Congressman Mahon Speaks Saturday

Congressman George Mahon, speaking before a crowd on the courthouse lawn here Saturday afternoon, gave a report of his 12 years in Congress and pledged his continued support of measures beneficial to interests of West Texas, in connection with his candidacy for reelection as Representative from the 19th District.

Outspoken in stating he had voted on every occasion for preparedness against war during the critical period from 1937 to 1940, the Congressman expressed the belief that America would be safe so long as the nation remained prepared against aggression.

He briefly reviewed progress of the rural electrification program in the 19th district, and said that under the present program an estimated 14,000 farm families in this congressional district would have electricity available in their homes during the next few years.

Mahon has served 12 years in Congress. If re-elected, he said he will be chairman of the Texas delegation in the house next year.

For a Bigger and Better Haskell

The overwhelming vote on the water and sewer bond election last week was a vote of confidence for a progressive step by the City Council. The issue had not been highly publicized or discussed. People simply looked the proposition over, saw it as sound business and OKed it. Many observers declared that good rains and three good oil wells had more to do with swinging the bond issue than anything else. We don't adhere to that belief. People of Haskell have come to realize that a number of progressive steps are going to have to be taken if this city is to stay abreast of the times. Growth for the next few years has been assured Haskell by oil play and the laws of nature, but local people have shown a determination to be ready for that growth. It is highly possible that a refinery will be located here (prospective builders already have been looking for a local site), and several other prospective Haskell citizens have looked over this area for locations.

It never was a good policy to wait until visitors arrived to make preparations for a visit. If Haskell is to be chosen as a site for a refinery, an up-to-date bakery, oil and gas wholesale distributors, a canning plant, or other businesses, we are going to have to show prospects the town is ready for them to locate here.

Coke Makes a Prediction

Governor Coke Stevenson came forth this week with the prediction that Grover Sellers and Beauford Jester will be the two leading candidates for governor when the first Democratic primary is held July 27. Governor Stevenson intimated these two men would be the leading candidates because they follow the trend followed by the incumbent—that of keeping quiet and doing nothing. Never has Texas had a governor in the mansion at Austin who does that job quite so completely as does Stevenson, and Texas people are ready for a man who will at least make himself known and express a view or opinion on matters of state. We are not taking a stand against Sellers and Jester. Rather, we are disappointed because the present governor puts his sanction on a couple of candidates who have proved they are men of action and who are dedicated to a more progressive Texas. It is not to their advantage to be picked by Stevenson, because many people will get the impression that they are being supported by Stevenson interests. If a majority of the voters of Texas were for policies and practices of the incumbent he would be a candidate for reelection.

We don't know who is to be in the runoff after the primaries, but we are prone to believe that Mr. Stevenson has missed his guess on at least one choice. Dr. Homer P. Rainey, our neighbor John Lee Smith or some of the other hopefuls may be in the runoff with Jester, but we don't like to see Stevenson cast a shadow on the two men he named.

"Give Unto Others..."

Freedom needs food. Freedom from the Fascist scourge is an empty victory to a man with an empty stomach. So also is freedom meaningless to a dead man. If the peoples of Europe, Asia and Africa are to be free, they must have food. At least 44 per cent of that food must come from America, the most important contribution to freedom we can make at this moment.

Man does not, it is true, live by bread alone. Unless he has bread, however, he will not live. Our immediate task, therefore, is to keep men alive. At this moment we must guarantee the nations of the world, at the very least, a minimal subsistence basis.

Up to now we have done little. Unless our nation acts boldly and swiftly within the next few weeks, it shall be said that America helped deliver mankind from the tyranny of the Axis but turned away with victory at hand and reverted to the isolationism of him who "passed by on the other side."

We Americans, surrounded by security, find it hard to picture lands torn by unrest, barren of transportation, gutted by invasion, and strewn with destruction. In the midst of our abundance we can not easily imagine the stark horror of Europe's empty bread basket, Asia's broken rice bowl, and South Africa's parched fields. Blackened lentil stalks in India are a far cry from our "amber waves of grain." But from us must come the food to stem the tide of famine. If we fail, millions will die. And their death will be traced to a concern that was too tepid, to efforts that were too timid.

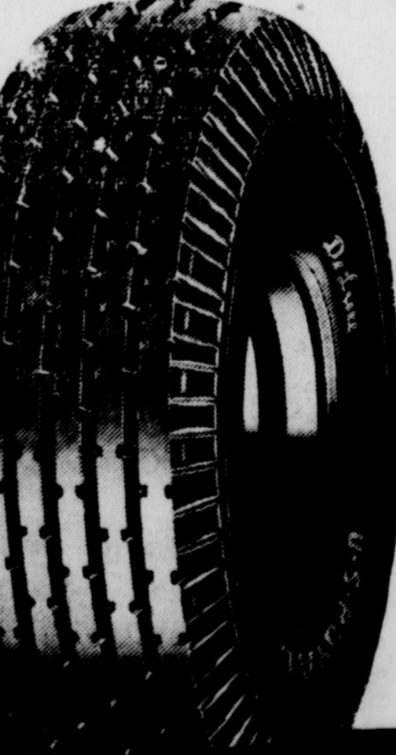

Stockdale Issues Statement to Voters Asking Reelection

To the People of Haskell County and the 39th Judicial District:
In January of this year I first announced that I would be a candidate for re-election to the office of District Attorney of the 39th Judicial District.

First of all I wish to express my appreciation and thanks to everyone for the splendid vote you gave me when I was elected to this important office. Also, I desire to thank all members of the petit jury panels and grand jurors

whom I have had the pleasure of working with; and for the courteous cooperation I have received from the public generally in the investigation and trial of cases. This fine spirit manifested by you has indeed been a source of inspiration to me in the discharge of my duties as your District Attorney.

Your district court is disposing of more business and more cases at this time than in many years. This is largely due to the trend of the times, and to the fact that we now have what is known as continuous terms in the 39th Judicial District. The terms of court remain the same but each term now extends over until the following term, which system is of great benefit to the public generally.

This means that when cases arise coming under the jurisdiction of the district court they are disposed of without the delay of waiting until the next term begins as was necessary in former years. Therefore, your district court is in session at all times for the dispatch of business in all counties of the district, and the grand jury may be called in by the District Judge whenever necessary.

One of the important problems of our nation and district today is that of juvenile delinquency. No doubt you are aware of this fact by personal observation or by reading articles written and published by many of our leading law enforcement officials. The United States Attorney General's Department has been devoting a great deal of time and study to this question in recent weeks.

As your District Attorney I have given special attention to these cases even though many of them are customarily filed in the county court. I believe that the hope of our democracy is with our boys and girls. They are our future citizens and leaders; and should be directed into the paths of constructive and reliable citizenship. In many instances outside influences, unknown to parents, have contributed largely to delinquency cases. Therefore, it is of utmost importance that efficient and careful investigations be made in each individual case in order to correctly determine the cause and source. By work-

ing closely with the peace officers of all the counties in the district these investigations are being made as each case comes to our attention. It has been a pleasure for me to work in cooperation with the Judges, schools and parents in order to dispose of these cases swiftly and constructively for the best interests of all concerned. The results accomplished thus far have been most gratifying. However, we cannot afford to release our vigilance in dealing with this problem. If elected, you may be assured that this policy will be carried forward vigorously in order to hold our juvenile delinquency cases to a minimum number.

These are important times in the history of law enforcement. Times in which experience counts a great deal in the investigation and trial of cases. I feel that the experience gained while serving as your District Attorney better qualifies me to give more efficient service in office during the important term just ahead. Because of the additional duties of the office at this time, it will be impossible for me to see each voter before the election. Therefore, in the event I do not have the pleasure of seeing you before July 27th I sincerely trust you will consider this as a personal solicitation for your vote and active support.
