## Haskell loses well-respected citizen and merchant

Raja Hassen was a well-known, well-respected citizen, merchant and friend of Haskell. He died at the age of 68, Fri., Sept. 24, at an Abilene hospital, following complications from problems with his heart.

Funeral services were held Sun., Sept. 26 at the First United Methodist Church in Haskell with Rev. Shane Brue officiating. Attesting to the esteem felt for the quiet man, many local and out-of-town friends attended the service.

Pallbearers for the service were Wallace Cox, David Middleton, Bailey Toliver, Wallace Wootan, James Strain, Don Nanny, G. W. Mullins and Marvin Hancock. Honorary Pallbearers were Abe Turner, Joe Harper, Royce Williams, Andy Gannaway, Joe Cortez, Ed Walling, Charles Chapman and Bill Gann.

Raja Shahir Hassen was born in Wewoka, Oklahoma, Dec. 6, 1930. Growing up in Haskell, after his parents moved here to open Hassen's Department Store, he started school and graduated from Haskell High School.

He attended the University of Texas where he earned a Masters Degree in Economics. In 1961, at the age of 31, he became the owner

and operator of the family's business.

During the last 38 years as a merchant he participated in the activities of the city. He was a member and past president of the Kiwanis Club, and a member of the Lions Club. He served on the Board of Directors of Haskell National Bank, and on the Haskell County Library Board. He was a member of the First United Methodist Church, where he served in many capacities, including that of treasurer at the time of his death.

Raja is survived by his mother, Fadwa Hassen of Haskell; one sister, Nabeela, and her husband Edward David of Roswell, New Mexico; one niece, Camille David of Dallas, and one nephew, Edward Nabeel David of Roswell.

Raja Hassen will be remembered as a kind and gracious man in every aspect of his life, and who was a devoted, caring, sacrificing son to his aging mother. He will be missed.

## Sailplane contest set October 16-17 at Haskell model airport

A radio controlled sailplane contest will be held Sat. and Sun., Oct. 16 and 17 at the Haskell Model Airport. The airport is located 3 miles east of Haskell at the old landfill site. This contest will also give some lucky spectator a chance to own a sailplane and try this exciting hobby. Spectators may sign up either day for a drawing to be held at 3:30 p. m. Sun. The winner will receive a complete ready to fly sailplane with radio installed. There is nothing to buy and the club will help you learn to fly. You do not have to be present to win.

The contest will be a timed flight with precision landings. A class for sportsman and expert pilots will be available. Two meter wingspan planes will compete on Sat. and unlimited planes will compete on Sun. Flying begins at 10 a. m. on Sat. and 9 a. m. on Sun. Prizes will be awarded

through 3 places in each class and skill level. A Grand Champion will be awarded in each level.

Sailplaning is one of the purest forms of flight. No motor is needed to operate. Launching is accomplished by either an electric winch, by a high start (made up of string and rubber tubing) or by running and pulling the plane into the air. Planes are launched 300-500 feet high and then a search is started for thermals, those rising columns of warm air. Gliders may stay aloft for a few minutes or up to several hours depending on the air and the skill of the pilot. One of the greatest thrills of sailplaning is to have soaring birds join you in a thermal you have found. Contests may be held for duration, speed, distance, or goal and return. Usually a spot landing will conclude each flight. World championships are held every two years for these events.

## State-ranked Hornets hand Indians first loss

The state-ranked Aspermont Hornets used a power football attack on the Haskell Indians Friday night, before a packed-house homecoming crowd in Aspermont, to knock Haskell from the undefeated ranks.

The Indians, 4-0 before the contest, used an 85-yard pass from quarterback Casey Riley to split-end Tyrone Billington to light up the scoreboard first. The pass play came with only 35 seconds left in the 1st period of play. James Isbell booted the point after TD to put the Hornets behind, 7-0.

### Paint Creek Pirates defeated by Westbrook

The Paint Creek Pirates lost their six-man football game with Westbrook, 46-0.

Going into the season, Paint Creek's last year's record was 2-8 (1-3). The last district championship for the school was in 1993. The last playoff appearance was in 1995.

Greg Priddy is in his second year as head coach at Paint Creek. His assistant coach is Joey McCord.

Returning all-district player this year is Sean Dancer, Center (second team).

Behind the skillful running of Zac Hunter, the Hornets crossed the goal line with 6:27 showing in the 2nd quarter. The point after TD kicked by Brent Medder, knotted the game 7-7.

In this hard hitting contest, it seemed that the team with the ball and momentum would come out on top. Aspermont took both the lead and the momentum into the locker room at the half. With only 24 seconds to play in the 1st half, Hunter's nine-yard run put the Hornets ahead. The try for point after TD failed. Half-time score was Haskell 7, Aspermont 13.

The second half again proved to be a hard-hitting contest. After a scoreless 3rd quarter, the Hornets scored on a 21-yard run by Bubba Ellison. Medder again kicked the point after TD. This final Hornet score came with 6:41 left to go in the game.

Haskell had two passes intercepted to make the game's only turnovers. The contest was almost error free.

Haskell's quarterback Casey Riley passed the 121 yards for the evening, but the strong defense of the Hornets limited the Indian rushing attack.

The Haskell Indians will have an open date this Friday, before beginning District 9-2A play against the strong Olney Cubs at Indian Field, Oct. 8. Kick-off time for that game, and all District games, is 7:30.

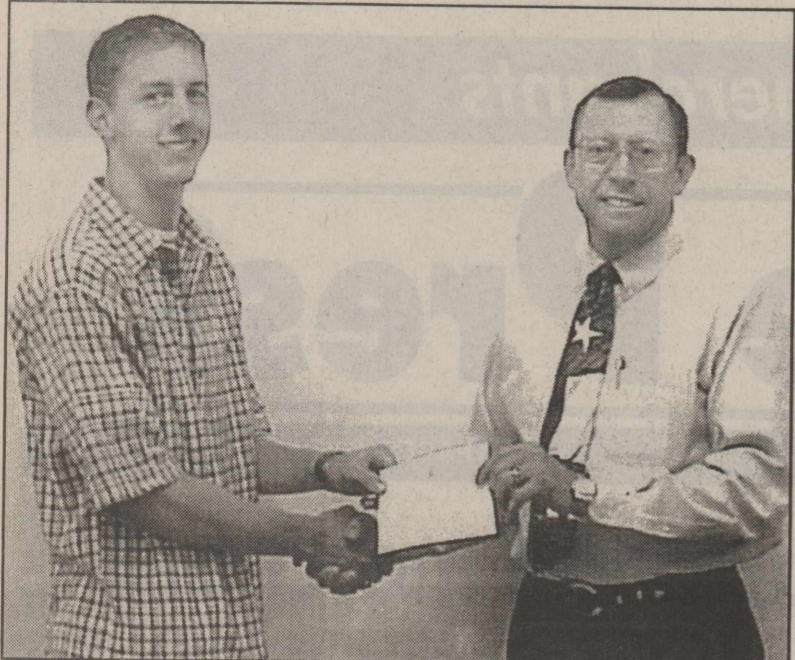

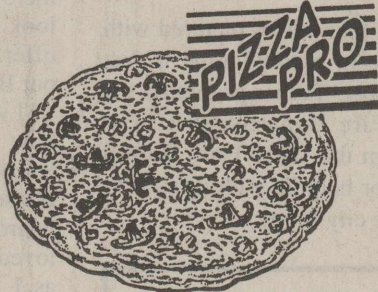

## Children need proper-fitting shoes

Finding kids' shoes that look and feel good can be a challenge.

"Parents may not realize that improperly fitted shoes worn in childhood can contribute to or exacerbate adult foot problems," said Dr. William Phillips, chief of orthopaedic surgery at Texas Children's Hospital in Houston.

Make sure your child's foot is measured regularly. When trying shoes, have your child wear appropriate socks and ask him or her to walk with both shoes on. Select shoes that accommodate the shape of your child's foot and provide adequate toe room. Look for shoes that are lightweight and flexible with non-skid soles. Leather or canvas uppers are good choices because they allow your child's foot to breathe.

At the FHA's national business meeting on July 6, members from across the country voted to change their 54-year old traditional name to one which will resonate with today's-tomorrow's-teens: Family, Career and Community Leaders of America.

Texas FCCLA State adviser Sharron Pierce says what was an appropriate name in 1945, when the group's main function was preparing young women to be homemakers, could not hold up against the sweeping social changes of the past five decades. As the time changed, so did the organization. In recent years, more males have become involved in and interested in the organization. Driven by real-world needs and the reality of male and female roles in society, FHA's programs now include areas such as financial management, career, leadership development and community service.

"Because our name had become outdated, we found it much harder to tell other kids what our organization is really about—building leadership skills and addressing important personal, family, work and societal issues," said Pierce. "We hope the new name will help teens get past the 'homemaker' stigma and into the details of how much work we do with the issues young people really care about, like school violence, family relations and career preparation."

Current projects being pursued by FCCLA chapters statewide include Families First, Families Acting for Community Traffic Safety and Community Service projects.

"The reality is that this student-

run organization has always dealt with the serious issues facing teens. In the 1950's it was civil defense emergency preparedness, in the 1960's it was school dropouts and from the 1970's to the present, we've tackled everything from substance abuse, nutrition, changing roles of men and women, teen pregnancy, parenting, the special needs to elderly and handicapped, to school violence," says Pierce. "We believe that our programs evolve so successfully that they'll be relevant to teens throughout the next millennium."

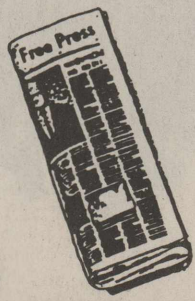

## Old picture brings back memories to Allie Belle Smith

An old Kodak picture brought to Allie Belle Smith of Haskell last week, brought back her vivid memories of the day it was snapped over sixty years ago.

Recently, Allene Denson, who worked at Lockheed Martin in Arlington with Allie Belle's son Bob Smith, was visiting in Mineola and while browsing at a

garage sale there, found the old snapshot and bought it for 25 cents.

After reading on the back that it was made in Haskell, she called Bob and Darlene Smith to tell them she wanted his mother in Haskell to have it. Last week the couple came to visit her and brought it with them.

Carefully written on the back of the faded picture of a twister threading down from overhead storm clouds, was the information that it was taken by Mary Fay and Jack Ratliff of Haskell, Sunday, May 7, 1939 at 1:30 p.m. and that it had destroyed one house and damaged property 10 miles away at Rule.

Both Allie Belle and Bob Smith remember the happenings of that day. The family lived a mile west of Haskell. Mary Fay and Jack Ratliff were their close neighbors. During that afternoon they were all in and out of their storm cellar watching the storm which eventually came close, just across the road from them. They remember several cars from Haskell turning in off the highway at their place and the people getting out to join them in their cellar.

After the tornado subsided, they all drove to Rule to survey the damage. Allie Belle remembers the strange sight of chickens running around completely plucked of feathers by the twister.

Neither Allene Denson, who happened on the old picture, nor the Smiths, who remember the day and the place it was taken, have any sort of clue as to how it may have found its way to a garage sale in Mineola. The unlikely chances of it ever getting back from there to where it started would seem awfully slim.

But the fact that it did may point out again, that old memories and old images of the past never die, they just have to be re-found and make their way back home.

## Emergency Farm Loan applications being accepted

Applications for emergency farm loans for losses caused by extreme fire hazards that occurred on Aug. 1, 1999 and continuing are being accepted at the Farm Service Agency (FSA) office located in Haskell, Farm Loan Manager Larry P. McDaniel said recently.

Haskell County is one of 227 counties in Texas recently named by Secretary of Agriculture Dan Glickman eligible for loans to cover part of actual production losses resulting from extreme fire hazards that occurred Aug. 1, 1999 and continuing.

McDaniel said farmers may be eligible for loans of up to 80 percent of their actual losses or the operating loan needed to continue in business or \$500,000, whichever is less. For farmers unable to obtain credit from private commercial lenders, the interest rate is 3.75 percent.

"As a general rule, a farmer must have suffered at least a 30 percent loss of production to be eligible for an FSA emergency loan," McDaniel said. Farmers participating in the Federal Crop Insurance program will have to figure in proceeds from those

programs in determining their loss.

"Applications for loans under this emergency designation will be accepted until May 1, 2000, but farmers should apply as soon as possible. Delays in applying could create backlogs in processing and possibly over into the new farming season," McDaniel said.

FSA is a credit agency of the U. S. Department of Agriculture. It is authorized to provide disaster emergency loans to recognized farmers who work at the rely on farming for a substantial part of their living. Eligibility is extended to individual farmers who are U. S. citizens and to farming partnerships, corporations or

cooperatives in which U. S. citizens hold a majority interest.
