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

Water well testing set

If you are a home or land owner with a water well or wells on your property that you use for drinking water either for humans or animals, when was the last time you had the water in your well checked for two common contaminants fecal coliform and nitrate?

If it has been a while since you have had your water tested, the Haskell County Office of Texas Cooperative Extension in cooperation with the Haskell County Extension Program Council Executive Board is sponsoring a water well screening event for area residents Oct. 31 and Nov. 1.

Approved water sample bags and detailed instructions for taking the sample will be supplied. Pick up the number of bags you need from the Haskell County Extension Office, 101 S. Ave. D in Haskell on any of the following dates: Oct. 26-28 or 31. Office hours are Monday through Friday, 8 a.m. until noon and 1 to 5 p.m., closing on Fridays at 4:30 p.m. To pick up a sample bag during the noon hour or after 5 p.m., contact the County Extension Office at 940-864-

2658 or 864-2546 so arrangements can be made for someone to be available to help you.

The water sample(s) must be returned to the Extension Office Monday morning, Oct. 31. Sample(s) cannot be brought in before Oct. 31. The water in the sample bag must be as fresh as possible in order for the test to be accurate.

Results of the tests will be distributed on Tues., Nov. 1, during an educational program beginning at noon at the Haskell National Bank Community Room. Monty Dozier, Extension Water Resources Specialist, will present an educational program on the different types of treatment solutions for contaminated water, especially water with high nitrate concentrations.

This program is open to anyone who is interested. You do not have to have water tested to participate in this program. A chili and bean lunch will be served beginning at 11:30 a.m. For more details on the lunch contact the Extension Office. The program will begin at 12:30 p.m. If you would like to eat lunch, contact the County Extension Office by 5:00 p.m. Oct. 28, at one of the numbers listed above to make a reservation for lunch.



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



Voters to consider 9 state constitutional amendments

AUSTIN-Nine proposed constitutional amendments will be on the Nov. 8 state election ballot, so it's not too early for Texans to start pondering what they are for and what they are against. Here are the propositions, in the order they will appear on the ballot:

• Prop. 1: "The constitutional amendment creating the Texas rail relocation and improvement fund and authorizing grants of money and issuance of obligations for financing the relocation, rehabilitation and expansion of rail facilities."

• Prop. 2: "The constitutional amendment providing that marriage in this state consists only of the union of one man and one woman and prohibiting this state or a political subdivision of this state from creating or recognizing any legal status identical or similar to marriage."

• Prop. 3: "The constitutional amendment clarifying that certain economic development programs do not constitute a debt."

• Prop. 4: "The constitutional amendment authorizing the denial of bail to a criminal defendant who violates a condition of the defendant's release pending trial."

• Prop. 5: "The constitutional amendment allowing the legislature to define rates of interest for commercial loans."

• Prop. 6: "The constitutional amendment to include one additional public member and a constitutional county court judge in the membership of the State Commission on Judicial Conduct."

• Prop. 7: "The constitutional amendment authorizing line-ofcredit advances under a reverse mortgage.'

• Prop. 8: "The constitutional amendment providing for the clearing of land titles by relinquishing and releasing any state claim to sovereign ownership or title to interest in certain land in Upshur County and in Smith County."

• Prop. 9: "The constitutional amendment authorizing the legislature to provide for a six-year term for a board member of a regional mobility authority."

DeLay faces formal charges

Embattled Congressman Tom DeLay formally faced charges of conspiracy and money laundering before a Travis County magistrate Oct. 20, and went through the booking process.

The Sugar Land Republican and former U.S. House majority leader, who has denied all charges against him, posted \$10,000 bond and was released. Immediately after his indictment in September, DeLay resigned as majority leader in accordance with House rules.

DeLay's attorneys on Oct. 20 petitioned the court for a change of venue, arguing that DeLay could not receive a fair trial in the capital city.

DeLay and two associates, John Colyandro of Austin and Jim Ellis of Washington, D.C., face charges stemming from the 2002 state elections, in which campaign funds collected by DeLay's Texans for a Republican Majority political action committee allegedly were transferred to the Washington, D.C.-based PAC, Americans for a Republican Majority. and the funds returned to Texas in the form of donations to seven state House races.

Travis County prosecutor Ronnie Earle convinced two grand juries that DeLay and associates knowingly violated a Texas law that prohibits direct contributions by corporations to political campaigns. The first grand jury indicted DeLay on a charge of conspiracy. A second grand jury nobilled DeLay. A third grand jury indicted DeLay on a charge of moneylaundering, which carries a penalty of up to life in prison.

Travis County State District Judge Bob Perkins, a Democrat who was to preside over DeLay's trial, submitted DeLay's request for a change of venue to a Republican administrative judge

Meanwhile, west Austin State Rep. Todd Baxter will resign his seat effective Nov. 1, citing personal reasons for leaving elected office. Baxter, a two-termer, was one of Republican state representatives who accepted campaign funds in the 2002 election that have been traced to contributions investigated by the grand juries. Baxter's exit will create a vacancy that must be filled by special election.

Whether through hurricane or drought, the state's pecan crop has endured inclement weather this year. About five percent of the crop was affected by Hurricane Rita in East

Older trees were blown completely out of the ground, and

younger trees were bent as much as 40 degrees. The surviving trees lost up to 60 percent of their nuts, and all their leaves.

In the rest of the state, the crop suffered from drought. The hot, dry weather slowed maturity and chuck split and has delayed harvest by two to three weeks.

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
