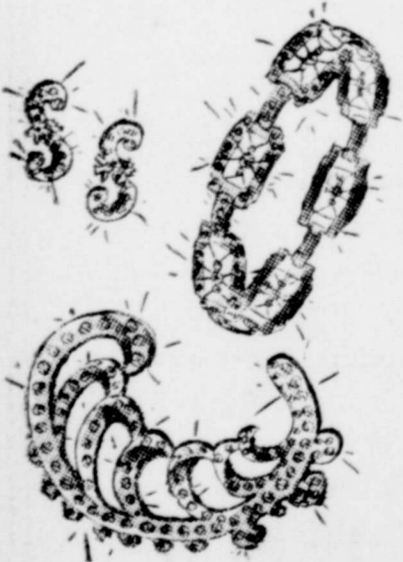

### To Mother

There are so many reasons why mothers mean so much to us. Literally, it is impossible to recount or even to know all the reasons why the love of mother deserves an affection that borders on reverence:

Because you were the one who gave us sympathy a far back as we can remember—when sympathy to our childish mind was the most sincere form of affection.

Because you did without things, when your need was greater, in order for us to have things we wanted.

Because you arose on many cold mornings to get us ready for school.

Because you have made sacrifices cheerfully for us all of our life.

Because you have stood by us through all things, even when we have been badly wrong.

Because you have given us encouragement and understanding that has inspired us more than we ever can tell.

Because you were so thorough in trying to teach us how to make the most of our life.

Because your love has been so deep that we never can repay you for all it has meant to us.

Because your devotion to us has not wavered through all of our pettiness and selfishness.

Because you have asked nothing in return for so much.

Because your heart has been broken because of us and you never mentioned it or complained of it.

Because you understand we never can say all the things we want to say about our mother.

### Let's Have Better Highways

By force of military necessity, most peace-time programs of development were suspended during the war. Makeshift arrangements permitted acceptable substitutes for some of the resulting inconveniences, but the vast road-building projects in Texas were critically interrupted.

The probability of mighty strides forward in Texas industry points the urgency of taking up again the program of building more and better highways and roads. There was little such building during the war. Even during the time of peace, an adequate program of road-building in this state is a never-ending process. The number of automobiles and the speed at which they are normally driven on the highways have increased rapidly in recent years. These changes have made necessary further engineering and new plans in road construction.

We are indebted to and offer our congratulations to The Houston Post for a splendid special edition of April 28 having a 28-page section devoted to highway problems and development in Texas. From that section we get much information of the sort that should make all of us aware of the importance of better highways for our state.

Texas now has about 27,000 miles of highways, more than any other state. But this state is far larger than any other, and when more automobile travel is possible, Texas will become a mecca for tourists. Much of our present highway mileage is in a poor state of repair and will not accommodate greatly increased travel without further serious damage. Tourists spend money, and they like to drive on good highways. The influx of tourists into Texas in years to come will go far toward paying for better highways.

But luring tourists to the state is by no means the only or even the most important consideration of an improved highway system. The factor of safety demands that we give drivers the best highways engineers can design. The annual death rate for driving accidents in the nation is 38,000, or nearly 2,000 for Texas alone. Perhaps the field of electronics holds many possibilities for new safety devices. If so, our highways should have them.

Highway engineers have estimated \$1,050,000,000 will be required to give Texas an adequate highway system. Such a program would take several years for completion, and the cost would be allocated over many years. But not all of the cost would be borne by the state. The federal government already has granted Texas \$28,765,649 for highway development, and the state will match this amount. The initial outlay is a good start, but hardly a drop in the bucket for the overall program costing more than a billion dollars.

State officials have earmarked only \$58,000,000 annually for a three-year period toward highway construction, far less than is needed for the estimate made by the engineers. As the Texas Highway Department points out, the question is not whether we can afford a good highway system, but whether or not we can afford to be without one.

Brief Items Taken from Old Copies of The Free Press

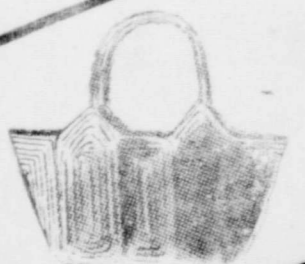
