperation in helping his department in many of these incidents.

As a timely reminder to Haskell citizens Chief Bassett said, "With summer coming on everyone should take precautions to keep all tools and yard equipment put up when not in use. Thefts of these items are common."

Isbell to attend U.S. Athlete games

There is a world of difference and a lot of miles between Krooked River Ranch in Haskell County and the city of Newport in Rhode Island. Yet, Paint Creek student Stefanie Isbell will close that gap with a fast plane ride on June 25, when she goes there to participate in the Inaugural U. S. Scholar-Athlete Games at the University of Rhode Island. Accompanied by her mother, Becky Wilson, she will fly into Boston, where they will rent a car for the drive to Newport.

In Rhode Island Stefanie will be one of 1600 young scholars, talented in athletics or the fine arts, who have been selected from 50 states to be a part of the only program in the United States combining sport, culture and education at one site at one time. The concept is unique, yet dates back to the first modern Olympic Games of 1896.

Conceived by the Institute for International Sport, which is dedicated to promoting world friendship through sport and culture, the goals of the U. S. Scholar-Athlete games are: to promote ethical behavior, sportsmanship, understanding, acceptance and friendship among the youth of the United States; establish open, non-political, long standing relationships among tomorrow's world leaders; utilize sports and the arts as means of communication and learning rather than competition; and to identify

and train young people to develop leadership skills and networking strategies as they pursue positions of leadership in government, education and other professional fields.

Since those attending the games can participate in only one of the fourteen sports programs or one of seven cultural programs offered, Stefanie has chosen basketball. At Paint Creek the sixteen-year-old junior has been a starter on the varsity team for three years, being named to First Team All-District each season. She likes all sports and also participated in the Regional golf playoffs.

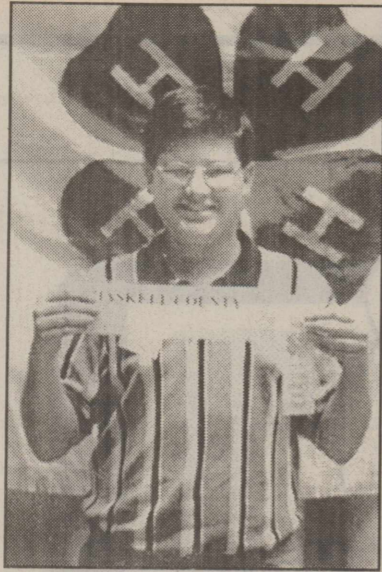

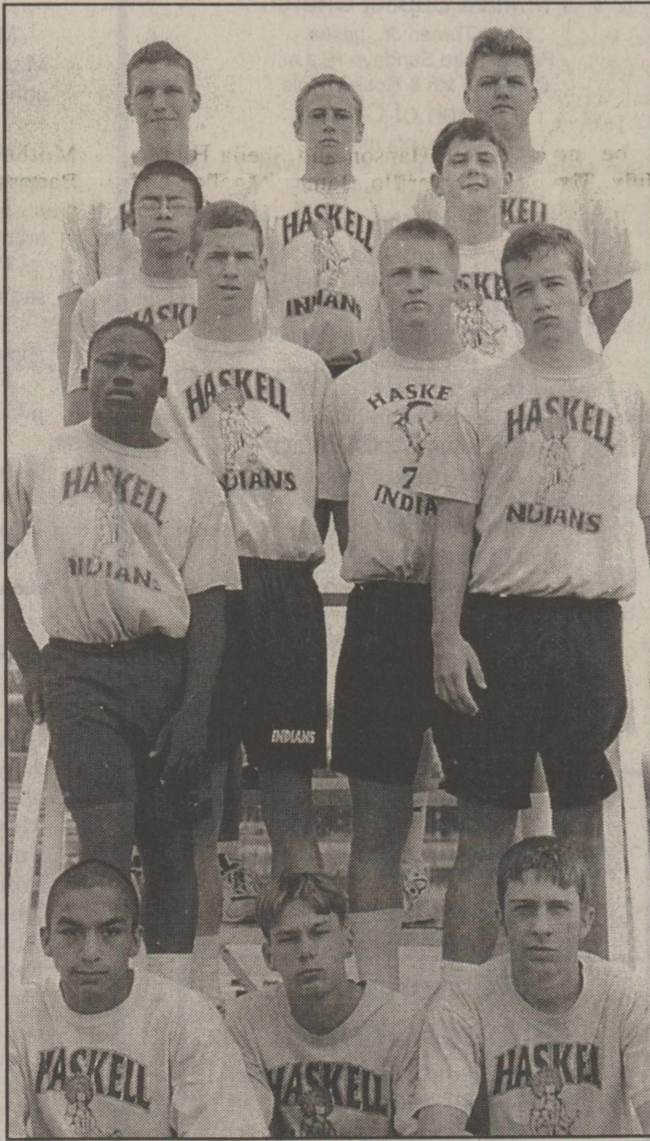
