

Gold shovels unearth joint prison pro

by Mary Kaigler Gathered at the intersection of County Roads 208 and 206, Tues., Dec. 5, area leaders turned shovels of soil among the stubble of the last cotton crop the field located northeast of town will ever yield.

It was the symbolic beginning of construction on the project which is expected to give a strong boost to the economic and population growth of the city and surrounding area. Among those wielding the

"gold" shovels were members of the Haskell City Council, Haskell County Commissioners, Economic Development Corporation (EDC) of Haskell, along with Mayor Ken Lane, County Judge David Davis, EDC president, Randy Hise and

EDC director, Monty Montgomery.

They were joined at the site by over a hundred Haskell County citizens, who stood in the biting, cold wind to witness the formal ground-breaking ceremonies for the

Rolling Plains Regional Detention Center. It was a long-awaited occasion. One that had taken time and effort on the part of many.

The idea of obtaining such a facility for Haskell began almost four years ago as local leaders searched for ways to bolster the waning farming-based economy and the resulting loss of population. In a joint venture of the County and City, plans and hopes for the project grew despite some objections and fears raised as to its validity for success, without the raising of property taxes.

Now, after three years of systematic efforts to prepare the way by working through the problems of successfully presenting the project to the public and negotiating with the Management and Training Corporation, which will operate it, the jail facility project is underway. In his remarks about the

venture, Mayor Lane said, "This is not something you see very often; a city and county working together." He added that he couldn't recall anyone turning him down when asked to do something in connection with the jail project.

"I think public education was the answer," Lane said of the opposition movement that was mounted before a county-wide vote approved the \$10.3 million bond issue. About \$5 million of the prison's cost will be funded by private investments in revenue bonds.

The 90,000 square-foot Detention Center is planned to house up to 48 county and area inmates and 500 federal and state

prisoners. The Management and Training Corporation manages 13 other facilities housing 10,000 beds in seven states and Australia.

Construction on the prison is expected to take about a year. J. C. Conner, vice-president of regional operations of Management and Training Corp. said Tuesday that his only question about the prison is how long it will be before we need to expand it.

The new local prison is expected to bring 125 new jobs, generating a \$3 million annual payroll for the area. "Maybe this will stop the bleeding," State Representative David Counts said of the decline in population and jobs the area has experienced during the last ten years.

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

Suzanne Starr speaks to local students about tobacco use

Did you realize that over 1,000 people in the United States die each day from tobacco related illnesses? Did you realize one dip of snuff has up to 4 times the amount of nicotine as one cigarette? Did you realize the tobacco industry spends 13.6 million dollars daily in advertising? These were some of the questions asked by Suzanne Starr from Hendrick Cancer Center of Abilene as she spoke Tues., Nov. 28, to fifth and sixth grade students at Haskell Elementary.

Starr not only gave students much information about the different kinds of tobacco products, but also showed slides and videos about the effects of tobacco use.

According to the American Cancer Society, cigarette smoke contains several toxic chemicals including carbon monoxide, hydrogen cyanide and formaldehyde. Cigarettes kill more Americans than AIDS, alcohol, car accidents, fires, illegal drugs, murders and suicides combined.

Students watched a video about Sean Marsee who excelled in track at an Oklahoma high school. At the age of 12, he started using spit tobacco. By the time he was 18, Sean was diagnosed with tongue cancer and died of oral cancer at age 19. Research now shows that spit tobacco users also have a nine

times greater risk of developing gum disease than nonusers.

Fifth grade student Meredith Harvey said that this really made her think about the consequences of using all kinds of tobacco and Ashley Belcher state that Starr pointed out that advertising by the tobacco companies and movies never show us what could really happen to tobacco users. Advertisements try to make smoking look cool and it really isn't, D. J. Rodriquez added.

Students were given much to think about and consider before making decisions about tobacco, tobacco use and its possible effects.

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

AUSTIN--Still not knowing a month after the elections whether Texas will get a new governor and lieutenant governor, not much is going on in the halls of state government other than the hiring of staff, monitoring prefiled bills and following the daily news from Florida. 

Ask the AG By John Cornyn, Attorney General

Q: Lately I have been receiving a lot of phone calls asking me to donate to charity. I want to make sure mydonation really helps people. Is there a way to ensure my donation will be used wisely?

A: One of my prime goals as Attorney General is to protect Texas consumers from fraud. The Consumer Protection Division of my office receives many letters each year from consumers who want to make sure their donations will be used for charitable purposes.

While the majority of charities are legitimate organizations that do a great deal to help others, there are some criminals who prey on Texans' generosity. Before donating to a charity, ask the following questions.

Who wants the money? If you are not familiar with the name of the organization, get the full name and address and check it out with your local Better Business Bureau. Some questionable organizations use names that are similar to wellknown national organizations. How is the money used? Ask the fundraiser to send you an accounting or financial statement that lists how donations are used as well as information on programs and services that are funded. A respectable organization will be able and happy to oblige. Is the caller a professional fundraiser? It is not illegal for an organization to use professional fundraisers. However, if a large percentage of donations are used for administrative and staff costs, not as much money actually goes to helping people.

name. Respectable charities will welcome your questions about how donations are used.

Never give your credit card, bank account, or social security numbers to a fundraiser who has called you. Ask to have donation information mailed to you. If the caller refuses, or offers to send a courier to pick up your donation, refuse. These are sure signs of a scam.

A few moments of research can ensure that your generosity is used to help those who truly need it.

Q: I am thinking of donating my home to my church, which would then raffle it off to raise money. Are there special guidelines that we need to follow?

A: The Charitable Raffle Enabling Act sets out all of the guidelines for qualified organizations to conduct raffles in Texas. The Act is contained in Chapter 2002 of the Texas Occupations Code.
