### "Ye Shall Know the Truth"

While practically all newspapers are more or less privately owned, there is perhaps no other institution that is privately owned that has so many responsibilities and duties regarding the public trust. We believe it to be the duty of a newspaper to attempt to act as guardian of the The homes are not opened up to public welfare, to learn about those things that may benefit or harm the community. By acting as a medium for public information, a newspaper can bring to light salient features of a controversy and aid in crystalizing public

But newspapers are bombarded by pressure groups that attempt to gain publicity for their causes, and the conflicting reports of opposing groups force the editors to dig beyond the surface for the true facts. A weekly newspaper acting alone can have no effect on a national question. Bu large chains of daily newspapers can pull a lot of weight | World War II. Do they not de- this city. Of all the chains of dailies, there is none that tries harder than the Hearst press to influence public opinion. Its editorial policies usually advocate something that is a radical departure from conventional thinking. It has gained millions of readers by nurturing them on a diet of sen sationalism. It usually gives the blackest headlines to those stories that most excite the imagination. In just such an attempt, the Hearst press recently fouled out.

The New York Daily Mirror brought its Sunday readers a nicely packaged feature on the modesty and virtues of President Truman: "There is no 'crackdown' in his system." There were to be three more such articles.

Then it happened. Hearst's New York Journal-Am erican, sister publication of the Mirror, flashed a black headline the same day: The Tragedy of Truman: He Has Failed the Nation in Crisis. The story said "we have been robbed of our birthright and stripped of our honor because President Truman and his picked associates have had neither the wit nor the courage to face their duties.

So there is the evidence of the trials and tribulation of a newspaper. We are unable to coax out a single tear be cause the Hearstlings misfired, but the evidence is a good ease in point that newspapers are subject to the errors and frailties of human judgment.

### The Role of Agriculture

The three great divisions of America's economic life are business, industry and labor. 



Studies of the gray fox in central Texas relieved the animal of primary responsibility for turkey shortage in that part of the state, assigning to depleted ranges the principal blame for wild turkey decrease and showing that of the predatory mammals skunks and snakes were probably the most serious, with horned owls, among birds, being implicated.

Fur animals in general were shown to be large insectivorous and consumers of rodents, at least in the Texas Hill Country, although in some instances the ringtailed cat, bobcat, gray fox, raccoon, and the various skunks became depredators on birds.

The serious surplus of deer in some areas was emphasized, with resultant die-offs through shortage of feed, parasitism, or diseases. In no case was the number of bucks
