> I saw three of the seven cemeteries on Okinawa. In the center homes, even in Christian homes, of one of them was the grave of Lt. General Simon Bolivar Buckner, who led our forces there, and all about him were graves of heroes of the Okinawa campaign. There were no chapels at the Okinawa cemeteries, but they were well kept. At one of them I observed a little shelter which protected a register of the names of those buried there.

The largest cemetery in the Pacific area is at Finschhafen, New Guinea, where about seven thous and of our men are interred. The remains of our men in many of the smaller cemeteries throughout the Pacific are being removed to the larger cemeteries where they can be better cared for, about fifty cemeteries thereby being aband-

In the European theater, the remains of our men who lost their lives on German soil are now being removed to semi-permanent cemeteries in France, Belguim and Holland. Our cemetery at Henri-Chappelle, Belgium, not far from Aachen and Liege, is the resting place of 17,323 American dead. This is our largest cemetery in Europe.

About two hundred thousand of our brave fighting men of World War II, who gave their lives for this country, rest beneath white crosses overseas. One-fourth of them are in the Pacific and most of the others are in Europe. Congress plans to provide at a later date for the return to the United States of the remains of these men for re-interment in national or local cemeteries, in accordance with the wishes of the next of kin.





### An International Golden Rule

Every coin made in America bears the inscription, "In God We Trust." There are a great many ways in which the American people accept the principles of Christianity, and there are a great many other ways in which we accord shabby treatment to the practice of those principles.

America has shown many times that it has a generous heart in tendering aid to nations which have suffered national disasters, and that very fact is an expression of The Golden Rule, the principal tenet of Christianity. We may have many selfish traits as individuals, but as a nation we have been the most generous on the face of the earth.

Maybe it is time for us to put into practice The Golden Rule in international politics. America has shown that it has no imperialistic ambitions. We have gotten along well with those nations which shared a mutual trust with us. Unfortunately, we do not share that mutual trust with all nations, Russia being the chief and most important ex-

The distrust between these two greatest powers on earth is partly our own doing. We failed to recognize the government of Russia for twenty years after the Communists came to power, and the Russian mind had ample opportunity to dwell on the fact while the nation was developing its domestic and foreign policies. And now that the Soviet has become a great world power, its leaders believe it can afford to be independent. Perhaps no one knows just how far Russia is willing to go in the diplomatic snobbery she has been practicing.

The breakdown of the London Conference is another and the most important example of the fact that relations among the world's greatest powers are not cordial. General George C. Marshall, Chief of Staff, has warned that America must be prepared for another war and advises that this country maintain an army of four million men-He offers dire warnings of great new destructive weapons.

But maybe the world has reached the point to where it cannot afford to have any more wars. Another one may destroy all of us. Maybe it is time for us to try to adopt an international Golden Rule, to spend a part of our wealth in educating suspicious Russia and other nations that we must have true world cooperation. The world must see who would not benefit by joining the organization and ion is the greatest force in shaping the destiny of this meetings

### The American Legion Can Help

There are very few servicemen who understand fully the various benefits to which they are entitled upon being discharged from the service. The G. I. Bill of Rights, true to government tradition, is composed of the usual generous number of wherefores, howevers and wherebys, and otherwise steeped in technical phrases so as to render if meaningless to anyone but a sharp lawyer.

But there are many benefits available to the service man under the provisions of the act, and as a veteran he entitled to many other benefits under government spon sorship that he probably has not had a chance to learn about. For instance every honorably discharged veterar is entitled to government hospitalization, and there are many benefits for his family about which he may never learn if he does not make the proper contacts.

There are certain problems about insurance that most veterans will not fully understand, and with the proper advise many of them may be spared a costly mistake which they will regret.

The hest place to get the needed advise about all these problems is the American Legion. There is a piti fully small number of veterans who have joined the local post of the Legion, and there probably is not a single one

"If all stray dogs were destroy ed, and all pets vaccinated for ragies, it would go far toward stamping out this justly feared fatal disease," Dr. Cox said.

The doctor stressed that dogs u pected of having rabies should not be killed immediately, but should instead be confined ten days for observation to see if the disease develops. If a dog sickens nd dies during the observation period, the head should be packed in ice and sent to the State Health

Department for examination. Freezing the brain, or killing the og prematurely, or in such manner as to injure the brain may make correct laboratory findings


