Austin, Texas.—Scarlet fever, now nearly three and one-half times higher than the seven-year median in Texas, is one of the most disabling and dangerous diseases usually associated with childhood although actually it is confined to no age limit, according to Dr. Geo. W. Cox, State Health Officer. One hundred nineteen cases were reported in the state during the week ending October 20, bringing the year's total to 3,443.

The doctor described scarlet fever as an acute infectious disease, the onset of which is sudden. The first symptoms including sore throat, vomiting, fever, and headache, may appear in three to five days after exposure. These are followed by the distinctive rash which gives this disease its name, Dr. Cox stated.

Complications may cause prolonged disability or death. Children suffering with scarlet fever may develop sinusitis and middle-ear infections which can lead to mastoiditis. As the germs spread through the child's system, the joint, kidneys, and heart may become involved, causing life-long invalidism or crippling.

"A child with any kind of a sore throat should be seen by the family physician promptly," Dr. Cox asserted. "If scarlet fever is present, the treatment recommended will do much to alleviate discomfort and reduce the possibility of serious complications."

Dr. Cox stated that children under ten years of age are most susceptible, and that those persons who fail to contract scarlet fever until grown stand "an excellent chance of never having the disease."

The Army Answers Your War Problems

Your questions on allotments, insurance, legal problems or other matters as they relate to Army personnel and their dependents will be answered in this column or by letter. Write Headquarters, Eighth Service Command, Dallas 2, Texas.

Q. My husband has been in Germany since April, and now is in the Army of Occupation. Does this mean that he will have to stay until it is all over, or will he be replaced in a certain length of time by new men?

A. Soldiers in the Army of Occupation are released from the service as soon as they become eligible for discharge. They are also being replaced by lower-point men and those who are now enlisting or being inducted into the service.

Q. Is a soldier still eligible for a furlough home after serving overseas for a certain length of time?

A. The Army has not resumed the furlough rotation policy it once had in effect. However, soldiers with long periods of service overseas will be released from that duty when replacements are available.

Q. Is it true that boys 17 years old can now enlist in the Regular Army?

A. Yes, but they must have the consent of their parents.

Q. My husband is a corporal in the Army and he will soon be discharged. We expect our child will be born in about six months. If he were to apply for Government maternity and infant care now, would it still be possible for me to obtain that aid, even though he will be out of the Army when the baby comes?

A. It is advisable for your husband to apply for Emergency Maternity and Infant Care before he leaves the service. However, if he applies after he leaves the service and a physician certifies that the pregnancy occurred during the time he was serving in the Army as a private, corporal or sergeant, the aid will be granted.

Q. I was discharged from the Army four months ago. At that time I stopped paying premiums on my National Service Life Insurance. I now find that it is possible for a veteran to keep the insurance for eight years from the time it was first taken out. I still have five years to go. Would it be possible for me to re-instate the policy?

A. Yes, write the Veterans Administration, Washington, D. C., saying you want to re-instate your policy. Include in your letter your full name, serial number, policy number and unit to which you were last assigned. Include also a check or money order for back premiums and a statement that you are in good health. If you wait until six months have elapsed since you paid your last premium, you will have to have a physical examination.

Q. My husband was killed in action a year ago. I am now receiving a monthly pension, but it isn't enough to support me. If I take employment, will this pension be cut off?

A. No. Since your husband's death was due to a service-connected disability, your pension is payable for life or until you remarry, regardless of any other income you may have.

Q. My husband is going to ask for a discharge from the Army because of hardship conditions at home. If he gets a discharge for this reason will he be barred from any of the privileges of the GI Bill of Rights?

A. Not if he is otherwise eligible.

Q. How long does it take a soldier to be discharged once he reports to a separation center?

A. Normally, about two days. But, if his records are not in shape, if his personal affairs are not in order, or if he needs some medical or dental attention, it may take longer.

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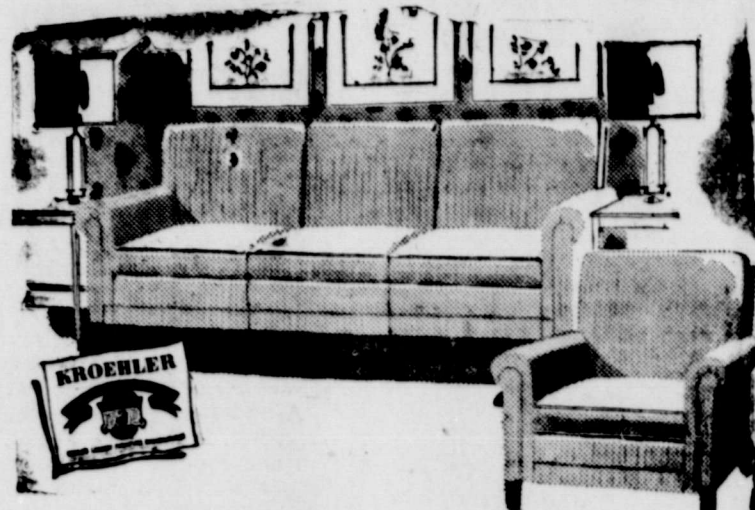


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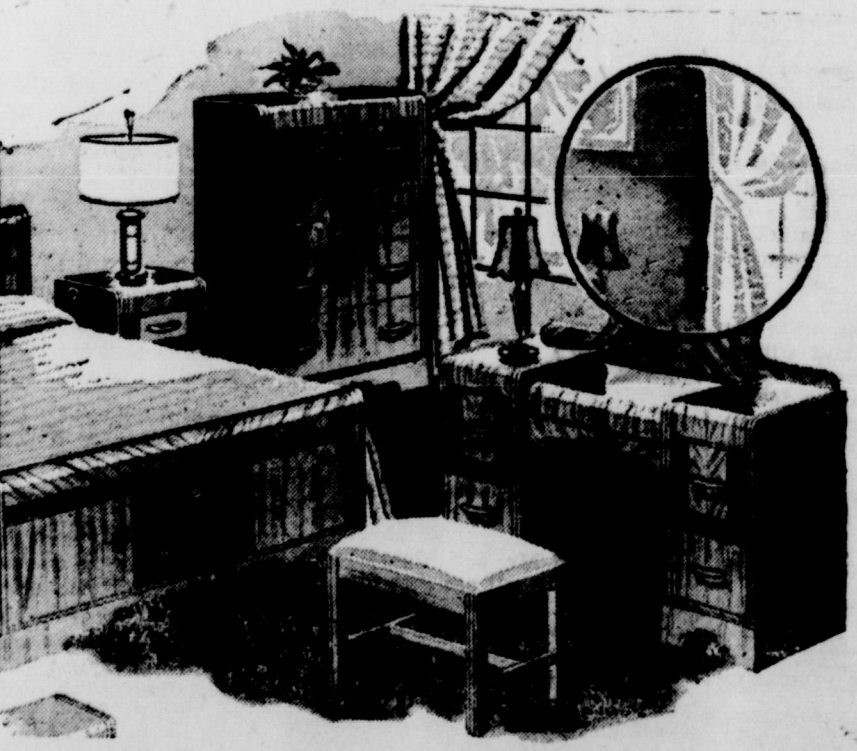

Discharged in Nevada**

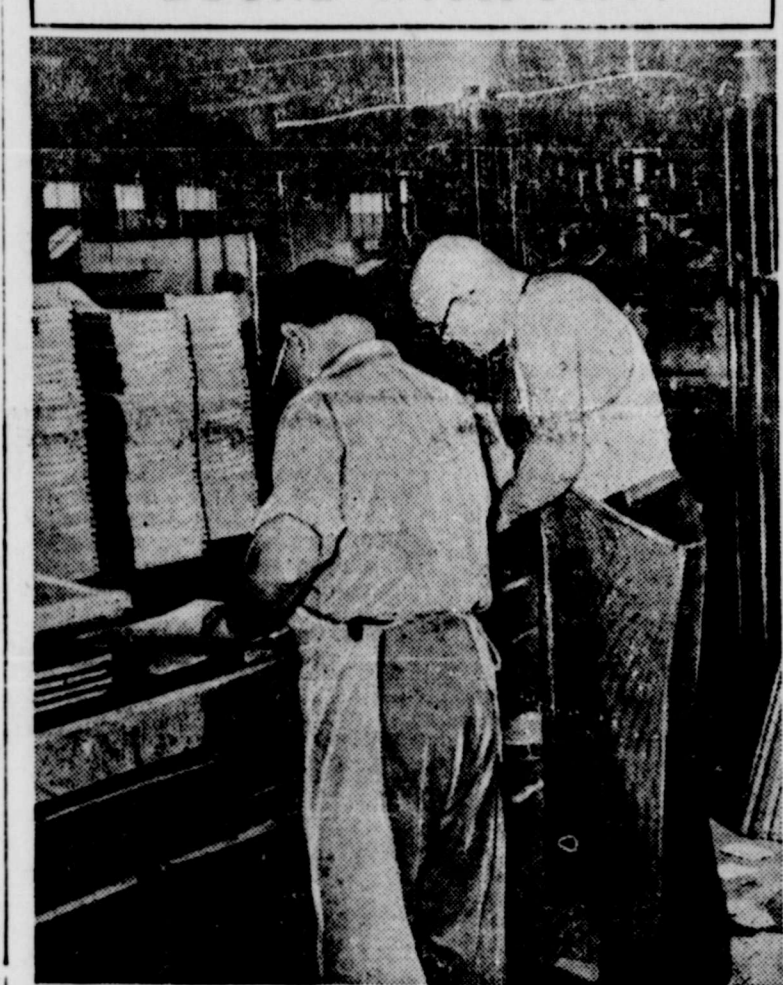
Sgt. James E. Smith of Haskell

The surplus aircraft disposal
program is a big one. Planes of
the original total value of ten bil-
lion dollars are in process of be-
ing declared surplus and offered
for sale to the public. Up to Oc-
tober 15, 44,000 planes had been
declared surplus and 14,000 of
them had been disposed of.
There are 634 surplus aircraft
on the airfield at Lamesa. At the
South Plains Army Airfield at
Lubbock, there are 1500 Flying
Fortresses, many of which have
served with distinction overseas.
The air forces will declare 1200 of
these planes surplus within a few
weeks.

It is now worth four points and four cents per pound.

**Increase Your Fat Salvage To
Increase Household Supplies**

"American housewives, them-
selves, can do a lot to speed up
the return of plentiful supplies of
soap to their grocers' shelves by
saving every possible drop of used
fats," according to an official joint
statement of the Department of
Agriculture and Office of Price
Administration.
"And since fats are used in the
manufacture of hundreds of other
things we all want—nylon stock-
ings, electric appliances, uphol-
stery, tires, etc.—the used fats that
housewives skim, scoop and scrape
can help to bring larger quantities
of many of those items back soon-
er," the official statement con-
cludes.

Fat Saving Personal

Fat saving has become just as
personal as that.
During war years, women had
dramatic reasons for saving used
high resistant paints; it went into
fat. It helped make munitions and
weather proofed battle jackets
Used fat helped supply the weap-
ons of war.
Now, the same used fat is needed
to make the instruments of peace.
Fats and oils are needed to help
thousands of industries over the
hump of reconversion.

Fat Comes Home

The fat saved in American
kitchens, comes right back home
to them, helping to supply linole-
um, oil cloth, cotton sheets, toilet
and laundry soap and chips, re-
frigerators, electric irons, vacuum
cleaners, upholstery, shoes, carpet-
ing, new girdles, clocks and hun-
dreds more household and per-
sonal items.

Housewives saved more than
500,000,000 pounds of cooking
grease for supplies of war; now
they are asked by the Department
of Agriculture and Office of Price
Administration to continue salvag-
ing fat to help themselves to get
supplies they have gone without
during war years.

Supplies to Continue Short

It has been publicly stated by
the governmental agencies directly
concerned, as well as by the cooper-
ating volunteer and industrial
agencies that the fats and oils scar-
cities will be increased rather than
decreased in the remaining months
of 1945, and during a long period
of 1946. The United States has al-
ways been an importer of fats and
oils, and this country up until the
beginning of World War II had
never raised sufficient animal fat
or vegetable fat crops to take care
of its own industrial needs.

Despite valiant efforts of Ameri-
can farmers and cattlemen, domes-
tic production has never been able
to compensate fully for the loss of
imports from the Pacific.
Meanwhile, the tremendous de-
mand for fats and oils goes on.
Points Increased
Officially, Washington has tak-
en the only means at its disposal
to impress upon American women
the urgent need to continue fat
salvage—increasing the point bon-

THE CHURCH AS A FELLOWSHIP

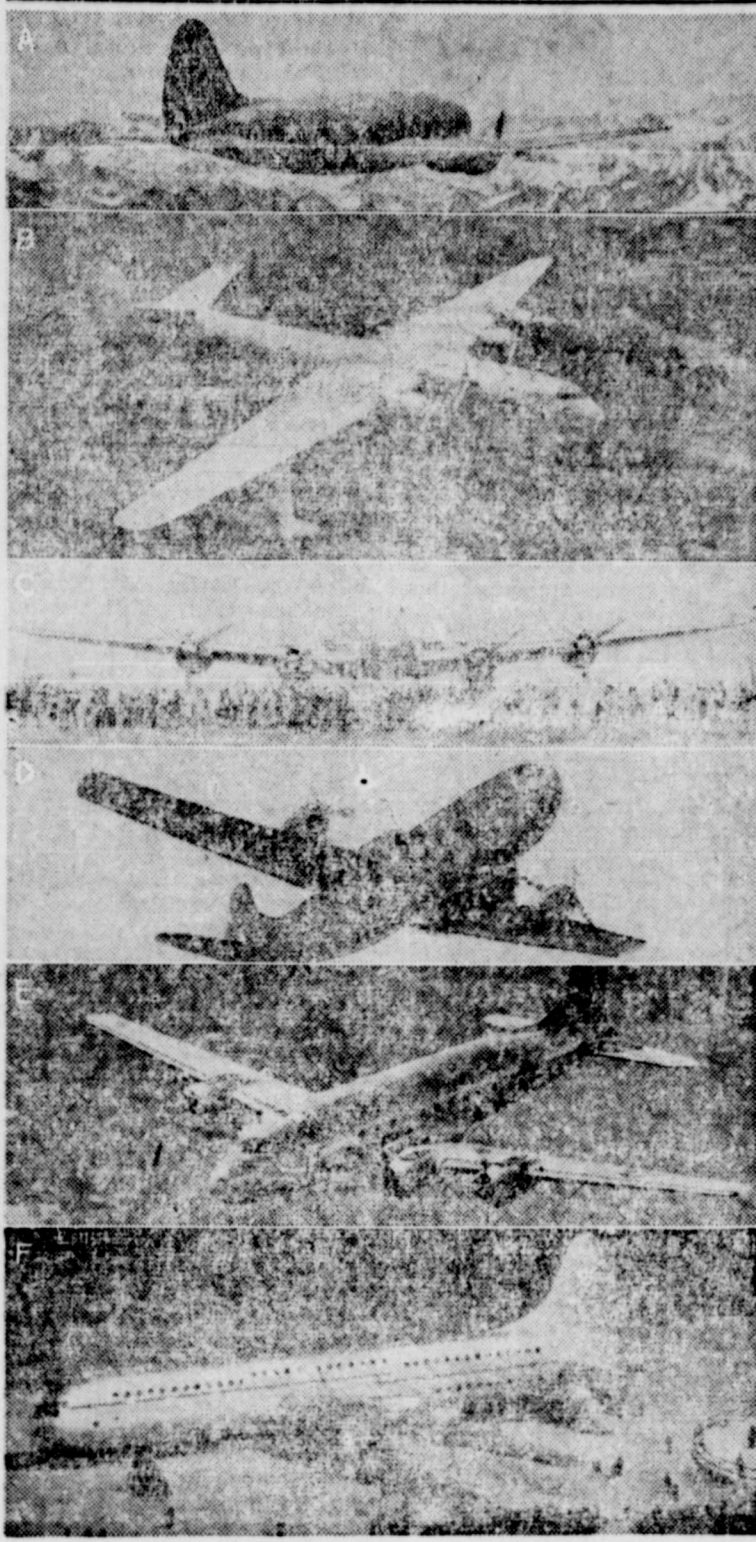
LESSON TEXT—Romans 12:3-18. GOLDEN TEXT—Be kindly affectioned one to another... in honor preferring one another.—Romans 12:10.

The greatest and most important institution in the world is the Church. The home, which we have been studying in recent weeks, is the primary unit of society, but its relationships are primarily of a personal nature. In the church there is an organized fellowship within a God-made institution, the living organism through which the Lord brings such blessing to the world—the Church.

Here, in God's house, among God's people, the believer finds strength and joy. The Lord's people are:

- I. Different Yet United (vv. 3-8). God is not interested in uniformity, but He does want unity. In the Church are all types of gifts and personalities, each one useful to God. He does not want them all reduced to that drab uniformity which characterizes so many man-made products. Prophecy, ministry, teaching, giving, ruling—yes, all the various

works to which God calls men should be done diligently for His glory. No man is to think of himself as more or less useful to God. His work is different, but it is God's work, and when all serve as they should there is unity and efficiency in the accomplishing of His blessed purpose.

The unity of believers in Christ (v. 3) is something which needs emphasis in our day. The forces of Protestantism are so divided as to be largely ineffective in many important fields.

Not only are they divided but there are almost endless divisions within denominations—yes, and even in local churches. Sometimes there are issues which cannot be met except by separation, but there are also many unnecessary divisions, dishonoring to God and weakening to the Church.

Let's remember we can be different (God wants us to be!) but we can still be united! God wants that, too!

II. Active Yet Kind (vv. 9-11). God puts no premium on laziness or indifference. We are not to be "slithful," but "fervent" in spirit. It sometimes one feels that the Church has gone sound asleep. It is alive but inactive. It professes to have a zeal for God, but if there is any fervency of spirit, in most places it must be well hidden. But that is not possible, is it?

How much we need a stirring revival in the Church to bring the people of God into active service for Him. If your church as a whole does not respond to the Lord's Word, why do you not as an individual ask God to rekindle His fire in your heart?

There is to be a humility (v. 10), a fine cleanness of thought and life (v. 9), an unfeigned love for the brethren (v. 9), along with all the fervency of spirit and zeal for service.

There is much talk of uniting Christendom and no little danger of compromise for the sake of an outward unity. Such schemes are destined to failure, but unity in Christ, which recognizes Him as the divine Head of the Church, that we do desperately need and should seek for His glory, for the good of the Church and for the blessing of a world lost in sin and strife.

III. Troubled Yet Peaceful (vv. 12-18). The Church of Christ is in the world to witness for and to serve Him. Hence, it must face all the persecutions and trials which an unbelieving world will bring upon it. Christians are not exempt from the troubles and sorrows common to all mankind.

Therein we find one of the great opportunities for effective witness, for as the Christian and the Church rightly meet such difficulties, they testify to the grace of God which can give peace in one's heart in

The Word Of God In 2nd Timothy 4:2 Paul told Timothy to preach the word. Of course we know he was talking of the word of God. We might notice a few things about the word: It has cleansing power, John 15:3. Now ye are clean through the word I have spoken unto you. The word of God is the seed of Kingdom. Mark 4:3. Hark! Behold there went out a sower; What did he sow? In the 14 verse Jesus said the Sower sowed the WORD. We learn from Peter in 1st Peter 1:22 that the Word has power to purify the souls of men, and that by it men are Born again. That is by Obeying it. James says of his own will bent he was by the Word of Truth. James 1:18.

Since the Word is Truth and the Truth is the Gospel of Christ we can realize how necessary it is to do what it teaches. As we will be judged by the Word of God at the judgment it behooves us to do as he has commanded. Come let us reason together. Fear God and keep His commandments. For this is the whole DUTY OF MAN.

Representatives of the Army Recruiting Station of Abilene will be in Haskell Tuesday, November 6, from 1:30 to 3:30 p. m. in the interest of those who want to enlist in the Army. Qualifications for enlistment are as follows:

Enlistment periods are for one year, eighteen months, two years and three years. In the first category, however, the one year period, only men who have performed active service of not less than six months will be permitted to enlist. These men now serving in the Army of the United States may be discharged for the purpose of enlisting as a regular, and may be reenlisted in their present temporary or permanent grade.

No person, however, who is now serving under an enlistment which began on or after June 1, 1945, will be permitted to be discharged for the purpose of enlisting for a period shorter than the one in which he is now serving.

A reenlistment furlough is also provided. (If reenlistment occurs within 20 days) and the length of this furlough is computed on the basis of 30 days for each year of completed service; the furlough, however, will not exceed ninety days in length.

Furlough travel allowance is a new and attractive feature of the bill. This provides for five cents per mile, for going and return journey, and this will be paid in

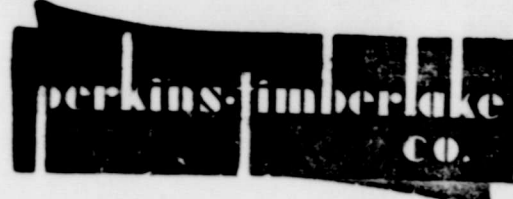

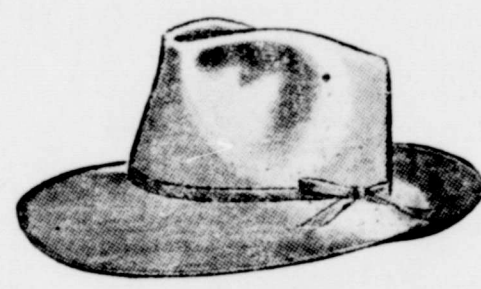
