## McKinney's hobby is 'for the birds'

Anyway you look at it, Bobby McKinney's hobby is "for the birds," and it all started with an idea he literally "dreamed up" one night this past July.

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During the few months since that night, the ideas keep on coming, and he has turned his natural creative talent and previous training as a tool and die maker/designer into a craft that is about to "take off flying" via the Internet, as M&C Craft.

Together with his son-in-law, Ryan Clayton of Stamford, who cuts the wood and helps assemble McKinney's creations, they now have over forty on hand. On the Internet, they will offer only three designs in three price ranges. For selling locally, there will be no limit to the designs available, which sell for \$28.00 for the smaller one, \$59.00 for the larger, and \$150.00 for the complete

18X18 inch "Featherville" town.

In his home workshop, using whatever pieces of wood he finds; some at hand, some acquired in other ways, he designs and puts together the decorative little bird abodes, each one complete with intricate details. He fashions each one with a theme; a church, school, library, bank, store or special holiday. Adding many related accessories, such as tiny cars, trucks, wreckers, buses or mail

trucks, he creates an imaginative scene with miniature birds doing human things (even having a tea party on an upstairs balcony).

A Haskell native, McKinney worked in Los Angeles as a machinist and tool and die maker from 1953 to 1979. He attributes his creative ability to the skills he developed there. One of his achievements was the designing of tooling to form the three and one half inch thick windshields for the 747 Boeing and other aircraft. In 1971 he designed an air conditioning unit for Mazda, which everyone in the industry was using by 1973, he said.

After working in the plastics industry and breathing the industrial and aviation smog, he developed lung problems. Subsequently, he and his wife, Laurie, decided to retire and return to Haskell.

"In the clean, fresh air here, I got well," he said.

From 1979 to 1989 the couple operated the Haskell Steak House. At the present time he is the Assistant Manager of Allsups. Laurie McKinney is a nurses aide. They have two daughters and a son, twelve grandchildren and one great-



Bobby McKinney's "town" creations are fascinating, even inspiring one Abilene woman to comment, "I could sit and look at this for hours."



#### HIGHLIGHTS

AUSTIN — State Education Commissioner Jim Nelson last week told publishers they may have to rewrite first-grade textbooks to incorporate more phonics only a month before the books are set for approval.

The textbook publishers already have spent more than \$100 million developing the books and were concerned the State Board of Education may not approve them at the textbook-adoption hearing next month, The Dallas Morning News reported.

With backing from Gov. George W. Bush, the board members developed new curriculum standards two years ago requiring phonics to be used when teaching students to read.

State education officials told the publishers several months ago that a majority of the words in first-grade readers had to be phonics-based to meet requirements, The News reported. The publishers contend they met all state guidelines.

At least one board member opposes the "majority" rule and plans to propose an 80-percent standard. The News reported the board's six conservative members are expected to support the change.

**AG Seizes Illegal Slots** 

Attorney General John Cornyn last week announced the seizure of 73 eight-liner Las Vegas-style gambling machines and more than \$190,000 in illegal wagers and prizes in Collin County.

After an investigation, the machines and money were seized at Lucky Dog Game Rooms in Wylie and in Princeton and from the owners' bank accounts.

"The operation of eight-liner slot machines violates the law," Cornyn said.

"My office will work closely with local law enforcement to vigorously investigate and prosecute those who violate the law."

The owner of the businesses, James Hester, the owner of the "eight-liners," Michael Willis, and seven other persons were arrested for charges ranging from engaging in organized crime to promoting gambling to possessing gambling paraphernalia.

Search warrants also were served for the seizure of funds in their business accounts at Security Bank in Garland and at NationsBank in Plano. Seized accounts held \$155,000 in earnings from the operation of the eight-liners.

**AG Announces Settlement** 

Attorney General Cornyn last week announced a \$7.6 million settlement with Walgreen Co., the Illinois-based pharmacy chain.

Walgreen agreed to pay 25 state Medicaid programs and Puerto Rico to settle allegations the company submitted false claims to federal and state health-care programs from June 1986 to September

As part of the settlement, Walgreen agreed to modify its pharmacy billing operations to ensure compliance.

Texas' Medicare program stands to recover about \$700,000

from the settlement. **Grants Aid Welfare-To-Work** 

Gov. Bush on Oct. 12 awarded the first of five "Innovation Grants" awarded to communityand faith-based organizations to assist people in getting off welfare and into employment.

The grants include stipulations that the grantees may not push religious beliefs, but all five went to faith-based organizations, raising concerns among some groups that the separation of church and state is becoming more and more blurred, the Austin American-Statesman reported.

Bush mentioned the grants during a stop at a South Austin church where he talked about how God and government can work together, the American-Statesman reported.

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## From The Inside Out

Have you ever considered the idea that volunteering at the Haskell Experienced Citizens Center or playing cards or dominos with friends may be good for your health?

Studies have shown that social interaction is a critical part of the mental and physical well-being of senior citizens.

Dr. Robert Luchi of the Huffington Center on Aging at Baylor College of Medicine in Houston says that, "The death of a spouse or life-long friends, the loss of a job, or a serious illness can make it difficult for some older people to maintain social contacts." He added that, "Activities such as volunteering, card playing and eating at a senior activity center are good avenues for social

According to the Adult Protective Services, such support groups are effective because they provide the opportunity for sharing experiences, mutual support, and problem solving.

When we grow older we often have a tendency to stay to ourselves, and turn inward in our activity and in our outlook on life.

This is a common practice for older people. Sometimes this tendency gões as far as causing us to back away in isolation rather than make the effort to interact with others. As comfortable as this may seem to us at the time, it can escalate to the point of being be a detriment to our health.

Isolation is defined as the lack of participating in activities that require contact with people, and according to the Texas Department of Protective and Regulatory Services, this problem applies to people regardless of their education, income, ethnicity, or geographic location. Taken to an advanced stage, isolation can result in selfneglect mentally and physically.

A lack of social interaction can also lower an older person's selfesteem, and, in some cases even cause severe depression. Older people often hide their depression from themselves and others by packaging the problem in a physical complaint, so diagnosis

However, depression in the older person should not be considered a normal part of aging, according to Dr. Victor Molinari, a Baylor

College of Medicine psychologist and director of geropsychology at the Houston Veterans' Affairs Medical Center. "Some groups are at higher risk, but the average older person is not depressed any more than a young person," he said.

Dr. Molinari said the two personality types of any age who are at higher risk of becoming depressed, are the obsessive compulsive persons bothered by their lack of control over changes related to aging, and dependent persons who lose the loved ones they rely one. That description would aptly fit a lot of seniors.

Experts encourage older persons to prevent depression by staying active and being connected to other people through family, community activities, seniors groups or church.

Like the candles we add to our cakes, the years we add to our lives should make things brighter

In Haskell there are many such opportunities for enjoyable, stimulating mental and physical activities for older people. When exercised on a regular basis, these activities might even "doeth good, like a medicine," and help make things brighter for us.


