Snake wrapped on entry doors to convenience store "not funny"

A Tahoka youth said he "thought it would be funny" to wrap a snake around the handles of the entry doors to a local convenience store, but when Manager Debbie Sanders arrived to open the store Monday she was not laughing. Sanders discovered the snake early Monday morning, calling Tahoka Police to investigate the incident.

The suspect, a 17-year-old Tahoka male, was observed at 2:40 a.m. on surveillance cameras at the store, as he wrapped a dead bull snake around the door handles and then walked away. Police identified the suspect as the same person who had been caught several days prior on surveillance cameras inside the store stealing several items, and had been prohibited from entering the store on criminal trespass charges. When the police officer contacted the suspect, the young man still had on the same clothing as when he was observed on the surveillance camera, and admitted that he had placed the dead snake on the door, stating that he "thought it would be funny" as a practical joke. He was arrested and charged with criminal trespass and criminal mischief causing substantial inconvenience.

Two US Flags were reported stolen from the Tahoka Cemetery, apparently taken from west of the entrance to the cemetery sometime between noon-8

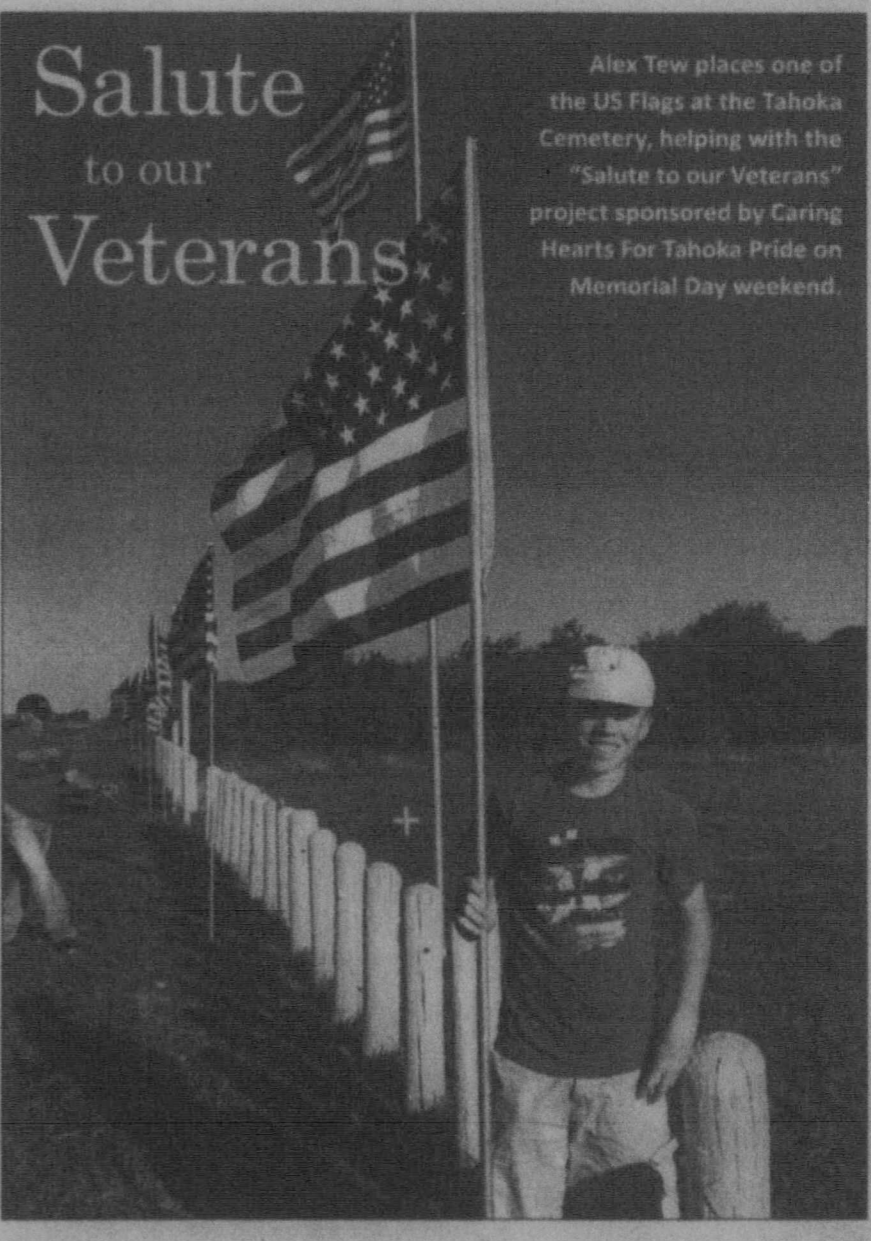
p.m. Monday, which was Memorial Day. Caring Hearts For Tahoka Pride volunteers had placed the flags at the cemetery in observance of Memorial Day.

Police also investigated a report of a fight between two females in the 2100 block of South 1st Street Monday evening. The altercation apparently stemmed from a social media post and circumstances arising out of Child Protective Services being called.

Driver Ricky Barnes reportedly hit a deer with his vehicle last Tuesday night about 9:30 p.m. on FM 1054, about 2.5 miles south of Draw. No injuries were reported in the incident. On Sunday night another accident was reported, of a vehicle veering off into a ditch on US 87 south of CR 18, due to water over the road following a thunderstorm. Tony Cassarez of Midland was driving a Dodge Challenger southbound on US 87 when it slid off the road. No injuries were reported in this incident.

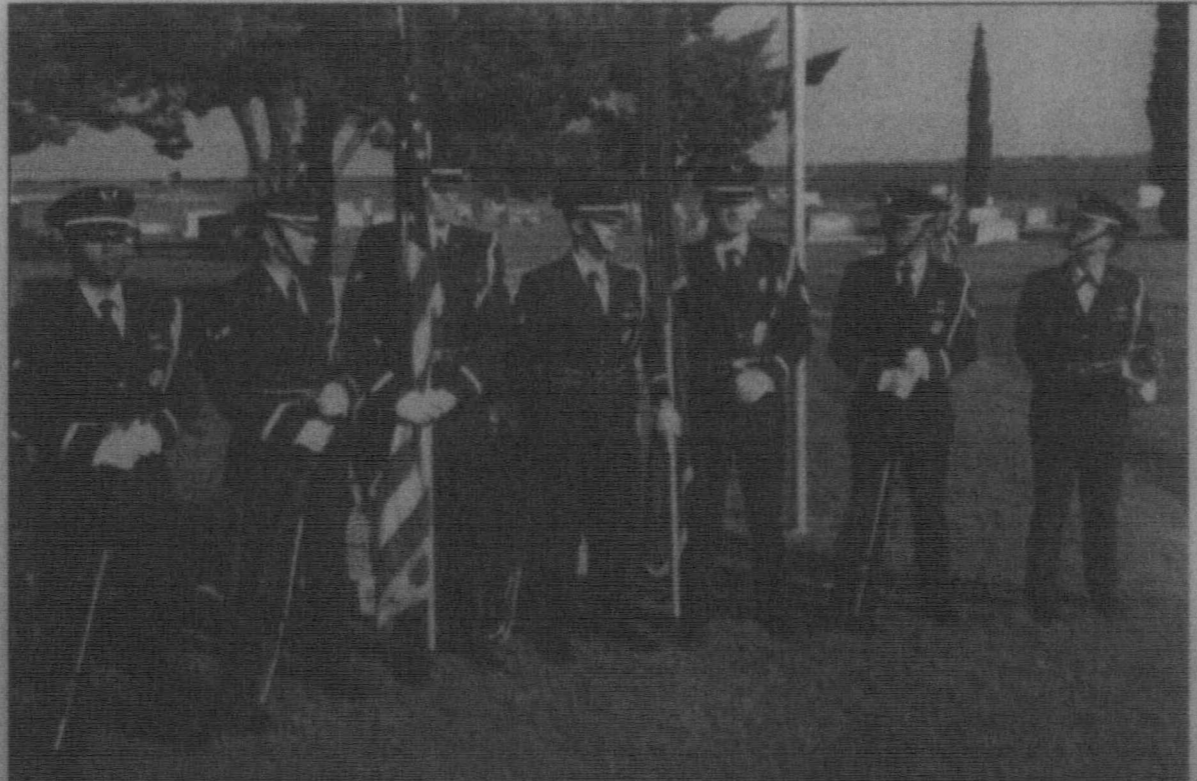

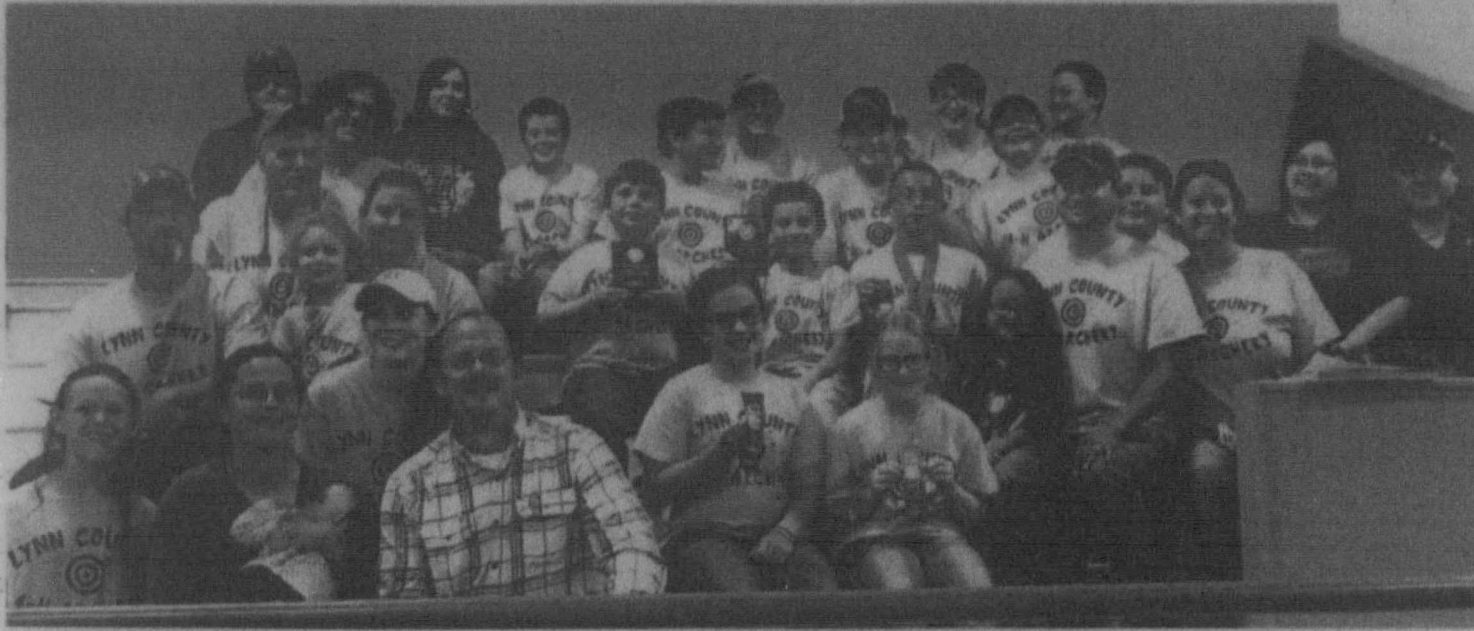

When it's warm in Texas, snakes are on the move, says expert

When it's warm in Texas that means people should watch out for snakes. It's the time of year when snakes slither away from their comfortable winter surroundings and are on the move. Dr. Jill Heatley, associate professor of veterinary medicine at the Texas A&M College of Veterinary Medicine & Biomedical Sciences (CVM), said active snakes could mean bad news for people and their pets. Heatley and veterinarians in the Small Animal Hospital at the CVM are expecting to see an increase in snakebite cases.

"If you believe your pet has been bitten by a snake, you need to seek veterinary care and the doctor can determine what kind of treatment is necessary," Heatley explains.

A snakebite on a human can be painful — and also expensive. It is not uncommon for a person bit by a venomous snake to have hospital bills up to \$50,000. Hospital treatments can range from one day to several weeks, and include care for damaged tissues and antivenom treatments that can run into the thousands of dollars, according to Heatley.

Although snakes are found in most parts of the world — Ireland, Iceland and New Zealand are some of the few snake-free countries — only four types of snakes found in Texas are venomous: the coral snake, copperhead, rattlesnake and cottonmouth (also called water moccasin).

"The thing to remember about snakes is that they generally want to be left alone," he says. "They are probably more afraid of you than you are of them."

"Of the four types of venomous snakes in Texas, the coral, copperhead, and rattlesnake are almost never aggressive unless they are provoked," Heatley adds. "The cottonmouth has been known to be a little on the aggressive side, so you should be a little more wary of it, especially if you are near a creek or lake where they are frequently seen."

Heatley says an inquisitive pet could also be a snakebite victim. If bitten, a dog usually suffers the bite on its face or nose, while cats tend to be nicked on their paws.

"The area that has been bitten will usually begin to swell almost immediately, which is a tell-tale sign of a snake bite," Heatley notes. Venom can spread quickly inside the animal, potentially resulting in kidney failure within 12 to 24 hours.

It is important to know that not all snakebites are the same. "Sometimes an animal or person will get just a small amount of venom from a bite, and sometimes it's much more," Heatley says. "There is also such a thing as a 'dry bite' in which no venom is injected at all. Interestingly enough, larger snakes tend to have lesser amounts of venom than smaller ones."

"One of the questions we often get in the veterinary hospital is, 'How can you tell a venomous snake from a harmless one?'" Heatley said. "The answer is that it is difficult because there are numerous types of snakes that are not venomous that look very similar to a venomous one." Heatley suggests looking for a triangular-shaped head in identifying poisonous snakes but does not encourage getting too close.

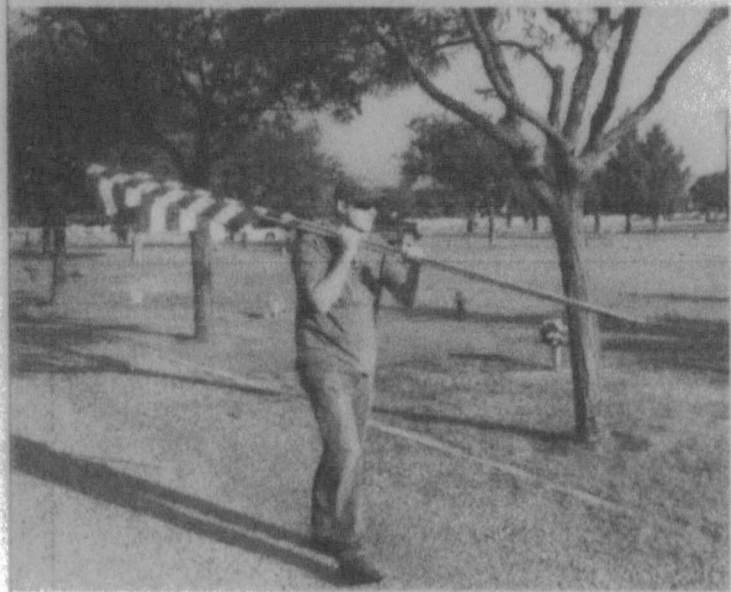

Salute to our Veterans ... Caring Hearts for Tahoka Pride had 21 volunteers to participate in a "Salute to our Veterans" project on Memorial Day weekend. Nine 3X5 American flags were placed at the St. Rest Cemetery, 28 at Nevels Memorial Cemetery and 27 at Tahoka Cemetery. 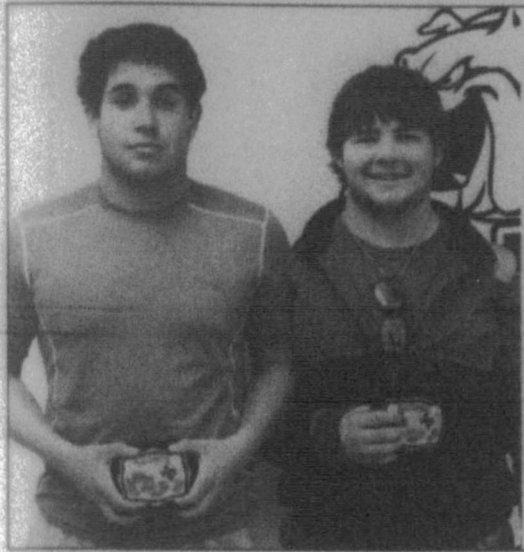

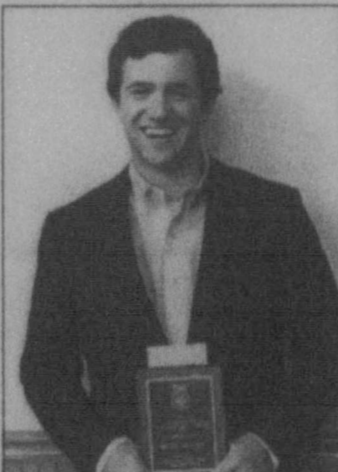
