HOME FOLKS INFLUENCE II. S. STUDENT THINKING
High school students says that the family exerts the strongest influence on their thinking. Second strongest influence is magazines and newspapers. These facts are revealed in the latest survey of the Institute of Student Opinion, a national polling organization composed of 1555 high school newspapers and sponsored by Scholastic Magazines.

The survey question, voted upon by 101,548 high school students and the percentage results, are as follows:

"In your opinion, which of the following influences your thinking to the greatest extent?"

Parents and other members of my family (38%); my school teachers (5%); my close friends (11.5%); community and student opinion (7%); magazines and newspapers (17%); radio (10.5%); movies (3%); school books (1%); church (5%); don't know (3%).

After the poll had been taken, high school newspaper editors and reporters interviewed more than 5,000 student voters as to the reasons for their choices. According to the interviews, the largest number named their families as the greatest influence on their thinking, be opinion (%); magazines and cause of home discussions and the advantage of different points of view. Others said they respected their parents' judgment most.

Typical of the reasons given for choosing magazines and newspapers, as the greatest single influence on the thinking of youth, are:

"Magazines and newspapers usually present both sides of a question and I can choose for myself. They give me a chance to examine an idea critically."

"It's there and you read it for what it's worth—if a point is missed, you can read it again."

Representative reason given by those who named their close friends as the strongest influence on their thinking:

"We're of the same generation. Everything my friends do, we do together. We even think together."

Those who named radio said they liked to listen to commentators and news broadcasts. Community and student opinion was rated first by some because, as they frankly admitted, they like to follow along with the crowd.

Hortense Marlow Gets Science Award

Miss Hortense Marlow, senior in Haskell High School, has been selected to receive the Bausch & Lomb Honorary Science Award Medal for achieving the highest scholastic record in science courses during high school.

Established in 1932, this Award has been recognized by educators as a national honor in scientific studies. Award winners are eligible to compete for the five annual Bausch & Lomb Science Scholar-

ships at the University of Rochester. These Scholarships have a value of \$300 each, payable \$100 a year for the first three undergraduate years. The University will provide loan funds, if necessary, for holders of these Scholarships for the fourth year of college study.

In commenting upon the Scholarships, M. Herbert Eisenhart, president of Bausch & Lomb Optical Company, said: "In these postwar years, America's progress is related in no small degree to its progress in science and technology. It is our hope that the Science Awards and Scholarships will be a stimulus and contribution to national progress."

Candidates Are People, Too

The action of candidates in Haskell County in deciding not to attend political rallies this year brings to mind that the public has not been very fair with the men and women it is asking to run the affairs of government. We are all only too familiar with the old American custom of squeezing the public man for all he is worth.

There really is no justification in issuing special invitations to political candidates to attend various social functions at which their purses are artfully drained of hard-earned cash. No doubt such things as box suppers and cake sales furnish a lot of fun, but we may as well be honest about it and admit the principal purpose of such things is strictly mercenary.

Most candidates have accepted such impositions because they have found it difficult to refuse gracefully. But men and women who ask for public office do enough to earn their money as it is. It is pretty lame reasoning that says they have any obligation to be jilted of their money. In the first place, there are usually enough candidates in a contest so that there will be more losers than winners. The losers, then, have incurred considerable expense already in campaigning for the office they will not get.

We do not think a public office should be regarded as a prize. We think it is a position of trust and service, and beyond the obligation of discharging duties efficiently, we see no further indebtedness to the public. Most of us have an unwarranted tendency to impose ourselves upon office-holders. Aside from the fact that their jobs are in jeopardy at election time, they seldom are better paid than are such positions in the business world. Naturally, one who holds office should be friendly, but the public should not try to make him feel that he should flog its boot tops.

Most public officials are first class citizens with a deep sense of obligation toward discharging their duties and toward civic betterment.

It is about time that the rest of us respect them as such and let them have the privacy to which they are entitled.

The National Pastime

If the sport pages had not already told us so, the recent weather would have given us a fair warning that baseball, our national pastime, soon will be doing business at the same old stand. Reports from the grapefruit circuits indicate that bright young stars, developed in the service, will hog a sizeable chunk of the glory that the oldsters have had to themselves during the war.

Retailers Demonstrate How OPA Causes 'Camouflaged Inflation'



On the basis that artificial OPA policies are raising the cost of living in the United States, the National Retail Dry Goods Association displayed before members of Congress in Washington examples of what it calls "camouflaged inflation."

The National Retail Dry Goods Association does not seek the immediate end of government price control but it asks that Congress amend the Price Control Act so as to increase the production of good quality, low priced consumer goods.

As Benjamin E. Namm, president of the Association said: "Production can stop inflation if we can only stop OPA from stopping production."

Officials of the Association described "camouflaged inflation" as "holding the line" against rises in the prices of reputable goods

while granting higher selling prices to inferior merchandise. The exhibit depicted this discrepancy with the comparison of the women's slips shown above and more than 100 other items received from member stores.

Among these others were a pair of men's white woven broadcloth shorts with an elastic waistband on which was placed an OPA price of \$14.95 a dozen. The manufacturer has discontinued production. Beside them were pink shorts of lesser quality bearing an OPA price of \$13.50 a dozen.

Also shown were two electric heaters, one of first rate quality made by a prominent manufacturer and priced by the OPA at \$19.95 retail while a decidedly poorer model next to it from another maker bore an OPA price of \$15.97 retail. The other exhibits were similarly striking.

Cotton Production Relieves Shortages

DALLAS, Tex.—One hundred and thirty-five million pounds reduction in cottonseed oil production during the first seven months of this season, compared with a year ago, is one reason that the President's famine relief committee had to urge Americans to reduce fats and oils consumption by 30 per cent. A. L. Warm, national general director, National Cottonseed Products Association, points out.

"Cottonseed oil production figures released by the Bureau of Census, following the appeal for reduced fats consumption, clearly show the critical need for increased cotton production in 1946 to supply cottonseed oil as well as cottonseed meal products to produce meat and animal fats," Ward said.

Cotton is a leading source of vegetable oil, ranking with lard and butter as a cooking and food fat, but reduced cotton acreage and production in 1945 curtailed supplies of both cottonseed oil and cottonseed meal products.

"For most Cotton Belt farms, cotton is a primary source of manure, a source of vegetable oil and protein concentrate feed, and these things can make their greatest contribution to the world-wide food and feed need by producing more cotton in 1946," he emphasized.

Planted on good land, as the hub of a balanced farming and livestock program, and produced with the higher yields per acre that can be achieved by following the 7-point program of the U. S. Department of Agriculture and State Extension Services, cotton can do more in 1946 to relieve the food and feed situation than any other one crop Southern farmer can grow," Ward added.

Kin of Servicemen Will Go to Europe

Applications for the transportation of 1,673 dependents to the European Theater have been approved for the month of April and the movement is expected to get underway by the middle of April. Lieutenant Colonel Robert L. Hardy, commanding officer of West Texas U. S. Army Recruiting District has been advised. Priority lists and details of the transportation plan are now en route to the United States and the individuals concerned will be notified in the latter part of March by the War Department.

The dependents who have qualified under the priority system governing the overseas movement are the families of 610 applicants and comprise 643 adults and 430 children. In the latter group, 274 are less than four years of age, 120 are between five and 11, 24 are between 12 and 14, and 12 are between 15 and 17 years of age.

They were selected on the basis of first priority for applicants who agreed to remain overseas for a period of two years and second priority for those who indicated willingness to remain overseas for a period of more than one year but less than two years. Relative priority between these categories is based on longest cumulative service since December 7, 1941. Rank or grade is not a factor in determination of priority lists.

LUBBOCK, Tex.—Texas Tech has added an eleventh game to its fall football schedule with the addition of Hardin-Simmons, an old rival, Morley Jennings, athletic director, announces.

LUBBOCK, Tex.—Guayule experimentation plantings conducted at Texas Technological College in connection with the government's emergency rubber project proved that this natural rubber could be grown successfully in

West Texas, according to Dr. A. W. Young, head of the plant industry department at Tech.

Approximately one acre of guayule was planted at Tech in March 1941 at the same time that other plantings were made in many parts of the United States. At the end of two years' growth the rubber yield was 5.14 per cent which compared quite favorably with reports

from other plots, Young says. With the end of the war the government's project was curtailed, however, one-fourth of the acreage at Tech will be continued to finish the experiment next year.
