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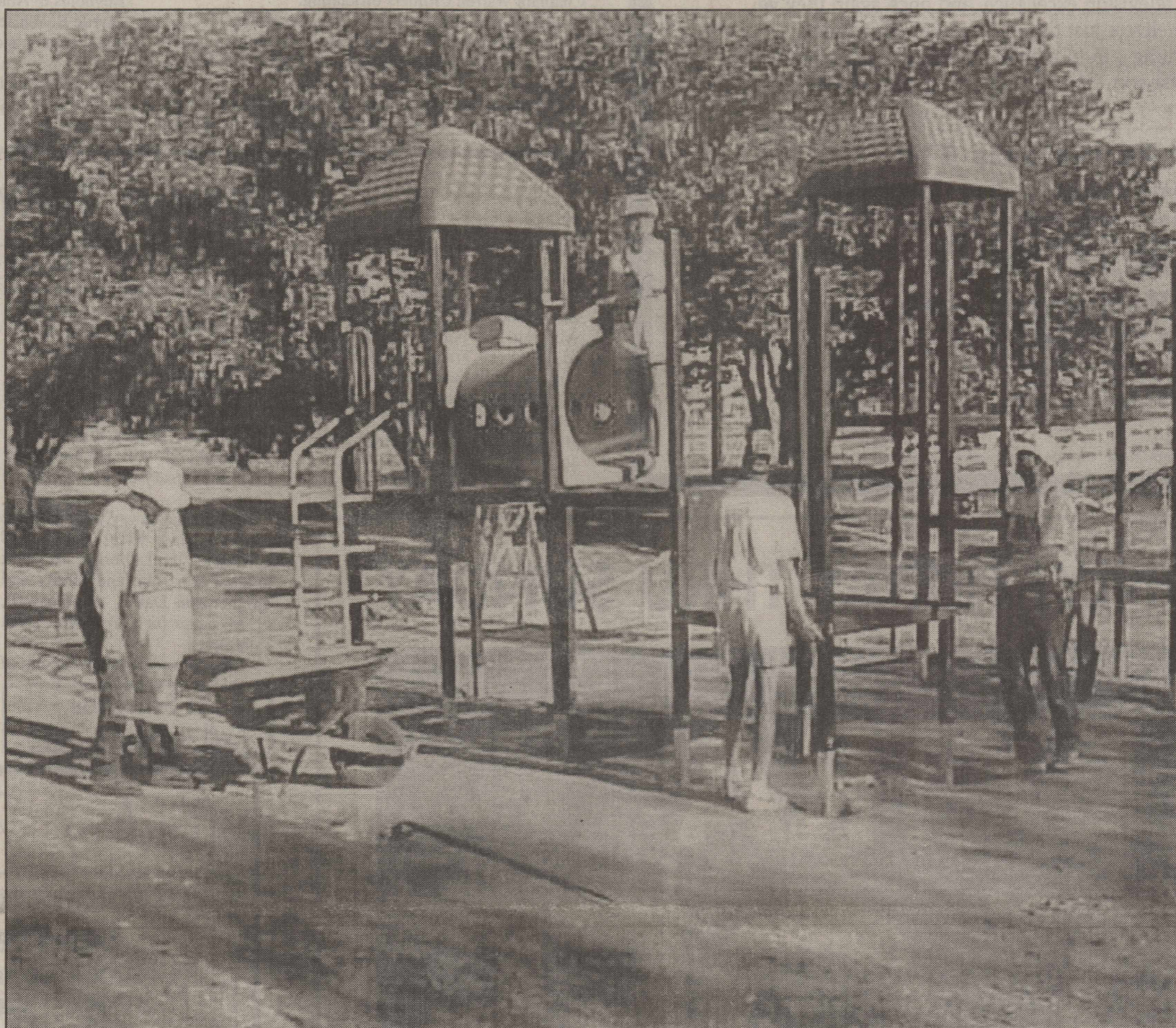

## New look for City Park playground

Playtime in the City Park will soon be taking on a colorful new dimension for the little citizens of Haskell.

For the last two Saturdays, volunteers from the Rotary Club have worked to install a big, new play equipment area, which will provide a variety of challenging opportunities for action-filled play by area children.

The new equipment is the first of several new play areas planned and budgeted for the park over the

course of the next three years, by Mayor Ken Lane and the Haskell City Council, working with the City Parks Board.

Located on a minimal recommended fall-zone area covering 1216 square feet, with a perimeter of 135 feet, the equipment will include an eight foot long "challenge" ladder, leading up to a series of seven different decks.

The decks, some of which are covered, range in size from 24 inches square to 64 inches square.

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# Green Thumb

Since it has been so hot, I'm sure you haven't thought about your flowers for fall. But it is the time to get the ground in good condition for planting.

First, spade the ground, then soak it thoroughly. If it is too hard, let it dry out so it will break into small particles.

Keep feeding your chrysanthemums liquid manure.

Since Aug. and Sept. are subject to almost identical schedules for working and planting, I have put them together for this writing.

It is time to prepare your pansy bed by working in plenty of manure.

Sow seeds of larkspur, bluebonnets, poppies, stock and hollyhocks.

Force a few bulbs for indoor winter color. Plant half now and half in two weeks for a continuous show.

Sometime later it will be time to winterize before storing your power tools. It is a little early, but give it some thought.

Repot plants that have been outside in the summer.

It is not too early to plant your season vegetable garden.

On or about Sept. 1 stop feeding everything but your lawn.

With a twinkle in our eyes and an almanac in our hand and a love for gardening in our hearts, we can learn old-time gardening.

I have a few garden guardians to pass on to you.

For example, plant garlic and onions near vegetables to repel aphids and deter rabbits.

If you get sunburned, make a garlic tea compress and it will bring blessed relief.

Any fish parts, burned or composted will give your tomatoes or peppers a big boost. Cucumbers peelings get A+ for driving away ants.

Red spider mites love your fruit trees and many other plants, but they will flee at the first sign of sour milk. So mix two cups of wheat flour and one cup of buttermilk in five gallons of water and soon they will be heading for the hills.

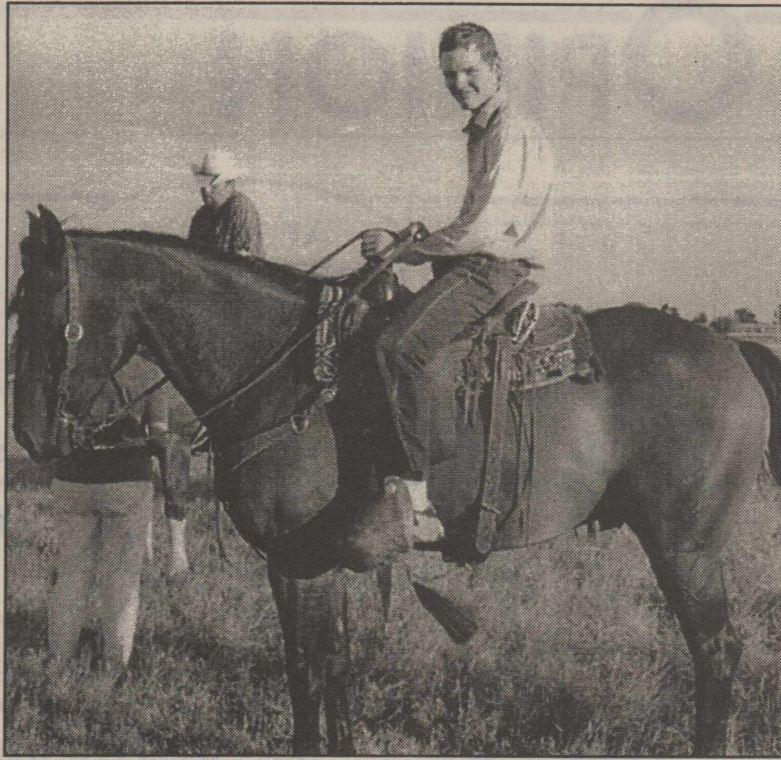
Mix one bottle of beer, one bottle of soda pop and one cup of ammonia in twenty gallons of water and soak the ground of your garden. Then your garden will be ready to grow things.

These old-time tips and tricks still work their magic today.

I have enjoyed writing this week, the nice hints and things to do and to pass them on to my friends.

Early fall is the best time to divide your perennials. Do this on a cool morning and give your overcrowded perennials plenty of nice room to grow.

## HIGHLIGHTS

**AUSTIN** — Gov. George W. Bush reviewed 11 candidates for state commissioner of education and last week appointed James E. Nelson of Odessa to the post.

Nelson, a 49-year-old lawyer who has no experience as a public school teacher, will replace Commissioner Mike Moses on Sept. 3. Moses, a longtime professional educator, will become deputy vice chancellor for the Texas Tech University System.

Nelson has served as a trustee of Ector County (Odessa) Independent School District, including two terms as president, and currently is chairman of the State Board for Educator Certification, the agency that licenses teachers. He also has served as president of the Texas Association of School Boards. In a Capitol news conference, Bush referred to Nelson as an "educational entrepreneur."

"I wanted somebody who understands that when we find success, we praise it, and when we find failure, we are willing to challenge the status quo. I believe Jim is that person," Bush said.

Nelson's annual salary as commissioner will be \$164,748. His appointment will expire in January 2003.

### Benchmark Rate Hearing Set

Texas Insurance Commissioner Jose Montemayor will decide whether to increase the benchmark rate for auto insurance after a Sept. 8 public hearing in Austin.

Texas insurance companies cite growing costs of vehicle repairs in asking for an 11.4 percent increase in standard rates for insurance.

Among those companies asking for a benchmark increase are Farmers and State Farm, the two largest auto insurers in Texas.

But the state's consumer advocate, the Office of Public Insurance Counsel, says the rates should decrease by 4.8 percent because profits are up and insurance losses are down. *The Dallas Morning News* reported last week.

The benchmark represents a premium under which companies are supposed to be able to earn a reasonable profit. Regulated companies can charge up to 30 percent above or below the benchmark rate.

On the other hand, county mutual auto insurers, which don't turn away drivers with less than perfect driving records, operate independently of the benchmark rate.

Jonathan Klein, a spokesman for Progressive Insurance, a county mutual, said his company has no plans to increase rates.

### Accountability Ratings Released

New ratings through the Texas Education Agency's school accountability system are available online at [www.tea.state.tx.us/perfreport/account/99/index.html](http://www.tea.state.tx.us/perfreport/account/99/index.html).

The 1999 accountability ratings are based on dropout rates, student passing rates in the Texas Assessment of Academic Skills and attendance figures.

Data tables show information used to determine the ratings for any campus or district.

Searchers simply "click" on campus, district or state data tables to get the information. Information on charter schools also can be accessed.

### Judge Rules for Early Voting

U.S. District Judge David Hittner of Houston has thrown out a lawsuit challenging the right of Texans to vote early in federal elections.

Texas Secretary of State Elton Bomer, the state's chief elections officer, praised the judge's decision.

"Early voting in Texas generally accounts for about 30 percent of the ballots cast on a general election day.

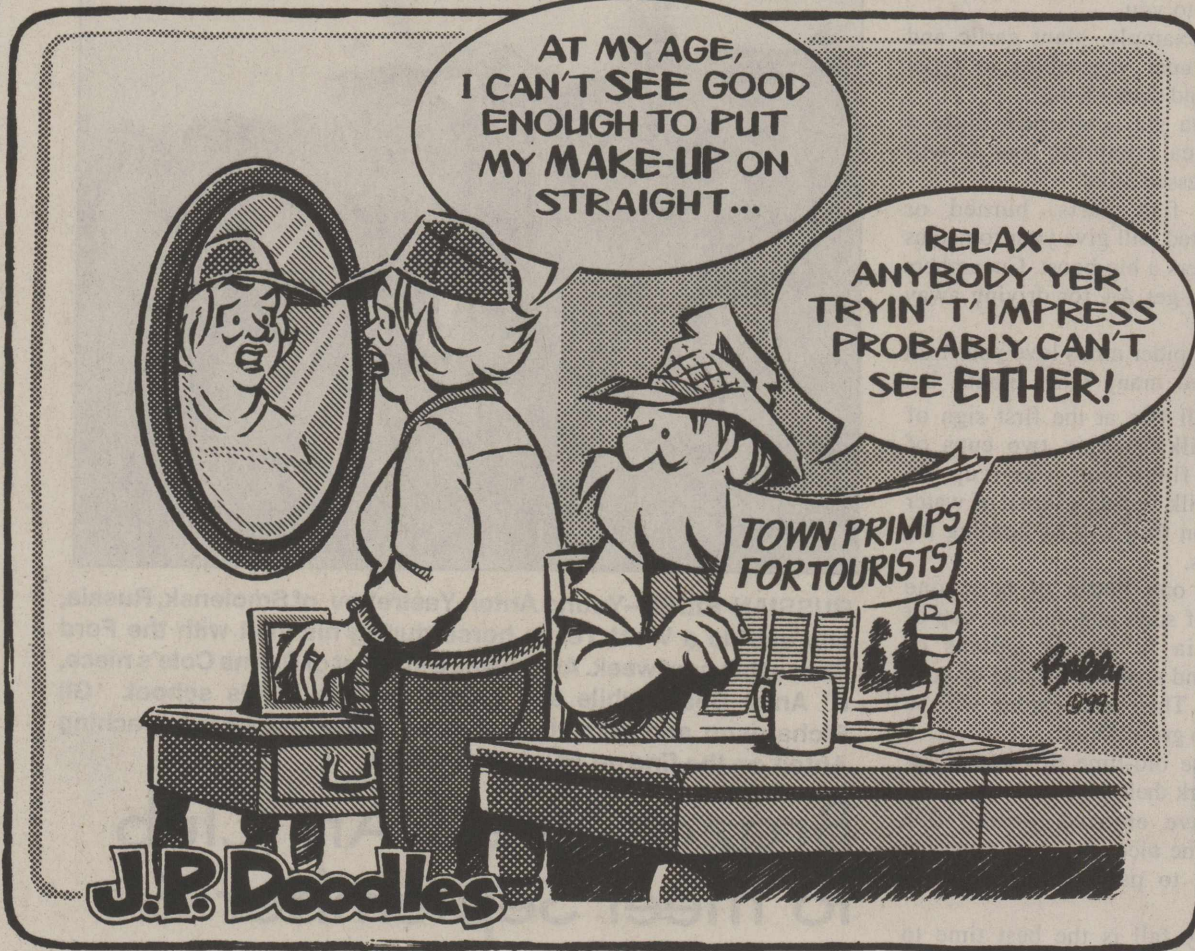
"More important, early voting provides Texans a convenient means of letting their voices be heard. I am happy the court agreed early voting in Texas enhances our right to vote," Bomer said.

### Other Highlights

■ More than 1.7 million Texans are expected to be on the Medicaid rolls in the fiscal year that begins Sept. 1, according to the state budget. The program will cost \$19 billion over two years, including more than \$7 billion in state funds. Created in 1965, Medicaid pays medical bills for low-income, older, and disabled people with no other access to health care.

■ Global Positioning Satellite (GPS) system time will roll over at midnight on Aug. 21-22, 132 days before the year 2000, according to a U.S. Coast Guard news release. Many GPS receivers will claim it is Jan. 6, 1980. Some manufacturers of GPS equipment have solved the problem and some have not. Users are encouraged to contact their receiver manufacturer.

■ Hunting and fishing licenses for 1999-2000 went on sale state-wide Aug. 11. If approved by the Texas Parks and Wildlife Commission this month, waterfowl hunters will get a 107-day season and 20-bird daily bag limit for light geese and a 74-day season and six-bird daily bag limit for ducks across most of the state.



## From The Inside Out

In the summer issue of *The Texas Clubwoman*, Jean Bolt, Chaplain of the North Carolina General Federation of Women's Clubs, wrote, "The practice of good human relations is not really so complicated—if we adopt a few simple rules as a way of life."

She presents the following common sense rules that say a lot in a few words:

\*Speak to people. There is nothing as nice as a cheerful word of greeting.

\*Smile at people. It takes 72 muscles to frown, only 14 to smile.

\*Call people by name. The sweetest music to anyone's ears is the sound of his own name.

\*Be friendly and helpful. If you would have friends, be friendly.

\*Be cordial. Speak and act as if everything you did were a genuine pleasure.

\*Be genuinely interested in people. You can find something about everybody, if only you will take the time to try.

\*Be generous with praise. And cautious with criticism.

\*Be considerate with the feelings of others. It will be appreciated.

\*Be thoughtful of the opinions of others. There are three sides to a controversy; your's, the other fellow's, and the right one.

\*Be alert to give service. What counts most in life is what we do for others.

The practice of good human relations simply means, "Be kind—to everyone."

Jean Bolt's words are true and to the point. Yet, in actuality we often

bypass these simple rules, and complicate the matter of human relationships. Judging from so much we see, hear and even experience about people having trouble in the way they relate to one another, both individually and in groups, we have to realize that it is a big, big problem in our world.

Of course, our seeming tendency (even willingness) not to properly relate to each other in a positive way, goes back all the way to the first four humans. Like them, we don't always find it easy to "relate" to others in the best sense of the word. But that fact just shows we are humans; it isn't something put on us that we can't help, or be responsible for.

In our relations with other people it takes a great deal of effort and energy to resist this urge to demand that all things must go the way we desire. So many arguments, so much disunity is brought about because we don't want to yield an inch in the way we look at things or perceive them to be. But, most of the time, it is strictly opinion.

We often become fault-finders, and critical to the point of alienation from any kind of relationship with those who are different from us in any way. Perhaps this comes from a feeling of insecurity and the unconscious fear that they may be right.

If we would truly make an honest effort to see (or even listen to) the other person's point of view, we could more often see that they may have reasons for their ideas and actions, that we don't know about. Before we "throw out"

or discard a relationship with someone, we might try harder to withhold our judgment as to their worth as a person or the worth of maintaining a good relationship with them.

The following poem, written by Mrs. R. E. B. Fielder, printed in writer Marge Green's book, *A Life With Wings*, says quite well one thing we may need to consider in relating to others.

### A Plea For Tolerance

Who could be so arrogant as to judge a fellow being? Before one could judge truly he would have to know all the diverse elements of heredity that through the ages have blended to make of that one the personality he is;

The home into which he was born and if he were loved and cherished so that he felt secure, or if he were neglected, so that a sense of fear and inferiority developed within him;

Who first told him of God, and if he believed, and if he has ever learned to pray;

The books he has read, and the friends he has made;

The ease with which he fits into his world, and the efforts he makes to do so;

If his talents and abilities are in proportion to his ambition;

The extent of his heartaches, and his capacity for joy;

Whom he has loved, and if he has been loved in return.

To judge truly one would have to know all of this and a great deal more.

## Ask the AG

**Q:** My mother is getting so that she can't live by herself any more. I want to find a good nursing home for her, but am not sure what to look for. I know you go after bad nursing homes, but can you tell me about some good ones?

**A:** Making the decision to place a loved one in a nursing home can be difficult. I understand your concerns about finding a facility that will meet your mother's needs. While this office does not keep a list of good nursing homes, I can offer some pointers on what to look for when selecting a nursing home.

The first thing to do is ask for referrals from friends who may have family members in a nursing home. Your mother's physician may also be able to recommend a good facility.

When looking you should shop around; visit several nursing homes in your area so that you can compare services. Make unannounced visits to the facilities you are considering. If you are interested in a particular facility after an initial visit, schedule an interview with the administrators.

Prepare a list of questions to take with you on an interview. For example, ask about the amount of staff turnover, the name of the attending physician and how medical emergencies are handled. Also, ask for a copy of the resident contract and the home's policies and procedures.

You should also ask about the facility's history of compliance with standards. If compliance reports are not available from the administrators, call the Texas Department of Human Services, Office of Public Information, at (512) 834-6771 and ask for copies.

When you go for an interview, you should also ask for a tour of the nursing home. Pay attention to how the facility smells, whether the clients are clean and engaged in activities and whether the staff seems competent and caring. If possible attend one of the meals and talk with the residents about their care.

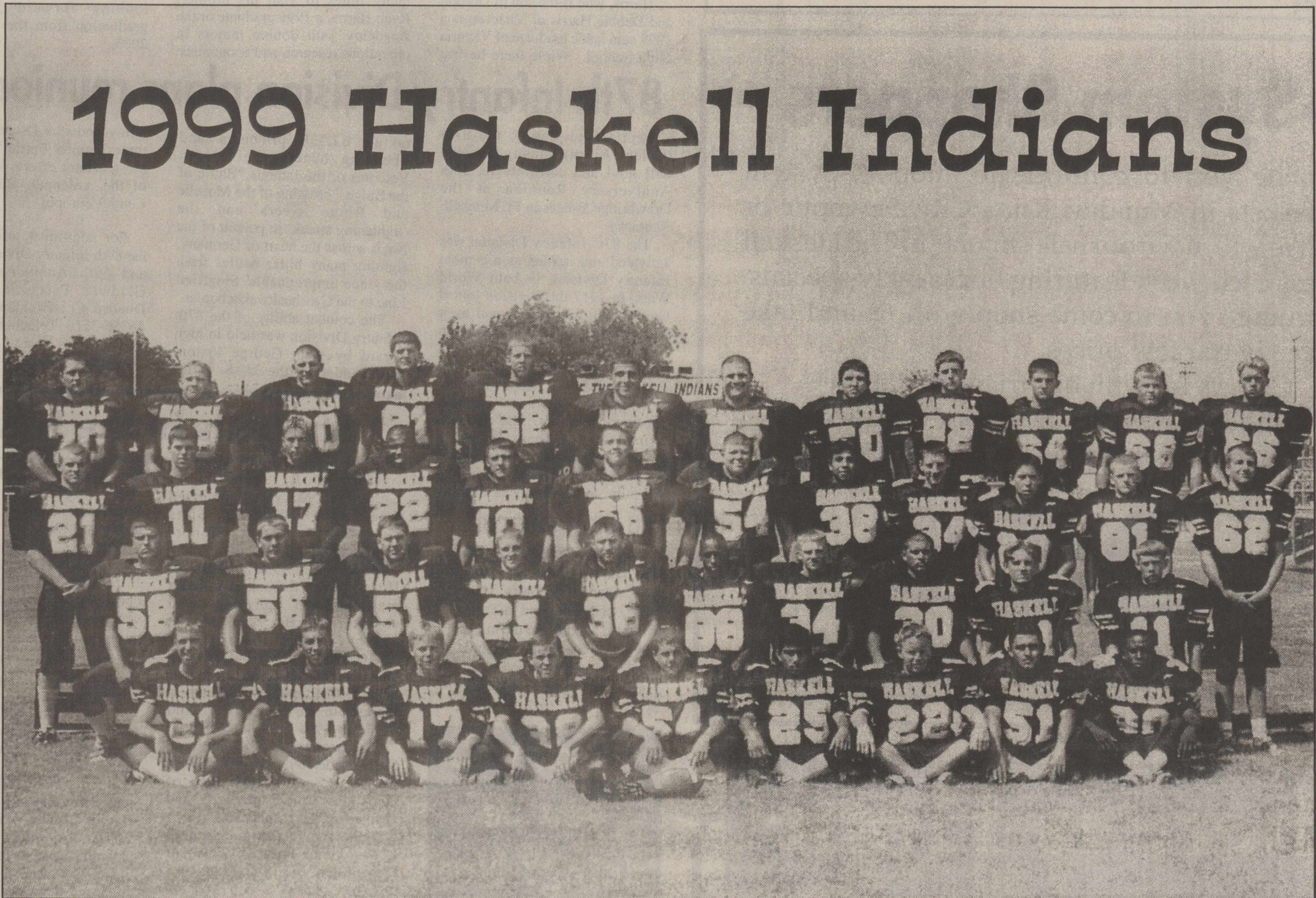

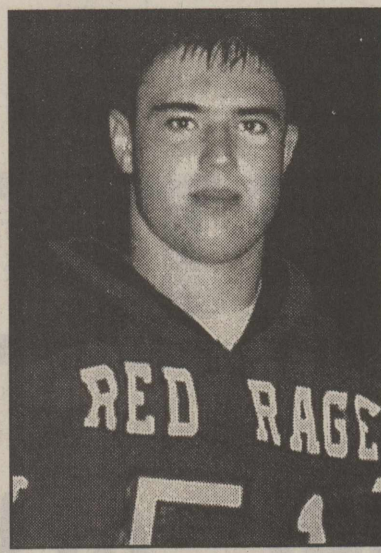
in Boulder, Colo., Labor Day weekend, Sept. 4 and 5.

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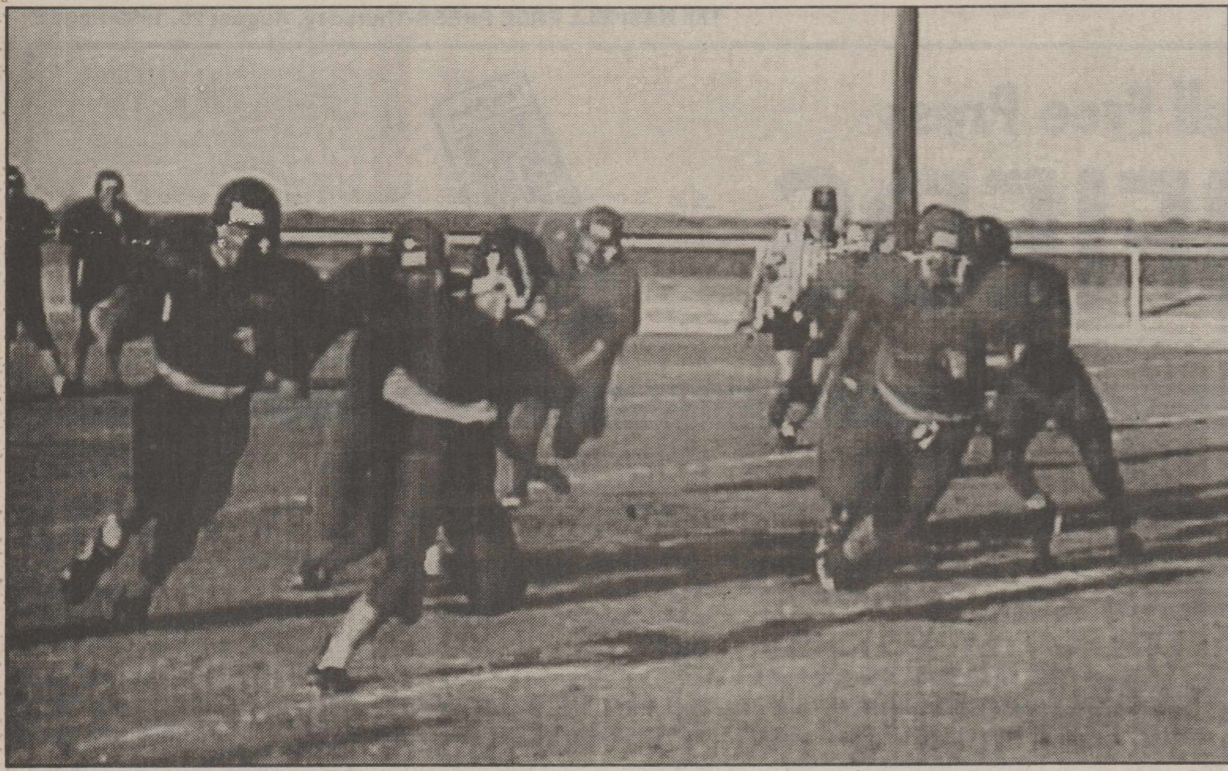
