# June tax receipts show increase

Texas Comptroller Carole Keeton Rylander recently delivered \$306.4 million in monthly sales tax payments to Texas cities, counties, transit departments and special purpose taxing districts. Sales tax allocations to local governments are up 4.1 percent compared to June 2001. So far this year, local sales tax allocations are down 0.9 percent compared to the first six months of 2001.

June sales tax rebates include local sales taxes collected in April and reported to the Comptroller in May. The state's share of sales tax collected during this period was \$1.2 billion, down 6.8 percent compared to a year ago.

Comptroller Rylander sent sales tax rebates of \$203.2 million to 1,114 Texas cities, up 3.4 percent compared to June 2001. Year-to-date, city sales tax rebates are down 0.8 percent compared to 2001.

Sales tax rebates of \$18.4 million went to 120 Texas counties, up 10.7 percent compared to one year ago.

# Farm Bill to help identify product's country of origin

By Lou Gilly Haskell Co. Extension Agent The 2002 Farm Bill will give consumers a better idea of where their food came from. A "country of origin" label will now be placed on all meats, fish, and vegetables.

A product will be labeled as "produced in the U.S." if it was born, fed, and slaughtered in the U.S. Yet, growing numbers of U.S. producers are bringing in cattle from Mexico or pigs from Canada, so it will be difficult to identify some meat products. This process requires the Secretary of Agriculture to issue regulations to run a voluntary country of origin labeling program for two years. Then, in September 2004, it will be mandatory.

Secretary of Agriculture Ann Veneman says the labels will administer the provisions of the law that Congress has asked to administer.



# PUBLIC NOTICE OF APPLICATION TO ESTABLISH RATES

Pursuant to Section 104.103 of the Texas Utilities Code, TXU Lone Star Pipeline (TXU LSP), a division of TXU Gas Company, hereby gives notice of intent to establish a supplemental rate identified as the "Integrity and Safety Assessment" (ISA) to track and recover costs of implementing its Pipeline Integrity Assessment and Management Plan and costs of system modification required by class location changes. The Pipeline Integrity Assessment and Management Plan is required by the Railroad Commission of Texas (Commission) pursuant to its Pipeline Safety Regulations, Rule § 8.101, while class location changes are necessary to comply with the Federal Minimum Pipeline Safety Regulations, 49 C.F.R. § 192, adopted by the Commission.

The proposed initial rate for the ISA is 2.05 cents per MMBtu, and is proposed to take effect as of July 1, 2002. The rate will be adjusted each year to reflect the change in costs necessitated by the pipeline safety regulations, with an opportunity for those costs to be reviewed by the Commission. The ISA will remain in effect for ten years from its initial effective date. The ISA constitutes a major change as that term is defined in Sec. 104.101, Texas Utilities Code. The proposed rate will increase the total revenues of TXU LSP by 3.7%, representing \$4.1 million of additional revenues.

The ISA will apply to the following classes of customers: 1) TXU LSP's customers with gas consuming equipment at an end-use location physically attached to TXU LSP's pipeline system or to the system of a local distribution company physically attached to TXU LSP's pipeline system; 2) entities selling gas to such customers; and 3) local distribution companies served by TXU LSP's pipeline system. The ISA will indirectly affect all residential and commercial customers served by such local distribution customers, including TXU Gas Distribution. At the proposed initial rate of 2.05 cents per MMBtu, the bill of an average residential customer (6 mcf of gas consumption per month) will increase approximately 12 cents per month.

A Statement of Intent to implement the ISA has been filed with the Commission in GUD Docket No. 9304 and is available for inspection at the Commission's office at 1701 North Congress, Austin, Texas, and at the offices of TXU LSP at 301 South Harwood, Dallas, Texas. Any affected person may file written comments or a protest concerning the proposed changes in the rates with the Docket Services Section of the Office of General Counsel, Railroad Commission of Texas, P.O. Box 12967, Austin, Texas 78711-2967, at any time on or before July 26, 2002. Any person or agency that has a justiciable or administratively cognizable interest in this proceeding who desires to be designated as a party may petition for leave to intervene and request to become a party to this proceeding. The deadline for intervention in this case shall be July 26, 2002.



AUSTIN — Poll is a simple four-letter word, but in politics it is both a verb and a noun.

During the campaign season, poll is short for opinion poll, the product of the verb to poll, a scientific (in most cases) measurement of how people think or how they intend to vote. Political campaigns are both fueled and guided says, could generate some \$1.5 by polling results.

Then, on election day, poll transforms into a noun as people go to the polls to cast their ballots. In a way, the public is still being polled in this process, but at this stage, the results are for real. Someone is either going to win office, lose or make it to a runoff.

The cycle continues if they get elected, with new polling telling them what voters think of the way they are doing their jobs.

Here's the polling picture these days:

Incumbent Gov. Rick Perry leads his Democrat challenger, Tony Sanchez, by 20 percent in the Texas Poll. But Perry's numbers have dropped since March, and the undecided category has grown to 25 percent.

Republican Land Commissioner David Dewhurst is ahead of former Comptroller John Sharp, the Democratic contender in the lieutenant governor's race, but the percentage for either candidate is lower than the approval level of the gubernatorial candidates. The numbers show Dewhurst slightly down since March, and Sharp slightly up. Undecided accounts for more than a third of those polled.

The race shaping up as the proverbial squeaker is the campaign for the U.S. Senate seat being vacated by Sen. Phil Gramm. Republican Attorney General John Cornyn and former Dallas Mayor Ron Kirk, the Democrat, are only five points apart, with Cornyn ahead. But

person-to-person, animal-to-person or animal-to-animal transmission of WNV. "We consider humans and equids to be 'dead-end' hosts, because they can become ill but haven't been shown to spread infection.

"Late last summer, infected birds were detected in Louisiana and Arkansas," said Dr. Conger. "Now with the confirmation of infected birds in our state, the Texas Department of Health will probably find infected mosquitoes through their surveillance activities.

"Vaccines are available to protect horses, mules and donkeys against WNV and other 'sleeping sicknesses,' but the shots are no value if they aren't given prior to disease exposure," said Dr. Conger. "We are running out of time before we may see disease transmission, so get your equids vaccinated now. The vaccines require two doses, administered three to six weeks apart, and full protection doesn't develop until four to six weeks after the second dose. Realistically, then, it can take 7 to 12 weeks for the horse to develop maximum resistance to infection. That's why it's so important to start the round of vaccinations now." Dr. Conger reminded equid owners that an annual booster is required for continued protection of the animals. "If your horse or other equid has signs of illness, such as staggering or an inability to rise, call your veterinarian immediately. It also is extremely important to rule out other causes of sickness with similar signs, such as rabies," asserted Dr. Conger. "If it is WNV, appropriate care must be provided quickly. Historically, about 20 percent of infected equids either died or had to be euthanized due to their illness."

birdbaths and troughs and maintain optimal chlorination in swimming pools. Drain any flowerpots or other containers that hold stagnant water and keep roof gutters clean. Control puddles that collect around stables."

Dr. Conger commended the TDH on its WNV disease surveillance, which includes testing mosquitoes, dead cows, blue jays, hawks and sampling zoo birds. He said "freshly" dead crows, blue jays or hawks can be submitted for laboratory examination, by calling the nearest regional Texas Department of Health office or the Texas Department of Helath in Austin at 1-512-458-7255.

"Always wear gloves when handling a dead bird, and wash your hands thoroughly afterward," warned Dr. Conger. "The bird could have had parasites or other illnesses, and

# Livestock owners encouraged to vaccinate animals for WNV

#### **By Brandon Anderson** Haskell Co. Extension Agent

West Nile Virus (WNV), a form of "sleeping sickness," was confirmed June 18 in two dead blue jays found on the northwest side of Houston. Veterinarians at the Texas Animal Health Commission (TAHC), the state's livestock health regulatory agency, are urging owners of horses, mules, donkeys and other equids to ensure that their animals have been vaccinated against not only West Nile Virus (WNV), but also against Eastern and Western Equine Encephalitis (EEE) and (WEE), two common forms of "sleeping sickness."

"The introduction of West Nile Virus into Texas isn't surprising, as we have monitored the south and eastward migration of the disease since it was first detected in North America in New York in 1999. Last year, WNV was reported in 738 equids in 20 states," commented Dr. Terry Conger, TAHC's state veterinary epidemiologist. He explained that staff members from the TAHC and the Texas Department of Health (TDH), which focuses on human health issues, have worked jointly to share laboratory and surveillance information and educational materials about this disease which can be transmitted from infected mosquitoes to humans and equids, causing brain swelling and severe illness. Until 1999, WNV was confined to Africa, Europe, Asia,

According to the Centers for Disease Control (CDC) in Atlanta, Georgia, there have been no documented cases of

precautions are always advisable when handling animals that have died of unknown causes." Dr. Conger reminded livestock owners that, as always, the TAHC operated a 24hour hotline for taking reports of

unusual signs in livestock, including: 1. staggering, falling, or inability to rise

2. illness affecting a large percentage of animals

3. sudden death loss

4. blistering around an animal's lips, teats or hooves

5. unusual ticks or maggots

"We are always on guard, watching for a potential foreign animal disease, so we ask producers and veterinarians to watch for these signs and report them immediately to us at 1-800-550-8242," said Dr. Conger. "Immediate response is our best defense in the case of any dangerous disease.'

# **Jerrie Sue Hise receives** child development credential

Jerrie Sue Hise of Haskell has been awarded a Child Development Associate (CDA) Credential in recognition of outstanding work with young children. The credential was awarded by the Council for Professional Recognition in Washington, D.C., which represents the early childhood profession.

CDA is the only major national effort to improve child care by evaluation and recognizing the skills of individuals providing care. The first credential was awarded 25 years ago, and now 46 states plus the District of Columbia include CDA in their child care licensing regulations.
