
Cost of the popular model (WR-100) is \$29.99 of which a \$5 credit other disaster that a county official remains with the department. Also



DA sets April 17 referendum



Eligible voters in the zone should receive an official ballot by mail after March 31. A postage-paid return envelope will be included. Completed ballots must be postmarked on or before April 17 to be counted. Producers who planted cotton in 2005 but do not receive a ballot should contact TDA at 521-463-4879.

In addition to deciding if an eradication program should be continued in the zone, voters will elect a board member to serve on the statewide board of directors for the Texas Boll Weevil Eradication Foundation Inc.

TDA received one nomination for this position before the filing deadline. The name of Woody Anderson of Mitchell County will appear on the ballot as a board nominee. Anderson has farmed cotton since 1974.

Tax reform plan ready for Legislature

AUSTIN-John Sharp has delivered, and soon it will be the Texas Legislature's turn.

On March 29, Gov. Rick Perry praised the bipartisan tax reform plan shepherded by Sharp, the former state comptroller who chaired the 24member Texas Tax Reform Commission appointed by Perry last

The commission held a series of public hearings around the state beginning in January, receiving input from private citizens, businesses and local governmental bodies.

Perry has summoned the Legislature to Austin to convene April 17. Tax reform will be at the top of the agenda.

Sharp's plan boasts a \$6 billion property tax cut, and respreads the pain by initiating a business tax of 1 percent on gross receipts. If adopted by the Legislature as recommended, no business, not even doctors and lawyers, will escape this new form of taxation. And gone will be the current business franchise tax.

Also under the plan, more tax liability will be heaped on smokers. The tax on a pack of cigarettes will increase to \$1.41 from the present rate of 41 cents.

Perry said the plan would make homeownership possible for more Texans by lowering property taxes. generate more revenue for public education, and stimulate job growth.

Already, business groups are signaling support for the Sharp plan. Among them are the newly formed Texas Manufacturers Association and the Texas Builders Association.

The Texas Supreme Court has placed a June 1 deadline on the Legislature to act on tax reform.

Students march on Capitol

Following the example of the halfmillion people who gathered in downtown Los Angeles a few days earlier to protest pending federal immigration legislation, hundreds of Austin-area high school students walked out of classes March 30 and made their way to the state Capitol to stage a peaceful demonstration.

Students marched up to 15 miles to speak in support of amnesty for undocumented immigrants, and of the ways society benefits from their families' presence in Texas.

Sen. Gonzalo Barrientos, D-Austin, met students on the Capitol grounds to tell them he appreciated the reasoning behind their act of civil disobedience. He assured them they had been heard and then asked them to return to school.

Abramoff to serve prison term

A federal court in Miami sentenced Washington, D.C., lobbyist Jack Abramoff to nearly six years in prison for fraud and conspiracy in the purchase of a Florida-based gambling cruise ship line.

Abramoff's dealings with Texas lawmakers are still under investigation.

On March 31, Tony Rudy, a former top aide of U.S. Rep. Tom DeLay, R-Sugar Land, and lobbyist with "Team Abramoff," pleaded guilty to an Abramoff-related conspiracy charge and is cooperating with federal investigators.

Meanwhile, U.S. Rep. Lloyd Doggett, D-Austin, filed the Stealth Lobbyist Disclosure Act.

Doggett said his act, which he originally filed in 2002, would close a loophole that lets lobbyists "spend millions trying to influence legislation while hiding behind empty coalitions to conceal their real clients identities."

Ethics agency lets 'check' stand

On March 24 the Texas Ethics Commission ruled that a donation to a state official need only be reported as a check, and not a dollar amount.

Bill Ceverha, a former state representative and current member of the Texas Employee Retirement Commission board of directors, received a check from homebuilder Bob Perry.

State Rep. Lon Burnam, D-Fort Worth, asked to know the amount, but the Ethics Commission ruled otherwise.

Group submits rail-building bid

The Texas Department of Transportation accepted a bid from Cintra Zachry to build six Central Texas toll roads for \$7.2 billion. The 600-mile project will run from the Texas-Oklahoma border to Mexico. with completion scheduled for 2010.

Renditions due

Texas Comptroller Carole Keeton Strayhorn has reminded Texas businesses to render their property with county appraisal districts by April 17. To render is to list the taxable inventory, furniture and fixtures, machinery and equipment and other property that a business owned or managed as of Jan. 1, 2006. Appraisal districts may use the information to set property values.

"Rendition helps county appraisal districts appraise business property fairly and accurately," Strayhorn said. "If some businesses are not paying their fair share of property tax, that places a greater tax burden on other hardworking business owners and homeowners."

Rendering allows property owners to record their opinion of their property's value and ensures that the appraisal district sends them a notice before changing a value on their property. Owners do not have to render exempt property, such as church property or a farmer's equipment used for farming.

If more than one appraisal district appraises a property, the property owner should render in each appraisal district office.

Property owners who need more time to file their renditions may file a written request with the chief appraiser on or before April 17 to receive an automatic extension to May 15. The chief appraiser may also grant an additional 15 days after the May 15 deadline if necessary.

The Comptroller's office also reminded owners whose property was damaged by a storm, flood or fire last year that they may file a special decreased value report that could lower their final tax bills. Property owners have until April 17 to file the decreased value report, which indicates their property's condition on Jan. 1, 2006.

Rendition forms and decreased value report forms are available from the appraisal district or the Comptroller's office. The rendition forms ask for the property owner's name and address, general description of property by type or category and the property's location. For property with an aggregate total of more than \$20,000, the property owner also must provide a general estimate of quantity of inventory and the owner's good faith estimate of the property's market value. The owner may provide the historical cost when new and the year the property was acquired rather than the good faith estimate.





DO YOU NEED MORE TIME TO **FILE YOUR 2005 TAX RETURN?**

Are you running out of time to file your 2005 tax return? Don't panic! There's still time to get an automatic extension of the deadline. This year, the automatic extension period has been changed from four months to six months. The six-month extension replaces the prior two-step process that required taxpayers to obtain first a four-month automatic filing extension. Then if additional time was needed, a second request explaining the need for more time had to be sent to the IRS.

Remember that even with an extension, you still have to pay any taxes you owe by April 27, 2006. The extension gives you more time to file your return, but not more time to pay. You'll be charged interest on any tax liability not paid by the original due date. And you may owe an additional penalty if you've significantly underpaid your taxes.

You can obtain an automatic extension in any of the following

•File a paper copy of Form 488.

•File electronically using the IRS e-file system on your own computer

•File using e-file by telephone.

•Have your tax preparer e-file on your behalf.

Whichever method you use, you must apply for the extension by April 17 or the due date of your return. You'll then have until October 16, 2006, to file your 2005 tax return.



In the Haskell Maidens softball play this week the team moved to 6-0 in district.




