City announces election, new business location

At the regular 7:00 a.m. meeting of the Haskell City Council, Feb. 14, Mayor Ken Lane signed the order of election, and an election resolution was approved.

A discussion was held about the Alpha Project, which is part of the Haskell Economic Development Corporation's effort to attract new business to the city. Alpha Project is the name given to TORCO, which manufactures torque converters. The building for TORCO will be erected on seven acres on North First, West Hwy 380, which the Council approved as

a commercial zone. TORCO is expected to bring 30 to 40 new jobs to the city. It was announced that Jacob and Martin of Abilene will engineer the building which was designed by WTU. Monty Montgomery, director of the EDC will coordinate the project. The Texas Capital Fund assists cities in such projects in the form of grants.

In further action: The Council approved the rezoning of property at 701 North 1st Street for a new USDA building.

The purchase of GTE's smaller services by Valor Communications was discussed. Continued negotiations will be made to effect a better deal from Valor for the city for Telephone One lines.

A Garage Sale Ordinance was passed permitting citizens to hold three garage sales per calendar year for two days each. The needed permit will have to be obtained from City Hall, with the first permit being free, and the following ones at a cost of \$1.00 each.

The bid for property located at 105 North 4th was approved.

After lengthy discussion regarding the future location of a Pavilion for the purpose of City functions and private rentals, it was decided that it would be located in the Fair ground area, with the exact location yet to be determined. Bids will be open for the construction of the pavilion.

Bids will also be taken for the construction of more bathrooms, heat and showers at the R. V. Park.

City Attorney, Shane Hadaway, reported several letters had been sent regarding the city's Unsafe Building Ordinance.

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Responsibilities of the District Attorney

My name is Andrew Ottaway. I previously announced my candidacy for the office of District Attorney of the 39th Judicial District, which covers Kent, Stonewall, Haskell and Throckmorton Counties.

Here are answers to questions I have been asked during the campaign.

No, I will not lie to you. Sometimes I will tell you things you do not want to hear, but I will not lie to you.

No, all is not well in the 39th Judicial District of Texas. There is too much dope being bought and sold and too many crimes being committed against the family.

No, it will not matter what color your skin is, or how good a football player you are, or who your family is. All persons who commit similar crimes will be treated similarly.

No, the first offense does not automatically get you one free shot at probation. If you sell drugs, you have two choices: the penitentiary or a jury trial. If you go into someone's house and commit a crime, you have the same two choices.

Yes, there can be serious problems with delay in handling cases, and some cases can be neglected or ignored. Prosecuting cases means pushing the cases to Grand Jury, then pushing the cases to arraignment and pretrial, and then pushing the cases to trial. I have done defense work for a long time. Delay is a win for the Defendant. Every day not in jail, or not in prison, or not having to pay financially is a good day for the Defendant.

There can be problems with cooperation with other State Agencies. The District Attorney must be involved with the work of the Attorney General's office, the Child Protective Service, DPS Narcotics, and the District Attorney in each neighboring District. The District Attorney must be aware of what they are doing in your District.

Delay has another cost to the taxpayers. If the Defendant is in jail, the county must feed him and guard him, or pay one of the other count-

ties to do it. I have seen people sit in jail in this district month after month with no court date even scheduled. Two years ago, the District Judge adopted guidelines to stop this but the guidelines have been ignored.

Yes, the "small" cases are sometimes more important than the "big" cases. For instance, I believe that the root cause of crime is the breakdown of the family structure. The Bible says, in James 1:27, that pure religion is to care for the widows and the fatherless. Most crime is committed by the fatherless. The modern widow is a single mom trying to raise children alone. A critical "small" crime that must be addressed is criminal non-support. I believe that if you have a pack of cigarettes in your pocket, or a six-pack of beer in your car, and you owe one nickel in back child support, you have committed the felony offense of criminal non-support. These "small" cases are very important to the "small" victims, who are children going without things they need.

Currently, all juvenile crime is handled by the county attorney in each county. This should be changed. The District Attorney should handle juvenile offenses at the felony level, and the county attorney in each county should continue to handle misdemeanor level offenses, just like in the adult system. In Haskell County, juvenile cases are neglected for months and months. Delay in a crime involving a child is even more critical than delay involving an adult—children who commit crimes need intervention by the State immediately.

The way you treat a Defendant after conviction is very important to the success of prosecution. Attitude is the key to rehabilitation. Defendants should be treated with respect, but firmness. You cannot excuse repeated violations of probation if the Defendant will just pay his fine. You must back up the probation department, or they lose their effectiveness. There should be zero tolerance for repeat offenders, or your message is lost.

School Board extends contracts, announces election

During the Feb. 16 meeting of the Haskell CISD Board, contracts were extended for administrators Eddie Bland, assistant superintendent; Bryan McCulloch,

secondary principal; Jim Lisle, elementary principal; Don Flippin, athletic director and Melynn Hunt, assistant athletic director.

To offset the over-staffing situation which has resulted from declining student population, the board voted to offer a one time only voluntary retirement incentive of \$10,000.00 to teachers who meet the eligibility criteria.

The board also decided to allow a bus barn to be built north of the football field on the vacant lot owned by the school district. Under a grant obtained from the Workforce Investment Act, the project will be used to train out of school youth in marketable skills.

Budget items passed by the board included amendments for state technology and accelerated reading

money. As requested by the Haskell County Appraisal District, approval was given by the board to the proposed resale of property acquired through delinquent property tax foreclosure.

The year's school board election was called, with sign-up dates for filing for the open positions set for Feb. 21 to Mar. 22. Members whose terms expire are Roger Moeller (Place 1); Mike Jordan (Place 2); Tom Hairgrove (Place 7); and Joe Yates (Place 4). All of the terms are for three years except Moeller's, which is for one year.

Student recognition at the meeting included elementary accelerated readers, Haskell County Stock Show winners and members of the football academic all-state team.

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Commissioner's Court meets

At the Haskell County Commissioner's Court meeting, Feb. 14, Haskell City Manager Sam Watson asked the Commissioner's opinion regarding the location of the proposed Pavilion to be built at the Fair grounds, and for any assistance they might give on the grounds.

In other business considered by the Court it was decided that:

The roof and ceiling of the Experienced Citizen's Center will be repaired.

Landscaping of grounds at the Sheriff's office will be improved. The possibility was discussed of drilling a well there so that the grounds may be maintained without city water.

A sewage problem at the Courthouse will be investigated.

Precinct 4 will advertise for bids on the sale of a Caterpillar dozer. A list of other equipment owned by the county is to be made for sale Mar. 13.

Consideration was given to the investment in equipment to provide better communication between county equipment operators.

County Clerk, Rhonda Moeller, clarified a State law which regulates the use of records belonging to a county. Records may not be removed from the room in which they are located, and there is a fee of \$1.00 per sheet for copies.

County Judge David Davis, and City Manager Sam Watson, will investigate a sewage problem at the city park.

The Courthouse will remain open on Election Day, Tues., Mar. 14.

Commissioner Kenny Thompson suggested a policy be set regarding the number and times of County holidays, after input is received from Court employees.

Workman's Comp for volunteer firemen will be further investigated.

A definite policy will be set on the collection of rentals from lake cabins

The county will join the Resource Conservation and Development Association.

Sales of two properties by the Appraisal office was approved.

An extensive discussion was made regarding expectations for the maintenance of Anchor Lake property. No new action was taken.

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Progressive Study Club honors long-time members

The Progressive Study Club of Haskell, a member of the Texas Federation of Women's Club's (TFWC) since 1945, met Thurs., Feb. 10 for a program on Federation, and to honor long-time club members.

To open the meeting, Ruby Smith and Anita Herren led the pledge to the American and Texas flags.

Club member Erma Liles, who has been a member of the TFWC for sixty-four years, was introduced by Nancy Toliver, first vice-president of TFWC Mesquite District.

A native of Weinert, Liles graduated from Haskell High School and West Texas State Teachers College. She also attended Southwestern Texas University in San Marcos and the Southwest Seminary in Fort Worth. A member of Delta Kappa Gamma, she taught school in Weinert for nineteen years, and played piano and organ for church for fifty years. As a member of Federation, she has traveled extensively, including trips to numerous State Conventions and three National Conventions of the General Federation of Women's Clubs. In 1964-65 she was elected president of the TFWC Mesquite District.

Displaying several mementos of her years in Federation, Liles said that the Texas club headquarters building in Austin is the largest state club headquarters in the United States. With Texas having the only state federation with a State Department in the General Federation of Women's Clubs, Liles said Federation is networking at its best-- local, district, state and national.

As a member of the General Federation of Women's Clubs, the TFWC studies the arts, conservation, education, home life, health, international and public affairs, safety and Texas heritage. Liles said some of the accomplishments of the Texas Federation are the giving each year of eight scholarships; maintaining the Headquarters Building in Austin, including the TFWC Women's Library housed there as an authorized library of books written by/and/or about Texas women; preserving historical sites such as the Alamo and Sam Houston's home in Huntsville; and establishing the Texas Federation's Centennial Committee, of which Liles is a member. She told of how, early on, the TFWC also organized Mother's Clubs (forerunner of the PTAs), Texas Federation of Music Clubs, Texas Garden Clubs, and Home Demonstration Clubs.

Liles said Federation is a way of learning from experienced leaders, working together on civic projects, sharing, caring about fellow club women, catching the vision and spirit of a century of tradition, being part of a special group with a distinctive character, and being identified with the largest service organization in the world.
