Bickering and pettiness have no place in a city that intends to get things done, and such qualities were not once evident. There was good-natured joking that added livliness to the meeting. Mayor Couch explained the Haskell. council's position in taking action to get the meters and the explanation was well-received and respected by the Wichita Valley the other day and business leaders, who, in opposition to the move, presented their side of the case in such a manner that it was just as well received by council members.

The two groups presented sincerely their views and every person there must have gone away from the meeting respecting the rights and opinions of every other person.

The spirit prevailing at the meeting surely went a long way in disposing satisfactorily of the knotty problem of Haskell's deplorable traffic situation. Everyone wanted something done about the parking. Admittedly, something must be done in the interest of the welfare of the community. And already the agreement has been reached that temporary traffic officers be on hand here Saturday. Perhaps a less expensive and more agreeable solution than parking meters can be found.
