



All the comments that came to our attention favored the suggestion that something be done about the matter. There is a city ordinance, as pointed out previously, that prohibits such parking, but the law has been shelved at the expense of convenience.

The fact that our citizens see fit to park their cars in such a manner does not make them criminals, but it does appear that they are selfish to the extent that they are willing to cause trouble for others in order to make it handy to do their shopping.

We can find no one to blame other than those who park their cars in such a manner. Our law enforcement officers are rightly willing to go along with the sentiments of the majority. It is certain that the majority do not want ears parked in such a jammed manner or there would be no ordinance to that effect. But the trouble is that there have not been enough protests for officials to abolish the

It seems there might reasonably be two solutions to the problem. The officials of this city can begin enforcing the law and let drivers of the cars shift for themselves, or they might try to make some provisions for places to park for the shoppers.

If the merchants of the city are willing to lose busimess as a result of the bad parking situation and the drivers are willing to continue to wait an indefinite period to move a blocked car, then it is likely that there will be nothing done about the problem. But if enough people want something done about it and will protest in the right way. then it is certain that the law can be enforced. Until that time, we can keep watching and wondering when the car that blocks our way will be moved.

Many cities have solved the parking problem by installation of parking meters, which the city council now proposes to do at the suggestion of many citizens. While parking meters may not be satisfactory to all, their installation certainly is more agreeable than continuation of haphazard and uncontrolled parking.
